A READING FROM THE SCROLL OF EZEKIEL

The Lord said to me, "Son of man, I appoint you as a guard for the family of Israel. If you hear a warning from me, you must tell the people in my name.

If I say that evil people will die but you do not warn them to change their ways so that they can save their lives, then as sinners they will die, but you will be responsible for their death. If you do warn evil people, telling them to repent, and they do not stop sinning, as sinners they will die, but you will not be responsible and you will save your own life."

Psalm - TODAY WE WILL LISTEN TO GOD. WE WILL NOT LET OUR HEARTS BECOME HARD.


Come, let us praise and thank the Lord!

A READING FROM ST PAUL'S LETTER TO THE ROMANS

Try not to owe anything to anyone. The only thing that you will always owe is love. If you love people, you have followed the law.

All the commandments: You must not commit (do) the sin of adultery, you must not kill, you must not steal, you must not covet (want the things that belong to other people), and other laws altogether - the Ten Commandments - are really the same as one law: 'You must love other people the same as you love yourself.'

Love can not hurt your neighbour. This means that, if you love people, you are following the ten commandments.

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF MATTHEW

Jesus said to his disciples, "If your brother does something wrong to you, go and tell him in private.

If he listens to you, you have saved your brother's soul.

If he does not listen, bring one or two people with you - two or three



witnesses will be able to tell what happened. If your brother refuses to listen to these people, report it to the community.

If your brother refuses to listen to the community, then treat him like a pagan or a tax collector.

I tell you the truth. Anything you agree on earth shall be (same) agreed in heaven. Anything you prohibit on earth shall be (same) prohibited in heaven.

I tell you again, if on earth two of you agree to ask anything and pray for it, my Father in heaven will give it to you.

This is because if two or three people meet in my name (Jesus), I will be there with them."

24th Sunday in Ordinary Time Sunday 13 September

A READING FROM THE SCROLL OF ECCLESIASTICUS

Anger and resentment are terrible things; sinners have both. The Lord knows your sins, and if you punish someone, the Lord will punish you.

If someone hurts you but you forgive them, your sins will be forgiven when you pray. If you are angry with another person, why do you expect compassion from the Lord?

You yourself are a sinner, but if you show no pity for another sinner, why do you expect the Lord to show pity to you.

Do not forget you are human, if you hold anger or resentment, you have no hope of forgiveness. Think about it!

One day you will die, and your body will become like dust. So better stop hating, and follow the commandments.

Remember God's covenant (promise) and do not hold a grudge (resent) or get upset about people's faults.

Psalm - THE LORD IS FULL OF COMPASSION AND LOVE, SLOW TO ANGER, QUICK TO FORGIVE.

My soul, thank the Lord! Bless his holy name. I will never forget all his blessings. He always forgives us.

The Lord heals us. He saves our life from the grave. He will not be angry for ever. He loves us. He will take away all our sins.



A READING FROM ST PAUL'S LETTER TO THE ROMANS

Our lives and death can influence people. If we live, we live for the Lord. If we die, we die for the Lord.

So, alive or dead, we all belong to the Lord.

This explains why Christ died and rose to life. Christ did this so that He could be Lord over all people, alive or dead.

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF MATTHEW

Peter came to Jesus and asked, "Lord, every time my brother sins against me, how many times must I forgive him? Seven times?"



Jesus answered, "I tell you, not seven times, but more: seventy seven times."

"The kingdom of heaven is like a king that decided to collect the money that his servants owed him. The king asked his servants to come and see him.

The first servant owed the king ten thousand coins, but he could not pay back, he had no money. So the king said that the servant should sell his house, his things, his wife and children, to pay off the bill.

But the servant fell on his knees and begged, 'Give me time, and I will pay back the money.' The king felt pity for the servant, so he let him go free and cancelled the bill.

This servant went out and he met another servant that owed him one hundred coins. The first servant grabbed the other servant at the throat and choked him.

He said, 'Give me the money that you owe me.' But the other servant fell on his knees and begged him, 'Give me time, and I will pay back the money.'

But the first servant refused to wait, and he threw him into prison. The other servants saw this and they were upset. So they went and reported everything to the king.

Then the king called the first servant and said to him, 'You wicked servant, you begged me to forgive you, and I cancelled your bill.

You should have done the same to the other servant and forgiven him, the same as I forgave you.'

