Dear Parents and Friends

Welcome to Week 11, and our last newsletter for the term. At the end of next week you will receive my end-of-term email, which will contain a live link to SEQTA *Engage*, for access to student end of semester reports. Please take the time to have some constructive conversations with your children regarding their academic progress, which can also be discussed during parent/teacher interviews in Term 3.

At Immanuel, our Learning Management System is built on the SEQTA platform, which is an interactive environment that enables teachers, parents and students to work together in one highly collaborative teaching and learning virtual space. Information on student learning and pastoral care is accessible to students, parents and teachers. It allows for tracking of academic achievement, attendance and facilitates live time reporting to parents.

SEQTA provides three dedicated portals for different users:

- SEQTA *Teach* is the working space in which teachers can complete all of their administrative and curriculum work in a single software application. Attendance, curriculum planning and delivery, marks book and assessment, correspondence, student welfare, individual education plan management, online resources management, and more are completed within this portal.
- SEQTA *Learn* is a student portal that allows students to tap into the rich resources created by their teachers and their peers. It allows students to view lesson plans, access resources, submit work electronically, send and receive messages, view their progressive grades, and interact live with their teachers and peers in an online environment. Hence, students can manage all aspects of their school life, including their timetable, collaboration with peers and teachers, content, assessments, grades, goal setting and homework through a single portal.
- SEQTA *Engage* is a parent portal that allows parents to view their children's lesson plans,

timetables, reports, and grades. They can easily communicate with teachers, read the school notices, and engage with their children's education pathway.

We will include your login details for SEQTA *Engage* in the email, and if you have any access difficulties please contact IT Services on T: 5477 3472. Please also note the previous Parent Portal is now accessible via SEQTA *Engage* but will only display your school fees and allow you to update your contact details. It has been renamed "Finance Portal" to reflect its new purpose and the login details for the Finance Portal are the same as your SEQTA *Engage* login details.

Give Yourself the Gift of Time

It has become a cliché to say we live in a push-button, instant gratification world, but this doesn't simply mean we have become more impatient than our parents. We are seeing an entirely different way of thinking.

There is a natural progression in life, which everyone knew back in the days when we were an agrarian society. You plant, then you cultivate, and finally you harvest. Plant, cultivate, harvest. A slow cycle, repeated over months and years.

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In today's world, everyone wants to go directly from plant to harvest. We plant the seed by joining the gym, and then get frustrated when a few days go by and there's no fitness harvest. Like taking steroids to enhance athletic performance or a miracle diet, or one night cramming before a test.

The step we keep overlooking is the step of cultivating. And that, unlike planting and harvesting, takes place only through the patient dimension of time. Partly because we are a culture raised on television and movies, we've lost track of time. Through a great film, you can experience the triumph of the human soul over adversity, the drama of a struggle between doing what's right and succumbing to the temptations of the world, the flowering of a great romance.... but it all has to be finished in two hours. Can you imagine meeting the person who will become the love of your life – the dating, courtship, romance, wedding and life thereafter – in two hours? Of course not. But in a world filled with instant coffee, instant breakfast, instant shopping, instant news and instant information, we have come dangerously close to losing touch with reality and believing we have access to instant life.

Past generations learned about life through books. Books take time to read. A child who a generation ago might have spent a month reading Charles Dickens' novel *Great Expectations* can now watch the film version and gobble it up in one hour and fifty-one minutes. In a film, we never see the little steps, repeated hundreds of times, which create the results. There isn't time. In real life, everything important happens through time. Everything worth doing takes time. Human relationships build over time. Skills are learned over time. Time is the key to every piece of human knowledge and development.

Give thanks to God for the gifts of time and life. Perhaps the upcoming vacation period will give us all an opportunity to momentarily withdraw from the 'instant' world and reflect on cultivating.

Taking Care when Driving on Campus

Late last year the College engaged RoadPro Consulting to review traffic flow across the campus. You may have noticed a number of line marking and signage upgrades being implemented throughout the first half of this year as an outcome of the report. During this vacation break we will be increasing the speed limit for Paveways Drive from 25 km/h to 40 km/h. This change aligns the College with the updated school zone on Wises Road and road signage guidelines specified by Queensland Transport. Please note that this speed limit change only applies to the section of road between the Wises Road entrance and the roundabout. All other speed zones remain unchanged at this stage.
