Another special day is this September 23, a special day for the international deaf community. This day is to celebrate the sign languages used by people in the world. The World Federation of the Deaf states there are more than 70 million deaf people and more than 300 different sign languages.

Fr Michael's Reflection...

Love and Humility

I came across a beautiful parchment while I was preparing a lesson to teach children about virtues. Virtues are **good habits**, which is another way of saying being constant in love in various ways. For example, patience is a virtue. This very old parchment showed the virtues, as if growing from a tree. It seems that these images must have been a popular teaching tool, especially in monasteries and convents, because I've seen many similar images with the virtues like leaves or fruit of the tree or vine. In the beautiful example that I found, the tree trunk is drawn in gold, and the leaves and various human figures are drawn in several colours.

It is very beautifully done and meaningful, but the part that I most want to tell you about is from where the tree grows. Like all such images that I have seen, the virtues grow from humility (being **humble**). In this, my favourite image, there is also a drawing of the Annunciation, when the angel Gabriel announced to Mary that she was to be the mother of God's Son.

Every virtue is from love, but why is humility always the beginning of that love? And what has it to do with the Annunciation?


The Annunciation is connected with humility in at least two ways:

- 1. The Annunciation announced the Incarnation, that God was to enter into His creation for love of us.
- 2. Mary received the angel's greeting humbly.

God was humble in creating us so that we could share in His love, and even more humble in becoming man, like us, and even dying on the Cross to bring us back to love and life with God.

Mary was humble in responding to God's love, being most careful to look to God. Mary thought carefully about the meaning of the angel's greeting. Pride could not make her lose sight of God, or herself, so Mary grew in understanding and love in that moment.

God created everything in love, and brings us sinners, whom He created "very good", to perfect love and life with Him by revealing Himself to us. Humility grounds us, like a plant in



soil, in the Truth and Love of God. That is why the virtue of humility is the beginning of every virtue, even prudence and justice, faith and hope.

Cost is \$30 which is the cost for the plaque to be made.




Did you know... facts about St Gabriel's!

- 1920 The Christian Brothers found a suitable property in Sydney on which to establish the school at Castle Hill.
- 1922 Two Irish Christian Brothers, Brother Joseph O'Farrell and Brother
 Damien Allen from the Cabra School in Ireland arrived in Sydney with plans

for the new building. They had much experience teaching and caring for deaf people.

The first student Patrick Kenna took up residence.

• 1937 - A fire destroyed the original Southleigh homestead which was the Brothers' residence. The building was over 80 years old. A new residence was constructed.

- 1948 Helen Keller visits St Gabriel's School.
- 1960 Additional building works were completed and by 1961 there were 75 boys.
- 1973 The School changed from a residential day school for deaf boys to a co-educational day school. The first female students were admitted in 1973.
- 1994 Elizabeth Kerr became the first layperson and first woman Principal.

Lives of the Saints – St Teresa of Avila

Feast Day: 15th October

Birth: 28 March 1515

Death: 4 October 1582

Became a saint in 1622

Patron of: People with headaches & migraines, people

who are criticised for their religious faith



St Teresa of Avila was born in Avila, Spain. She had a brother named Rodrigo. They both loved reading the Bible and the lives of the Saints. They loved the saints and the martyrs and wanted to be like them.

Her mother loved to read women's fashion and beauty books. Teresa saw them and wanted to be like the women in the books. She no longer wanted God but loved to look at herself in the mirror. She also loved to read romantic novels.

When she was 12 her mother died and she asked Mary to be her mother.

Her cousin came to visit Teresa and she loved to gossip. Teresa copied her and gossiped through the town. This worried her father so he sent her to a school for girls so that she would stay holy. She started to turn back to God and decided that she wanted to be a nun.

Teresa became sick. She suffered physical pain. Most people thought that she would die. Her prayer life grew stronger and by praying to St Joseph she was healed from her sickness.



She was given the gift of seeing heavenly things.

One vision she saw was an angel with a golden spear. The angel was smiling and gentle with Teresa. The angel put the spear into Teresa's heart.

Teresa felt no pain, she felt safe and at peace. She felt very close to God. As a nun Teresa was distracted with worldly thoughts and many people visiting her. These things kept her away from prayer and from God.

So she decided to live a simple and prayerful life.

She and her friend St John of the Cross set up a new religious group known as the Discalced Carmelites. Both Teresa and John opened more than 30 monasteries throughout the world.

During her final years her health became worse. She accepted her sickness because God was calling her to heaven. She died in her sleep

In 1970, Teressa was named a Doctor of the Church for her writing and teaching on prayer.







A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

The apostles said to the Lord, "Help our faith." The Lord replied, "If your faith were like a small mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, 'Throw yourself into the sea,' and the tree would obey you and throw itself into the sea.

Suppose you have a servant digging in the field or looking after sheep.

When he has finished working and he comes in from the field, would you say to him, 'Sit down and eat now?' No!

You would tell the servant, 'Quick! Change, make yourself clean, bring my supper for me to eat and serve me. After I have finished eating, you yourself can eat and drink later.'

The servant should obey, do the job and not wait for any special thanks. So it is the same with you: you should say, 'We are only servants.

We work because it is our duty"



28th Sunday in Ordinary Time - 9 October Gospel Reading

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

Jesus was walking to Jerusalem along the border between Samaria and Galilee.

