

2018 marked the 8th year of the Australian Academy and the 60th Anniversary of AFI | AACTA, Australia's longest standing national screen culture and industry development organisation.

Despite the pioneering works of Australian screen legends such as **Raymond Longford**, **Lottie Lyell** and **Charles Chauvel**, when the AFI was founded in 1958, Australian filmmaking had reached an extremely low point. The founding members of the AFI had an ambition to change things, to bring people together and help build the community and momentum that's helped underpin the industry and awards we have today.

Six decades on, our industry and AFI | AACTA's activities have come a long way, continuing to evolve and adapt to support the ever-growing and ever-changing Australian screen industry. 2018 saw our screen culture and industry development programs reach new heights, with 173 events being held across Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Perth, Mumbai and Shanghai. From film forums, masterclasses and discussion screenings to the inaugural AACTA Pitch competition, our programs connect, nurture and promote current and new generations of our industry.

The annual AACTA Awards have grown to become a world-class marker of screen excellence, and the only Australian organisation honouring screen practitioners across all industry sectors. The 2018 Awards season saw us present a total of 63 awards at three major ceremonies in Sydney and Los Angeles, including three new ground-breaking awards: Best Casting presented by Casting Networks; Best Sports Presentation; and Best Indie Film presented by Event Cinemas, introduced to recognise the Australian independent films and filmmakers who are making waves and telling diverse and unique stories audiences can't find anywhere else.

Now in its second year, our Asia International Engagement Program went from strength to strength. Not only did the program see cross-cultural events held in Mumbai, Shanghai and Sydney, but it also generated remarkable international media attention in China, India and USA. The program culminated in the presentation of the AACTA Award for Best Asian Film presented by Eureka International Group (EIG) to Chinese box-office and critical hit **Dying to Survive** at the AACTA Awards Ceremony in Sydney.

2018 wasn't only a strong year for the Academy, it was also a big year for Australian screen stories and practitioners. We saw Australian productions front and centre on the world stage; from Warwick Thornton's Sweet Country earning recognition at Toronto and Venice film festivals, Joel Edgerton's Golden Globe nominated Boy Erased, the box office success of Peter Rabbit™ and Charles Williams' All These Creatures winning the Short Film Palme d'Or, to Australian television productions such as Mystery Road, Mr Inbetween, Wentworth and Hannah Gadsby's Nanette garnering audience attention worldwide.

Today, Australia has a wonderfully broad ranging and immensely talented screen industry thanks, in large part, to the passionate support of the industry and our members, whose passion and support ensures our industry remains vibrant and dynamic. We thank you for your tireless work and dedication. We'd also like to take this opportunity to thank the dedicated AACTA staff and board, and our valued partners, new and continuing, whose generous support allows us to continue promoting, celebrating and nurturing the Australian screen industry.

The ceremony drew a crowd of over 1,250 guests, including some of Australia's top film and television stars such as Bruce Beresford, Sigrid Thornton, Jack Thompson, Rebecca Gibney, Fred Schepisi, Susie Porter, Aaron Pedersen, Marta Dusseldorp, Leah Purcell, and David Stratton.

Highlights of the Ceremony included performances from **Vance Joy** and **Katie Noonan**, and the presentation of the AACTA Longford Lyell Award to **Bryan Brown**, the Byron Kennedy Award to **Ian Darling AO** and the AACTA Award for Best Asian Film presented by Eureka International Group (EIG) to Chinese box office hit **Dying to Survive**.

The support of AACTA's partners is invaluable, in particular the long-term investment of the New South Wales Government, whose renewal will see the AACTA Awards return to Sydney in 2019 via the support of its tourism and major events agency, Destination NSW.

A record 56 AACTA Awards were presented across two major events held in Sydney at The Star Event Centre: the Industry Luncheon on Monday 3 December and the AACTA Awards Ceremony on Wednesday 5 December.

Hosts **Kat Stewart** and **Nazeem Hussain** were joined by 770 guests for the sell-out Industry Luncheon, which saw 35 awards presented, including three new AACTA Awards. The inaugural AACTA Award for Best Indie Film presented by Event Cinemas was awarded to **Benjamin Gilmour's Jirga**; **Allison Meadows** became the first-ever recipient of the AACTA Award for Best Casting presented by Casting Networks for her work on **Riot**; and the inaugural AACTA Subscription Television Award for Best Sports Presentation went to **Finals Footy on Fox: Richmond V Collingwood**.

