## WEEKLY WAR NEWS-June 15, 1945.

NEW LANDINGS IN BORNEO. Supported by a heavy naval and air bombardment, Australian forces on 11 June made simultaneous landings at four points in British Borneo—at two points on Labuan Island, and at Brooketon and Muara on the western coast of Borneo. The Japanese were taken by surprise, and Australian casualties were negligible. This landing follows the Australian seizure of Tarakan, 600 miles away on the opposite side of Borneo.

AIRCRAFT INDUSTRIES RAZED. Continuing the Allied plan for the systematic destruction of Japanese war industries, Super Fortresses in big formations on June 8th, 9th and 10th hammered

vital military targets in the Tokio-Yokohama district.

On June 1st Super Fortresses blitzed Osaka with 3,500 tons of fire-bombs. The target area was the highly industrialised portion of the city bordering on Osaka harbour and south of the Shin Yodo River.

On June 4th the port of Kobe was left a smouldering ruin after a mid-day fire-bomb raid by nearly 500 Super Fortresses. This was Kobe's third raid. The city is now largely burnt out as were Tokio, Osaka and Yokohama.

Meanwhile systematic raids on airbases in Kyushu by carrier-based aircraft continue.

OKINAWA. Japanese lines on Okinawa have been cut in two south of Naha. The main terrein still held by the Japanese has been reduced to a small area on the south-western tip of the island. An estimated 15,000 men bottled up there have no room in which to manoeuvre. American forces are already pressing on the Japanese line in Kiyanzaki area. It is worth noting that allowing for differences in time and scale the developments on Okinawa are closely following the pattern of the Saipan and Iwo Jima campaigns.

PHILIPPINES. Driving swiftly down the Cagayan Valley, the Americans on 8th June captured the town of Bambang. Large

quantities of food and medical stores were taken.

CHINA. Chinese successes in the coastal area opposite Formosa were reported from Chungking on 9th June. The Chinese have laid open a 105-mile stretch of the Fukien coast above liberated Foochow, and are now less than 10 miles from the Chekiang border.

INVASION OF HOMELAND? A special session of the Japanese Diet was called in view of the possibility of an Allied invasion of Honshu. On June 9th, Premier Suzuki told the Diet that the Ameri-

cans would invade Japan.

The Government introduced an Emergency Measures Bill asking the Diet to transfer to the Government virtually all rights and powers to deal with the production of munitions, food and other necessities.
