

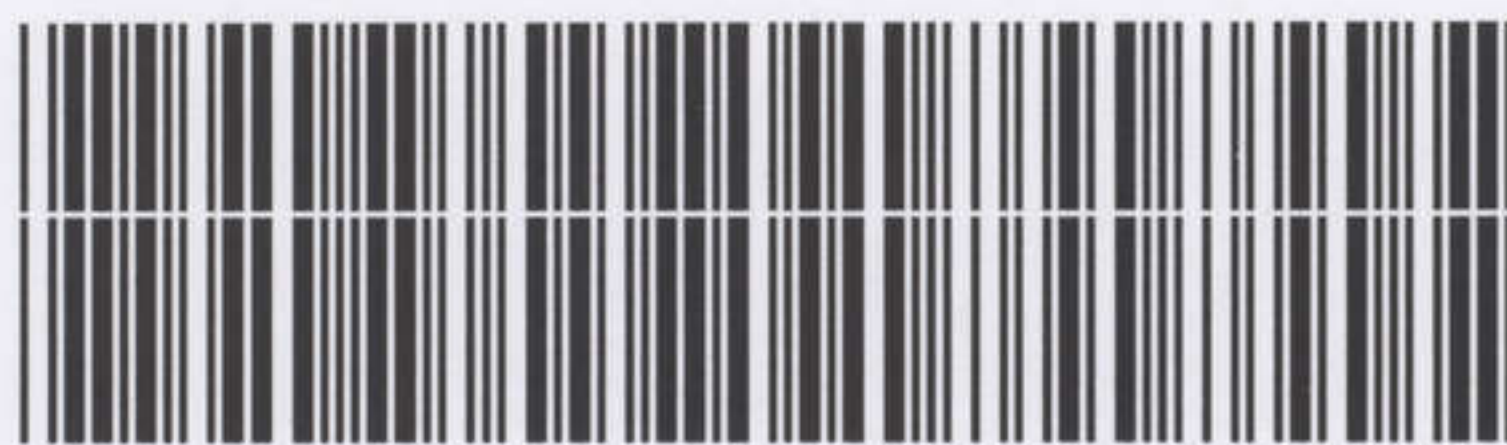

CAIRO	July	1	<p><u>A.A.N.S. PAY and ALLOWANCES.</u> ^{Salonika} Cable received from Administrative Headquarters, London "approving of the pay of three shillings from 1st June 1918." The recommendation of Headquarters London provides an additional 1/8 per diem to cover laundry and extra rationing.</p> <p><u>SICKNESS AT AUSTRALIAN CAMP, SUEZ.</u> A report was received from S.M.O., Austcamp, Suez re patients suffering from Dysentery and Mumps. A.D.M.S. A.I.F. proceeded to Suez by 1815 train.</p> <p><u>Lieut. Colonel McLAREN - A.C.F.A.</u> Application for transport duty to Australia received from above officer, and referred to D.D.M.S. A.I.F. Egypt, Memo in reply from D.D.M.S. A.I.F. informs that application is to be considered when vacancy occurs.</p> <p><u>MESSAGE DEPARTMENT - 14th AUSTRALIAN GENERAL HOSPITAL.</u> The D.D.M.S. A.I.F. Egypt instructs that application is to be made to D.M.S. for the provision of the necessary apparatus.</p> <p><u>T/Sister C. McGILLIVRAY - A.A.N.S.</u> Query memo. received from D.M.S. A.I.F. re the promotion of the above-named Sister, and instructing that she is to revert to Staff Nurse unless facts in possession of D.D.M.S. A.I.F. in Egypt, warrant her retaining her temporary rank. D.M.S. A.I.F. also asked that this Nurse be transferred to 14th A.G.H. and subsequently utilised as soon as convenient on transport duty to Australia, with a request that she is not sent forward again.</p>	<p>OHJ</p>
		2	<p><u>MEDICAL CLASSIFICATION BOARD.</u> Colonels Blackburn and Saw reported from 14th A.G.H. and held Classification Board at Australian Depot Stores, Gezireh. Personnel from Australian Headquarters, Cairo, were also present for classification.</p> <p><u>MEDICAL OFFICER FOR REST CAMP, PORT SAID.</u> A wire was received from D.D.M.S. A.I.F. Egypt notifying that no additional Medical Officer can be spared for the Rest Camp at present.</p> <p><u>MISSES K.L. CONWAY and N. McDONALD - Q.A.I.M.N.S.R.</u> The applications of these Nurses, who belong to Q.A.I.M.N.S.R., to join the A.A.N.S. were not approved by Matron-in-Chief, A.I.F. 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CAIRO	July	2	<p><u>DYSENTERY AT SUEZ CAMP.</u> A.D.M.S. A.I.F. inspected the Camp with S.M.O. and all sanitary arrangements were found perfect. The Camp is free from flies, latrines are all fly proof, faeces are being incinerated twice daily and ashes buried, all solid garbage is being incinerated and fluids disposed of in a sanitary manner. The draft is due to embark for United Kingdom on the 4th inst. and there are at present a number of dysentery convalescents in camp and also a number of diarrhoea cases undiagnosed, whom it is not considered wise to send forward without bacteriological examination of stools. The Commanding Officer Military Laboratory Suez, had informed the S.M.O. Suez Camp, that he could not possibly cope with the examination of these stools before the 4th inst. A.D.M.S. visited S.M.O. Suez Camp and with him visited C.O. Military Laboratory and arranged that all these stools should be examined before the 4th inst. (routine work being temporarily suspended) and only men sent forward who gave negative results. The same procedure to be adopted in reference to contacts of the two diphtheria cases. The stools of all necessary cases were collected and sent to the Military Laboratory by 1600. A.D.M.S. A.I.F. returned to Cairo by 1715 train from Suez.</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">AJ</p>
