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IMPERIAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Meeting held at Adastral House

Present: Colonel Lord Gorell, Deputy Director of Staff Duties (Education), Chairman, Lieut. Colonel Lascelles, S.D.S. Vice-Chairman Colonel Curtis Directorate of Training Organisation, Air Ministry, Lt. Colonel Helbert, South Africa, Capt. E. R. Holme, Chairman, Australian Universities Committee, Mr. A. E. Twentyman, Board of Education, Major J. Sheppard, Ministry of Labour, Capt. J. E. Archey, New Zealand, Capt. J. M. MacEachern, Canada, Capt. W. MacLean S.D.S. Secretary.

The following motion was carried unanimously:

"With a view to promoting the widest possible understanding between the peoples of the Empire, the Committee considers it desirable that every facility should be afforded for the movement of University teachers and students from one country to another within the Empire; The Imperial Education Committee requests the Colonial Office to consider the desirability of taking up with Governments and Shipping and Railway Companies concerned the question of granting to such teachers and students, duly vouched for by responsible authority, rail and sea passages at considerably reduced rates"

The Secretary reported in regard to the visits of 1,000 Overseas agriculturists to the Cardiff Royal Agriculture Show in June and of 100 representatives from Oversea Dominions to the Highlands. The representatives of Australia, South Africa, New Zealand and Canada conveyed the thanks of their respective Dominions Education Services for the work which had been done by the Committee in making those visits a success. It was mentioned that the visits had proved a great educational benefit, both to Officers and men.

A letter was received from the Curator, Edinburgh Corporation Museum relative to securing a set of Overseas Dominions colors. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Colonial Office in regard thereto.

The Secretary to the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries wrote stating that, arising out of the Imperial Education Conference, a strong opinion had been unanimously expressed on the need of an Imperial Agricultural Bureau, and that the Board of Agriculture was prepared to initiate the preliminary organisation necessary for the formation of such a Bureau and asking the Committee to nominate a representative to attend a Conference to be held at an early date to consider the matter. Lt. Colonel Lascelles was nominated as the representative of the Committee.

JOURNAL

All "Copy" for the August number of the "Education Service Journal" has been prepared and sent to the printer during the month and the magazine is now being printed. Owing to the progress in repatriation the issue has been reduced again, the total number to be printed being 2,500. This is to be the final number of the "Journal" which was first published in January and has been issued every month since.

LECTURES

The Assistant Director of Education, Tidworth, writes with regard to lectures at U.K. Depots:

19/7/19 The total attendance at lectures during the week was 11,690,
a decrease of 6730 when compared with the previous week's figures.
to With the closing of Depots and the rapid shrinkage in camp strength
a decline in this return is to be expected. At the same time the
25/7/19 average attendance of 377 is an indication of the hold which the
Lecture Service has on the men and a proof of the popularity the
lecturers and their subjects have.

During the week 27 lectures were delivered by 11 lecturers,
of whom 4 are attached to the A.I.F. At Sutton Veny the Weekly
Session of the "Diggers Parliament" was held, 500 men participating.
The weekly meeting of the A.D.H. Debating Society was attended by
150 who listened and took part in an interesting debate on free trade
versus Protection. There were also two Fruitgrowers Conferences at
Sutton Veny.

26/7/19 The total attendance at lectures during the week was 8790,
a decrease of 2900 compared with the previous week's return. The
to average attendance was 314 which though lower than the more recent
figures exceeds the average of March and April when camps were
1/8/19 crowded to overflowing.

During the week 26 lectures were delivered by 8 lecturers
of whom 3 are attached to the A.I.F. The final meeting of the
Fruitgrowers Conference took place at Sutton Veny at which important
resolutions were adopted. An experimental Mock Trial at Bulford
proved a great success. The proceedings were keenly followed and
much enjoyed by an audience of 520, almost the record attendance of
the week. The Bulford Debating Society is to be congratulated on
the excellent arrangements made to render this new venture so popular.

