Protecting our children is a shared responsibility and we are here to help!

Payment of fees - Term 2

Families paying fees on a per term basis are reminded that payment is due by the 17 June 2016. Families who have not set up regular payment plans with the College are expected to have paid 2/3 of the scheduled full fees by this date. The payment of fees is a major proportion of the College income, and payment of the full year's fees is expected for all students by the end the school year. You are reminded that the College uses the services of Cole Accounting to follow-up parents/caregiver who are falling behind with the payment of fees.

Safety

Last week I sent an email to all families in regards to concerns that we have had expressed to us in relation to how some of our students are behaving when accessing public transport.

It is extremely important that our boys are made aware of possible dangers when choosing to engage in risky behaviours, such as running on train tracks or trying to move from one carriage to another. There have been a spate of tragic accidents involving trains, pedestrians and train crossings in Adelaide recently and these should serve as a very stark reminder of the need to engage in behaviours that are preventative and safe.

I would again encourage you to discuss the importance of these issues with your son. Please do not hesitate to contact the College if you witness our students partaking in any behaviour that is risky or unsafe.

CEA Program

Our CEA program (Curriculum Extension Activities) has long been an integral and valuable addition to the curriculum at the Middle School. I would like to take this opportunity to note a couple of key points in relation to the philosophy, practices and procedures behind the program:

- Our CEA program is reliant on the help and support of parents, carers and the wider community we do not have enough staff to coordinate/coach/tutor all of the activities, hence the importance of support with the organisation, facilitation and successful running of the program.
- We do not run or facilitate specialised sporting programs nor do we have the resources to support this. We
 encourage participation in CEAs so that the boys can interact with their peers in an environment outside the
 classroom; this helps build relationships with peers, parents/carers and the wider community.
- We are not a 'Club' and do not operate as one; we expect our boys to represent, and be proud of, their school when they participate in their chosen CEA.
- We appreciate and acknowledge the support we get from Mums, Dads, Grandparents and other friends of the school - we simply cannot operate without your ongoing support.

Parent Teacher Interviews

This week you would have had the opportunity to meet some of your son's teachers to discuss his learning in various areas. Please be aware that you don't have to wait for these formal opportunities to discuss any issues you may have. We very much believe that holistic learning occurs best when there is a healthy partnership between teachers, students and their families. You can request to meet any of your son's teachers throughout the year.

Goal Setting

Having a goal is a really great way to give yourself direction, focus and motivation. Goal setting is helpful if you feel overwhelmed by how much is going on, if you feel like you are lacking direction or if you have something big to tackle.

The important thing to remember about the goals you set is that they need to mean something to you. Start with the things you enjoy. What are the five things you enjoy most in life and what do you want to achieve in these areas. Do you play the guitar and do you want to be able to master a particular piece of music?

Don't get too caught up in the big things. A lot of the time when we think about goals we think they need to mean big things and that can get overwhelming. But a goal should be anything you want to do or achieve; big, small or completely random. Goals can be made about many areas of your life not just study and work but health, hobbies, friendships, family and attitudes.

Break open your goal into sub-goals. This is an important step to keep you focused and motivated. Sub goals can be set so that the little achievements along the way can be celebrated. Write down your goals, work out your smaller sub-goals and display them in a place where you will see them and be reminded of your direction and progress. Have a time frame or deadline of when you want to have achieved a certain goal or step along the way and remember to always celebrate your successes.

I have always used the acronym **SMART** when setting goals and it has helped me in many areas of my life and I encourage you to remember this clever little formula.

Your goal should be:

S= Specific M= Measurable A=Attainable R=Realistic T=Time bound

Here is an example of a SMART goal. I will be able to confidently play the national anthem on the piano by the end of July 2016.

Please remember that if you don't achieve your goal you are not a failure but you have been given the opportunity to create a new goal and time to work towards achieving it.

There are numerous changes to the timetable in Week 8 of this term.

Year 10 Students

Timetabled lessons on Monday and Tuesday of Week 8 will be swapped (June 20 and 21).

That is, Monday June 20 will be a 4 lesson day with 3:30pm dismissal:

- Homeroom
- Lesson 1: Line 1 (yellow)
- Lesson 2: Line 2 (brown)
- Lesson 3: Line 5 (blue)
- Lesson 2: Line 4 (green)

Tuesday June 21 will be a 3 lesson day with 1.25pm dismissal:

- Homeroom (combined)
- Lesson 1: Line 2 (brown)
- Lesson 2: Line 3 (red)
- Lesson 3: Line 6 (pink)

There will be no formal lessons scheduled on Wednesday June 22 and Thursday June 23 due to Year 10 exams for Science and Maths. Please refer to the exam timetable included in this newsletter for subjects and times. There are no exams for Essential Science and Essential Maths. Students are not required to attend school if they do not have an exam scheduled. The library will be available for use for guiet individual study.

