

Fr Michael's Reflections...

Forgiveness

People are sometimes surprised when they are reminded about how much Jesus insisted that we forgive one another. He said that if we want to receive God's mercy, we must show mercy to others. Jesus showed people how to forgive in this way when he was being crucified. He prayed to the Father, "forgive them, for they know not what they do".

Many saints have followed the example of Jesus and forgiven even those who were hurting and killing them. Sometimes, they had good people to encourage them to forgive.

Maria Goretti was viciously attacked by a young man when she refused his advances. She was taken to hospital, but was dying. The parish priest came to give Maria the Sacraments and before she died he encouraged Maria to forgive

her attacker. Maria responded, "for the love of Jesus I forgive him... and I want him to be with me in paradise." For that reason, she is a patroness for those struggling to forgive.

Forgiveness doesn't mean forgetting about justice.



And we should defend ourselves and others. Maria's attacker was taken to jail, and he needed to be. However, forgiveness requires letting go of revenge. Forgiveness means striving to love as God loves, which is why Maria said "for the love of Jesus" and prayed that her attacker would one day live in heaven. Having this kind of love in our hearts does not depend on the one we are forgiving, but our prayer for their good will only come true if their hearts change.

Meet the Deaf Religious - Fr. Min Seo Park (South Korea)

Fr. Min Seo Park — The First Deaf Priest Ordained in Asia

You may remember Fr Min Seo from when he brought a group of Deaf Koreans to World Youth Day 2008 in Sydney, here's some more information about him!

Fr Park, who was born in 1965, lost his hearing at the age of two after he was prescribed the wrong medicine. He felt the calling to the priesthood at a very young age. At the school for the deaf he met Fr Michael Cheong-Soon-o, to whom he revealed his desire to become a priest, but because of the lack of courses for the deaf in Korean seminaries he was sent to the United States.



In 1994 he entered the University of Gallaudet to study philosophy and mathematics, and there he met Fr Thomas Coughlin, the first deaf priest in the US, who became his spiritual director. After graduating he studied theology at St. Joseph's Seminary in New York and then attended the University of St. John, where he received a degree in 2004. He returned to Seoul in South Korea where he continued his studies at the seminary and was ordained a deacon in July of 2006.

When he was a seminarian in the United States, he was given a special opportunity to participate in serving the Deaf in the absence of the priest who usually ministers a particular parish community. The priest who has ministered the Deaf since 1968, was supposed to preside at the Holy Week liturgies. Unfortunately, he became ill and was temporarily unable to fulfil his responsibilities.

Three Deaf people in the congregation carefully observed him as he explained God's Word in sign language. They were shocked when they learnt he was Deaf, as they never thought that Deaf people could lead liturgies and preach. They believed that it was impossible for Deaf people to be ordained or become leaders because they never saw Deaf leaders serving the church. Through this, their attitudes and beliefs changed. Fr Min Seo Park learned that even if no priests preside at Mass in the Deaf church, Deaf lay people could lead liturgical service. It is important that Deaf lay people be responsible and involved in the Deaf church.






Out and About in the Deaf Community

Pope Francis does not ordinarily celebrate the Sacrament of Matrimony, but on 9th July, he made an exception for a young Italian Deaf couple, who were married in the chapel at his residence, Casa Santa Marta. Teodoro Pisciottani and Paulina Szczepanska,

the daughter of a Vatican employee, received this rare blessing by the Holy Father, an unforgettable story that they

will one day be able to tell to their children. Teodoro and Paulina are active in cultural events for the deaf community in Padua, in northern Italy, including a version of "Big Brother" for the deaf and being on the Deaf Youth Committee.



A New Bishop for Parramatta!

As you may know, Ephpheta is the Catholic Ministry for deaf people, serving across the dioceses of Sydney, Parramatta and Broken Bay. So on 16 June we were very excited to be invited to the installation of the new Bishop of Parramatta Bishop Vincent Long Van Nguyen at Parramatta Cathedral.

It was a beautiful service – we were all very proud of our own Donovan Mulligan



who led one of the Prayers of the Faithful in Auslan. We were also very proud of our interpreters, Nicole, Daina, Kate and Rosanna, who worked very hard interpreting the service. Archbishop Fisher, who was previously the Bishop of Parramatta and is now the Archbishop of the Sydney Archdiocese, led the service. Bishop Vincent spoke about his life – arriving in Australia as a refugee boat person from Vietnam "Our boat journey was risky. There were more people on board than the boat could carry safely. By the third day, we had run out of food, water and fuel. From then on, we were at the mercy of the elements. On the seventh day, we

drifted near an oil rig, half alive and half dead," he said in an interview with the Australian Catholic Bishops' Conference in 2015. He and his family were rescued and settled in a refugee camp in Malaysia, where he stayed for 16 months. He was accepted to come to Australia in 1981. He felt a

vocation for religious life when he was a young teenager living in Vietnam. Before his appointment to Parramatta, Bishop Vincent was an Auxiliary Bishop in Melbourne. Archbishop Denis Hart said, "Bishop Long has used his considerable gifts to reach out to many people in Melbourne, he is a fitting leader of Australia's biggest non-metropolitan diocese in Parramatta. Bishop Long brings to Parramatta a wide knowledge of people and a deep compassion for them. He has endeared himself to so many by his genuine interest in people's spiritual needs, he will be a very effective pastor in Parramatta." Bishop Vincent is the Australian bishops' delegate for migrants and refugees and chairman of the Australian Catholic Social Justice Council. Welcome to Bishop Vincent!

endeavours on this new adventure. Good luck Danni, we hope to see you on the big screen one day in the future!






were and why they enjoy DYS. Here's what they had to say!



History Corner

Bill Flaherty

Bill Flaherty was one of the best known members of the Catholic Deaf Association of NSW and was a great friend with many of St Gabriel's exstudents over many years.

William Roy 'Bill' Flaherty was born in Maitland district, NSW in December 1918, of Aboriginal parents, names unknown. He was left on the doorstep of a priest's house when a few days old. The priest's name was Father William Flaherty of St Joseph parish. Maitland Diocese and he gave his surname to the

infant. For many years Bill was cared for by Misses Soorley and Ada Morgan and Mrs Walker. He lived in several foster homes as he grew up.

Bill went to board at St Gabriel's School for Deaf Boys Castle Hill in February 1924 at the age of 5 and left school in 1937. He was very grateful for the patience shown by the Christian Brothers in training him to become a self supporting member of the community.

When Bill finished school he worked as a handyman at St Joseph's Home for retired priests at Morriset where he stayed for three years. During the Second World War he came to Sydney and worked as a handy man at a number of convents, hotels and presbyteries. He then worked as a dry cleaner at Tamworth for few years and returned to Sydney to work as a cleaner in various hotels and also as a dry cleaner.

For seven years Bill was the secretary of the St Gabriel's Old Boys Association. He also served on the committee of the Catholic Deaf Association, of which he was president in 1944.

Since his retirement Bill lived at Blacktown. He spent a lot of time with his close old school friend, Tom Houlcroft and his growing family. He spent the last few months of his life at Woy Woy, a place he loved very much. He never married. When he was about 21 years old he was jilted at the altar. His hearing fiancé never turned up on his wedding day!

William Roy Flaherty died on 3 August 1993 at the age of 74 and was buried in Castle Hill cemetery. His bright personality and sense of fun made him a welcome visitor wherever he went. His faith was a good example to everyone.


