



Deaf Society is available to support you. Other organisations are available to help you. Ephpheta Centre is not an NDIS registered provider. We are grateful that many deaf, hard of hearing, and deafblind people who enjoy being at events organised by Ephpheta. Thank you all.

Back to NDIS. I am self managed. It means I look after invoices for the services I request from service providers especially interpreting services and I make payments on my own. I enjoy this process. It is not perfect. There are not enough Auslan interpreters. We as deaf people need to look at alternatives. We need to work together with NDIS and make it a better service for all of us.

The Ephpheta Centre was officially launched in August, 1979. So this year we will celebrate 40 years of the Ephpheta Centre! Stay tuned for a program of events this year.

As always, please let me or the Ephpheta team know your ideas, your feedback, and stories in Auslan. My door is open. Be Open.

Fr Michael's Reflection...

Congratulations and thank you to the Ephpheta Centre, the Catholic deaf community and all our beloved companions on this 40 year anniversary.



An odd thought popped into my head recently; that if anyone wanted candidates to pioneer the colonisation of Mars, they might like to ask the Deaf community. There they will find many trailblazing, resilient, compassionate, and patient individuals, who don't mind very extended periods of socialisation and are remarkably quick to pick up new technology.

When the brothers Saints Cyril and Methodius took the faith to Moravia, they invented some written language to assist in communication. I wonder if they might be good patron saints for the Deaf community who are constantly shaping their own language. Do you have difficulty communicating on Mars? Never mind, signs can be seen from far away, do not require an atmosphere, and new ones can always be created for special circumstances!



Murreall has given so generously of her time and kind spirit in all of these years. Everyone who comes to the Ephpheta Centre knows Murreall and knows what a kind and gentle person that she is. We thank her for her time, her generosity, her love, and her wonderful baking!

How did you first join the Ephpheta Centre?

I first joined as a volunteer. It was after one of our deaf Catholic community weekends at Leura and Sister Helen Gaffey asked me if I would like to join as a volunteer to the Ephpheta Centre to help with the newsletter. This was around 1979 or 1980 when Ephpheta was at Paddington. Jenny Hannan was also a volunteer at Ephpheta at this time.





We looked after the newsletter mailout on Fridays. I remember that it always took a long time! Sometimes I would help if there were special meetings where people would come from all over Australia – I would help with preparing morning tea, lunches and afternoon tea.

After we moved to Lewisham, Mary Caruana

asked me if I would like to work there 2 days a week. This was helping in the office, taking communion to deaf people and helping with pastoral visits. I remember that we sometimes had a bowling group – we would have about 15 deaf people as a special activity. I remember there

was so much work when we moved to Lewisham. We had a lot of volunteers come to help us with fixing up the building and cleaning up. Shirley Carroll also started with us when we were at Lewisham. I remember when we started the craft group – it started with about 5 people and then, as more people started to learn about it, the numbers grew and grew.





We also had games days and we started a hard of hearing prayer group.

We then moved to Flemington and it was around this time that I decided to retire as a paid member of staff. Nola Lawler took over my role but I still continued to be involved with craft group and some pastoral visits.

What role has the Ephpheta Centre had in your life?



I was first involved with the Catholic Deaf Association when I moved to Sydney when I was 24. This then led to my involvement with the Ephpheta Centre and I was involved with CDA and Ephpheta for many years.



Because I never had children, I often thought about what I should do with my life. I felt that God was wanting me to do something in my life, I felt that God was calling me to volunteer with the Ephpheta Centre. Through

my involvement with Ephpheta I met so many different people and I really enjoyed doing this. I enjoyed meeting so many different people and many people became my friends. I remember meeting one deaf lady, she had never been to school. I remember spending many months trying to teach her sign language – it was very difficult. But I was always happy to try to help people – I always felt that Jesus was with me when I was trying to help people.



What changes have you seen at the Ephpheta Centre over the years?

