



GENERAL HEADQUARTERS, MEDITERRANEAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE. 1st February 1916. I propose to bring up to Tel el Kebir, as soon as arrangements can be made, sufficient Australian & New Zealand reinforcements to form eight provisional brigades of four battalions. These will be trained with a view to their incorporation in new divisions when the time comes. I propose Cox for command and supervision of the training at Tel el Kebir, with a staff on the lines of a divisional staff but somewhat smaller. The question of the appointment of eight brigade commanders will come up, and brigade majors. Godley has also asked for authority to raise the personnel necessary to form six more New Zealand batteries (filling up his two existing brigades and forming a third), as well as a third New Zealand Field Company and another New Zealand A.S.C. Company. I think it advisable to employ surplus reinforcements in this way, though it is a great question when any guns will be available to arm the additional batteries. PROCEEDINGS OF JOINT NAVAL AND MILITARY CONDERENCE
HELD AT G.H.Q. ISMAILIA, JANUARY 81st, 1916.

1. It was pointed out that some slight adjustment was needed so as to make the Naval and Military Sections of the Canal Defences coincide.

Decided that the exact limits of the Military Sections should be communicated to the Vice-Admiral with a map, and that the Vice-Admiral should be requested to make the necessary adjustments.

2. The question of naval co-operation in the defence of the Front Line was considered. The naval arrangements contemplate allocation of ships as follows:-

Two battleships in the Gulf of Suez

One battleship and two large monitors in the Bitter La bs.

(The two large monitors would be available, if required, in PELUSIUM Bay for the defence of the left flank.)

Two battleships at PORT SAID.

The small monitors in PELUSIUM Bay on the left flank.

This distribution will be confirmed, and any alterations or amendments communicated, by the Vice-Admiral to the Commander-in-Chief.

A communication will be sent to the Vice-Admiral in due course, giving a list of important points, in connection with the defensive line, on which it is desired that the Naval guns should be registered. Attention was drawn to the

/desirability

desirability of being able to bring maval gumfire to bear from the Gulf of Suez on the Western portion of the NEKHL - BIR ABU GARAD - AYUM MUSSA Road.

3. The questien of communication with the garrisons of TOR and ABU ZENIMA was brought up.

Decided to ask the Vice-Admiral to go into the question of the three possible alternatives -

- (a) Submarine cables.
- (b) A warship in constant touch by wireless.
- (c) A land wireless station.

Captain Burmester said that the laying of a submarine cable would be the lest and simplest solution, and that the Vice-Admiral had the matter in hand.

4. The proceedings of a Naval and Military Conference held on January 26th at PORT SAID, which was attended by representatives of the Force in Egypt and not by representatives of M.E.F., were discussed.

Decided that, so far as the M.E.F. is concerned, the decisions taken by that Conference will not apply. All questions of military reconnaissance by aircraft, or requests for reconnaissance, etc., will be communicated by G.H.Q. direct to the Vice-Admiral who, it is understood, is willing to undertake co-ordination of seaplane work, including arrangements tith the French for the use of their seaplanes on services required by M.E.F..

It is understood that, in the event of simultaneous demands for reconnaissance by Force in Egypt and M.E.F., the Vice-Admiral, if he is unable to meet both demands at once, will himself decide, after any necessary telegraphic communication with either force, the order of relative urgency.

5. It was proposed and agreed to that Corps Commanders should be placed in direct communication with S.N.O. of sections on

the Canal, and that the Vice-Admiral should inform the Commander-in-Chief the name and position of Headquarters of the several S.N.O.

on tactical details (requisitions for Naval artillery support, patrelling, etc.), Corps Commanders will communicate direct to the S.N.O. of sections, and the latter will be to this extent the channel of communication between the military forces defending the canal and the Vice-Admiral.

- elsewhere, leaving reduced forces to defend the Canal so that the defensive lines would have to be withdrawn to the vicinity of the Canal itself, the existing naval arrangements, as incorporated in the various memoranda issued by Vice-Admiral Sir R. H. Peirse, will be revived with such modifications, particularly as regards artillery co-operation and inter-communication, as may be found necessary. The necessity for such revision will be considered by M.G.R.A. and D.A.S. with the naval officers concerned.
- EARDAWIL Lagoom. Captain Eurmester undertook to obtain information as to the numbers of small native craft, which it might be possible to procure, suitable for running supplies up to the Eastern end of the Lagoon and landing them to form a Supply Depot there, for a force of, say, 50,000 men. He also undertook to consider generally the question of the establishment of a base of supply in that locality, and of the protection of supply-ships off the coast. He agreed to emdeavour to make further reconnaissance of the coast at the Eastern end of the Lagoon, and to take soundings, etc. with this in view.
- 8. At the conclusion of the Conference Lt.Commander Bevan conferred with D.A.S. with regard to the questions of Communication and inter-communication, and Lt.Commander Pinsent conferred with M.G.R.A. with regard to gunnery in the Canal, artillery co-operation, etc.