Friday June 24 is a student-free day (semester changeover) - no lessons scheduled.

Year 11 Students

There will be no timetabled lessons for Year 11 students from **Friday June 17** (Week 7) through to **Thursday June 23** (Week 8) due to exams.

Please check the exam timetable included in this newsletter for subjects and times. Students with "clashes" on this timetable have been contacted via email to inform them of a re-scheduled time.

Students are not required to attend school if they do not have an exam scheduled. The library will be available for use for quiet individual study.

Friday June 24 is a student-free day (semester changeover) - no lessons scheduled.

Year 12 Students

Timetabled lessons on Monday of Week 8 will be swapped to a Tuesday timetable. That is, **Monday June 20** will be a 4 lesson day with 3:30pm dismissal:

- Homeroom
- Lesson 1: Line 1 (yellow)
- Lesson 2: Line 2 (brown)
- Lesson 3: Line 5 (blue)
- Lesson 2: Line 4 (green)

However, the format for lessons on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday will be dramatically different, with each subject being allocated a significant block of time for a workshop.

Year 12 students will NOT attend homeroom on these days.

The workshops will occur as follows:

Tuesday June 21

12:00noon-3:30pm: Line 3 (usually Mon2, Wed2, Thu3)

This line does not have a lesson scheduled on Monday of Week 8 and so has less time allocated in comparison to other subjects. Your teacher may require you to stay until 4pm because of this. Please consult directly with your subject teacher regarding your workshop finish time.

Wednesday June 22

9:00am-12:00noon: Line 4 (usually Tue4, Wed3, Fri1) **12:30pm-3:30pm: Line 1** (usually Tue1, Thu2, Fri3)

Thursday June 23

9:00am-12:00noon: Line 5 (usually Tue3, Wed4, Fri2) **2:30pm-3:30pm: Line 2** (usually Mon1, Tue2, Thu4)

Wednesday and Thursday there will be a **20 minute recess break from 10:30am–10:50am** and **lunch break from 12:00noon-12:30pm**. The tuck shop <u>will</u> be open at these times.

Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday there will be a **20 minute afternoon break from 2:00pm–2:20pm**. The tuck shop will NOT be open at this break time. **Note** that the <u>Tuesday afternoon workshop commences at 12noon</u>, but it is a 12:30pm start on Wednesday and Thursday.

Research Project classes will NOT be running workshops as students should be finished the requirements of this subject by this time. Students are not required to attend school for the line where their Research Project class is scheduled on Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday.

The library will be available should students wish to access this resource during that time. Please note that Friday is a student-free day. The library will also be open on this day for students to utilise.

Year 12 VET students should see me prior to Week 8 to discuss the impact of their VET placement on their attendance at workshops. The workshops provide a great opportunity for focus and consolidation of learning experiences for each subject. Students and teachers will have a large block of time facilitating significant work completion with limited interruption. There is also the added bonus that this format provides significant non-contact time for Year 12 students to focus on study Tuesday morning and move forward with workshop tasks on Friday. Students also gain additional time with their teachers for the subjects they would have missed due to the student-free day Friday.

2016 e-Learning News #3


This edition of the e-Learning newsletter contains information regarding some of the newest updates to Google's Calendar App. If you are a regular Google Calendar user you may have noticed some recent feature updates. Two updates are detailed below:

Update #1 - Create Reminders

Google has added a Reminders feature to its Calendar App.

When you click in your Calendar to create an event, you now will see the option to create a Reminder...

You have the ability to set the date and time of the reminder, as well as whether or not you wish to repeat the reminder.



You will receive a pop-up notification at the time specified for the reminder.



Reminders will move from one calendar day to the next until you have marked the reminder as done.

When reminders are marked as done they will appear at the top of your calendar as shown below:



To permanently remove the reminder, simply click on it and select delete.

Some points to note:


- The reminder is private to the calendar owner. If you have shared your calendar with other people, they will be unable to view the reminders.
- If you were a Google Tasks user, you will need to switch over to the Reminders feature. It can be enabled from the drop down menu on the Tasks calendar... see below:

Update #2 – Event locations

Event locations will now appear in the **day** and **week** Calendar views when using the web Calendar app. This removes the need to click on

the event to see the event's location. A sample event with location is shown here:
