God's Good Crop.

At first glance today's gospel seems to draw a clear distinction between the wheat as the good crop and the darnel as the bad crop. The darnel

was sown by the enemy while everybody was asleep. It was regarded as a toxic crop to be weeded out.

Darnel has an intoxicating effect, if consumed. In fact, its official name, "Lolium temulentum", comes from a Latin word for "drunk." In contrast, wheat is described as the good seed which sprouted and ripened. Indeed, Jesus describes it as a metaphor for his own self-giving love: that "unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit" (John 12:24).

Yet, if the darnel is indeed the bad crop, we might well ask ourselves why the farmer has decided to let both crops grow till the harvest? The answer to that question is that this parable, like all parables, reveals surprising truths about aspects of God. In this instance, it describes the mercy and love of God. Here, God is not a ruthless farmer who is targeting the darnel. Rather, God allows both wheat and darnel to grow to the harvest. Each and everyone has the opportunity to return God.

The Dominican theologian Herbert McCabe explains that we should not be deluded into thinking that, if you are sorry for your sins, God will come and forgive you, that he will be touched by your appeal, change his mind about you and forgive you. McCabe would have us understand that the truth is, instead, that God never changes his mind about you. God is simply in love with you. What he does again and again is change your mind about him. You are not forgiven because you confess your sins. You come to celebrate that your sins are forgiven.

Today's psalm describes God's mercy and compassion. It speaks of a God who is "abounding in love and truth" (Psalm 85:15). John Duns Scotus, the 13th century Franciscan theologian, similarly believed that God did not enter human history because Adam and Eve had sinned; rather, God became man because he loved humanity so much, he desired to be one with us. In the midst of our struggles, God takes the initiative and draws near to us. The second reading describes how "the Spirit comes to help us on our weakness. For when we cannot choose words in order to pray properly, the Spirit himself expresses our plea in a way that could never be put into words" (Romans 8:26). We are called to an awareness that God loves us immensely and to respond to God's love and fulfil our destiny as flourishing beings, nourished in the rich soil of God's compassion and mercy.

the readings have an understatement that God alone is our judge. Thank goodness he is kind and merčiful.

Our first reading steps back from the retribution and violence common in the Old

Testament and focuses on God's mercy and protection. Characteristics such as patience, tolerance and leniency are examples for his people and implies they should act with kindness towards others. The paradox of God's strength and power enacted through kindness, gentleness and mercy are not always obvious in our current state of national tensions.

This nature of God is reinforced in Paul's letter about prayer to the Romans and demonstrates how eager God is for their redemption. They are not confident about what prayer is; its format, posture, content (are we?). He tells them that the Spirit intercedes for them in prayer, interpreting their 'heart' to reveal their intentions to God. Under the Spirit's influence and in his presence, they can expect their relationship with God is maturing. This revelation must have been very encouraging.

The parable of the weeds (gospel) attempts to reveal the Word to disciples and anyone who would listen. We might hear, "Why does God allow this to happen?" and parables give us an insight into how God operates. This one pictures the enemy sowing weeds in the wheat in the

The parable of the weeds continues the dark of night (a euphemism for evil), and highlights the teaching of the Word through parables. All subversive and cunning way it can go unnoticed until its subversive and cunning way it can go unnoticed until its effects are felt or seen. How do we feel about, 'Let them both grow'? We have to deal with this in our life with patience and trust and remember we are all a mixture of dark and light. Can experiencing 'dark' clarify for us what is 'light'?

As with the movement from 'Law' to 'Love', we learn that God judges intention, attitude and our nature. Perhaps warnings from this parable could include not judging others, that acting too soon can affect the 'wheat', and to remember what God deems important. How does this fit with society's problems today? Will God judge us the society of the society as weeds or wheat?

Do we have difficulty discerning dark and light motiva-tions and influences? Can we learn from experience? Are we aware of the weeds in our life? If we were planted in rich soil (last week), do we have an obligation to produce a harvest?

The two other parables simply show what incredible effects can be generated from such a small cause. In the face of persecution and rejection. Jesus wanted the disciples to know that every effort counts and not to give up. If we're to grow our church we're probably at that stage again.
