

#### Not an easy life

One of St Paul's proudest boasts was that he had worked harder, travelled further and suffered a great deal more than any of the other apostles (1 Cor 15:9-10). In 2 Corinthians (6:3-13; 11:23-33) he catalogues the trials and tribulations he had experienced for the sake of his "children" (6:13), which included "far more imprison-

ments, far worse beatings, and numerous brushes with death" (11:23).

What made this even more remarkable is Paul's age. Paul would have been close to sixty years of age when he was evangelising the cities of the Aegean Basin. By the time he wrote Romans, from which we derive our second reading today, he would have been in his mid-60s.

As implied by his list of troubles in 2 Corinthians, Paul's career was anything but a "cake walk"; nor was it a career that involved a well-deserved retirement in his twilight years. He was beheaded in Rome around the year 64 CE, along with many other Christians who died at the behest of the Emperor Nero.

Paul stands as a clear example of one who chose the "good life" over a "comfortable life". He stood up for what he believed. He stood out by travelling, writing, and building up Christianity. But, in doing so, his life was far from comfortable.

Matthew's Jesus similarly warns his disciples that choosing to follow him will involve tough decisions. The irony of the biblical record is that the immediate "reward" for all of those who chose to live a good life is all-too-often hardship, misunderstanding, persecution and even death at the hands of their persecutors. Sometimes, these difficulties will even be visited upon us from within our family circle.

This passage in Matthew will reverberate throughout the rest of the gospel, most notably for our purposes in Matthew 13:54-58, where Jesus returns to his hometown. He enters the Synagogue expecting a ready welcome from his former neighbours and friends, only to encounter misunderstanding and disbelief. Jesus observes that "Prophets are not without honour except in their own country and in their own house" (Mt 13:57).

We might think of this episode as a first century Judaean form of the Australian "tall poppy syndrome" — the tendency to discredit rising stars whom the mob believes are too "full of themselves" or "take themselves too seriously".

The fear of ridicule and misunderstanding may tempt us to forego making the tough decisions or the right choices in life. We don't want to stand out or stand up for fear of being knocked down, especially in matters of public faith-practice. But as Paul and Jesus testify, standing up and standing out is the only real path to the good life – that is, a life built on purpose and meaning.

#### SCRIPTURE SCRUTINY

2 Kings 4: 8 - 11 Romans 6: 3 - 4, 8 - 11 Matthew 10: 37 - 42



Elisha, Elijah's successor, was a prophet in the time when Israel was still two kingdoms north and south. He was fortunate that a nation's success was judged on its loyalty to God. He was unfortunate that Israel's lack of it would lead to its demise. On his regular travels to Shunem, Elisha stayed in the house

of a kindly couple who, on the insistence of the woman, built an extra room for him. Her kindness was rewarded with one of Elisha's many miracles. Though old, she would bear a son. The scenario demonstrated the following:

- The woman showed great faith in action (charity to Elisha).
- People of faith can work together. He showed faith while she showed a compassion that he didn't have.
- There was a reciprocal gratitude (not always the case but God always notices).

Does some act of love that we've seen come to mind? Do we need to change in some small way? Have we been thankful that a need was answered, but not fully acknowledged what just happened; the exchange and intimacy between you and God?

Paul, who relied heavily on the resurrection, focuses on baptism in his letter to the Romans.

- He considers it to be where we identify with Jesus' death. It was their death to sin wherein they are no longer pre-judged.
- From immersion in the tomb (and font water) with him, and then emerging from it to a new life in God, there is now hope.

This was important for converted Jews because it also meant the death of the Law for them. What would we like to be raised away from in becoming new? Would we be enthusiastic about putting God 'out there' by our actions so that others might feel they should investigate?

But this new life can also be a challenge. In Matthew, Jesus insists on us prioritising love of God over love of family. Its harshness may be lessened by viewing it as putting things in order. Loving God first helps us to love our family better by showing empathy, guidance, forgiveness. We can go deeper than human perception and reflex. It follows that we can better love the marginalised, the suffering, the earth. How do we cope with family (or friends) who we objectively think are guilty of significant sin? Do we feel a tug-of-war? Is this suffering and confusion an act of "taking up our cross"? Can we trust in God's love and mercy?