The remaining 21 awards were presented at the AACTA Awards Ceremony, which was hosted by **Stephen Curry** and telecast on Channel Seven with encore screenings on Foxtel. In a big year for Australian screen stories, *Sweet Country*, *Mystery Road*, *Riot*, *Ladies In Black*, Nicole Kidman, Warwick Thornton, Deborah Mailman and Simon Baker were among the winners announced at the Ceremony.

























8TH AACTA INTERNATIONAL AWARDS

The 8th AACTA International Awards were held on Friday 4 January 2019 at The Mondrian Hotel in Los Angeles.

The star-studded Ceremony was hosted by Renee Bargh, with Nicole Kidman, Rami Malek, Glenn Close, Alfonso Cuarón, Emily Blunt, John Krasinski, and Olivia Colman among the winners, nominees and VIP guests in attendance.

The winners of the 8th AACTA International Awards were a truly international group, spanning continents, cultures and decades. Alfonso Cuarón's Roma won the AACTA International Awards for Best Film and Best Direction. Cuarón, who won the same two awards in 2014 for Gravity, now holds the record for the most AACTA International Awards won by an individual (a record previously held by Alejandro G. Iñárritu with three).

Period comedy-drama *The Favourite* also took home two awards, with Olivia Colman winning Best Lead Actress and writers **Deborah Davis** and **Tony McNamara** winning Best Screenplay.

Nicole Kidman won her second AACTA International Award for Best Supporting Actress for **Boy Erased**, marking the second time Kidman has won both the AACTA Award and AACTA International Award for Best Supporting Actress for the same role, previously winning the awards in 2017 for *Lion*.

The remaining two awards went to first-time AACTA Award winners Rami Malek, who won Best Lead Actor for Bohemian Rhapsody, and Mahershala Ali, who won Best Supporting Actor for Green Book.

In addition to the seven AACTA International Awards presented, Australian comedian Hannah Gadsby was retrospectively presented with the AACTA Award for Best Performance in a Television Comedy. Gadsby won the Award at the 2018 AACTA Awards in Sydney for her critically acclaimed stand-up special Nanette.

Highlights from the 8th AACTA International Awards were aired in Australia exclusively as part of *Screen* on Foxtel Arts, Foxtel's high definition dedicated arts channel.

The AACTA International Awards honour the best achievements in film excellence regardless of geography. The Awards are determined by the Australian Academy's International Chapter who vote across the seven categories. The AACTA International Chapter is made up of 190 Australian screen professionals with distinguished international credentials, many of whom are members of AMPAS

The AACTA International Awards continue to add a uniquely Australian voice to the international awards circuit, and often act as an early forecaster of the Oscars® and BAFTAs. This was again reflected in 2019, with AACTA International Award nominees and winners receiving a total 61 BAFTA nominations

pioneer Raymond Longford and his partner in filmmaking and life, Lottie Lyell, and recognises a person who has made a truly outstanding contribution to the enrichment of Australia's screen environment and culture.

Brown's career spans over four decades with over 91 film and television credits including 15 AFI and AACTA Awardwinning productions, two of the top 50 films of all time at the Australian box office, two AFI Awards and a further six AFI

"Just say your name, 'Bryan Brown', that's like Australian cinema right there...you are richly deserving of this and we're very lucky to have you."

Throughout the 1970's Brown cut his teeth with some of Australia's leading directors, with supporting roles in films such as Fred Schepisi's The Chant of Jimmie Blacksmith, Bruce Beresford's Money Movers, and Phillip Noyce's Newsfront, before taking on leading roles in Donald Crombie's Cathy's Child and Albie Thoms' Palm Beach

In 1980, Brown became the first male actor to be nominated for both the AFI Awards for Best Lead Actor (for Stir) and Best Supporting Actor (for Breaker Morant) in the same year. His performance as Lt. Peter Handcock in Breaker **Morant** not only won Brown his first AFI Award, it also garnered him international attention.