The king was angry. He sent the servant to prison to be punished till he could pay back all the money he owed to the king."

Then Jesus said, "My father in heaven will do the same as the king, so each of you must truly forgive your brother."

A READING FROM THE SCROLL OF ISAIAH

Search (look) for the Lord before it is too late.

My deep wish and hope is that in my duty I will not fail Christ, and that always, especially now, I will be full of courage so that through my body I can give glory to Christ, either by my life or by my death.

To me, it does not matter if I live or die, to me the most important thing is Christ.

If by living in this body, I will be able to work for the Lord, I will accept.

But I wish I could die so that I could be with Christ. It is difficult to choose which is better.


But I know you need me, so it is better for me to stay alive here with you.

The most important thing in your daily life is that you follow the gospel of Christ.

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF MATTHEW

Jesus said to his disciples, "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner, a rich man, that went out very early in the morning looking for workers for his vineyard (grape field). The man agreed to pay one silver coin to each worker for one day. He sent them to work in his vineyard (grape field). At nine o'clock in the morning the rich man went out again.

He saw some people in the market place standing idle,



doing nothing. He said to them, 'You go and work in my vineyard (grape field), and I will pay you a fair wage.'

So they went. Then at twelve o'clock, midday, and again at three o'clock in the afternoon, the rich man went out and asked more men to work in his vineyard (grape field).

At about five o'clock, the man went out again and found more people standing. He said to them, 'Why are you standing here, doing nothing.'

They said to him, 'Because no one gave us a job.' So the rich man said to them, 'You go and work in my vineyard (grape field).'

In the evening, the rich man said to his manager, 'Tell the workers to come. Pay them their wages. First, pay those that started to work late in the afternoon. Then the workers that began work early in the morning, pay them last.'

So the workers that started to work late afternoon came, and they received one silver coin each. Then the workers that began to work early in the morning came, and they expected to receive more money.

But they also received one silver coin each. They grumbled, and said to the rich man, 'Those that started late in the afternoon only worked for one hour. You paid them one silver coin each. We worked hard all day in the hot sun, but you pay us, one silver coin each, the same as them!'

The rich man answered one of them, 'My friend, you remember this morning we both agreed that I would pay you one silver coin? I am being fair. Take your money and go. I can decide how much I want to pay workers. It is my decision, my money. Why are you jealous because I am generous?' So the people that are last will be first, and the people that want to be first will be last."

A READING FROM THE SCROLL OF EZEKIEL

The Lord said, "You object and you say 'The Lord is not fair.' Now I tell you, family of Israel,

listen to me: You are the people that do not live the right way.

When good people change, start doing evil and then they die, they die because of the evil

they have done.

When people stop sinning and live the right way, their lives will be saved. If they stop sinning, they will certainly live, they will not die."

Psalm - LORD, REMEMBER YOUR MERCY.

Lord, teach me your ways.

Help me to live with the truth.

Because you God, you are my Saviour.

Do not remember my sins,

but give me your love.

The Lord is truly good.

He shows the right way to sinners.

He leads humble people the right way.

He teaches his way to the poor.



A READING FROM ST PAUL'S LETTER TO THE PHILIPPIANS

I ask you: what does our life in Christ mean to you? Does love mean anything to you? Do we share the same Spirit? Do you have kindness and mercy for other people?

Are these things important to you? If you believe this, you will make me very happy. I want you all to have the same thoughts that we have.

I want you to be together with the same love in your hearts that we have. Agree with each other, do not get involved in competition.

Everybody must not boast (proud) but be humble. Always think other people are better than yourselves. Don't be selfish, don't think about yourself, but think about helping other people.

You must have the same attitude as Jesus Christ: Jesus Christ was holy. Jesus was God but he gave up his power as God to become the most humble of all people.

He became a slave. He became human the same as all people, and he lived as a man. He became so humble that he accepted death, death on a cross.

But God raised him to the highest heaven. God gave him the name that is more important than all other names.

So everybody, in heaven, on earth, and under the earth, will kneel down and honour the name of Jesus. All will praise God the Father and say that Jesus Christ is Lord.

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF MATTHEW

Jesus said to the chief priests and the Jewish leaders, "Tell me what you think: a man had two sons.

He went and said to the first, 'My son, go and work in the vineyard (grape field) today.' The son answered, 'I will not go,' but later he thought about it and changed his mind.
