



Fourth Army R.O. 2535 published in Orders, which states that a number of Casualties have occurred owing to ignition by "Very" Lights fired, sparks from locomotives etc., of propellant charges of German cartridges which have been thrown away. Charges not to be removed from German cartridges

except by authorised officers, who will be responsible that charges are, at once, safely packed or destroyed. AIF Order 1378 also published, allowing members of AIF to draw up to £5 for Christmas Gifts, provided they have sufficient credit.

G.R.O.5128 published in Orders, by which all ranks are forbidden to remove any parts or contents of Tanks temporarily derelict in battle area. Any officer, N.C.O. or man found attempting to remove, or in possession of objects of this nature will be arrested and conduct investigated.

G.R.O.1839 published forbidding communication, sale or barter of any articles between officers, soldiers or civilians and Prisoners of War.

Corps R.O. A/T79 published, which states that the Army Commander again calls attention to the injury done to roads through M.T. being driven at excessive speed. Charges brought by the

Correct bridge for heavy transport must be used and special care to be taken at night to ensure that the correct bridge is used.

N.C.O's and Drivers again reminded through Orders that speed limits laid down in Traffic Regulations, Para.4 and as amended, are to be strictly observed. Speed limit for lorries 8 m.p.h., or as governed through Towns and Villages. Attention must be paid to speed Notice Boards.
