TOKYO NEWS - Luxury Hotel for GEA Travellers.

A big luxurious hotel for officials coming to Nippon from East Asia will be constructed near the International airport at Fukuoka, at a cost of 5 million yen.

Cabinet Changes.

The following changes have taken place in the composition of the Cabinet. Mr. Shigemitsu displaces Mr. Tani as Minister for Foreign Affairs; Mr. Ando becomes Home Minister in place of Mr. Yuzawa; Mr. Yamazaki becomes Minister for Agriculture; Mr. Amau becomes President of the Board of Information, and Mr. Owasa has been appointed State Minister. These changes are interpreted as a sign of weakness, taking place as they do at the neight of a ver.

CASABLANCA:

In the Tunisian tip of North Africa where the cornered Axis armies are making a last and desperate attempt to prevent themselves being pushed into the sea, the Allied armies are steadily advancing on all fronts. The British are now within 48 kilometres of Tunis. The American and French troops are also advancing. The difficult ground gives the Axis troops advantages in defence, but everything points to the likelihood that their days in Africa are numbered. The German press is preparing its public for bad news.

ROME RADIO'S TRIBUTE TO EIGHTH ARMY.

"Britian's 8th Army", said Rome, "is the finest fighting force in the world today. The British 8th Army represents the most modern and powerful force on the different chessboards of this world war. The British artillery is well provided with guns. It is splendidly organised. The British armoured units are amongst the world's best. This army's leaders and staff have been carefully chosen. They have proved their worth on the battlefield. The cooperation of the R.A.F. and the British land forces can serve as an example to anyone".

Army. They say that the German armoured units withdrew, leaving the Italians to put up a desperate resistance which alone delayed the enemy.

MELBOURNE

Allied air superiority in the Pacific continues to be maintained in the most striking way. The Allied air victory in the Bismarck Sea was followed by further victories at Kavieng, Guadalcanal, and over Oro Bay. Then came the raid on Port Moresby, so disastrous to the raiders, and since then the equally disastrous raid on Milne Bay, followed by a most destructive attack on Wewak by Allied aircraft, where much damage was done to Japanese shipping. These successes were apart from others scored almost daily by the Allies in the air over the Pacific Islands and seas.

STOCKHOLM

"You must expect decisive military events soon", declared the Czech Prime Minister, Doctor Benes, from London on April 25.

SAIGON-AMERICANS RAID F.I.C.

It is reported that American planes successfully raided a certain Japanese base in northern French Indo-China.

TOKYO - THE SHIPPING WORLD Statistics reveal that 754,280 tons of Japanese ships, representing over 250 ships, were sunk or damaged in the North-eastern and North-western sectors of the South Pacific front from August to March. Ships which must have been damaged by near misses are not included.

PEEPS BEHIND THE GUNS - Tokyo - Increase in Price of Rice. The price of rice has been officially raised for the first time since 1939. The increase is from ¥49.50 to ¥62.50 per 5 bushels. Hearing about rice, Japanese mothers of growing children are remembering sadly a recent Tokyo broadcast, reporting that the markets of Saigon and Cholon were being flooded with mountains of rice, although there were no ships to carry it to places where it was needed.

TOJO'S DILEMMA. It is reported on reliable authority that some time ago Premier Hideki Tojo, who is depressed because of the reverses of warfare on Guadalcanal and of the frequent sinkings of Japanese ships, arranged a secret consultation at night with the well-known astrologer, Professor Donsho Kakama. It has been divulged that on this occasion the Professor tried to on wince the Prime Minister of the necessity in the interests of the state of changing his christian name for a more propitious one. His present name cannot but be regarded as an ill omen for Japan's future success in war, as the characters with which it is written prophesy an excellent opportunity for England. Premier Tojo, deeply impressed with the learned professor's pronouncement, showed himself quite willing and even ea er to decide upon a suitable new name with the astrologer's assistance. The name in view, Tsuguki, would imply that the opportunity is favourable for Asia. If the character for Tsugu (also A for Asia) is used for the first name, this would especially assure splendid opportunity for East Asia in view of the fact that the first character of "Tojo" (To- Higashi-East) stands for East. As a person of high social standing could ill afford to use a name which had not been officially registered, investigation has been made as to the possibility of a change of registration. To his great concern, Premier Tojo, who was able to start the G.E.A. war almost on his own, has found it impossible to effect this change as it is against the rules and usage of civic registration in Japan. A solution of this difficulty, which seems to be wornying the Premier even more than weightier cares of state, has still to be found. This story is the foremost gossip item of this week.

SAVINGS AND NATIONAL SERVICE BONDS. A plan is announced for the official compulsory purchase of savings and national service bonds. Compulsory purchase of savings and national service bonds will be enforced by the All-Japan Finance Control Association. This scheme has been introduced to overcome difficulties resulting from increased military expenses and from the difficulty of acquiring sufficient means out of savings or loans. Its success is considered doubtful as compulsory saving is already being practised to a great extent.