During the next decade, Brown found huge success in the US, receiving Golden Globe and Primetime Emmy nominations for his role as rogue stockman Luke O'Neil in US mini series *The Thorn Birds*, and starring in a slew of critical and commercial hits including: Golden Globe nominated rom com Cocktail, opposite Tom Cruise; Oscar®, BAFTA and Golden Globe Award-winning drama *Gorillas In The Mist*, opposite Sigourney Weaver; as action hero Roland 'Rollie' Tyler in F/X and its sequel F/X2; and as the unforgettable Leland Van Lew in Along Came Polly.


Brown won his second AFI Award in 1999 for Best Supporting Actor for his role as gangster Pando in *Two Hands*, opposite Heath Ledger and Rose Byrne. Brown has received a further four AFI nominations: Best Supporting Actor for *Rebel*; Best Lead Actor for *The Umbrella Woman*; and Best Supporting Actor and Best Film for Rachel Ward's Beautiful Kate. Other notable credits include Baz Luhrmann's Australia, mini series Deadline Gallipoli, family film Red Dog: True Blue, Warwick Thornton's Sweet Country, mini series Bloom, and 2019 comedy-drama Palm Beach.

In the 38 years since receiving his first AFI Award, Brown has firmly established himself as one of Australia's most respected actors, acting as a mentor to so many performers over the years and as an ambassador for the Australian screen industry

A true visionary, Darling is the founder of Shark Island Institute, Good Pitch Australia and the Documentary Australia Foundation, with all of whom he shares this award.

The three Good Pitch Australia events held since 2014 raised more than \$15 million in philanthropic support for the funding of 19 social impact documentaries and campaigns including AACTA Award-winning and nominated films *That Sugar Film*, *Blue*, *Whiteley*, *Ghosthunter*, *Gayby Baby*, *Zach's Ceremony*, *Prison Songs*, and Oscar® and Grammy nominated, Emmy Award-winning *The Hunting Ground*.

A year after the historic launch of AACTA's Asia International Engagement Program in June 2017, AACTA returned to Shanghai to present an exciting event series, including the Academy's first-ever masterclass in China, an insightful China-India cultural exchange panel and discussion, and a successful industry-attended cocktail event.

The cocktail event saw AACTA announce Eureka International Group (EIG) as the Best Asian Film Award presenting partner. Guests in attendance included: *Triple Threat* stars Tony Jaa and Tiger Chen; Zhenjian Yang, producer of epic fantasy film Asura; and Katrina Harrigan, Australian Deputy Consul General, Shanghai.

MASTERCLASS WITH ANIMAL LOGIC: REIMAGINING STORY THROUGH ANIMATION AND VFX

Following a sold-out event at Vivid Sydney in 2017, AACTA's **Animal Logic: Reimagining Story Through Animation and VFX** masterclass was the first of the events to take place as part of the Official Program of Shanghai International Film Festival. The masterclass explored the creative process behind making films with insights from Animal Logic's CEO and co-founder **Zareh Nalbandian**, production designer **Grant Freckelton** and VFX supervisor **Will Reichelt**.

The panel showcased a selection of stunning visuals from some of Animal Logic's most iconic productions, giving the 400 Chinese film fans and students in attendance an exclusive look at the techniques used to create some of cinema's most memorable scenes, from development to release.

CHINA-INDIA FILM AND CULTURAL EXCHANGE PANEL AND DISCUSSION

AACTA was thrilled to take part in the pioneering China-India Film & Cultural Exchange Panel & Discussion, held as part of the Shanghai International Film Festival. The aim of the event was to engage the film industries of China and India in intercultural dialogue and provide a platform to encourage further collaborations in cinema and culture. The panel discussed a variety of film and cultural exchange topics, from achieving success in the Chinese and Indian film markets, to how China and India can collaborate to make films together, what types of productions travel the best internationally, and what success in co-productions and intercultural films looks like.

The event was hosted by award-winning actress Nadia Hatta. Guest speakers included: Leena Jaisani, Head of Entertainment at the Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry; Kulmeet Makkar, CEO of the Film and Television Producers Guild of India; award-winning Finnish director Renny Harlin (Skiptrace); Indian directors Advait Chandan (Secret Superstar) and Saket Chaudhary (Hindi Medium); Hong Kong director Wai-Keung Lau (Infernal Affairs); Chinese actor and director Daming Chen (What Women Want); Indian producer Daljit DJ Parmar (Kung Fu Yoga); and CEO of Indian television network B4U Ishan Saksena (Three Stories).





