1. Except in the Dock's area of Brit Com Base all individually moving Army Vehicles will make a physical stop at all

245. TRAFFIC CONTROL - LEVEL CROSSINGS (cont'd)

level railway crossings. The driver will check that it is safe to proceed before moving across the line.

2. Convoys will follow the procedure set out in para 1 or dismount a traffic control man at crossings to signal each vehicle of the convoy across.

3. Formations will erect conspicuous railway crossing signs at all main crossings.

4. Provost will check compliance with this order and firm disciplinary action will be taken against offenders.

246. DRESS - ANTI MOSQUITO MEASURES

All ranks will wear long trousers and long sleeves as uniform from 1900 Hrs to 0600 Hrs daily.

Gaiters or anklets will be worn by all elements in which these items are an authorised scale of issues. At other times summer dress in accordance with existing regulations will be worn.

Permission granted to female members to wear evening dress is suspended.

The above order will be strictly enforced until withdrawn by orders from this HQ.

The estimated period of special precaution is six weeks.

247. MEDICAL EXAMINATION -- COOKS

Cooks who have been discharged from Hospital after treatment for V.D. and who have been returned to Cooking duties will be given a medical examination every week for the first month after discharge from Hospital.

This examination will be in addition to the normal surveillance by specialists at VDTG.

248. LEGAL

Any other rank desiring to interview a legal officer at HQ BRET COM BASE for the purpose of obtaining legal aid regarding his private affairs, will obtain permission from an Officer of his Unit who will arrange an appointment for such member.

249. REPORTS OF LOSSES OF STORES ETC

All reports of losses etc reported to DAPM by telephone will be confirmed in writing and a copy of the memo submitted as part of the Investigating Officers report.

250. KEYS - SECURITY OF.

O.C Units are responsible for the Security of Stores on charge to their respective Units. Keys of storerooms etc must be safeguarded and a Register of keys kept showing to whom keys are issued and a relevant signature.

250. KEYS - SECURITY OF (Cont'd)

The practice of leaving keys in a hiding place known to members of the staff etc will cease forthwith.

237. DISCIPLINE - OUT OF BOUNDS AREAS.

Areas OTUMURA 751438 and KOHINCURA 753445 on the mainland eight miles east of KURE are OUT OF BOUNDS to all personnel, except those required to proceed there on duty. War Gases in dangerous condition.

238. DISCIPLINE -- TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS.

Attention of Formation and Unit Commanders is drawn to the excessive rate of accidents involving Military Vehicles throughout BCOF.

During the month of MAY 46, seven fatal traffic accidents occurred.

All possible Action is to be taken to ensure closer observation of traffic regulations.

Provost authorities are instructed to maintain a more rigid check on cases of speeding, careless and negligent driving and faulty maintenance.

41. PRECAUTIONS AT LEVEL CROSSINGS.

- A. Two serious accidents have now occurred in BRIT COM BASE AREA due to trains hitting motor Vehicles at level crossings, involving the deaths of three members of the Occupation Force.
- B. Reliance can NOT be placed on the lowering of barriers by the Japanese railway gate keepers and in any case some minor crossings are unguarded. All Drivers of MT Vchs. will observe carefully, that a train is NOT approaching from either direction before crossing the railway track.
- C. OC's units will be responsible that this Order is brought to the attention of every Driver posted or Attached to their units, and to the attention of every Officer Authorised to drive a Vehicle.

42. ANTI-MOSQUITO PRECAUTIONS

All Ranks are warned that mosquitoes are the vectors for both Malaria and Japanese B Encephalitis in the TOKYO Area. Strict Anti-Mosquito precautions must be observed by all Ranks; these will include:

- (a) Wearing of protective clothing and sleeves rolled down by night.
- (b) Mosquito Nets to be erected before 1830 hrs. each night.