		3	<p><u>AUSTRALIAN INVALIDS ex UNITED KINGDOM AT ALEXANDRIA.</u> A.D.M.S. Force in Egypt requested A.D.M.S., A.I.F. to confer with him with regard to the above, who are becoming very truculent and threatening owing to delay in embarkation for Australia. The authorities at Alexandria are very worried by the attitude of the men, and consider that there will be serious trouble if the men attempt to carry out their threats. A letter has been received from G.O.C. Alexandria District requesting that something may be done in the matter. It was arranged that A.D.M.S. A.I.F. should proceed to Alexandria by the 2330 train and explain the situation to the men so as to try and get them contented pending embarkation. A.D.M.S. 		4	<p><u>H.S. "WANDILLA"</u> A cable was received from Administrative Headquarters, London advising the following as due to embark for Australia on 1/7/18: Officers: 20 cot, 12 berth; O/Ranks: 242 Cot, 209 berth; Tubercular 10 cot, 16 berth, Total 509.</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">AJ</p>
			<p><u>AUSTRALIAN INVALIDS ex UNITED KINGDOM AT ALEXANDRIA.</u> A.D.M.S. A.I.F. interviewed A.D.M.S. and G.O.C. Alexandria District and arranged for visit to Montaza. Proceeded to Montaza accordingly and addressed the Australian Invalids in regard to their greivances and behaviour. The situation in regard to shipping which has caused the continued delay in embarkation and their consequent long stay in Egypt was explained to them. The men appointed a spokesman who explained explained their side of the case. Another greivance was that of insufficient leave and pay, therefore at the request of the G.O.C. and A.D.M.S. Alexandria District, arrangements were made by A.D.M.S., A.I.F. for a further pay of £2 per man to carry them over till date of embarkation, and the G.O.C. Alexandria District agreed to extension of leave from 6.15 p.m. train from Alexandria till 9.15 p.m. train. Arrangements were made for five malcontents, who had been acting as ring leaders and stirring up most of the trouble, to be transferred to Moascar, pending embarkation.	
		3	D.D.M.S. A.I.F. in Egypt inspected 2nd Australian Staty. Hospital and N.C.O. School at Moascar <u>Venereal Ward</u> , at No. 2 A.S.H. was too crowded and not enough recreation was provided for the patients. The D.D.M.S. is bringing this matter before the Red Cross Society to see what improvements can be made. Everything else at the Hospital is satisfactory. <u>N.C.O.'s School of Instruction.</u> Major Green asked D.D.M.S. A.I.F. for an additional <u>N.C.O. Medical Officer</u> to be appointed to the School, as he considered the present number was insufficient. Arrangements will be made for a suitable man to be supplied as soon as one is available. 		