

WORKSHOPS. The Workshop output has materially decreased since the period of active warfare.

Remarks and references to Appendices

Two changes in location took place during the month. The new sites occupied were not satisfactory. Since the departure of the "1914 Men" commencing in August last, practically no Reinforcements have been received. This fact, together with the number of men who have reported to Hospital "Sick", accounts primarily for the decreased output.

SUPPLY. Weight of Rations handled daily 56 tons.

Weight of Coal handled during the month 300 tons, Hay 300 tons, Oats 380 tons.

Highest daily Feeding strength 17,687 men and 3,200 horses.

Average daily Feeding strength 13,000 men and 2,260 horses.

Average number of units Fed daily 112.

Highest number of units Fed in one day 164.

Total Feeding strength for month407,000 men and 70,700 horses.

Average strength of units, Men 17 and Horses 21.

During the month of December the Railhead changed three times, necessitating change in Ration Dump location on each occassion. The operation of "Pack" Trains for the last two months has been becoming increasingly difficult, and the time of arrival of "Pack" more and more irregular. In some instances Trains were more than a day and a half late. In more than one instance it was necessary to clear the train between the hours of 11 p.m. and 4 a.m. and to issue to units immediately. No actual breakdown, however, occurred. For two weeks there was a distinct shortage of Coal.
