

## PICTORIAL LEAFLET:

## LANTERNS WITH WARNINGS TO SOLDIERS:

B oth sides of this leaflet show an identical illustration depicting five fire-guard lanterns with inscribed warnings.

One side shows a copy of an anti-espionage poster as distributed in Japan.

The text reads:

Central lantern: "Be careful of spies."

Lantern at left: "Be careful in documents and

letters."

Further to the left: "Be careful in telephone conver-

sations."

Lantern at top right: "Be careful in cafes and pubs."

At Bottom right: "Be careful in factories and on

tehicles."

(It will be observed that these warnings are all related to the text of the central warning against spies.)

The inscriptions on the other side reads as follow:

Central Lantern: "Beware of a planless, bungling

command and of useless fighting."

Lantern at left: "Beware of the propaganda of the

Military Clique and their lying

radio."

Further to the left: "Beware of false shame, of the

importance of life. Heed against

dying a useless death."

Lantern at top right: "Be on your guard against military

officers who leave you in the lurch."

At bottom right: "Beware of being left behind to die

from starvation."

(Here again, the slogans are related to the central slogan, insofar as the failure of the Command should be considered the cause of the bad situation of the Japanese troops. At the same time, they are more or less associated with the slogans on the original Japanese design.)

On both sides appears a scribbled note meaning:

"File regarding arms, Hashimoto Unit Headquarters."

(This inscription has no relation to the propaganda text and has been used simply to arouse added curiosity and induce careful reading

(Intention: To cause among Japanese in isolated and dangerous positions, distrust against Japanese Command, and to strengthen their awareness of the fact that the only alternative to dying in vain lies in the decision to surrender.)