As Jesus arrived at a small village, ten people came to meet Jesus. They did not come near Jesus, because they all had



leprosy. They shouted to him, "Jesus! Master! Please have mercy on us!"

Jesus saw them and said, "Go to the priests and let them see you." The ten lepers went on their way to see the priests, and they were healed. One man realised he was healed; he came back praising God with a loud voice. He knelt down in front of Jesus and thanked him. The man was a Samaritan, not a Jew.

Jesus said, "Ten lepers were healed. Where are the other nine? Only one, a foreigner, came back to praise God." And Jesus said to him, "Stand up and go. Your faith has saved you."

29th Sunday in Ordinary Time - 16 October Gospel Reading

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

Jesus told his disciples that they should always pray and never give up hope. Jesus taught them this parable (story):

"There was a judge living in a town. He did not respect anyone. He was not afraid of God or the people. In the same town there was a woman, a widow.

The widow went to the judge many times to complain and said, "My enemy is against me. I want justice."

The judge refused to help. After a long time, the judge thought to himself, 'I don't care about God or people, but this widow comes back to me again and again, bothering me. So I will help her. If I don't give her what she wants, she will come and bother me and I will be worn out.'"

The Lord Jesus said, "You see that man was not a good judge. When people pray to God every day, God will always hear their prayers and help them.

God is not slow to give justice to his people. But when the Son of Man comes, will he find people on earth with faith?"



30th Sunday in Ordinary Time - 23 October Gospel Reading


A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

Jesus was watching some people, they proudly thought they were very good and they looked down on other people. Jesus told this parable (story) to these proud people:

"Two men went to the Temple to pray. One was a Pharisee and the other a tax-collector.

The Pharisee stood and said this prayer to himself,

'I thank you, God, that I am not bad like other people. I am not like those that are greedy, not honest or adulterous.



I thank you that I am not like this tax-collector. I fast twice a week, and I give you one-tenth of everything I earn.'

The tax-collector stood at the back of the Temple. He prayed and would not look up to heaven.

He beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me. I am a sinner.'"

Jesus said, "I tell you, after this man, the tax-collector, finished his prayer, he went home at peace with God. The other man, the Pharisee, was not in favour with God.

So any person that makes themselves important will be humbled, but any person that humbles themselves will be made important."


31st Sunday in Ordinary Time - 30 October Gospel Reading

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

Jesus arrived at Jericho and was going through the town. There was a man named Zacchaeus, he was one of the important tax collectors, and he was very rich.

He wanted to see who Jesus was, but he was a short man and because of the crowd he could not see Jesus.

So Zacchaeus ran ahead (forward) and found a sycamore tree; he climbed the tree. Jesus walked past the tree, he looked up and saw Zacchaeus in the tree.



Jesus said to him, "Zacchaeus, come down, quickly. I must stay at your house today."

Zacchaeus came down and joyfully welcomed Jesus into his house. All the people saw this happen and complained, "Jesus has gone to the house of Zacchaeus, a sinner."

But Zacchaeus said to Jesus, "I will give half my money to the poor.

If I have cheated any person I will pay that person four times more!"

Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house; this man is also a son of Abraham. The Son of Man has come to find lost people and save them."

32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time - 6 November Gospel Reading

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

Some Sadducees came to Jesus. Sadducees do not believe in the resurrection. They asked Jesus a question: "Master, Moses wrote that if a married man died and had no children, then his brother must marry the widow, so that they could have children.

Well, there were seven (7) brothers. The first brother married a woman, but he died and they had no children.

So the second brother married the widow, but he died. Then the third brother married the widow, and he also died. The same thing happened with all the other brothers; they all died and had no children.

Last of all, the woman herself died. Now, on the day of the resurrection, which brother will the woman be wife to, because she had married all seven brothers?"

Jesus replied, "On earth, people marry each other. But the people that are worthy to rise again to new life in heaven, they will not marry because they will be like angels and cannot die.

They are children of God, because they have risen from death. Moses himself proved that the dead are raised to new life.

In the story about the burning bush, he said that the Lord is the 'God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob.'

This means that he is God of all living people, not dead people. To God, all people are alive."



33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time - 13 November Gospel Reading

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

Some people were talking about the Temple. They said, "This is a beautiful Temple, built with the best stones." Jesus said, "In the future, all this that you see, will be destroyed and gone."

They asked him, "When will the Temple be destroyed? How will we know when it will happen?"



Jesus said, "Be careful! Don't let other people fool you. Many will come using my name. They will say, 'I am the Christ; now is the time.' You must refuse to follow them.

When you hear about wars, riots (rebellion) and troubles, don't be afraid. These things must happen, but the end is not soon."

Jesus continued telling them "Nations (countries/peoples) will fight against other nations. Kingdoms will fight against other kingdoms. There will be terrible earthquakes, plagues (sicknesses), and famines (drought, no rain) everywhere. There will be terrible things happening from the sky.

But before all this happens, people will seize (take) you, arrest you, persecute you and throw you into prison. Kings and governors will judge you because of me (Jesus). This will be your chance to tell the Good News.

Remember: you must not worry about what to say. I will help you and give you much wisdom, that no one will be able to say anything against you.

Parents, brothers, sisters, relatives, friends will betray you. Some will condemn you to death. All people will hate you because you follow me and my name. But you will not lose your life. Through your endurance (patience and perseverance) you will win your life."

But the other thief told him off and said,


"Have you no respect for God? You got the same punishment as Jesus. You and I