2/8/19 The total attendance at lectures during the week was 2,300,
a decrease of 6,490 on the figures of the previous week. The average
to attendance was 192. Ten lectures were delivered by 6 lecturers of
whom 2 are attached to the A.I.F. at Sutton Veny. The usual weekly
8/8/19 session of the "Diggers Parliament" took place. The Bulford Debating
Society also held its customary debate the subject discussed being
"Should Womens Suffrage be abolished"?

9/8/19 A most marked increase in attendance at lectures and debates
is reported for the week. The return from leave of several A.I.F.
to Lecturers has enabled the Education Officers to prepare weekly pro-
grammes which are widely circulated in the depot and enable the men
15/8/19 to choose the subject they consider most to their liking.

The total attendance was 4700 an increase of 2400 over the
previous weeks figures. Nine lectures were delivered by 6 lecturers
of ^{whom} 3 are attached to the A.I.F. There was a meeting of the Bulford
Debating Society and the usual weekly session of the Diggers Parliament
at Sutton Veny.

A very successful innovation has been introduced at Bulford
where the members of the Public Speaking class deliver lecturettes to
small audiences limited as a rule to 30 or 50. Eight were delivered
during the week as an experiment and were considered to be so satis-
factory that it has been decided to make them a regular weekly feature.
A study circle with an attendance of 220 has been inaugurated at
Sutton Veny.

Few original 540's have come in, but there are still some applications for extension, and many questions arise, both in connection with men on N.M.E., and in connection with University matters in general, such as status of Australian graduates and undergraduates in England and on return to Australia, the new Ph.D. degree, A.C.I. 280, the Imperial Education Committee, and the Universities Bureau of Empire.

Vacation courses to be arranged, and men are attending Summer Schools at Oxford, Cambridge, St. Andrews, Bangor, and other places. There has been some difficulty in selecting courses appropriate to individual needs, and in arranging them when selected, as Schools are running concurrently in widely distant places, and men often wish to transfer from one to another, but these transferences have in some cases been arranged. Some of the men at these Schools have not been placed under AF.540, the Schools being regarded, for service reasons, as ordinary Instruction Schools.

The Committee's pamphlet on the Universities of Australia, written for the Imperial Education Committee, and intended for the information of British Service men wishing to take University courses in Australia, is now going through the press, and should shortly be ready for distribution.

Favourable reports have been received of the successes of those of our students who have already sat for examinations. Several have taken degrees, and others have been granted extensions which will give them the necessary residential qualifications for degrees that may be taken later.

The position of Overseas Scholars, whose scholarships extend into 1920, needs further consideration.

Applications for N.M.E. have been very few, but there are one or two late-comers who have been kept until now for duty, or have come from Egypt, and there are still some applications for extension, and some alterations and adjustments of various kinds to be considered. The number of interviews remains considerable.

The various Summer Schools are now in progress. It was impossible to conclude the original arrangements for the School at Oxford, but a few of our men are there, and the School at Cambridge has been unable to carry out its complete programme. Saltburn can take no more applicants, but room may still be found at Aberdeen.

Progress reports are generally good, and sometimes very satisfactory. We continue to hear of more than the expected results being obtained, and of the right work being done. One of the men placed by us is to read a paper at the meeting of the British Association in September. Another has obtained from University College London Certificates of Honour in Experimental and General Psychology, having gained the number of marks in each subject qualifying for a prize.

Certificates have been prepared for the students who have been attending the lectures of the Council of Legal Education. Our men could not be admitted to the examinations of this body, but the certificates show what courses each man has attended. The Law Society (Solicitors) invited our men to sit for its Terminal Examinations. One of them received high commendation, and two certificates of distinction for his work in Real Property (89 %)

and personal Property (87%).

The proposals of the Imperial Education Committee for the foundation of an Imperial Education Bureau are being considered by the British Government.

