

Extracts from the Rules made by the Lord Chamberlain

THE name of the actual and responsible Manager of the Theatre must be printed on every play bill. The Public can leave the Theatre at the end of the Performance by all Exit and Entrance Doors, which must open outwards. Where there is a Fireproof Screen to the Proscenium Opening, it must be lowered at least once during every Performance to ensure its being in proper working order. Smoking is not permitted in the Auditorium. All gangways, passages and staircases must be kept free from chairs or any other obstructions, whether permanent or temporary.