43. WAR BADGES.

1. This instruction applies to badges issued in relation to the AIF in respect of the war which commenced on 3rd September, 1939.
2. The badges concerned are as follows:-
  - (i) Returned from Active Service Badge
  - (ii) General Service Badge
  - (iii) Female Relatives' Badge
  - (iv) Mothers' and Widows' Badge
  - (v) Exemption Badge (Reserved Occupation)
  - (vi) Exemption Badge (Medically Unfit)
3. The Returned from Active Service Badge, the General Service Badge, the Female Relatives' Badge and the Mothers' and Widows' Badge are issued subject to the provision of this instruction.
4. Issues of the former General Service Badge, the Exemption Badge (Reserved Occupation) and the Exemption Badge (Medically Unfit) were discontinued in pursuance of a decision of War Cabinet on 12 JUL 42. Eligibility for all other Badges, except the Mothers' and Widows' Badge, ceased on the 2nd September 1945.
5. DEFINITIONS:- For the purposes of this instruction -
  - (i) "DISCHARGE" means ceasing to be employed on continuous full-time duty in or with the AIF, CEF, or a Garrison Battalion, and in the case of the PAF (exclusive of any part of those forces raised in time of war for war service) ceasing to be employed on War Service.
  - (ii) "EMBARKED" means proceeded on a journey, on Duty, Overseas, irrespective of whether the journey was completed or not, provided it extended beyond the last Australian port of call or the vessel;
  - (iii) "FITNESS" means member of the AIF employed on full-time Duty or a person in Uniform, or full-time Duty, accredited to the AIF in an Official capacity.
  - (iv) "MOTHER" means female parent, including a step-mother or foster-mother who has acted as a parent during infancy and education to a person in respect of whom a badge is claimed.
  - (v) "OVERSEAS" means outside the Commonwealth of Australia and its Territories.
  - (vi) "WAR" means any war in which His Majesty was engaged since 3rd September, 1939.
6. RETURNED FROM ACTIVE SERVICE BADGE - The following conditions govern the issue of the Returned from Active Service Badge:-
  - (i) This Badge will be issued, on discharge, to male or female members who are qualified to receive it.
  - (ii) To qualify for this Badge a member must -
    - (a) Have embarked for service overseas between 3rd September 1939 and 2nd September 1945; or
    - (b) Have been serving overseas on 3rd September 1939, or
    - (c) Have been enlisted and served overseas between 3rd September 1939, and 2nd September, 1945; or

6. RETURNED FROM ACTIVE SERVICE BADGE (continued)

- (d) Have served on continuous full-time duty in one of the operational areas within the Commonwealth of Australia and its Territories prescribed in this instruction, while on the posted strength of a Unit or Detachment forming part of the OOE of a formation functioning therein; and
- (e) Have been discharged for a reason other than those stated in para 2 of GPO 65/1946.
- (iii) Members of the permanent staff of a ship, or the crew of a water transport vessel who left on a voyage to a prescribed operational area but owing to enemy attack did not complete such voyage, will be regarded as having rendered qualifying service.
- (iv) Subject to clause (iii) of this paragraph, a member whose only service outside the territorial limits of the Commonwealth of Australia was rendered during the journey from one part of the Commonwealth to another, will not be deemed to have served overseas.
- (v) For the purpose of this paragraph, the following are prescribed as operational areas from and including the dates shown:-
- (a) Mandated Territory of New Guinea - 4th January 1942.
  - (b) Territory of Papua - 2nd February 1942.
  - (c) Northern Territory, north of latitude 14° south - 19th February 1942.
  - (d) Torres Strait Islands - 4th March 1942.

7. GENERAL SERVICE BADGE

In pursuance of a decision of War Cabinet on 16th December 1945, the issue of a new General Service Badge is approved subject to the following conditions:-

- (1) This badge will be issued, on discharge, to male and female members who are qualified to receive it.
  - (2) To qualify for this badge, a member must not be eligible for the Returned From Active Service Badge and must -
    - (a) Have been enlisted, called up, or appointed for Service with the AIF for the duration of the War or have been a member of the PWF during the of War, and
    - (b) Have served full time for a continuous qualifying period of not less than 28 days during the War; and
    - (c) Have been discharged for a reason other than those stated in para 2 of GPO 65/1946.
8. FEMALE RELATIVES' BADGE - The following conditions govern the issue of the Female Relatives' Badge:-

- (i) To qualify for this badge, a person must be a female relative of a member who, on discharge, will be eligible for the Returned from Active Service Badge.