CHINA | AUSTRALIA FILM FORUM

AACTA held an exciting **China | Australia Film Forum** in Sydney during ScreenWeek in December 2018. The Forum aimed to further encourage collaboration between filmmakers in Australia and China.

The panel gave the 280 guests in attendance valuable insights into the current state of the industry, including: a comprehensive overview of the Chinese film market and current trends; new opportunities and challenges; and the status of a number of current co-productions and collaborations.

The Film Forum was followed by an exclusive Cocktail Party, giving guests the opportunity to meet and network with panellists and other leading figures from the Australian and Chinese film industries. Guests in attendance included: Andrew Knight, Stephen and Bernard Curry, Jack Thompson, Fred Schepisi, Jeffrey Walker, Nazeem Hussain, Shane Jacobson, Rob Coleman, Kingston Anderson, and Kimble Rendall.

Moderated by **Max Yang** from the Shanghai International Film Festival, the Film Forum bought together some of the most important figures working in the Chinese film industry today, including:

- China-based director and Best Asian Film Grand Juror Renny Harlin (The Long Kiss Goodnight, Skiptrace, The Legend of the Ancient Sword, Bodies at Rest);
- Chinese screenwriter and Best Asian Film Grand Juror Liu Yi (Wolf Warrior II);
- China-based producer, President and CEO of Perfect Village Entertainment Ellen Eliasoph (Shadow, Mountain Crv):
- Australia-based producer and Best Asian Film Grand Juror

The AACTA Award for Best Asian Film presented by Eureka International Group (EIG) recognises the exceptional calibre of films from the Asian region as well as their growing popularity, not just with audiences domestically within Australasia, but also globally.

Over the past year, Asian films contributed \$36 million AUD to the Australian box office, signalling the immense popularity of Asian cinema in Australia as the region's film industries continue to boom and produce high-quality, internationally lauded titles.

The Award was presented to Chinese box office hit *Dying to Survive* at the 2018 AACTA Awards Ceremony presented by Foxtel in Sydney. The film's director **Muye Wen** accepted the Award on stage, which was presented by Golden Globe winner **Rachel Griffiths** and Best Asian Film Grand Juror **Renny Harlin**.

60 YEARS OF AFI | AACTA

2018 marked the 60th Anniversary of AFI | AACTA, Australia's longest standing national screen culture and industry development organisation. For 60 years, AFI | AACTA has promoted and supported the growth of Australia's screen culture and industry, helping to carve careers and nurture the industry.

The annual AACTA Awards (formerly the AFI Awards) have celebrated the industry and its immense talent since 1958. The awards have since grown to become a world-class marker of screen excellence and the only Australian awards to honour practitioners across all industry sectors, including feature film, documentary, short film, television, online, visual effects, and animation.

Today, AACTA continues to evolve and adapt to support the ever-growing and ever-changing Australian screen industry.



The AFI is officially born with the issue of a certificate of incorporation on 12 November 1958.

The AFI was established in order to facilitate the touring of imported films from Melbourne Film Festival to Sydney Film Festival and to the newer festivals in Canberra and Adelaide. In this early format, under founding director **Erwin Rado**, the AFI's role was to negotiate for films on behalf of each division – each of which acted as autonomous divisions of the AFI-run 'Australian Film Festival'. Although the Australian Film Festival was ended after only one year, the Melbourne Film Festival remained an activity of the AFI until 1972 when the two organisations separated.

Ten awards were presented, recognising advertising, documentary, educational, and experimental film, the prominent areas of filmmaking in the Australian screen industry throughout the 1960s. The aim of the AFI Awards was to encourage and grow the industry to match those of Australia's European and American counterparts.

In 1966, Schepisi won the Golden Reel Award for Public Relations for *People Make Papers* and the Bronze Award for Advertising Under Five Minutes for *Hilton Rehearsal*. Schepisi received seven AFI Awards throughout the 1960s for advertising and public relations films. These early days of Schepisi's career in public relations and advertising were illustrative of the filmmaking activities throughout the 1970s, when feature films weren't prominent.