# ARMENIAN REFUGEE CAMP AT PORT SAID.

The French Naval Authorities operating on the Syrian Coast found themselves obliged to remove to a place of safety some 5,000 Armenian Refugees from the neighbourhood of ANTIOCH near ALEXANDRETTA.

The obligation to keep and support these people is really one for the French Government - certainly not the Egyptian - but as they were dumped down by French warships the Egyptian Government, pending other arrangements, were obliged to look after them. At that time Egypt was, and is, housing several thousand Syrian refugees deported by the Turkish authorities in Syria. None of these are Egyptian subjects. At PORT SAID the Egyptian Government has gone to considerable trouble and expense to organise this Camp. The site was selected by myself as one that could not interfere with any Military Operations or indeed with any Military accommodation. It will be immensely inconvenient to move them elsewhere to say nothing of the money wasted in so doing; much of this money has been subscribed by charitable people. The Military has taken up all available camping grounds in EGYPT, so unless you consider it a matter of grave military importance it may remain where it is.



Sir,

I hope to forward in due course, a list of important points in connection with the defensive line on which it is desired that the Naval guns should be registered.



1. With regard to the horse establishment of artillery units of Mediterranean Expeditionary Force, it has been decided that equipment will be carried out in all cases on the scale laid down in War Establishments Part VII.

In view of the fact that it will be impossible to horse all these units to War Establishment for some time, this will be done in successive phases as follows:-

### (a). Field Artillery Brigades.

lst' Phase. To equip guns and firing battery wagons with the minimum of horses for preliminary work.

Brigade Headquarters ......16 Horses.
Each Battery ..........75 Horses.

2nd Phase. Complete batteries to establishment.

Brigade Headquarters ......14 Horses.

Each Battery .......50 Horses.

3rd Phase. Complete the Brigade Ammunition Columns.

A 4-battery Brigade ......192 Horses.

I requested Admiralty to arrange retention of the anti-sircraft gums at IMBROS until they are replaced by guns which are being sent from England. They are required for the protection of the Royal Naval Air Bervice Aerodromes which was moved to IMBROS at the request of the Army and Royal Maval Division camp. Admiralty suspended transport pending settlement with War Office. In taking this action the Admiralty have no doubt been influenced by fact that IMBROS is frequently attacked by hostile aircraft. - of the Canal was read. The wording of that part of the Memorandum dealing with the division of the Canal into three sections was amended so as to agree with Force Order No. 5 of January 27th.
- 2. It was agreed that the French Squadron will operate in No. 5 Section of the Canal, and that General Officer Commanding 15th Army Corps will communicate direct with the French Squadron besides communicating with the S.N.O. detailed for No. 5 Section.
- Further questions with regard to communication and inter-communication, and also with regard to gummery in the Canal, artillery co-operation, etc., were left to be further discussed by the D.A.S. and M.G., R.A. with Lieut. Commander Bevan and Lieut. Commander Pinsent respectively.
- 4. It was decided that as soon as the Naval Memorandum was approved by the Admiral, a copy of it should be forwarded to General Headquarters, who would then issue necessary Force Orders with regard to it.

- The Navy were informed that steamers passing through the Canal need no longer be protected by sandbags.
- The question of communication with the garrisons of TOR and ABU ZENIMA was discussed. The Navy stated that cable communication with TOR is being arranged, and will probably be finished in about a week.

  No decision was come to with regard to ABU ZENIMA.
- 7. Decided that copies of the new 1/100,000 map would be sent to the Navy as soon as they were issued.
- 8. The question of patrol boats firing on military rowing boats at night was discussed. It was decided that firing was not to take place without challenging. Orders to be issued that boats must stop, if challenged, to let Naval patrol boats come up and inspect them.
- was discussed. The Navy reported that the coast line along the BARDAWIL LAGOON and the shore East of that point was quite unsuitable for the landing of supplies, and it was decided that if a movement is to be made against EL ARISH, the railway must be relied upon.
- ing 15th Army Corps must notify the Navy as to the position of his left flank, and must inform them as soon as the redoubt on his left is constructed and manned.

Australia agrees to your proposal but New Zealand requires some further information as it will be necessary to maintain their three brigades with reinforcements only for two brigades and no increase on present scale of reinforcements available before the end of August. Instead of forming two new Australian Divisions containing majority of newly formed units it would seem better to withdraw an infantry brigade from the 1st and 2nd Divisions and replace them by one of the new brigades. You would thus obtain a seasoned mucleus for your new divisions. We will send out equipment and harness for six 18-pdr. gun brigades but as you have already been informed howitzers are not available at present. There is no objection to General Birdrood arranging details with Minister of Defence Australia provided he keeps the War Office acquainted through you with what is done. He must await instructions with regard to New Zealand.
