





As the defensive arrangements on the Eastern Front are now practically completed, I think the time has errived when I should move my . . . . . . . . . where I shall be in closer touch with the High Commissioner and Government. In order, however, to free me from immediate command over the Canal Defences I consider it essential that a General Officer with a Corps staff and the rank and pay of a Corps Commander should be appointed to command the troops on the Eastern Front with Headquarters at ISMAILIA. I recommend General Dobell for this appointment. I condider it essential that the Corps staff for No:5 Section, asked for in by my A.H. 906 of 15th. August should be maintained as it exists at present, except that I propose to substitute a G.S.O.1 for the B.G., G.S., and an A.A. & Q.H.G. for the D.A. & Q.M.G. In order to save expense and possible confusion in sending financial effect of my proposals by wire, may I refer you to the statement attached to the demi-official letter referred to in your wire under reference. There are, however, the following empditions to this statement. The difference in pay of General Dobell if appointed to command Eastern Front would be £1,000. This would be compensated for by appointing a Brigadier-General to command on the Western Front, thus saving £500, and by substituting a G.S.O.1 and A.A. & Q.M.S. for a B.C., G.S. and D.A. & Q.H.C. in Nord Section, thus saving another £500.

If my proposals are approved I will make the necessary move of G.H.Q. at the end of October or beginning of November, about which time dovernment returns to CAIRO.

With reference to the forward policy already decided upon in the section under your command, the Commander-in-Chief would be glad to have, as soon as possible, your detailed proposals for the permanent occupation of the water-bearing area up to and including BIR-EL-ABD.

Without wishing in any way to interfere with your complete freedom of decision as regards the dispositions which you may consider most suitable, the Commander-in-Chief wishes to emphasize the essential importance of practising the utmost economy of troops allotted to permanent, or semi-permanent, garrisons, with a view to keeping available the largest force possible for offensive action.

In this connection the Commander-in-Chief is of opinion that a system of strong self-contained posts, capable of sustained defence, and designed mainly to serve as pivot centres for mobile troops operating offensively from them, should be all that is necessary in any situation which is likely to arise.

In view of the fact that the mechanical transport units with the Western Frontier Force are distributed over a very wide area, from SOLLUM to KHARGA, it has become impossible to provide, from the existing staff of these formations, adequate supervising staffs for the smaller detachments. It is very necessary that adequate supervising staffs should be available in order that the various small motor convoys scattered in this large area should always be maintained in a state of efficiency. The despatch of two additional Mechanical Transport Companies to SALONICA has completely denuded this country of all surplus mechanical transport personnel, and I therefore have the honour to recommend that a special M.T. Company be formed for service with the Western Frontier Force, and to request that sanction be given to this establishment, the "Composition in Detail" of which is attached hereto.



In accordance with instructions issued in my 6.5. Z/44 of 8/4/16, weekly reports have been submitted on the progress of engineer works, but some modifications on the original instructions have been issued, and there seems now to be a certain amount of doubt as to what information is required.

The Commander-in-Chief wishes to be kept informed of the general progress of all defence and engineer work which has been undertaken under instructions from General Headquarters. and of all work involving the use of behour and the expenditure of engineer or defence stores which is initiated in Sections.

DEFENCES.

ROADS.

Under this heading information is required as to the general progress of the defensive works which are in hand and of any new defence works which have been undertaken since the last report.

If there are any special difficulties in the supply of labour or stores for the works these should be brought to notice

Information is required as to the progress of work on roads, the construction of which have been approved, so that the progress of the work may be noted on the record maps which are maintained at General Headquarters.

Any new road construction which is being undertaken should be reported and any difficulties which may arise in the supply of labour, road metal, road rollers and watering carts

should be recorded.

RATIMATS.

Information is required as to the progress in construction of the railways and Decauville tramways in your section.

PERRIES and

Progress of work on bridges, ferries and wharves, and on the general condition of the existing bridges, ferries and wharves should be briefly reported on.

WATER SUPPLY.

The condition of the water supply systems in all Sections is of special importance. Information is required regarding the progress of any work in hand on condensing or filtration plants, pumping engines, engine houses, reservoirs, and extensions of pipe lines for the supply of water to the troops in camps and in out-posts. Generally speaking no new work on these should be undertaken without approval from General Headquarters as the supply of engines, pumps, and water piping must be controlled by G.H.Q.

BUTTING.

The progress of hutting generally should be reported on. Details are not required.

A scale of hutting which may be provided has been laid down and it is presumed that the scale will not be exceeded without authority.

The Commander-in-Chief wishes, however, to be kept informed in a general way of what hutting is still required and what is being done.

- 1. With reference to War Office telegram No. 21995 cipher of 25th August, 1916, the organisation which is proposed for the Imperial Camel Corps when completed will be as follows :-
- (a) There will be six independent companies in the Western desert. At present it is not considered necessary to organise these companies into a battalion owing to their wide dispersion. They will continue, therefore, to be commanded and administered direct from Camel Corps Headquarters.
- (b) In the Canel Zone two battalions will be formed, each probably of five companies. These battalions will be attached to forces operating in the Eastern or Western desert as may be required, and will be administered as battalions from Camel Corps Headquarters.
- (c) The Hong-Kong and Singapore Battery is being mounted on camels and attached to the Imperial Camel Corps.
- (d) Thus the Headquarters Imperial Camel Corps will deal directly with two battalions, six independent companies, the Hong-Kong and Singapore Camel Battery, and the Imperial Camel Corps Base Depot and Remount Depot.
- and will make for the greatest efficiency of the Camel Corps, which it is found necessary to keep distinct as a separate Corps instead of merely forming battalions without any central organisation and handing over such battalions to the various

commanders in the field. It is very necessary to maintain the Corps Headquarters from the point of view of training, inspection, postings of officers, recommendations as to promotion, etc., reinforcements, remounts, improvement of equipment and so forth.