8/8/19 A few more new applications, mostly from men from Egypt, have been received and dealt with, and applications for extension, for to the purposes of examination, are under consideration.

14/8/19 The early part of the week was fully occupied in the compilation of a report on the operations of the Section since its inception. Other matters that have engaged attention are the preparation and issue of certificates to men who have attended the lectures of the Council of Legal Education and the Law Society, and the final revision of the pamphlet on the Universities of Australia, to which some alterations and additions have had to be made, owing to the time it has taken in going through the press.

Arrangements have been made for the completion of Form D.29 as men report conclusion of their courses, or forms are sent in.

15/8/19 A special report to the Director of Education upon the work of the Section since its commencement was submitted on the 18th inst. to

21/8/19 The usual monthly report to the Australian Universities has been prepared and dispatched.

A few applications for N.M.E. from members of the Egyptian Forces are still being dealt with, and a number of applications for extensions are still occupying the attention of the Committee.

The work of checking cards by AF 540, collecting of overdue reports and making up a final record of each student, has begun.

22/8/19 Pamphlets on the Australian Universities, prepared at the request of the Imperial Education Committee, for the information of British Service men desirous of taking University courses in Australia have now come to hand. Five hundred are being placed on book stalls to for sale, at sixpence each. One hundred have been sent to the Imperial Education Committee, and fifty to the Ministry of Labour, Appointments Department. Thirty are being sent to each of the Australian Universities, and single copies to various persons interested.

The Section is now engaged on preparation and checking of D.29 forms, including the checking of the sectional records with forms 540 and 545.

A special 3 months course at the Bangor University and Forest of Dean has been arranged to commence on August 9th for 40 selected men.

The animal husbandry course at Marshal College, Aberdeen, terminated on the 14th inst., and some excellent reports have been furnished by students.

As July 31st is the last day for the commencement of N.M.E. (with the exception of a few special cases and men coming from Egypt) there are very few new cases to be dealt with.

There are numerous applications for extension, but those are only recommended in very special cases.

There are no tours now in progress. The Minister of Defence has approved of extension of N.M.E. of 16 Officers and O.R.'s until 22/12/19 to make a special study of the textile trade.

The majority of the men from Egypt have been placed on farms, and the remainder are being sent out as quickly as places can be found for them. Lt. Baker is travelling in Scotland, Lincolnshire and Northamptonshire in order to obtain suitable places as quickly as possible.

No educational tours have taken place this week. Mr. Baker has returned from Northern England and Scotland, and the Deptz has now a superabundance of suitable places for men from Egypt who are being placed as they report.

During the past week a party has devoted all its time to visiting the London Wool Warehouses at Aldgate in the mornings, and the London Wool Exchange, Coleman Street, for the wool

sales in the afternoons. The wool prices are still about the same, and do not seem likely to drop this year. Much valuable information was gained, thanks to the kindness of Mr. Raistrick, of Du Croz, Doxata Co's, who spent much time at the Warehouses with different members of the party.

A small party, nine in number, all interested in horse breeding went to Dublin this week to visit the horse show.

Recommendations under form 540 were made for 26 men, the majority of whom are in the Light Horse. The Section is still placing Light Horse men as they report.

On Aug. 22nd and 23rd a party under Lt. Boydell visited the London Wool Warehouses at Aldgate and wool sales. The main feature of the sales was the scarcity of good combing merinos offered as compared with previous sales. Consequently the competition for this class was strong and prices went up. Average merinos were a little dearer and faulty lots remained about the same. There was plenty of crossbreds and prices here also showed an increase on previous sales. Parties visited the Smithfield Meat Markets on Aug. 25th, Islington Slaughter Yards and Cattle stores on Aug. 26th, and Union Cold Storage at Nelsons Wharf, Blackfriars, on Aug. 27th.