The AFI establishes the Raymond Longford Award.

The highest honour AFI | AACTA can bestow upon an individual, the Raymond Longford Award recognises a person who has made a truly outstanding contribution to the enrichment of Australia's screen environment and culture. Originally named in honour of the great Australian film pioneer Raymond Longford, the name of the Award was changed to the AACTA Longford Lyell Award in 2015 following extensive industry consultation to recognise Longford's partner in filmmaking and in life, Lottie Lyell. Director lan **Dunlop** was the first recipient of the honour at the 1968 AFI Awards. Since then, 46 individuals have received the honour, including Peter Weir (1990), Cate Blanchett (2015), Fred Schepisi (1991), Jan Chapman (1997), Sue Milliken (1993), Andrew Knight (2015), Jacki Weaver (2014), Don McAlpine (2012) and, most recently, Bryan **Brown** (2018).

The AFI is instrumental in the lobby for the 'revival' of Australian film throughout the 1970s.

During this time, under the direction of AFI Chairs **Phillip Adams** (1971-1973), **Colin Bennett** (1974) and **Barry Jones** (1974-1980), the AFI established the Experimental Film and Television Fund (EFTF), the Vincent Library (a distribution arm which later evolved into AFI Distribution and continued until 1999), The George Lugg Library (a research and information collection), opened cinemas in three states (the Longford in Melbourne, the Chauvel Cinema in Sydney and the State Theatre in Hobart), lobbied for Australian content, and expanded its film culture focus and activities.



The Experimental Film and Television Fund was the first funding agency for Australian film and television.

Administered by AFI between 1970 and 1977, the EFTF handed out almost \$2 million to filmmakers for 828 projects. The fund aimed to foster originality in form, content and technique, and also to discover new creative talent. Beneficiaries of the fund included Peter Weir, Paul Cox, Jan Chapman, Scott Hicks, Byron Kennedy, a 16-year-old Alex Proyas, Yoram Gross and Tim Burstall, who would all go on to become some of Australia's leading directors.

The first AFI Award for Best Short Film was presented at the 1970 AFI Awards.

Then named the Alan Stout Award for Short Film, **Nigel Buesst's** EFTF-funded **Dead Easy** and **Rod Kinnear's She's a Grouse Game** were the first short films to win the Award. Other early winners included **Tim Burstall's The Hot Centre of the World** and **Dr George Miller's Violence in the Cinema...Part 1**.

At the 1972 AFI Awards, **Tim Burstall's** EFTF-funded film *Stork* became the first production in AFI history to win more than three Awards, winning Best Film, Best Direction for **Tim Burstall**, Best Performance by an Actor for **Jacki Weaver**, and the Australian Film Development Corporation Award.

The first competitive AFI Awards for feature film are presented.

Nine films vied for the nine Awards, with three iconic Australian films receiving record-breaking nominations: *The Devil's Playground* with 11 nominations; and *Picnic at Hanging Rock* and *Caddie* each with 7 nominations. The first 'official' AFI Award for Best Film was presented to **Fred Schepisi's** *The Devil's Playground* at the 1976 AFI Awards.

The AFI establishes the Byron Kennedy Award.

Established in collaboration with Dr George Miller, the Byron Kennedy Award honours Miller's original filmmaking partner and Mad Max co-creator, Byron Kennedy. The Award celebrates outstanding creative enterprise within the screen industry and recognises an individual or organisation whose work embodies innovation and the relentless pursuit of excellence. The first Byron Kennedy Award recipient was sound engineer Roger Savage. Over the past 34 years, 43 individuals and organisations have been honoured, including Baz Luhrmann and Catherine Martin (1999), Jill Bilcock (1995), Rachel Perkins (2002), Rolf de Heer (2006), Animal Logic (2010) and, most recently, lan **Darling AO** (2018).

Jane Campion becomes the first female to win three AFI Awards in the same year.