I have seen a lot of changes since I first joined the Ephpheta Centre. We used to have many people involved in our signing

choir. We now have signed mass in a lot of different places and also we sometimes join with hearing parishes in integrated mass. A lot of our community have grown older – we used to have many more young people coming to Mass and to events.



One of the benefits which I have seen is that we now have very good interpreters interpreting the Mass.

I would love to see more young people coming to Mass and to continue the good work of the Ephpheta Centre. I hope and pray that Ephpheta will continue strongly into the future.






Brother Reg Shepherd has had a long and loving relationship with the Catholic Deaf Community and the Ephpheta Centre for many years.

In the year 2000 Br Reg received a Medal of the Order of Australia for his wonderful work. Reg has been an important part of the deaf community for many many years and so in our 40th year of Ephpheta we went to see him at Concord and asked him a few guestions!



Reg is now 90 years old – Reg is a friend to all in the community. We thank God for the gift of Reg in our lives and in the life of the deaf community and for his tireless love and work.



What was your first encounter with the Ephpheta centre and the deaf community?

I met my first deaf person when I was 8 years old growing up in Braidwood. I met a young deaf boy my age who was home from school at St Gabriel's in the Christmas holidays – this was Jimmy Roberts. We made up our own signs to communicate with each other.

I had decided to join the Christian Brothers when I was aged 16.
On the same day that I entered the Brothers there was another young man who joined called Gerry McGrath. We looked very

much alike and people kept calling us by each other's name. Over 10 years we had about 400 cases of mistaken identity! People thought that we were brothers and even twins!



I first went to St Gabriel's school on 9 Sept 1953, I was 24 years old – on month later my parents came along to see how I was going. My mother was worried as she didn't think I was patient enough to be teaching the deaf. She knew I was not a very patient young man and was prone to throwing tantrums! I said to her "well mum I will have to learn to be patient, I will need to learn from the deaf." I was at St Gabriel's for 28 years. But I am still not very patient!

What was your role at the Ephpheta Centre? What was your regular work?

I first became involved with the Ephpheta Centre when it was in Paddington – I had an interview with Fr Malone. I worked for Ephpheta also when it moved to Lewisham and then to Flemington. I met many deaf people over the years – I worked with deaf children in government schools in the deaf units, I would visit 3 or 4 schools a week. Teaching in the state schools was how I met many young deaf people – after they left



school, I helped many young deaf people become more independent. I visited many deaf people in hospitals and in prisons. I also visited many deaf people in their home. There was a lot of travel! I have kept in touch with many deaf people and their families throughout their lives.




Has the Ephpheta Centre and the Deaf Catholic Community impacted on your personally and if so in what way?

From being at St Gabriel's and the Ephpheta Centre, deaf people taught me the value of community. People in the deaf community are a visual answer to Jesus' question at the Last Supper when He says "As I am one with the Father and the

Father is one with me, so you will also be one". That all may be one. When I meet a deaf

person, I don't just say hello and goodbye, we stop and talk with each other. Deaf people are one with each other



You gave so much for the Ephpheta Centre and the deaf community what do you feel you have received?

Love.

In my life story, I have one statement "I found love in the deaf community". It is as simple as that. And love is everywhere. The deaf taught me everything I know. Plus of course what I have learned with the Christian Brothers.

The word "Ephpheta" means to be open – to God and to people. It is the same as God's love for everyone – we must love everyone the same as God loves us.



What is your hope for the future of the Ephpheta Centre and the Deaf Catholic Community?

My hope is the same that I had through my years at St Gabriel's and ever since then – that all people become involved in their community and that we all learn together



and have opportunities to grow. That we listen and support each other. When

I was at Ephpheta I learned how to listen to people – often when we just take time to listen to a person we help that person find the answer in themselves.

I still have a prayer that I carry with me – I found it in my father Leo's wallet after he died. It



says "God our Father, help me when I meet any man or woman or child to remember that each of them was made in your likeness". This is our faith. My Prayer is Jesus' prayer for Peace and Unity among us "That all may be one".