The lectures of the week were again of a varied nature. Repatriation, Social and Economic Problems, The Story of Zeebrugge, The Palestine Campaign, Russia; India, China, Japan, South Africa, Papua and Victoria, Law and War, Fruit Canning and Wireless Telegraphy were among the subjects handled by the lecturers.

In addition the "Digger's Parliament" at Sutton Veny held its weekly session at which 500 attended. The Bulford Debating Society at 1st A.D.H. discussed the merits of Free Trade and Protection before a house of 150. An innovation in the form of a Fruit Grower's Conference at No. 2 Group was found to be so successful that a second was held during the week. At these conferences Sgt. Hogarth continued his demonstrations on Fruit and Vegetable Preserving. The meetings were under the presidency of Lt. Col. James D.S.O., 24th Bn., and were attended by those interested in the export of Australian fruit as well as fruit growers. Definite resolutions were adopted and a report of the proceedings is being prepared and will be subkitted for publication in the Education Journal.

No. 2 Group, Sutton Veny: The organisation of staffs of instructors and the arrangement of classes in the Quotas now in process of formation at Sutton Veny, is a difficult task that is being ably performed by the G.E.O. and his staff. For Quotas 61 and 62 classes are being arranged in Sheep and Wool, Surveying, Estimating, Mining and Mechanical Engineering, Civil Engineering, Town Planning, Mechanical drawing, Drawing and Design, Carpentry, Tailoring, Telegraphy, Book-keeping; Accountancy, Business Method and Organisation, Shorthand, Commercial and General Law, Elementary Subjects, Latin, French, German, Algebra, Mathematics, Psychology, Philosophy, Economics and Ethics - a syllabus which speaks for itself.

The strength of this Depot is 5727, the attendance at lectures 6560 and the average at classes 364.

Library sales for the week amounted to £14/10/10, the sales on Monday reaching £8/13/4 - a record for one day in the Group.

The Repatriation and Demobilisation branch of the work maintains considerable activity, the questions asked being numerous and covering a wide range.

1st A.D.H. Bulford: Enrolments and attendances show a marked increase and improvement. The popularity of the Debating Society is well maintained. On Thursday, many sound arguments for and against Protection were listened to by a good number of men, many of whom are gradually being induced to participate in the Debates.

Mr. Butcher's lectures on the Coloured Races were keenly followed by a large audience, who realised the growing importance of the "Yellow Peril".

A large and more central hut has been obtained and all instructional work except carpentry and Engineering is now being

conducted there. The original hut is used by the Carpentry and Engineering Students.

C.T.D. Parkhouse: The Camp is emptying rapidly, and this is the last week of instructional activity. In spite of declining Camp strength the average attendance at classes is good varying from 70 to 100 % of the number enrolled.

The lectures delivered during the week attracted large audiences. Capt. Nicholls was particularly good. His lecture on Law and War gave rise to an animated discussion, in which the lecturer participated.

Quota 57: Further headway has been made in the organisation of the work for the remainder of the time in camp and for the voyage home. The list of Instructors is practically complete and now that it is more definitely known that classes will be in operation, enrolments are increasing satisfactorily.

The study groups in the various branches of horticulture and irrigation will be particularly popular. At present the Instructor in these subjects is on leave. A class room has been obtained and this will tend towards a further increase in enrolments. An Instructor in electricity and Mechanical Drawing is also being included on the personnel and classes in these subjects are being formed.

A trip to Shaunton Gardens was arranged on Wednesday last for 30 men of the Quota. Those who undertook the trip were well pleased with their outing and expressed the hope that more trips would be available.

Our men are availing themselves of the various lectures which are given in the Area. The services of two lecturers have already been secured for the voyage. A Camera Club is also in process of formation, the 57th Bn. Photographer having willingly offered his services towards making it a success.

