But our Ephpheta community and our team are very strong. Last year, the community showed amazing strength and resilience in changing to life with COVID and all the changes


that came with it. And we will continue to go from strength to strength. We will always be here to support the community in the best way that we can.

Fr Michael's Reflection...

Ash Wednesday

Abraham spoke with God - he wanted to ask God for something. But first, Abraham said to God that he was being bold to even ask, because, "I am only dust and ashes". What did he mean?

Abraham was humble. A person must be honest to be truly humble. Abraham was being honest about the greatness of God, and his own littleness next to

God. Abraham depended upon God, his Creator, who created man from the dust. Abraham was honest about his short life on earth. It would not be long, before the end of his life. He would then return to dust, like something that is burnt up and reduced to ashes. Yet, Abraham still asked God, and God answered him.



In the Bible, there are stories about a man named Job. Job suffered many terrible things, and he even had sores all over his body. He sat down in ashes and said "I have become like dust and ashes". He spoke angrily to God. But later on, Job was sorry, and said, "I repent in dust and ashes".

In other places in the Bible, people used dust and ashes, fasting and wearing rough clothes, to show their sadness or to protest about how badly they had been treated. It was a sign for people, and especially a

reminder for themselves of their need for God. When they were sad, and humbled, they prayed to God with honesty and hope.

On Ash Wednesday, the priest makes the mark of Christ's Cross on each person's forehead. (The priest may sprinkle ashes on a person's head instead this year in some places, because of COVID.) The priest says, "remember, you are dust, and to dust you shall return".

We need this reminder. It helps us to be honest with ourselves and with God. It helps us to remember that God is the giver of all good things in this life and the next. On Ash Wednesday and all through Lent we choose to be reminded. We fast, and give to the poor, and pray. We give up some of the things that make us most comfortable, because we want to remember that our hope is in God and we want to be good like God. We want to follow Christ, and believe in the Gospel, because Christ has promised to lead us, through every suffering, to life with God. Even the Cross, upon which Jesus suffered, has become a sign of hope for us.

On the first day of Lent, the whole Church begins to repent together. However, from then on, our small sacrifices, our fasts, prayers, and good deeds, are hidden. They are hidden because they are for God alone. It is like we are speaking trustingly with God, just as Abraham did.

Mother Mary, you were always humble and honest with God. Help us to be humble and honest too. May we keep a good Lent, and grow in love of God and all people.


Zoom with Fr Michael Depcik

Do not worry if you cannot come to this picnic. We will have small mini deaf cafés (small get togethers at cafés) in different areas throughout the year.



Amen.


