

Community consultation program.



South Australia's economy is in a process of transformation with a shift away from traditional to new and high tech industries. To work our way through this transition, the state needs to remain open to ideas and boldly explore all possible future opportunities.

In March 2015, the State Government established the Nuclear Fuel Cycle Royal Commission to consider the practical and economic issues raised by South Australia's greater participation in the four areas of activity that form part of the nuclear fuel cycle - mining, further processing, energy generation and waste management.

The Royal Commission's Report provides all South Australians with a lot to think about.

The Report's findings and recommendations is the starting point for a community conversation about our potential further involvement in the Nuclear Fuel Cycle, which all South Australians can be involved in. This conversation will help guide Government's decision making on the next steps.

South Australians have the opportunity to consider the evidence, understand the choices and provide their views on the Nuclear Fuel Cycle Royal Commission's Report. A comprehensive state-wide consultation program is underway, to enable everyone to get involved and contribute to the conversation about the state's future.

The program has four stages:

STAGE ① - BE INFORMED.

Working collectively over four days, a randomly selected Citizens' Jury of 50 everyday South Australians considered the Royal Commission findings, and had access to expert witnesses to help them work through the issues and better

understand the options. They produced a report identifying the key issues for community discussion. The jury was facilitated by democracyCo at arm's length from Government.

STAGE ② - BE INVOLVED.

From July – October 2016, a comprehensive statewide community consultation program will offer a range of opportunities for South Australians to participate in the conversation about the State's future role in the Nuclear Fuel Cycle.

Over 100 sites across the state will be visited to ensure all South Australians can get involved, and to enable the Government to gather feedback from the community.

This program includes activity at:

STAGE ③ - BE CLEAR.

Following the statewide program, Citizens' Jury Two will be formed and will consist of 350 randomly selected South Australians, including the Citizens' Jury One participants. The Jury will convene over September and October.

This Jury will review community feedback from the state-wide consultation program, in addition to finalising their own perspectives from examining the Royal Commission's Report. The Jury will capture their deliberations in a report that will be provided to the Premier, Jay Weatherill, as a key input to the Government's decision-making process.

STAGE ④ - GOVERNMENT'S RESPONSE.

During November, the Government will carefully consider the Royal Commission's Recommendations, together with the Citizens' Jury Report and feedback from the statewide engagement program in deciding the next steps.

Every South Australian has an opportunity to learn more about the nuclear fuel cycle by discovering the facts, understanding the choices, and providing their views on the Royal Commission's Report. This is a discussion about the state's future that all South Australians can have, and will help guide the Government's decision making on the next steps.
