

AUSTRALIAN HEAD QUARTERS (EGYPT)
CAIRO July 8th 1919.

#### H.T. "MALTA".

I beg to report as follows on H.T. "MALTA" which sailed from Kantara for Australian Ports on 3:7:1919.

I proceeded to Kantara on 2:7:1919 and embarked 4 nursing sisters for duty on the voyage. Sister SCANLON, Staff Nurses:-STEWART, DAVIDSON, and H.McDONALD. Lt.Col. ANDERSON, SMO., Major SUTTON and Captain McCREDIE, Mc., embarked for medical duties. On arrival at ship I received a despatch from EMO., AIF., Port Said stating that the SMO., had condemned certain portions of the ship.

On impection, in company with SMO., the parts condemned viz: - troop deck sections "A" & "C" were paid special attention. It was decided that no troops should be put in a deck owing to faulty ventilation, proximity to crews' quarters & offensive odour emanating from dried eastern food in an adjacent storer com. Troop deck "C" on impection, was found to be in my opinion, well provided with electric ventilating blowers and permanent windsail fitted into end of deck opposite to blowers. The lighting of this deck is artificial. During a storm which would necessitate the closing of the port holes in the troop deck above "C" the latter deck would be the only one which would receive a regularly renewed supply of fresh air as its ventilating system is independent of all other decks. Major Harvey SUTTON, DADMS., Anzac Mounted Division considered that the air on this deck is renewed about 6 times per hour. Lt. Col. HERCUS also considered the deck satisfactory. Considering all the factors govern--ing the repatriation of the A.I.F., in Egypt viz: - the Egyptian Summer, the repeated delays that have been encountered and the inadvisa--bility of breaking up units and leaving small detachments behind of a division that has ceased to exist owing to the return of all its personnel to Australia. The space allotted the troops on this deck is very liberal only 89 men being detailed for this portion of the ship.

For sentimental reasons only I made a rrangements with O.C. Troops that the men occupying this deck should have preference for deck space for sleeping purposes if they wished to do so. The remaining troop decks and Sergeants' accommodation are satisfactory, ventilation being effected by ports, windsails and fans.

DECK SPACE is very limited that on the promenade deck being cut up by many temporary deck houses. The well decks afford no space whatever for men owing to the presence of large winches, hatches and deck houses. It was strongly suggested to the O.C. Troops that as the first class accommodation was good, all the space possible should be made available for the use of the troops. He instantly concurred with my views on this matter.

HOSPITALS. Hospital accommodation is ample, the general hospital being situated in the 2nd dining saloon which is quite satisfactory for the purpose. The Isolation fitted with 10 beds is & situated on the poop. Disinfection room is situated on the port side.

LATRINES. ABLUTION etc. 26 seats for other ranks, 38 wash basins and 12 showers are provided. 5 Plunge baths were placed on board for ablution purposes.

TROOP GALLEY. In my opinion the galley is deficient in capacity and Faulty in position, If very rough weather occurs, some difficulty may be experienced in serving mess orderlies with food.

with others recently made available for repatriation of A.I.F., in Egypt. She is deficient in beam for trooping purposes and the deck space is limited and encumbered.

However taking all factors into consideration and the fact that the units it was proposed to embark consisted of the remnants of the Anzac Mounted Division; also the excellence of the ration and the very large amount of foods and comforts placed on board by Australian Comforts Fund and Australian Red Cross, I am of opinion that the troops will not suffer in any degree by being embarked.

The vessel was seen on approaching her to be in a very 'dirty condition and that opinion was verified by the Master who stated that the speed of the vessel was very poor owing to the fact that she had not been docked since November last.

on internal impection the vessel was found to be occupied by invalids transferred from a shipwrecked vessel in the Red Sea.

In spite of this fact it was considered that the vessel was a first class hospital carrier. The air space, ventilation, sanitation, and scale of rations on board, also large deck space making her Emminently suitable for the purpose.

The first class accommodation for staff is very good. The saloon having seating accommodation for 45.

The accommodation in cabins for staff and others as required is 38.
