# A Message from Liz & Dave...

#### Liz's report

I was recently reading an article written by a friend. He was talking about the ancient Japanese art of kintsugi, - this is where a broken pot is mended with gold. I had never



heard of this before but was interested to learn more. Instead of the artist trying to cover up the fault, the broken pot is mended with gold.

Instead of the cracks being hidden, they are



made a feature. This is to show the history of the pot and show the beauty of the broken thing which is made whole again.

What if we could learn to do the same with our lives?

When we are cracked and broken, we often try to cover up our brokenness. But when we fail or make a mistake - this is when we learn. Our mistakes and failures teach us things about ourselves and about other people.

And when we are cracked and broken, this is when we should turn to God and His unfailing love. God loves and accepts us in our humanity and in our brokenness. And God tells us to love and accept each other in the same way.

No matter how wounded we are, God can heal us. If we have a willing and loving heart - and come to God for help - God can take the shattered pieces of our life and heal us. We receive this healing when we pray, when we spend time with God and especially in the Eucharist. The Eucharist is the highest point of love and tenderness, of the power of God's healing. Through it, God can make us into something even greater - a glorious whole that is made stronger, more beautiful, more complete. Just like the broken pot.

#### Fr Michael's Reflection...

Glory, praise, and honour to God for the Ephpheta Centre! Thanks to God for all the graces and gifts that He has given over the past 40 years. Thanks to all the kind-hearted people who have helped and supported the work of Ephpheta. Thanks to all those who have brought the Ephpheta community to life and nourished it by giving of themselves. Thank you to Jesus for the life of faith and love that has been received and handed on in this community. May Jesus lead us to everlasting life.



Jesus revealed God to humanity when he became man. We saw God, who is Love, walking among us. He called us to be remade in the image of God who created us. We know that image, because we know Jesus, who loved us with the love of God. It was people remade in that image by their faith and actions, who established the Ephpheta centre and built a community around it.

A famous painting in Ephpheta, painted by Ron Wild, a member of the community, shows a moment in the Gospels when the love of God for the deaf was witnessed; the healing of the deaf man. The word "Ephpheta" comes from the word Jesus said to the deaf man when He healed him. This glimpse of the love of God is full of meaning.

As we look back on 40 years, this little Scripture can be an encouragement to the Ephpheta community. See how we were like Jesus. Jesus was seen in us. Even though there were mistakes and sins, there were also times when we were like Jesus or made in His image. This Scripture can also be an inspiration for the future. It can show us how to be more like Jesus and more like God.

Think of the hard life of the deaf man in the Scripture. He had no proper language like you have. He would have had almost no access to the minds of those around him, as the miracles of Jesus and hope in Him were discussed. He would have been brought along, not knowing what the fuss was about. Perhaps, he was embarrassed and disturbed to see those who brought him pleading with a man for him, as a crowd watched on.

I imagine the man was a little relieved, when the first thing this man (Jesus) did, was take him aside from the crowd to communicate privately. Thanks again to everyone who helped to start Ephpheta and work for the good the community. Sometimes you must not have known how best to proceed, but you gave it your best and left the rest to God. And, I don't know if you have noticed, but you have all grown in understanding of how to interact with one another as brothers and sisters, respecting each other's gifts and supporting one another.

May we continue to become more like Jesus in this regard.

[Jesus] put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue; and looking up to heaven, he sighed,

and said to him, "Ephpheta," that is, "Be opened."

Jesus *signed*. Descriptively, yes. Still, before any known sign language, Jesus communicated with the deaf man by touch, gesture, body language, and facial expression. He also spoke a single, distinct word, "eph-pha-tha".

Hearing people are sometimes surprised by how directly (and sometimes explicitly) Deaf people communicate. I imagine some Deaf

people are surprised by how directly Jesus communicated, putting his fingers in the man's ears and spittle on his tongue! Yet, remember that the love and familiarity of Jesus towards the man is the same as that of the Creator who made the first man from moistened earth and breathed life into him.

Mother Mary, Mirror of Grace, help us to reflect the image of your son in our lives. Help us to love one another as Jesus loved. Amen. Father Michael.

