Fr Michael's Reflection...

"Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." Hebrews 11:1

The world seems to grow more angry and confused every day. However, Christians are called to be hopeful and have peace in their heart. How can we be peaceful, when there are so many wars around the world? How can we be hopeful, when Christians find themselves opposed more and more?



The saints and martyrs give many examples, but I will go back even further, to Abraham.

Abraham learnt how to trust in God's promises and have faith. (His name used to be Abram, but God changed it to Abraham.) Abram was quite old before he left home. His father died and God called Abram to leave everything. God promised:

- 1. A great land
- 2. A great name (because a descendant of his would be a king)
- 3. Many children.

Abraham often only partly trusted in God. He was trapped in fears, which made him lie and do only part of what God wanted. Abram even sinned to try to make the promises of God come true. However, as the saying goes, Abraham learnt to "let go, and let God".

What made Abraham's faith so wonderful is that he believed God without seeing all God's promises happen in his own life. He saw only the beginning, with the birth of Isaac. Yet, Abraham's faith grew so strong that in his old age he believed that God could even raise the dead to life.

Faith is trusting in the things God has promised; hoping in things we cannot see yet, like,

- 1. the glorious life of the saints and angels in heaven, and
- 2. the face of God, and
- 3. the place prepared for us in eternal life, so long as we remain standing firmly in the faith of the Church.

In the Church, it is like we are standing on the deck of a great ship, which may roll about, pitch and turn, but will never sink beneath the waves. No matter what happens in the world, Christ's ship will never sink, but carry faithful, hopeful souls all the way to heaven. So, we have reason to have peace of heart. Nothing can threaten us. We have reason for hope, because, no matter what may happen to us in this life, Jesus assures us that those who have faith in Him, can never be separated from Him. They will have a reward and a place made ready for them in heaven.




Christmas Mass Times






Out and About in the Deaf Community

Western Sydney Airport Tour

The new airport – which will operate 24 hours a day – is a very important part of Sydney's future.

Lives of the Saints – St Lucy

Born: around 283

Died: around 304

How old: 21 years old

Feast Day: 13th December

Patron saint of: Blind people

Lucy was born to very rich parents. They showed great

love for her. She lived a very happy family life. When Lucy was five years old, her father died.

Lucy became a Christian at a very young age. During her time, it was dangerous to live as a Christian in public. They worshipped in secret. The Romans would punish

any person who followed Christ. Lucy knew this and she did not tell anyone, especially her mother ,that she was a Christian.

She offered her life to God as a virgin (single woman) as well and devoting her life to prayer and helping the poor people.

Lucy's mother was dying. Her mother wanted her daughter to marry a man from a rich family. Lucy obeyed her mother's wishes. One night, Lucy had a dream of St Agatha. Agatha told her that her mother was healed from her sickness. Her mother became a Christian. Lucy gave her money and things away to the poor. When her husband heard this, he was very angry and told the king about what she did and about her Christian faith. The king asked her to reject her faith. Lucy refused. She said that she will only offer sacrifice to God only and remain pure. She accepted what was going to happen to her.

The soldiers tried to burn her, then cut her eyes out. But Lucy continued to pray to God without her eyes and spoke to the crowd about God. The soldiers killed

her with their sword. She was martyred for her love for the Lord.

The Church honors Lucy as a saint, and she is the patron saint for blind people. Her name means "light." When we think of Lucy, we can remember that she teaches us to follow Jesus, the light of the world.
