

AUSTRALIAN WAR MEMORIAL

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Officers and men of the Japanese forces!

For many years, while planning their schemes of conquest the Japanese militarists were strengthening their bases in the Central Pacific. Now, their work of twenty years is being destroyed almost overnight by terrific and increasing Allied blows.

Japan's inner defensive zone is crumbling with dramatic suddenness, and it is evident that the militarists are powerless to stop this. The Gilbert Islands were captured inNovember and 4,500 officers and men of the Japanese army were annihilated in the fighting. The Japanese Navy did not intervene. Then the Allied attack swept on to the Marshalls. Still the Japanese Navy made no attempt to interfere. No help came, and the defending troops were abandoned by their incapable High Command. The main base of Kwajalein fell only three days after the attack had been started on January 21. Roi Island was also captured causing the useless loss of 6,500 officers and men and Army employees. The Allied offensive rolled on.

Next Truk came under heavy attack. On 23 February (Jap date 24 February) carrier planes raided the Marianas Islands. 3240 klm. south - south - east of Japan that is 1280 klm. nearer Japan than is Truk. Step by step the Allied forces are approaching the Homeland.

In the Marshalls landings and other operations Allied losses were comparatively light. This was due to the completeness of their preparations and to improvements in tactics and equipment. The Japanese military clique, no longer able to conceal the facts, have had to reveal in their communiques the loss of 3 cruisers, 2 destroyers, 13 transports, and 120 planes in the attack on the supposedly impregnable base of Truk alone. Allied reports mention Japanese losses in this attack as 19 ships sunk and 201 planes destroyed

These developments in the war are full of significance both to the hopelessly outfought Japanese troops on isolated fronts and to the garrisons who still await their fate elsewhere in the South. Yet whilst these wide spread attacks were made against Japanese bases in the Pacific United States Navy also attacked bases in the South bombarding Rabaul and Kavieng on February 18 (Japanese date 19 February). As things are the High Command cannot prevent the Allies from taking the bases which lie close to the Homeland therefore what expectation is there that it will be able either to reinforce or withdraw the troops in the far Southern Regions.