### It is our pleasure to introduce Stephen and Nola Lawlor.

Stephen was involved for many years as a pastoral worker and then Director of the Ephpheta Centre. Nola was also one of the first deaf employees at the Ephpheta Centre. Stephen and Nola are well known and loved by many in the deaf community. They are both wonderful people. In 2012 Stephen received a Papal Knighthood for his service to the Church. We took the opportunity to catch up with them and ask them a few questions.



# What was the first time that you came to the Ephpheta Centre?

Stephen: It was around 1980 or 1981.

Fr Peter Fitzgerald encouraged me to get involved with Ephpheta Centre. So, every month I went to Ephpheta at Lewisham. I took my family there as much as we could.

**Nola:** In about 1972 I found out about a new Catholic club for deaf people which had many ex- Waratah and St Gabriel's students. Father Ryan ran this group – he taught us about many

different things including Catholic teaching. It was after this time that Ephpheta started.

After I was married and was raising a family life got very busy. It was lovely that deaf friendly and accessible Masses were available to us. We were lucky to have other deaf families so we were able to have social outings together. There were lots of Church outings. The Mass services were wonderful with growing numbers of deaf people.






#### What role has the Ephpheta Centre had in your life?

**Stephen:** I was at Ephpheta as a member of the Ephpheta community. I was the chairperson for the Parramatta deaf catholic group. I was interested in going to this group because many of our deaf friends had families at the same time. We all participated in the group's activities and our children grew up together. It was rather nice and easy going!

When I was about 50 years old, I decided that I was not happy continuing with my job as a printer. The industry had changed due to technology.



After a few years doing different work, Fr Peter Woodward approached me and asked me whether I would like to work as a pastoral worker? I started working part time and then after a year went to full time.

After a number of years, I was approached by the Archdiocese of Sydney about becoming the director of the Ephpheta Centre. This was a big step for me.



**Nola:** In about 2005 I started work at the Ephpheta I worked with Sr Mary Silk,



Shirley Carroll and some other people. We did lots of food preparation for hearing impaired people. We served tea for morning tea after Mass. We helped take some of the community home after Mass services. We did lots of pastoral visits.







# What are your favourite things about the Ephpheta Centre?

**Stephen:** I always loved being involved in accessible Mass services - understanding the services, homily and presentations. I also love getting involved in the community. The community spirit was very strong. We had many activities such as fancy dress comps, BBQs, fund raising events, and so on. Ephpheta taught me a lot and the Deaf

community taught me a lot as well. I really loved to be part of the deaf community.

**Nola:** My most favourite thing about Ephpheta is going to the Mass. Being able to understand what is going on during the Mass service. Signed services are great.

#### What changes have you seen at the Ephpheta Centre over the years?

**Stephen:** I have seen BIG changes happen at Ephpheta. We were able to have more accessible Mass services. We always have tried to make Ephpheta the place where people are made welcome. Other deaf organisations look up to Ephpheta. At that time, we didn't have many interpreters involved. Nowadays we have many more interpreted events. How much we have gone through! This year is Ephpheta's 40th year of operation. I hope we will maintain this good work for the next 40 years!

**Nola:** When I think about my old days compared to today and future at Ephpheta. I think Ephpheta is still going well. It is important we have more new people join up.

# What are you hopes for the Ephpheta Centre for the future?

**Stephen:** I would love to see Ephpheta to keep running with an expanded team. Ephpheta should keep on providing improved services to the deaf community. I hope to see more deacons and priests who can use Auslan competently to provide Mass services for the deaf community.



**Nola:** I hope to see Ephpheta Centre still grow and the use of technology to help us understand our Catholic faith. Love is important. Maintaining spiritual connection is very important.

### It is our pleasure to introduce Margaret and Brian Johnston.

Both have played important roles in the life of the Ephpheta Centre and have made great contributions to the Catholic Deaf Community over many years. Brian has been involved on many deaf committees and organisations in a variety of capacities. We are also grateful for Brian for his long- running contributions to the Deaf history page in our Ephpheta newsletter. Margaret has been involved in many deaf organisations and committees over many many years. They are both valued members of our Ephpheta community and wonderful people. We thank them for their years of service and support.



