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
A message from Liz & Dave!




Did you know... facts about Sydney, NSW!

Lives of the Saints - St John Vianney

Feast Day: 4th August Birth: 8th May 1786 Death: 4th August 1859 Became a saint in 1925

Patron of: Priests

John was the 4th child of 6 children. He was a shepherd who looked after sheep on his father's farm.

He taught other children to pray and to know their

faith. Every Sunday the family travelled a long distance for Mass.

John saw priests as heroes and he decided that he wanted to become a priest.

When studying, he struggled in his studies. It was very hard for him to learn the language Latin although he tried very hard. He almost failed, but the Bishop saw John's goodness and ordained him a priest.

John became the parish priest of a small town in France called Ars. He was there for 41 years. During that time John visited the sick and poor, spent days in prayer and showed his people how to live a holy life.

John loved hearing people confess their sins. He had a wonderful gift of understanding what was in people's hearts and minds. Sometimes John spent between 11-16 hours a day listening to people confess their sins.



Through John, God's mercy and love came to these people.

He also taught the faith to many people through his homilies and set up a home and school for poor children.

John Vianney is a saint because he was a holy man who loved his faith and the people he served.


Martha's Cookbook (Recipes from the Deaf Community's Kitchen)

Gran's Casserole or Stew

About this recipe...

This is a very YUMMY casserole - good for any occasion and perfect with a good glass of red wine.





- 500g cubed steak
- 1 swede turnip
- 1 parsnip
- 1 onion
- About the same amount of pumpkin and carrot
- Small tin crushed tomatoes
- ½ cup tomato sauce
- ¼ cup black sauce
- ½ cup plum sauce (if you have it)
- 1 cup water

Method

- Preheat oven to 180°C.
- Toss meat in flour, salt and pepper.
 Put all chopped vegetables and meat in casserole dish.
- Cook in oven for 2 hours.

For a stew, cook as above, in a saucepan for about 1 ½ hours or until meat is tender.

Quick Apple Crumble

About this recipe...

A nice dessert for a cold winter's night out on the farm.

The Crumble Topping can be used on any fruit, canned, stewed or bottled.



Ingredients

Filling

- 3 large cooking apples
- 1 tablespoon golden syrup
- 2 tablespoons water
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice

Crumble Topping

- 1 cup self raising flour
- 1 cup shredded coconut
- ½ cup sugar (brown or white)
- 1 heaped tablespoon butter or margarine

Method

- Preheat oven to 180°C.
- Peel, core and slice apples. Combine golden syrup, water and cinnamon in a saucepan and stew apples in this mixture until soft.
- Place apples in a pie dish and leave to cool.
 Sprinkle lemon juice over apples.
- To make Crumble Topping mix together all crumble topping ingredients well.
- Sprinkle crumble topping over apples, bake in oven for 20 minutes or until golden brown.
- Serve with cream, ice-cream or custard.
 (The grandchildren like all three!)





But the Lord answered, "Martha, Martha, you worry and are upset about so many things, but only one thing is needed.


Mary has chosen the best part. No one can take it away from her."

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

One day Jesus was praying in a quiet place. After he finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, the same as John taught his disciples." Jesus said to them, "When you pray, pray using these words: 'Father, we pray your holy name will be honoured. Your Kingdom come. Give us our bread everyday. Forgive us our sins, as we forgive those that hurt us. And protect us from temptation."



Jesus also said to them, "Suppose you have a friend and you go to him in the middle of the night to tell him, 'My friend has come to my house and I have no food to give him. Please lend me three loaves.' The man inside the house will say, 'Go away! Don't bother me! The door is locked and my children and I are in bed. I cannot get up and give you the bread.'"

Jesus said, "I tell you, maybe the man will not get up to give you anything, but if you continue knocking on the door and never stop asking, the man in the house will get up and give you anything you want. So, I tell you: Ask, and you will receive. Search, and you will find. Knock, and the door will be opened to you. Because if a person asks, he will always receive. If a person searches, he will always find. If a person knocks, the door will always be opened.

If you are a father, what would you do if your son asked you for bread? Would you give him a stone? No! Or, if he asked you for a fish, would you give him a snake? No! Or, if he asked you for an egg, would you give him a scorpion? No! If you are a bad person but you know how to give good things to your children, surely the heavenly Father will give the Holy Spirit to those that ask him!"