5	<u>VENEREAL PROPHYLAXIS ALEXANDRIA.</u> A.D.M.S., A.I.F. interviewed A.D.M.S. Alexandria District in regard to drawing Ordnance Equipment for quarters of <u>Venereal Prophylactic Orderlies at Windsor Hotel.</u> After conferring with Ordnance Department on telephone it was obvious that no equipment could be drawn for these men in Alexandria District. A.D.M.S., A.I.F. accordingly interviewed the Proprietor of Windsor Hotel and persuaded him to supply the necessary furniture free of cost. The Proprietor has been very generous in this matter, having now supplied one room, fitted with sinks and water for Venereal Prophylactic purposes, and an adjoining room with furniture complete for use of the Orderlies. 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CAIRO	1918 July	8	<p><u>MESSAGE DEPARTMENT - 14th AUSTRALIAN GENERAL HOSPITAL.</u> The following cable was sent to London:- "Owing to insufficient provision for massage treatment at 14th A.G.H. many patients invalided to Australia being deprived of services unnecessarily, strongly recommend increase establishment Hon. Lieutenant masseur, 2 Staff Sergeants certified masseurs, 2 masseuses ranking as Staff Nurses. Personnel to be sent to Egypt"</p> <p><u>H.T. "PORT DARWIN".</u> Capt. Joyce inspected H.T. "PORT DARWIN" with Major Vernon, S.M.O. of the Ship and Lieut. Band</p> <p>R.N.R. The fittings were complete and the ship ready to receive Invalids. All the re-fitting had been carried out according to the instructions of the A.D.M.S. A.I.F. and the ship was thoroughly clean throughout.</p> <p>A plan of the ship and a report was obtained from Lieut. Band.</p> <p>Major G.H.Vernon, S.M.O. reported to Australian Headquarters, Cairo, for instructions, and proceeded by 1100 train to Suez.</p> <p><u>MEDICAL STORES ex TRANSPORTS.</u> Memo. sent to S.M.O. A.I.F. in Egypt attended Royal Flying Corps Medical Board at Heliopolis and saw candidates being examined by the Board. The preliminary examination of the candidates had already been carried out and the Board was only putting them through their final examination. Notes were taken of the proceedings and papers borrowed from the Board for D.D.M.S. to discuss with Colonel Blackburn, President of Medical Board at No. 14 A.G.H.</p> <p>10 <u>INVALIDS FROM UNITED KINGDOM.</u> Sgt. Lawson proceeded to Alexandria with Nominal Rolls of patients from United Kingdom, and travelled with them to Suez to check them off the train and on to the "Port Darwin" for embarkation.</p> <p><u>2nd Australian Staty. Hospital, Moascar.</u> Memo received from Commanding Officer, stating "As the Hospital has now well over 400 patients many of whom have had to be placed on ground sheets on the floor, I applied for authority to A.D.M.S. Palestine L. of C. to have local Australian and New Zealand sick - except isolation cases and out patients- sent to 26th Stationary Hospital direct".</p> <p><u>H.T. DeGaris proceeded to Suez by 1130 Hospital Train. Hospital trains arrived on time and Invalids were duly embarked. The Transport was in a clean and xxx satisfactory condition for embarkation. All equipment arrived and the staff had ship well prepared to receive Invalids.