Campion received the AFI Awards for Best Achievement in Direction in a Non-Feature Film (*A Girls Own Story*), Best Screenplay in a Non-Feature Film (*A Girls Own Story*) and Best Experimental Film (*Passionless Moments*). Just three years later, Campion became the the first female to win the Palme d'Or for Short Film for *Peel* at the 1986 Cannes Film Festival. Over the next 34 years, Campion went on to win a further six AFI | AACTA Awards (including the prestigious Byron Kennedy Award in 1989), became the first female Australian director to be nominated for an Oscar® and the first – and thus far, only – female filmmaker to receive the Palme d'Or for feature film (both for *The Piano* in 1993).

The AFI introduces the first television awards, presenting ten awards recognising production, direction, performance and screenwriting.

The awards were introduced following a cultural shift in the Australian screen industry which saw filmmakers embrace television as a medium to tell stories of cultural importance. Productions such as Crawford Productions' The Sullivans and Reg Grundy's The Young Doctors, as well as the introduction of long-running drama series' Neighbours and Home and Away helped bring Australian television to international attention. The 1980's also saw a surge of high-quality dramatic mini series' and telefeatures, including Kennedy Miller Mitchell's The Cowra Breakout and Vietnam (which saw Nicole Kidman first recognised by an Awards organisation, winning the AFI Award for Best Performance by an Actress in a Mini Series at the 1987 AFI Awards).

Halifax f.p. earns a record 12 nominations in television categories, winning three awards.

The record was broken in 2000 when *Grass Roots* received 13 nominations, winning five awards. With a total 38 nominations, *Halifax f.p.* remains the most nominated television production in AFI | AACTA history, while the *Underbelly* series holds the record for most wins in television categories, winning a total of 12 awards between 2008 and 2012.



Kath & Kim becomes the first and only comedy to win the AFI Award for Best Television Drama Series at the 2002 AFI Awards.

This prompted the inclusion of comedy in the AFI television award categories and the introduction of the AFI Award for Best Television Comedy Series.

The inaugural AFI Award for Outstanding Achievement in Craft in Television is presented to *Kath & Kim* costume designer Kitty Stuckey.

The Award was the first to recognise television craft outside of production, direction, performance and screenplay.

44 awards recognising excellence in feature film, television, documentary, visual effects, and short film were presented across two major events: the Industry Luncheon and the Awards Ceremony, which was held at the Sydney Opera House and telecast on Channel Nine. Although the AFI Awards were previously held over two nights, the Industry Luncheon event was introduced to give industry the collective opportunity to celebrate their achievements together without the pressures of a telecast event.

Five Awards were presented at the event, recognising film excellence regardless of geography. The AACTA International Awards honour Australia's international screen peers, adding a uniquely Australian voice alongside those of the Oscars® and the BAFTAs, as well as celebrating fellow Australians working in screen internationally.

The launch followed an extensive review which sought to identify new ways of recognising and nurturing screen excellence in Australia, elevating national and international understanding of the AFI Awards, and ways in which the AFI could better represent and progress the whole screen industry. The AFI received overwhelming support for the core principals under their proposal to create an 'Australian Academy', which paved the path for AACTA to be established.

With AFI Award and Oscar®-winning actor **Geoffrey Rush** named as the founding President, the Australian Academy drew upon elements of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences (USA) and the British Academy of Film and Television Arts (UK), tailoring them to meet local industry needs and traditions, and to ensure that AACTA remained distinctly Australian.

AACTA introduces six new television screen craft awards.

The new awards, which recognised cinematography, editing, sound, original music score, production design, and costume design, were introduced following extensive industry lobbying, consultation and an organisational review. The introduction of the Awards saw Australia's television industry recognised for their craft alongside their film industry peers, achieving greater inclusivity for screen craft and the television sector. The six new Awards were first presented at the 3rd AACTA Awards in January 2014, where 20 television awards were presented across television drama, comedy, children's, light entertainment, and reality.

In the inaugural year of the program, AACTA held numerous cross-cultural events, including three In Conversation-style events in Sydney in December 2017. The inaugural AACTA Award for Best Indie Film presented by Event Cinemas, which specifically honours the finest Australian films with a budget of under \$2 million, was awarded to *Jirga*. AACTA introduced the Award after the percentage of films with budgets under \$2 million entering the Awards almost doubled between 2011 and 2018, as well as industry expansion which has seen low-budget and independent Australian films have more opportunities to find audiences than ever before. Awarded to *Finals Footy on Fox: Richmond V Collingwood*, the AACTA Subscription Television Award for Best Sports Presentation recognises the ground-breaking work the subscription television sector is undertaking in the coverage of sport.