Throughout this year we will have many special things happening – this will include our community retreat and special community celebrations.

Lenten Reflections

In this newsletter, our Lenten reflection is Fr Peter Fitzgerald's first Lenten reflection as his Chaplain of the Ephpheta Centre – this was published in the Ephpheta newsletter back in March 1989 when the Ephpheta Centre was based in Lewisham.

When you receive this newsletter, only a few more weeks will be remaining in LENT - that time leading up to the Passion, Death and Resurrection of our Saviour Jesus Christ.

What have we done during the past few weeks of Lent? We have been asked to fast - give up something we like as a penance for our sins during Lent. We are asked not to eat meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday and to do some act of good work each Friday during Lent, such as visiting a sick person or helping someone in need.

Paddington 1979 - 1988

It all began at 49 Gordon St Paddington... The Ephpheta Centre was set



up in early 1979 after Sister Helen Gaffey was appointed by her Congregation to work with the Catholic Junior Deaf in Sydney.

The Centre was located in a former Commercial college run by the Sisters of Charity. It became the Centre for Catholic Deaf people in Sydney.

Lewisham 1988 - 1996

It was with some tears but also some excitement that Ephpheta moved to its new home at West St Lewisham.

This was in the grounds of the old Lewisham hospital in premises owned by the St Vincent de Paul Society and the team working from Lewisham included Fr Peter Fitzgerald as chaplain.



The Lewisham premises had their own chapel, were close to the train and the Deaf Centre at Stanmore.



Cardinal Clancy opened and blessed the new Centre in Lewisham on 8 April 1988.





Flemington 1996 - 2009

In early 1996 the Ephpheta Centre was again on the move!

After a community working bee at the new premises, Ephpheta packed up its bags and moved to its new home in the old presbytery next to St Dominic's Flemington at 108 The Crescent.





Again, this was close to the railway station at Flemington and we had the use of the Church at St Dominic's which was next to the Centre.

During our time at Flemington Fr Peter Woodward became Chaplain and Stephen Lawlor was appointed as Director.











Punchbowl 2009 - present

Even the morning rain could not dampen happy spirits on this day! We also had a special visit from Santa and his naughty elf who had an Ephpheta shopping bag for everyone!




On 24 and 25 December we had wonderful Mass and celebrations with the community.






Combined Men and Women's Day Out

History Corner

Maud Bruyn

A number of Deaf ex-students stayed on at Waratah Deaf School in Newcastle NSW and either became teachers or worked as domestic servants and house mothers. During the Depression of the 1920s many girls of school leaving age would be likely to return home to almost certain unemployment and possible poverty. So the school decided to offer them employment in their sewing room and accommodation at the school. Some of the Deaf never left school. Maud Bruyn was one of those who stayed on at Waratah for many years and worked in the sewing room.

Maud Beatrice Bruyn was born at Dumaresq Creek, Armidale NSW on 10 June 1900, one of six children of Joseph Bruyn, farmer and Theresa, nee Hirschberg. At

about five years old Maud went to become a boarder at Waratah Deaf School.

Deaf sewing room workers made all kinds of beautiful Church vestments, tabernacle veils, ciborium covers, altar linen, priest's stocks and stoles, women's dresses and lingerie and baskets. In 1937 Maud Bruyn was the co-ordinator for the sewing room.

By 1941 there were 15 sewing room workers. They received their board and lodging and were given pocket money when they went out, for example, enough for bus fare and entry to the pictures. When the school became an oral school about 1952, all the women in the

sewing room had to leave. Those who did stay on were not allowed to sign to the children. Maud Bruyn stayed on at the school before her death in 1975.

Maud Beatrice Bruyn died on 2 December 1975 at the age of 75, late of Waratah. She was buried with her beloved sister, Dorothy Bruyn at Botany cemetery in Sydney.
