

	June 6th	(1)	the ship and his special duty. Captain Simpson as Orderly Officer received great assistance from the Chief Steward, Mr Clitherce, in organising the feeding of the wounded. All soon received foo or drink of some sort, many as soon as they got on board, but as the 12666 came on board during the space of a few hours it was impossible to feed them all immediately. I cannot speak too high of the voluntary assistance given untiringly by the ship's company from the Captain downwards and of the excellent work put in by my Officers and men at high pressure until all the wounded were landed at Malta by 3 pm on the day they arrived at Malta June 9th. I never heard a complaint of any kind. Three deaths occurred. The following points came under my notice as being of intell had a wooden cot made for lowering stretchers over the side of the wessel in the naval way of thickest and heaviest timber available. The weight steadles the cot in its transit and prevents it swinging and bumping the side of the vessel, as I have seen lighter cots do. It was made big enough to take two stretchers, or one with two attendant orderlies if required, or four less serily wounded in a sitting or lying position.  Oneman lost his arm through the abuse of the tourniquet in the field. Only one I am afraid of several during the war. The tourniquet was not required and had not been removed. There is a mount of unfortunate tendency amongst men learning "First Aid" to apply a tourniquet when there is no need Many wounds were bandaged much too tightly, and gave rise to a considerable amount of unnecessal pain. I think this is largely due to the fact that the First Field Dressing is applied with a reaf bandage in each hand which tends to a tighter pull being taken on the bandage than when one had by tightening the bandage, undoubtedly, but I refer partisularly to wounds that were not septican	m d ly rest he ous st of ry ll nd

### July 23rd

Reached ANZAC COVE at 1 am. and disembarked without incident. Joined the N.Z. Field Ambulance under Lt Col Begg at WALKER'S RIDGE.

July 27th

Since arrival the Unit has been engaged in the evacuation of wounded and general fatigues. To day 3/96A Pte Macdonald was sent to LEMNOS sick. July 29th

Under orders from the A.D.M.S. a Hospital for diarrhoea patients capable of accommodating 40 cases was opened at WALKER'S RIDGE and the Tent Subdivision of the Unit was placed in charge of it. 26 patients were admitted.

July 31st

3 Privates arrived from LEMNOS and by order of the A.D.M.S. are attached to ke this Section until the arrival of Lt Col Thomas with Section A. Total number in Hespital 37.