General: The figures for the week under review show a further decline owing to the large number of men embarked for Australia during the previous week. The efforts of the Education Staffs in Depots and the keenness shown by the few men marching in, partly replaced the loss. The results obtained at the 1st A.D.H. are particularly encouraging as at this centre the position is now better than at any time since the inception of the Scheme. The work of the Education Service is now confined to Groups 2 and 6.

The topics dealt with by the lecturers were of a varied character embracing the campaign in Palestine, The Problems of the Coloured Race, The League of Nations, Natural History and Fruit Canning.

A fruit grower's Conference (final sitting) was held at Sutton Veny. A most successful Mock Trial inaugurated at Bulford by the Debating Society, drew a delighted audience of 520. Much local colour was introduced and the eloquence of the various counsel was of a high standard.

Group 2, Sutton Veny: New classes are being formed, and are filling rapidly, the most successful being Motor Engineering, Carpentry and Electricity.

Educational personnel for Quotas 62 and 63 have been completed. The former quota is now commencing classes under Capt. Tatham.

Energetic propaganda work is being undertaken among all the men in camps and no effort is being spared to make the Quotas now in process of formation as efficient as those which are possessed with a complete educational establishment before marching in from France.

Lectures were well attended during the week. Mr. Hamby expressed great satisfaction with his audiences, being very much struck by the searching and pertinent questions asked after his lectures.

The final session of the Fruit Growers Conference was held on Saturday. The discussion was most instructive, and definite resolutions were passed dealing with important problems connected with the marketing of Australian fruits. Delegates, one from each State, were carefully selected to visit and report on various fruit markets in U.K. A full report of the proceedings is being prepared, which will show that Australians are fully determined to share in the Overseas handling and disposal as well as the growth of fruits. During the week 124 books were sold, their value being £13/5/7.

1st A.D.H. Bulford: In spite of the many difficulties besetting the educational work in this Hospital no better example of grit and determination in educational activity has ever been recorded in A.I.F. Depots in U.K. The organisation is excellent and the most is made of every opportunity. For many weeks a definite time table has been in operation. Daily class work starts at 9 a.m, and does not terminate before 10 p.m., 7 days per week. Everything works with machine like precision. The men attending are fired with enthusiasm. The fact that they are often compelled to interrupt their studies for treatment or are even taken from the class room to their ward does not deter them. At the earliest opportunity they report to the Education Officer and carry on, taking up their studies from the point from which they were forced to suspend them. A visit to the Education Office reveals remarkable activity at all hours of the day, the large class room being filled with busy students. Classes in commercial and elementary subjects, Carpentry, Engineering and Telegraphy claim large and regular attendances, though it is almost impossible for any man to attend daily.

C.T.D. Parkhouse: At this Centre all class work has ceased, the staff has been dispersed and the office closed.

The activities during the week were confined to lectures of which 3 were delivered to good audiences. Though the number of men present was, comparatively speaking, small, the attendances at lectures represented a high proportion of the men in Camp.

The subjects of the lectures were mainly of a social, Economic or Industrial nature. At the same time Miss Bacon's lecture on Flying Machines in Peace and War and W/O Healey's talks on the Palestine Campaign drew large audiences in camps, where the strength has been reduced almost to vanishing point.

No. 2 Group, Sutton Veny: On the closing of No. 5 Group, Weymouth, carpentry tools and motor mechanic equipment sufficient to enable classes to be conducted were despatched to Sutton Veny. The chief instructors from No. 5 Group, Sgt. Woods, Sgt. Simppen, and Sgt. Rutledge were also transferred to that Group. Chiefly owing to the energy and organising ability of Sgt. Woods these classes were quickly in operation with enrolments of 98 in Motor Mechanics and 14 in electrical engineering, and arrangements have been completed for the carpentry class to assist in repairing the camps in this way saving much for the A.I.F. A tour to Stourhead was arranged for 1 Officer and 32 O/Ranks from Qudta 62 to visit the famous Stourhead and gardens. During the week 105 volumes valued at £9/16/11 were sold.