</p> <p><u>H.S. "KAROOA"</u> Memo. received from D.N.T.O. advising h.s. "KAROOA" left Bombay 7th July and is due Suez on 18th inst.</p> <p><u>H.S. "WANDILLA" and "KANOWNA"</u> Memo. received from D.N.T.O., H.S. A.I.F. in Egypt inspected 14th A.G.H. and found it in an efficient and satisfactory condition. He considered that this was in need of more colour, and approached the Red Cross Commissioner in respect to this.</p> <p><u>Convalescent Ward.</u> This was found to be in a more satisfactory condition than would appear from the report of Lieut. L.L. Jones, A.I.F. masseur.</p> <p><u>Massage Dept.</u> This was found to be in some difficulties owing to bad material and short supplies, as are all parts of the Hospital in a minor degree.</p> <p><u>X-Ray Dept.</u> The internal administration of the Unit has been largely altered and apparently with considerable benefit. There is a shortage of Physicians and xxx a great preponderance of Surgical cases. D.D.M.S. considered that there was too much work for the Oculist and Aurist and decided to transfer Major E.C.T. Smith from 2nd A.S.H. to 14th A.G.H. Four Nurses for transfer to Australia also require duty passages if possible, wire whether all can be arranged" D.M.S. E.E.F. asks if above accommodation can be arranged on "KANOWNIA" or "KAROOOLA" Reply sent pointing out that owing to the number of nurses and officer Invalids from A.I.F. in Egypt, and A.A.N.S. Salonica already awaiting transport to Australia and number due to arrive from U.K. for Australia, no accommodation would be available for these Nurses on H.S. Kanowna & Karoola. H.T. Wiltshire might accommodate "BARLINGA" left for Egypt on 10th July from United Kingdom carrying 17 Officers, 4 Nurses, 779 O/Ranks. CAIRO	July	16	<p><u>S/Sgt. DISPENSER FOR REST CAMP, PORT SAID.</u> Memo received from Major Richards, Medical Officer, requesting that a S/Sgt. Dispenser be appointed at the Rest Camp, in consequence of 14th A.G.H. having notified them that all supplies they need must now be drawn from Base Depot Medical Stores. Memo. forwarded to D.D.M.S., A.I.F. for ruling.</p> <p><u>LEAVE TO PALESTINE.</u> Memo. sent to Commanding Officer 14th Aust. Gen. Hospital advising that all applications, whether Nurses or Officers, must be submitted for approval through proper channel to G.S.I., 1st Echelon, G.H.Q.</p> <p><u>NURSES PROCEEDING ON LEAVE.</u> The Principal Matron, A.I.F. ^{was} advised that all Nurses (non-convalescent) proceeding on leave should not be sent to Convalescent Home, Bulkeley, but proceed at their own expense and stay at Hotel or Boarding House, as is done by Imperial Sisters, since the Red Cross Society are no longer prepared to bear the expense.</p> <p><u>H.S. "KANOWNA"</u> Wire received from E.M.O. Suez, advising arrival of "KANOWNA" at Suez. Accommodation on "KANOWNA" Officers: Cot 6, non cot 20 ; O/Ranks, Cot 200, non cot 198; Mental cells 4, Mild cases 18, Invalid Nurses 4. No accommodation for Tubercular Officers if Invalid Nurses carried. 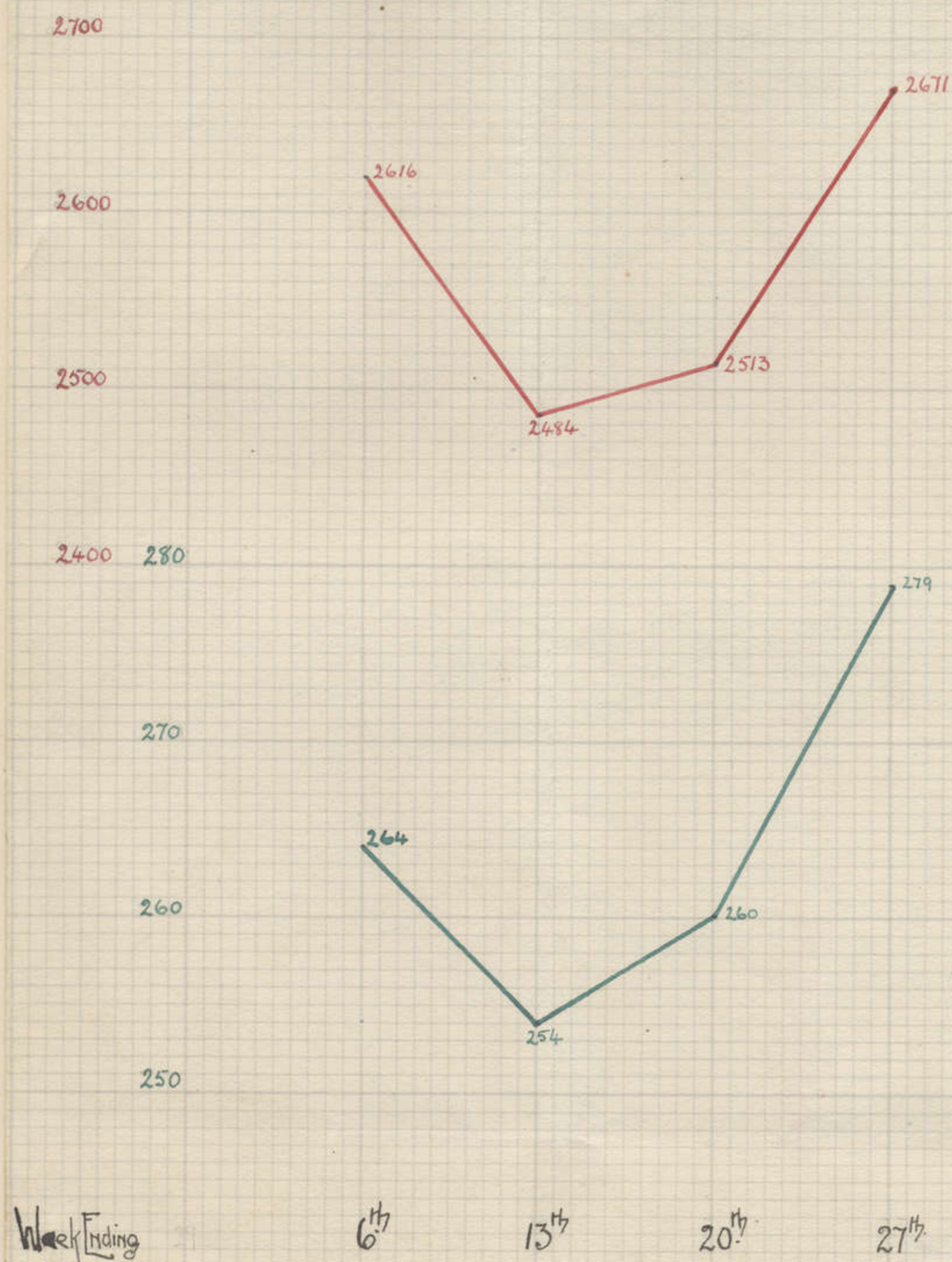