#### When and how did you first learn about the Ephpheta Centre?

Brian: In 1979 I went to a special conference in Canberra called "Deaf People in the Church". This was organised by a priest in Melbourne with his Catholic deaf group. This conference followed a conference in Sydney in 1977 which focused on deaf Catholics had in the Church. So after the Canberra conference, Ephpheta was set up in Sydney in 1979. This was a big breakthrough when people were working full-time to support deaf Catholic people. Ephpheta started with a small team. I was involved for many years with CADHIPA (Catholic Association for Deaf and Hearing Impaired People of Australia). I was on the first Sydney CADHIPA committee. I was also involved in both the Sydney and Parramatta Catholic Deaf Associations.

**Margaret:** I first heard about Ephpheta Centre when my then boyfriend (who later became my husband), Brian, took me to Ephpheta Sunday Mass at St Francis of Assisi's Catholic Church, Paddington in 1985. That day was the first time I had ever seen Mass signed and finally had a better understanding of the service even though I was not Catholic.

### What was the first time that you came to the Ephpheta Centre?

Margaret: After the Ephpheta Sunday Mass in 1985 Brian and I attended the Ephpheta Sunday luncheon that was being held in the Centre It was the start of many lifetime friendships with the Catholic Deaf Community members.



#### What role has the Ephpheta Centre had in your life?

Margaret: After my marriage to Brian in 1986 I continued to attend Mass run by the Ephpheta Centre. Due to our family's involvement with the Church I decided to become Catholic. Fr Peter Fitzgerald received me in to the Catholic Church with the Catholic Deaf Community at Lewisham Chapel during the Easter Vigil in 1989. I have been involved with Ephpheta Centre for many years as a Choir Member (later Choir Leader), Pastoral Council Member and currently as a Pastoral Care Volunteer

# What activities and events have you enjoyed with the Ephpheta Centre over the years?



Margaret: Ephpheta Centre organised for Catholic Deaf Community members to be part of the many 200,000 people to attend the Open Air Mass at Sydney's Randwick Racecourse during Pope John Paul II's visit in 1986 and it was a lovely atmosphere to be there. As our children grew we enjoyed the Family Weekends

held at Mulgoa run by the Ephpheta Centre and the Catholic Deaf Trust which enabled the families to come together and have fun. I also attended the Deaf Encounter Christ weekend which was very spiritually uplifting.

# What are your favourite things about the Ephpheta Centre?

Margaret: The love of pastoral care volunteering under Ephpheta Centre has enriched my life which has led me to a new path and new challenges. Due to family and work commitments, I have yet to enjoy any pilgrimages organised by



Ephpheta Centre (Brian has been to many) and I hope I get the chance one day.

#### What changes have you seen at the Ephpheta Centre over the years?



Margaret: Ephpheta Centre has made Mass easier for us to understand by having Auslan interpreters in attendance. The involvement from hearing staff to Deaf/Hearing Impaired staff has been an impact and Ephpheta Centre is relying on volunteers to continue their work.

#### What are your hopes for the Ephpheta Centre for the future?

Brian: My hope for the future of the Ephpheta
Centre is that deaf people will continue to be
involved and will continue to be supported by the
Ephpheta Centre. That deaf people are more
involved in the Church and the community, that
Ephpheta will continue to be a comfortable and
helpful place for deaf people and their friends. I
hope that more chaplains and priests will learn sign
language.



**Margaret:** That Ephpheta Centre will still be around for the next generation (who knows what the future holds).

# Our Ephpheta Sunday Celebrations

Every year in early August the Catholic Church throughout the world celebrates a special event known as Ephpheta Sunday. This is linked to the reading which happens through Mass of when Jesus meets the deaf man (the reading is set out in the Gospel of Mark) and He says to the deaf man "Ephpheta" (which means to "be open"). Every year on Ephpheta Sunday the Church celebrates the gifts which deaf people bring to the life of the Church. It celebrates the gift of language and the gift of community. Ephpheta Sunday has always been the "big day" in the Ephpheta Centre's calendar



since the Ephpheta Centre first opened its doors in Paddington in 1979.