1st A.D.H. Bulford: Most satisfactory progress is being made at this centre. By means of active propoganda work the new enrolments more than replace the losses due to students marching out of the hospital and the enthusiasm infused into the men attending by the energetic staff causes the total attendance and percentage of strength of the hospital to show a continued improvement.

A very successful innovation has been introduced at Bulford where the members of the Public Speaking Class delivered lecturettes to small audiences limited as a rule to 30 or 50. Eight were delivered during the week. It has been decided to make them a regular feature. At No. 2 Group, Sutton Veny, a large Study Circle has been formed for the discussion of Civics and other questions.

No. 2 Group, Sutton Veny: The growth and progress of the Technical classes under Sgt. Wood are being well maintained. In spite of men marching out the numbers continue to grow. The instructors have compiled a complete syllabus of instruction in all branches, thus increasing the efficiency of the course by systematising the work.

Motor Engineering: Great activity is shown by this class. The instructors are energetic and possess the gift of instilling keenness and enthusiasm into the men. Sufficient equipment to make illustration by means of actual parts were obtained from Weymouth. The following is the syllabus of lessons given during each course and at the termination of the course an examination is held. This is the most popular class in the Depot. (1) First principles of the Internal Combustion Engine, (2) Lecture on the 4 cycle Engine, (3) Lecture on the 2 cycle Engine, (4) Principles of Thermo Syphon System of Water cooling and Lubrication, (5) Theory of Carburation, (6) Theory of Ignition, Magneto and Accumulator, (7) Lecture on Gears and Clutches, (8) Lecture on Differential and Brakes, (9) Lecture on Motor Car construction and general upkeep.

Electrical Engineering: A set course of lectures is given in this class also. A pupil from the class has been installed at the Group Cinema and, under class arrangements, wiring and electrical repair are being effected throughout the camp.

Carpentry: No. 10 Camp has been taken over for repairs, the students being engaged in the repairing huts and camp equipment. This class is also undertaking the necessary Glazing and Bricklaying. In addition to providing practical instruction for the men this useful work is saving money, time and labour for the A.I.F. by getting camps ready for handing over to the Imperial Authorities.

Photography: In the able hands of Sgt. Freeman this class is making rapid headway. The attendance is good and the keenness of the men most marked. Sgt. Freeman is also accompanying tours and advising the men on Pictorial Composition and Selection of Subjects, in addition to giving useful Technical knowledge. Dancing classes and a Depot Concert party are being formed and will soon be in operation.

Commercial: The Commercial School is taxed to its fullest accommodation. Here men are receiving instruction in Book-keeping, Commercial and General Instruction, Architectural and Mechanical Drawing.

Tours: A party in charge of Lt. Blakett, visited the Falkirk district in Scotland to inspect Engineering and other works. A detailed report of this tour is being prepared. A party from Quota 62 under Capt. Neech visited Romsey and Winchester to study historic growth of Romsey Abbey and Winchester Cathedral. A party from Quota 64 under Capt. Neech inspected Stourton and Bath. The leader gave much valuable information concerning the various styles of Architecture met with in the course of the tour.

Library: The sales for the week amounted to £16/13/5. The requirements cannot be met owing to the delay in replenishing the stock.

Agricultural: Seed testing experiments are being carried out with English and Australian seeds. It is proposed to re-open the Wool-classing Instruction as soon as accommodation can be obtained.

1st A.D.H. Bulford: In spite of students marching out an increase is shown on account of the large number of new enrolments. A most attractive propaganda is being carried out ceaselessly. The average attendance at classes is 75 % of the total men enrolled. The members of the Public Speaking Class are making good progress.

The Director General in accordance with a ruling given by the Minister of Defence, desires that, in future applications for extensions of Non-Military Employment after 31st October, only very special cases should be considered at all. These recommended as such, will be considered by the Director General and, where he concurs with the recommendations, will be submitted to the Minister for final decision.