18th Sunday in Ordinary Time - 31 July Gospel Reading

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

One of the men in the crowd said to Jesus, "Lord, tell my brother to share our father's inheritance (wealth) with me." Jesus replied, "My friend, am I your judge? Who said that I should divide things between yourself and your brother?" Then Jesus said to everybody, "Be careful! Protect yourself from greed and selfishness; a person with a lot of things does not mean that his life is safe."

Then Jesus told a parable (a story) to the people, "A man was rich because his land grew lots of crops. He thought to himself, 'I have plenty of crops. What will I do? I can't keep all my crops because I have not enough room.' Then the rich man said, 'I know. I will pull down my old barns and build new bigger barns. I will keep all my crops in my new barns.

After that, I will tell myself: I have plenty of good things kept safe for many years. I can have an easy life; eat, drink and have a good time.' But God said, 'Fool! Tonight, you will die. What will happen to all the things you have kept safe? Will all these things still be yours? No!'" And Jesus said, "If a person saves good things for himself, he will never be truly rich. It is better to be rich with God in heaven."



19th Sunday in Ordinary Time - 7 August Gospel Reading

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

Jesus said to his disciples, "My friends, do not be afraid. Your Father is pleased to give you his kingdom. Sell your things and give the money to poor people. It is better to have treasure in heaven that will never disappear. Treasure no one can steal from heaven, no moth can destroy. Because if your treasure is safe in heaven, you will be happy and at peace."

Jesus said, "Be ready, fully dressed with lamps shining. You must be like servants waiting for their master to come back from the wedding feast. Be ready to open the door quickly when he comes and knocks. If the servants are ready when their master arrives, they will be happy. I tell you the truth, the master will take an apron, he will tell the servants to sit down at the table, and then he (master) will serve them.

The servants will probably have to wait till midnight or later, but if they are ready when the master arrives, they will be happy. If the owner of a house knew what time the thief would come, the owner would make sure the thief could not break into the house. In the same way, you must be ready, because you don't know when the Son of Man will come."


Peter said, "Lord, is this parable (story) for us or for all people?" The Lord replied, "If the servant is good enough, and wise and can be trusted, the master will ask the servant to be in charge of the house and make sure that family and other servants eat their food at the right time. When the master arrives and sees this servant working hard, the servant will be happy. I tell you the truth, the master will ask this servant to be in charge of everything.

But if the servant says to himself, 'My master is late', and he starts to be cruel to the other men and women servants and attacks them. He eats and drinks and becomes drunk. Then the master of the house will come when the servant does not expect him. The master will punish the servant and throw him out, and he will suffer because he was not a good faithful servant.

The servant knows what his master wants, but does not do the work for him (master), that servant will be whipped.

If the servant does not know what his master wants, and does no work for him (master), that servant will receive less punishment.

Any person that receives many gifts will be responsible for many things. If God gives many gifts to a person because God trusts that person, then God will expect a lot more responsibility from that person."



20th Sunday in Ordinary Time - 14 August Gospel Reading

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

Jesus said to his disciples, "I have come to bring fire to the world; I wish it were already burning!

Yet I must receive a baptism and I am anxious until it is over (finished).

Do you think that I came to bring peace to the world?

No, not peace, but division.

From now on, a family of five will be divided, three against two, and two against three.

The father divided against the son, son against father, mother against daughter, daughter against mother, mother-in-law against daughter-in-law, daughter-in-law against mother-in-law."



21st Sunday in Ordinary Time - 21 August Gospel Reading

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

Jesus was walking through towns and villages, teaching the people. He continued to go towards Jerusalem. Someone said to Jesus, "Lord, how many people will be saved? Only a few?" Jesus said, "Try your best to enter (go in) through the narrow door, because I tell you, many people will try to go in but they will fail. After a man has locked the door of his house, you could find yourself standing outside, knocking on the door saying 'Lord, open the door and let us in,'

But the man inside the house will say 'I don't know where you come from.' Then you will say, 'You know us. We ate and drank with you. You taught in our streets.' But he will reply, 'I don't know you. Go away, you wicked people! 'When you see Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and all the prophets in God's kingdom, but you are outside, you will suffer and scream because you cannot get in.

People will come from east and west, from north and south, and all will sit down at the feast in the kingdom of God. Yes, all the people that used to have the last and lowest place in life will be put in the first and best place, and all those that used to have the first and best place will be put in the last and lowest place in the

kingdom of God."