MASTERCLASS IN DIRECTING WITH MICHAEL **GRACEY**

Over 240 guests joined AACTA and host Marc Fennell for this masterclass with Australian director **Michael Gracey**, who directed the Oscar® nominated and Golden Globe Awardwinning film *The Greatest Showman*, as he discussed his career, vision, work ethic, and creative process alongside an array of stunning material on screen.

MASTERCLASS IN WEB SERIES CREATION

Held in Sydney as part of Vivid Sydney and in Melbourne during AACTA Shorts Fest, these masterclasses provided insight into all facets of web series creation, including concept development, scripting, casting, shooting, finding and growing your audience, and funding opportunities. The panels brought together some of Australia's most successful web content creators, including: Christiaan Van Vuuren (Bondi Hipsters, Soul Mates); Chloë Reeson (Homecoming Queens); ABC TV Head of Comedy Rick Kalowski; Sophie Hyde (Fucking Adelaide); Adele Vuko (Skitbox); Charlotte Seymour (Other People's Problems); Princess Pictures partner and producer Paul Walton; Stuart Willis (Restoration); Screen Australia Junior Investment Manager, Online Alvce Adams (I Can't Even); and hosts Warwick Holt (Restoration) and Screen Australia Multiplatform Investment Manager Rosie Lourde (Starting From Now).

AACTA SEMINAR: FILM AND TELEVISION PATHWAYS IN QUEENSLAND

This special seminar event brought together some of Queensland's most successful screen practitioners to share their journeys and give insights into what drives them, their creative process and how they found success while living and working in Queensland. Beetle Feeders); and WildBear Entertainment Principal and EP Veronica Fury.

MASTERCLASS IN MUSIC IN FILM AND TELEVISION WITH DAVID HIRSCHFELDER

Following two successful masterclasses in Sydney and Melbourne in 2017, AACTA gave members in Brisbane an insight into the world of film composition with BAFTA, AFI and AACTA Award winner **David Hirschfelder**, whose Oscar® nominated work includes **Shine** and **Elizabeth**.

IN CONVERSATION: AUSTRALIAN TELEVISION DRAMA TO THE WORLD

Hosted by Margaret Pomeranz, this 'In Conversation'-style event, held in partnership with Foxtel, focused on how to create, commission and produce a drama series with international appeal, and discussed the 'how and why' of the global success of Australian dramas including Wentworth, A Place to Call Home and *Mr Inbetween*. The panel included: director Nash Edgerton (Mr Inbetween); actors Marta Dusseldorp (A Place to Call Home) and Celia Ireland (Wentworth); FX Networks and FX Productions President of Original Programming Eric Schrier; and Foxtel's Head of Drama Penny Win.

AACTA VFX & ANIMATION BAKE-OFF

Held in Sydney for the fifth year, AACTA's annual VFX & Animation Bake-Off was also held in Melbourne for the first time in 2018. The Bake-Off gave voting members an exclusive behind the scenes look at the 13 productions competing for the AACTA Award for Best Visual Effects or Animation, Audiences in Sydney and Melbourne heard first-hand from the practitioners behind some of the world's biggest productions, including Animal World, Black Panther, Bright, The Bureau of Magical Things, Christopher Robin, The LEGO® Ninjago Movie, Occupation, Peter Rabbit™, Romper Stomper, Skyscraper, Tomb Raider, Upgrade and Winchester.

THE SWEET SPOT: SUCCESSFUL CREATIVE **COLLABORATIONS THAT REALLY HIT HOME** PRESENTED BY AFTRS

Held during AACTA ScreenWeek in Sydney, this sold-out panel discussion event was held in partnership with AACTA, Screen Producers Australia, the Australian Directors' Guild and the Australian Writers' Guild. The event brought together a panel of film and television creatives whose projects received AACTA nominations across directing, producing and writing categories to share their trade secrets. Panellists included: directors Warwick Thornton (Sweet Country), Jeffrey Walker (Riot), Ben Howling and Yolanda Ramke (Cargo); producers David Jowsey (Sweet Country), Joanna Werner and Louise Smith (Riot); screenwriter Greg Waters (Riot); and actor Xavier Samuels (Riot).