- Gorpe Meadquarters, and it would have a serious effect on the efficiency of the Corps to change the system. As soon as the organisation is approaching completion, which should not now be long delayed, it is intended to submit a proposal to give the Officer Commanding Imperial Camel Corps, who will then command a force of some 3,300 of all ranks, the temporary rank of Brigadier-General, and the two battalion commanders, who will each command about 1,000 camel-men, the temporary rank of Licut-Colonel.
- 4. Since under Article 855 of the Royal Warrant for Pay and Promotion, dated 1914, cavalry rates of pay are allowed for non-consissioned officers and men of infantry while employed as mounted men, and since of the six Camel Companies formed from the Territorial Force five are formed from Youmanry units and therefore draw cavalry pay, I recommend that cavalry rates of pay should be sanctioned for all officers and men of the Imperial Camel Corps, which will include, in particular, pay at cavalry rates for :-

Commanding Officer with Command Pay as in a Gavalry
Regiment.
Second in command.
Adjutant, with adjutant's pay as in a cavalry regiment.
Quartermaster.
Infantry officers attached.



The Commander-in-Chief wishes to call the attention of General Officers Commanding to the extreme importance, which has been overwhalmingly proved in the present war, of maintaining Machine Gun Companies, Squadrons and Sections at the highest possible state of efficiency. This cannot be done if the personnel of machine gun units is not given the ample time necessary for keeping its guns in order and carrying out its training, or if the sympathy between machine gun officers and superior commanders is imperfect.

The following points should be impressed on all officers who have machine gun units under their command :-

- (1) The personnel of machine gum units should not be unduly depleted or dispersed for the purpose of guards, fatigues or instructional courses.
- (2) To keep a machine gun unit at its highest efficiency a large amount of work requires to be done each day both in the training of personnel and the maintenance of the guns.
- (3) The trained machine gunner is a valuable man, not easily replaced. It is therefore wasteful to expose him to unnecessary risks apart from those involved in the execution of his special duties.
- (4) Finally, in an engagement the lives of many men will depend upon the efficiency of the machine gum units. A good machine-gum unit may make all the difference between success and failure:

  a bad machine gum unit is not only useless but dangerous. It is therefore in the interests of all that machine gum units should be encouraged to strive for the attainment of the highest efficiency, and that the most cordial co-operation should exist between the Machine Gum Corps and the other arms.

As regards Lewis Gun Sections, the following passage from Army Council Instructions 1589 of 14th August, 1916, may be quoted:-

"The all-round standard required for a machine gumer is far higher than that necessary for an infantry soldier. He must be well developed and sufficiently strongly built to enable him to work with, and carry, a machine gum or similar weight under adverse conditions, and if necessary to double or crawl with it. He must have no physical defects which would be likely to interfere with this work".

Though this Army Council Instruction only applies to the Machine Gum Corps, it will be seen that the above passage applies with almost equal force to Lewis gumners. Lewis Gum officers should, therefore, be given a wide discretion, in cases where they consider that men sent to them for training are unlikely, owing to inferior physique or any other defect, to become efficient Lewis gumners, to return these men and demand others in their place.


It is, however, considered that the conditions of desert warfare do not give sufficient scope for the employment of Stokes Gums to justify completing brigades in EGYPT to their full establishment in this particular. The gums and summnition for them are urgently required in FRANCE and MESOPOTAMIA, and it would not be in the interests of the service to divert either from these theatres to EGYPT.

The functions of School of Instruction with regard to Stokes Guns are :-

- (1) To provide a nucleous of men throughout the formations now in EGYPT, who understand these trench
  appliances, and who would be most useful in case divisions
  were called upon to operate in other theatres.
- (2) To provide a highly trained detachment who can direct to the best advantage the employment of the limited number of gums available wherever special circumstances demand their use.

In these circumstances it is not considered that the question of transport mentioned in para. 5 of the report can be taken up.



Your proposals appear so necessary that I do not see how I can do anything else than reluctantly agree.

Any dimunition in my strength goes sorely against the grain for I do not see how I can advance with a force of suitable strength on EL ARISH with the consequent long extension of L.O.C. if any reduction in my strength and establishment takes place.

Owing to the extent of my fronts I cannot reduce the strength of the troops holding Nos. 1 and 2 Sections from EL FERDAN to SUEZ. Neither can I at present reduce the blockading force on the Western Frontier With its 800 miles of front until I have settled With the Senussi Which Will take me a month or two of cold Weather.

I do not agree that the drafts referred to in the telegram will compensate for the loss of the units. I have always counted upon these drafts to complete my Territorial Force Divisions up to strength and the drafts will not bring me in excess of establishment.





Sir,

consideration of the point raised in your 121/8315 of 18-8-16 opens up the question of the organisation of the Artillery of the Territorial Divisions in this command. I am certainly of opinion that any brigade of artillery, even if only of two batteries, should have a Lieut.-Colonel in command, but I should be glad to be informed whether it is intended that howitzer brigades are to continue on this establishment. In my opinion, the most practical organisation of Divisional Artillery is the composite brigade, containing both field guns and howitzers, as lately adopted in France, and I would recommend that this be extended to Territorial Divisions. The divisional artillery of these divisions could then be formed of either:-

- (a) Four brigades, each consisting of one howitzer and two 18-pr batteries.
- (b) Three brigades of one howitzer and three 18-pr batteries.

  In the case of (a), an increase per division of two howitzer batteries is involved and the reduction of one 18-pr. battery.

On the other hand, (b) would give a decrease of one brigade, and involves only the addition of one howitzer battery to each division.

The fact that the latter organisation would place all artillery brigades on a similar basis, singles it out for preference.