#### And this year – what a big day we had!!!

On Sunday 4 August we started our Ephpheta Sunday celebrations by joining the congregation at St Patrick's Cathedral at Parramatta. About 160 deaf people participated in the Mass which was brilliant. Bishop Vincent Long celebrated the Mass – he was joined by our chaplain Fr Michael Lanzon, Fr John Hill (former chaplain at JPC in Melbourne), Fr John Paul Escarlan (who helps with deaf chaplaincy in the Parramatta diocese and undertook his pastoral placement at Ephpheta), Fr Shinto Francis (assistant priest from St Bernadette's at Castle Hill who undertook his pastoral placement at Ephpheta) and Fr Fernando Montano (parish priest of St Bernadette's Castle Hill, former chaplain for the deaf in Hong Kong and long-time friend of the Ephpheta Centre). We were so lucky to have these priests who are good friends of Ephpheta and our deaf community celebrate Mass for and with us.

We were so proud to have Stephen Lawlor lead the reading and Edith and Ernie Gartner present the offertory to Bishop Vincent.

After Mass, we made our way to the Park Royal for an afternoon of fun and friendship. We all enjoyed a delicious 3 course lunch. There were some interesting presentations by Stephen Lawlor and Murreall O'Connor (and videoed greeting from Br Reg and Br Gerry) and all of the Ephpheta team were involved in the presentations. Everyone enjoyed the fantastic photo display put together by the Ephpheta team (special thanks to Pat for her amazing work!!) and all had fun in the photo booth! Thanks to the great team of interpreters who made the day accessible for everyone.

# Words of Remembrance for Mary Silk

Many in our community will remember Sr Mary Silk who worked for many years with the Ephpheta Centre. All who met Sr Mary will remember her kindness, gentleness and sense of humour. Unfortunately, Sr Mary passed away on 21 May 2019. Some of the community travelled to Wagga for her funeral. Here is an extract from one of the eulogies at her funeral:

Sister Mary Silk was born in Boroowa and educated in Young. Mary entered the Presentation Sisters in 1948 and enjoyed 68 years living out her Religious

Living in community with Mary we experienced a dynamic, energetic woman of great faith. Mary's ability to reach out to people in need was a special characteristic of hers.

Following 30 years as teacher, Principal and Community Leader, suddenly Mary experienced

loss of hearing. She turned the loss into a new ministry of involvement with the hard of hearing. She became a leading light in the *Better Hearing Association* in Sydney where she undertook to visit each Parish and request hearing loops be installed.

Mary cris-crossed Sydney to conduct lip-reading classes for the hard of hearing. Mary was always involved in her parish and loved to share her Faith. Mary was a marvelous communicator.

Mary the woman we honour today was loving, faith-filled, and prayerful with a zest for living. No doubt Mary has already checked with God as to whether we are in God's hearing loop.

## **History Corner**

#### **Sister Mary Columba Dwyer**


Sister Mary Columba Dwyer was Superior of Waratah Deaf School (Rosary Convent) in Newcastle NSW from 1895 to 1924 under whose wise guidance the School flourished and became renowned throughout Australia. The beloved and revered Sister Mary Columba had a tremendous part in the education of the Deaf for 37 years since 1886.

Sister Mary Columba was born Kathleen Dwyer in Albury NSW in 1860, one of ten children of Irish born parents, William and Anastasia Dwyer. In 1881 she entered the Dominican Sisters at Maitland and became Sister Mary Columba. Her name 'Columba' was named after the great Celtic saint. In 1886 she

was sent to Newcastle, and began her life's work with the Deaf. She became a great friend of Sister Mary Gabriel Hogan, Deaf nun there.

Sister Mary Columba had two brothers who became a Bishop - Vincent Dwyer of Maitland the first Australian-born Bishop in 1897 and Joseph Dwyer the first Bishop of Wagga Wagga in 1918. Three other brothers died very young.

Sister Mary Columba was appointed as Mother Superior of the Waratah Deaf School in 1895. She continued as Superior right up to the time of her death in 1924. It would have been considered an advantage to have Mother Mary Columba as superior during the time her own brother was the bishop of the diocese.

Agnes Lynch (ex-student) remembered that when Bishop Joseph Dwyer visited

Waratah in 1939 he spoke to girls in sign language. It seems that Sister Mary Columba encouraged her family to become fluent in sign language.

Mother Mary Columba died at Waratah on 23 March 1924 at the age of 64 and was buried at Sandgate. She died just one year after the establishment of St Gabriel's School for Deaf boys – that for which she so long worked and prayed had been achieved. In 1926 a beautiful monument (group of Statuary depicting Jesus healing deaf man) was erected in Rosary Convent grounds in memory of Mother Mary Columba.