SHORTS

From 20-23 August, AACTA Shorts Fest shined a dedicated spotlight on short filmmaking in Australia. Shorts Fest featured a tailored program of events including the inaugural AACTA Pitch event, a masterclass in web series creation, the 2018 Oscar® Short Film Program and the 2018 AACTA Short Film Program. Over 1,000 guests attended the ten events held in Sydney at Event Cinemas Bondi Junction, in Melbourne at Cinema Nova, in Brisbane at Event Cinemas Brisbane City Myer Centre and in Perth at Event Cinemas Innaloo.

FILME

An all-inclusive look at Australian film, AACTA Film Fest gave members the opportunity to see the outstanding Australian films competing for nominations for the 2018 AACTA Awards presented by Foxtel.

AACTA Film Fest was held from 3-25 September in Sydney at Event Cinemas Bondi Junction, in Melbourne at Cinema Nova and in Brisbane at Event Cinemas Brisbane City Myer Centre. Along with a record-breaking 37 feature films in competition, AACTA Film Fest saw an increase in total attendance numbers compared to 2017, with over 3,400 members attending the screenings.

As part of AACTA Film Fest in 2018, AACTA provided an online platform for journalists, filmmakers and other industry figures to discuss the feature films in competition. 18 articles were posted online and promoted across AACTA's social media, generating excellent traffic to the News section which became one of the busiest areas of the AACTA website during this period. This online conversation saw filmmakers and many high-profile members of the industry as well as state screen agencies, guilds and industry organisations become much more engaged in AACTA Film Fest and competing films, promoting the articles, screenings and films.

2018 also saw AACTA welcome four Film Fest hosts: Clem Bastow and Andy Hazel in Melbourne, and Blake Howard and Annie Parnell in Sydney. The hosts were regular fixtures at the Film Fest screenings, building a rapport with attendees which saw many guests engage in further discussion about the films not only with the hosts but with fellow audience members as well as online.

DOCSE

Shining the spotlight on Australia's thriving documentary industry, AACTA Docs Fest was held from 2-7 October in Sydney at AFTRS, in Melbourne at Cinema Nova and in Brisbane at Griffith University. For the first time, members had the opportunity to see a wider shortlist of feature documentaries competing for the AACTA Award for Best Feature Documentary in cinemas. AACTA Docs Fest not only helped facilitate a broader exploration of the ten feature documentaries in competition, but also drew attention to the filmmakers behind them and the incredible stories and people they explored.







In 2018, AACTA launched **AACTA Pitch**, a national pitching competition that aims to discover Australia's next world-class scripted series for television or web. Identifying and nurturing the best and most exciting new series ideas, AACTA Pitch provides meaningful support for creatives as they start their journeys on the world stage.

In its first year, AACTA received 150 entries for the competition, with eight finalists selected to compete at the AACTA Pitch Live Final in August in Sydney: *Bulldog's Alley, Emerald Way, Good Grief, Monster's Playground, The Mirage, Pixel Raiders, Tradies,* and *Virgin in a Sex Store*.

Held as part of AACTA Shorts Fest, over 150 audience members joined AACTA for the special event, where the eight finalists pitched their series in front of the live audience including the AACTA Pitch judging panel: Princess Pictures Senior Producer Scripted and Unscripted Mike Cowap; Foxtel Drama Development Executive Carly Heaton; Screen Australia Online Investment Manager Lee Naimo; and Jungle Drama Development Manager Shay Spencer.

Darcy Prendergast and Seamus Spilsbury's Monster's Playground took home the top prize, which included a \$5,000 cash prize, post-production support from Spectrum Films, feedback and mentorship opportunities, and tickets to the 2018 AACTA Awards presented by Foxtel. Special mentions went to Virgin in a Sex Store, Pixel Raiders and Emerald Way.

AACTA Pitch will return in 2019 and AACTA looks forward to discovering more incredible new ideas from our industry's emerging creators.