(continued)

8. FEMALE RELATIVES' BADGE (continued)

(ii) For the purpose of this paragraph, a "Female Relative" of a member means -

- (a) If the member is married - the wife and the mother of the member;
- (b) If the member is a widow, widower or divorcee - the members eldest living daughter and mother;
- (c) If the member is a widow, widower, or divorcee without mother or daughter - the members eldest sister;
- (d) If the member is unmarried - the members mother.
- (e) If the member is unmarried and his mother is dead the member's eldest living sister;
- (f) If the member has no female relatives within any of the foregoing categories - the members nearest female blood relative, nominated in writing by him.

(iii) A star will be attached to a bar suspended from this badge to indicate one member who has rendered qualifying service and another star will be added for each additional member who has rendered qualifying service.

9. HONOURS' AND WIDOWS' BADGE. - The following conditions govern the issue of the Honours' and Widows' Badge:-

- (i) To qualify for this badge, a person must be either the father or the widow of the member who died whilst employed on continuous full-time duty, both father and widow being eligible for the badge.
- (ii) A star will be attached to a bar suspended from this badge to indicate one deceased member, and another star will be added for each additional deceased member.

GENERAL

10. A person who was issued with an Exemption Badge or a General Service Badge, and subsequently became entitled to another type of badge, will not be issued with such badge until the one originally issued has been returned.

11. War Badges will not be worn by members of the AIF on full-time or part-time duty when in uniform.

12. (a) The Badges mentioned in this instruction remain the property of the Commonwealth of Australia, and, in any instance where it is found that a badge has been issued to a person who is not entitled thereto, the badge will be withdrawn.

(b) It is to be noted that a person wearing a War Badge to which he is not entitled is guilty of an offence against Regulation 31A of the National Security (General) Regulations.

13. The following circular names are cancelled:-

- MB79894 of 29 November 1940.
- MB37042 of 2nd May 1941
- MB 02515 of 27th July 1942.

Such cancellations will not effect any badges already issued.

44. DISCIPLINE - CRIMES OF VIOLENCE

59. PRECAUTIONS AT LEVEL CROSSINGS

1. Except in the docks area of Brit Com Base all individually moving army vehicles will make a physical stop at all level railway crossings. The driver will check that it is safe to proceed before moving across the lines.
2. Convoys will follow the procedure set out in para 1 or dismount a traffic control man at crossings to signal each vehicle of the convoy across.
3. Formations will erect conspicuous railway crossing signs at all main crossings.
4. Provost will check compliance with this order and firm disciplinary action will be taken against offenders.
5. Reliance can NOT be placed on the lowering of barriers by the Japanese railway gate keepers and in any case some minor crossings are unguarded. All Drivers of MT vehicles will observe carefully, that a train is NOT approaching from either direction before crossing the railway track.

60. USE OF M.T. FOR RECREATIONAL PURPOSES

ECOF are issuing instructions as to the use of M.T. for recreational purposes but meanwhile the following instructions cover the use of M.T. for recreation in TOKYO.

Unit transport may be used for Amenity runs which cover sightseeing, sport, evening dances, cinema and other forms of recreation as may be laid down by this Sub Area up to a distance of 40 miles. (i.e. 20 miles each way).

The use of Transport for a greater distance will NOT be permitted without the approval of Commander, Brit Com Sub-Area, TOKYO.

The most economical type of transport will be used for the numbers carried. Seating accommodation will be filled to capacity but overloading will not be permitted.

Jeeps may be used provided that:-

- (a) Approval of the Commander, Brit Com Sub Area is obtained.
- (b) Seating accommodation is filled.
- (c) Trailers are not used for carrying personnel.

Specialist vehicles, motor cycles, and motor cycle combination, are not to be used for amenity runs.

Drivers detailed for amenity runs will conform to the following rules:-

- (a) Will be in possession of a proper work ticket for the run.
- (b) Will be on duty from the time the vehicle leaves the IM Park until the vehicle returns to the Park.
- (c) Will not exceed the speed limit of the vehicle they are driving, or the local limits laid down.
- (d) Will be responsible for the safe-guarding of their vehicle which they will not leave unattended unless special organized arrangements for safe-guarding of vehicles at the destination have been made by the Unit or formation concerned.