22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time - 28 August Gospel Reading

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

One sabbath day Jesus went for a meal in the home of an important Pharisee. Other pharisees watched Jesus carefully. Jesus saw that some people picked the best places to sit. So Jesus told them a parable, "When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not sit in the best place.

Perhaps another person more important than you has been invited, and your friend that invited you will say to you, 'Please give your place to this person'. You will have to get up, go and find another seat in the lowest place, and you will be embarrassed. So, when you are invited, go and sit in the lowest place.

Then your friend that invited you, will say to you, 'Come, my friend, I will give you a better seat.' People will see and you will feel honoured. Yes, any person that has the last and lowest place in life will receive the first and best place.

A person that has the first and best place in this life will receive the last and lowest place in God's kingdom." Then Jesus said to the Pharisee that invited him, "When you give a meal or party, do not invite your friends, brothers, relatives, or rich people, because you know they will invite you to their party later.

When you give a party, invite the poor, the crippled, the blind, because you know

they are poor and they cannot pay you back. This means you are blessed because God will reward you."



23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time - 4 September Gospel Reading

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

A large crowd of people followed Jesus, he turned and said to them,
"If anyone comes to me but loves father, mother, wife, children, brothers, or
sisters more than me, then that person cannot be my disciple.

Any person that does not carry the cross and follow me, cannot be my disciple.

If you want to build a tower, you must sit down first to make a plan and find out how much it will cost. You need to know if you have enough money to finish the job. If you start building and later realise that you cannot finish building the tower, all the people watching will laugh at you. They will say, 'This man wanted to build a tower, but now he cannot finish the job.'

If a king goes to war against another king, first he will sit down and plan. If the king has only 10,000 soldiers and the other king has 20,000 soldiers, he knows he cannot go to war because he will lose.

He will send messengers to meet the other king and try to make peace."

Jesus said, "In the same way, if you want to be my disciple, you must give up everything you have and follow me."





24th Sunday in Ordinary Time - 11 September Gospel Reading

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

One day many tax-collectors and sinners came to listen to Jesus. The Pharisees and scribes (writers) complained. They said, "This man, Jesus, welcomes sinners and eats with them." So Jesus told them this parable (story):

"Suppose a shepherd has 100 sheep, but loses one sheep; what will he do? He will leave the 99 sheep, and he will go to look for the lost sheep until he finds it. After he finds the lost sheep, he will be so happy, he will carry the sheep on his shoulders and take it home. Then he will tell his friends, 'Look, I found my lost sheep! Rejoice with me.' In the same way, I (Jesus) tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner that repents, than over 99 good people that don't need to repent.

Or, suppose a woman has ten silver coins; but she loses one; what will she do?

She will light a lamp, clean the house and look carefully until she finds the lost coin. And when she finds it, she will tell her friends, 'Look, I found my lost coin, rejoice with me.'

In the same way, I (Jesus) tell you, the angels of God will rejoice over one sinner that repents."





25th Sunday in Ordinary Time - 18 September Gospel Reading

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

Jesus said to his disciples,

"If no one can trust you with small things, then who will trust you with big things?

If a person is not honest with small things, then that person will not be honest with big things too.

If no one can trust you with money, then who will trust you with real wealth or worldly riches?

And if no one trusts you with things that belong to another person, then who will give you the things that belong to you?

No person can serve both God and money. Either he will hate God and love money.

Or, he will love God with respect and not trust money, because he knows that money can be dangerous.
You cannot love both God and money at the same time."



26th Sunday in Ordinary Time - 25 September Gospel Reading

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL OF LUKE

Jesus said to the Pharisees:

"There was a rich man with very expensive clothes.

He ate wonderful rich food everyday. Outside his gates, there was a poor man named Lazarus, his body full of sores. Lazarus waited at the gates hoping for



some scraps of food from the rich man's table. Dogs came and licked his sores. The poor man died.

Angels came and carried him into heaven to be with Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried. The rich man went to the place of death, named Hades; he was in terrible suffering. He looked up and saw Abraham and Lazarus far away.

He shouted, 'Father Abraham, have mercy on me! Tell Lazarus to come to me, so that he can put his finger in water and cool my tongue because I am suffering in this fire.'

Abraham replied,' Remember, during your life on earth, you had all the good things. Lazarus was poor and he had nothing. Now he is enjoying himself here, and you are suffering now. Also, there is a deep wide valley between you and us. No person can leave us and cross (go) over to help you, and no one can leave your place to come here.'
