It is a unique team environment which pushes the boys physically and mentally as they cope with the demands of cycling their human powered vehicle through the early hours on the Sunday morning. ## Open Conversations Strengthen Relationships

Why and how does having an open conversation strengthen relationships, creates friendships and resolves conflict?

Talking about things, getting thoughts and ideas out in the open, hearing alternate opinions and hashing out your own can be an amazing source of understanding and comfort. Conversations can open you up to new ideas, people and opportunities. Genuine connections are built on shared conversations and experiences and often you don't know if someone shares your experiences until you talk to them!

How do you act in a conversation? Do you listen as well as talk? Do you change your opinion and actions because of the conversation you have shared with others? Do you make time in your busy life to devote your full attention to the the art of conversation?

Every good conversation starts with good listening .Telling people how much you appreciate them, admire them or simply how much you enjoy their friendship, and genuinely listening to them when they talk to you can really strengthen the bond that you share. Research shows that one of the key things about good relationships is that people who say more nice or positive things, rather than negative things have healthier relationships. Try at least 5 positives for every 1 negative to ensure you're sharing enough of the good stuff to make you both feel good about your social connection.

Making time for conversations about everything and nothing at all is a display of friendship and trust. You cannot learn more about a person's real self unless you're actually spending time with them! Talking about issues is also the first step to sorting out the problem. If you take the time to listen calmly to the other person's feelings and see things from their point a view you'll able to work on how you can both improve what you're doing and how you can help each other do better.

## No verbal consent for medication

In line with best practice the Health care centre staff will not accept verbal consent to administer medication (e.g. paracetamol/ibuprofen) to students. At the commencement of each year parents/guardians are given the opportunity to update student records and provide consent in writing for medication administration. The student diary has a section on page 10/11, outlining health care support to students, and offering a consent that can be signed for administration of medication. Please ensure this is signed and the student electronic health records can be updated accordingly.

In 2016 the College will be implementing a new medication policy for day students, however in the interim we would appreciate your cooperation to comply with this practice to ensure medication safety for all students.

## Vocational Education & Training Celebration Assembly

It is my pleasure to acknowledge two of our former scholars, both of whom participated in the College's VET Program.

Tori Wilmot graduated from the College in 2014 and during her time was a very hard-working and committed member of our school. In 2013, at Year 11, Tori studied for 6 months for the Certificate II in Community Services and then decided to change and take up a School-based Apprenticeship working through a Certificate III & IV in Disability at CARA Woodville.

Last year while in Year 12, Tori continued her studies for her qualifications in Disability with CARA as part of School-based Apprenticeship Program while also working in this area. This year, Tori has been working full-time as a Community Support worker at CARA, Oaklands Park and while she has taken time off from work earlier this year and travelled overseas, she is currently planning to go to University and study teaching, Majoring in Special Education, to work with young people who have disabilities.

Our second old scholar we wish to recognise is Josh Barrett. Josh graduated from the College in 2014 and during his time was regarded as a very capable sportsman which he built upon to forge a career direction. Josh was in the VET program in Year 11 where he completed a Certificate II in Sport and Recreation at Hamilton College. Last Year, while in Year 12, Josh completed a Certificate III in Sport and Recreation and was part of the School-based Apprenticeship program where he did his traineeship with Appleton Sport through the AFL Sports Ready Program.

Josh is now employed full-time at Our Lady of Grace School at Glengowrie as a Coordinator of Sports. He is also studying for his Certificate IV in Sport and Recreation. Josh's future direction is to work in the Management field in the Sporting Industry. He is also looking at university study.

In July this year, Tori and Josh were recipients of The Australian Vocational Student Prize, which recognises students who have demonstrated outstanding skills while completing vocational training in senior secondary years.
