Briefly, the idea is to establish a Soldiers Association throughout the country and the Openinous. No better name could, I think, be suggested.

Amongst the many objects of such an Association would be the following:-

- To watch and safeguard the interest of all members of the Porces, and to take such steps as are necessary to protect them during and after demobilisation.
- To promote undertakings for the disabled, using our individual and combined efforts to find employment for all discharged soldiers and sailors.
 - To help discharged soldiers and sailors to prepare their necessary papers and to see that their pensions and allowances are in order.
- 4. To secure the welfare of the women and children left by those who have fallen.
 - To perpetuate in loving memory and affection the dead.
- To promote amongst the rising generation the grand spirit of patriotism and devotion that is the characteristic of the Army of to-day.

To achieve these objects, it would be necessary to have borough and county organisations throughout the country with a grand central council.

Parliament rould be requested to grant a recognised uniform for authorised parados only, which parados could be held at intervals during the year or on a stated Bank Holliam.

Membership would be free with service as qualification

Women should be admitted to the Association to represent their husbands during their absence on service. For the past two years these questions have been discussed in wartous forms and the very definite casive is wident that when we drift back to civil lire, whatever our vesations may be, we may still held together as a living corporate body. It should be noted that the welfare of every trade or profession is anteguarded by some such organisation as is hevely suggested.

There are a large number who desire to contribute annually toward the general funds to be used for this organisation, and for extending help when necessary.

Part I soon after the 10th May 1015, when the Third Australian Congret Monptal left Australia for Active Service Abroad, it was found that several Masons were included among the Officers sha other Ranks of the Unit and an endeavour was made to hold a Secial Cathering on board,

It may be of interest to note that of the twenty one present at the first gathering only three were laft to carry on the work so ally commoned at the Dardsmelles. The rest are scattered for and wide, from Helgium to Palestine, some may have made the greatest scarifice of all others counded and invalided to their homes while the rest are carrying on wherever they may be.

The Fourth Gathering held on the eve of Anzac Day, an Aniversary that will live for ever in the History of Asutralia and Hew Zealand, saw an increase in the numbers present.
