

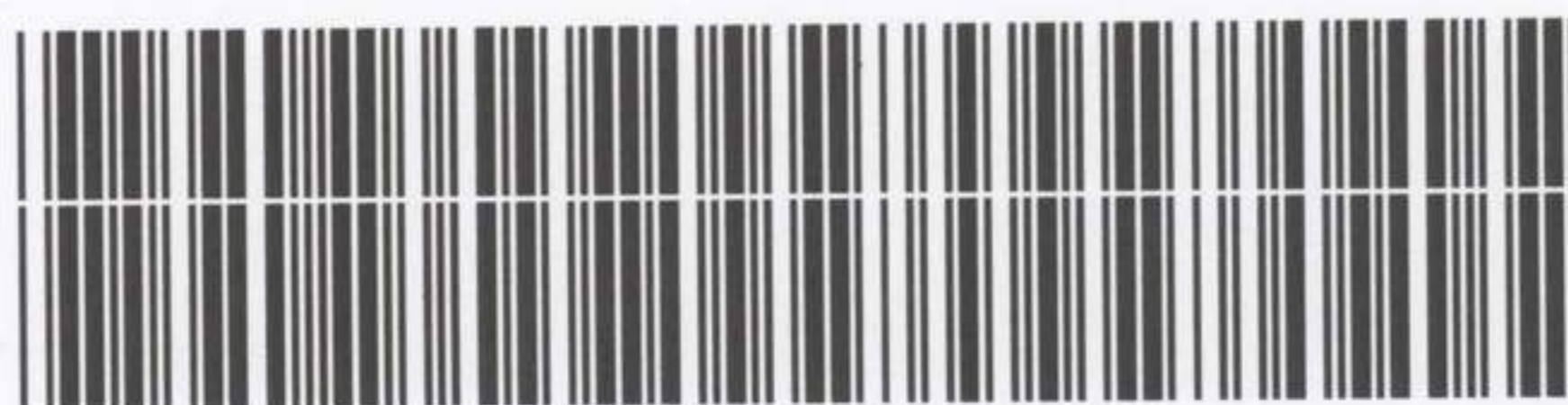

Work of the Month

The health of the animals of the Division generally speaking, remains good, although in a few cases there was a slight falling off in condition, due probably, to the great increase of work, caused by the almost continuous movement of the units, and falling off of grazing, due to.

(1) The time of the year. Autumn.

(2) The congestion of the areas with troops, so that many units had very little ground to graze upon, and in many places the area was covered with steel holes, barbed wire etc, so that grazing was impossible.

Evacuations for sickness were light. The majority being through gunshot wound, with a fair percentage of PUN.

Considering the bad class of country and the amount of Bombing & shelling, these casualties were not very high, as during the whole period, most units have not been in one position, long enough to erect practicable Bomb proof shelters, or walls for house lines.

Total evacuations of animals of the Division through the M.V.S. for the month were: 351.
