## Copy of Citation of Mrs. Alice Ross Appleford, RRC., MM.

During the two wars Major Appleford has exhibited great interest and given much personal service in social work to the benefit of the community, despite the calls on her as a mother of a family.

Interested in the training of Voluntary Aids she, as an Assistant Controller in the State of Victoria and with her experience in training and organising Aids, was able to bring skilled capacity and organising ability to the responsibilities of assisting in the formation of the Australian Army Medical Women's Services from 1942 onwards. In all, 1,900 women passed through her hands and aided and encouraged by her leadership, were able to give excellent service in military hospitals both in Australia and other battle-fronts overseas.

In addition, Major Appleford was responsible for organising appeals and raising large sums of money for both Red Cross and other worthy causes; organising bodies of women to make toys for needy children in hospitals in both England and Australia; arranging holidays for orphan children of deceased soldiers.

Her devotion, sense of duty, sterling character and kindliness has always set a very high example before her fellow women.

#### FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE MEDAL

Copy of Citation of Mrs. Alice Ross Appleford, RRC., MM.

During the two wars Major Appleford has shown an outstanding example of service, while in the period between the wars she not only brought up a family, but also gave much time and energy to social work. She acted as Assistant Controller, Voluntary Aid Detachment in Victoria in 1941 and was commissioned in the appointment in 1942, when the Australian Army Medical Womens' Services was formed in 1942 she became the first Assistant Controller, and still holds the appointment. Her influence on the Service in Victoria which numbered 1,900 was most marked, and aided by her encouragement and leadership the members carried out important work in medical units, not only in Victoria, but also overseas as 300 of them were accepted for service outside Australia. Since the war numbers have diminished, but not the standard of service. A.A.M.W.S., mainly through Major Appleford's guidance, contributed generously to various Appeals, amongst them Red Cross Junior Appeal £6,014. They made toys for Britain and for local hospitals, helped with the camp for Mallee children, and at Christmas arranged holidays in homes for girls from orphanages, who were children of deceased soldiers. During 1945 they strongly supported the appeal made by A.A.N.S. to raise a commemoration fund for the Centuar nurses.

No one who came in contact with Major Appleford could fail to recognize her as a leader of women. Her sense of duty, her sterling solidity of character, her humanity, sincerity, and kindliness of heart set for others a very high example.
