

Kemarks and Summary of Events and Information references to Appendices Luie. A' boy now in Support. Remaining boys - 2 Platoons in Support, I in Pregnes line and I in Outpost line. Front Line 10/4/17 mun Brigades on our left attacked during night and attained 1st and 2 nd Objectives. Later information shows that Counter attacks by evening drove them back to old line. This Unit ordered to consider preparation for attack on QUEANT, but on account of flank troops being formed back, this is cancelled for hime being. German patrol approached one of our Outpost and 2 of them Killed by Lewis Gun fire. Very wet day and cold with snow minh. falls. Twenty two Reinforcements came up and joined Corp. Min. ## Map Reference Sheet 57 C 1/40,000.

In order that the Battalion may be quickly assembled the following precautions will be adopted!

(1) On receiving alarm at Bat talion Headquarters, a

message will be sent to Companies as follows:-

"(a) " Company \_ Stand to" which means that Companies will stand to at Company assembling posts and working parties will stand to near their work.

"Battalion - Stand To": Companies and Working parties will move independently to Battalion assembling post and there await further orders.

Dress:- Fighting Order plups waterproof sheet and gas hel-

mets.

(2) Assembling Posts :- (a) Company - In street where Company is billetted.

(b) Battalion - At H. 28. A. Central.

(3) Officers in charge of working parties will send back, to remain at Battalion Signalling Office, a runner who must know the exact location of the Officer concerned and who will remain at his post until relieved by the runner from the relieving Officer.

(4) All Working Parties will move out to their work in Fighting Order plus waterproof sheets and gas helmets. Arms will be piled and equipment stacked, to close proximity to their work and

necessary guard posted thereon."

(5) Company Commanders will make internal arrangements in order that blankets and packs of their Companies may be collected and stored after troops have moved out. It is suggested that C.Q.M.S. his storeman, and proportion of Officers' servants as well as No Duty men be used for this purpose.

(6) All Officers will, during t he 27th instant, reconnoitre the route from their present location to(a) the Battalion assembling

post , (b) VAULX.

(7) Intelligence Officer and Signalling Officer on the alarm being given will proceed direct to VAULX and report to the Battalion Commander of the Battalion which this Unit is supporting to receive The Intelligence Officer will then rejoin the Battalion en route in order that they may be guided to required area.

(8) Company Commanders will make immediate arrangements to ensure that water bottles of men are filled each night, also render a Certificate that each man is in possession of 120 rounds S.A.A. to

Battalion Hgrs. by 1800 on the 27th instant.

(9) Transport. The following Transport will be kept loaded and ready to move:- 4 Lewis Gun limbers, Tools and Ny Signalling limber, Mobile Reserve of S.A.A. and Bombs, and Maltese Cart. This transport, on the alarm being given, will move direct to the Battalion assembling post. In addition to the above, hacks for the following Officers with the requisite number of grooms will also be taken to the Battalion Assembling post:-

C,O,, Adjutant, M.O., Signalling Officer, Intelligence Officer,

and 4 Company Commanders.

(10) The Q, m, will, as soon as the Battalion moves off, make arrangements for Cookers and rations to follow the Unit, also collect all packs and blankets left by the men and form a Battalion Dump in BAPAUME. On completion of mix the above the Q.M. will hand over all Billets to the Area Commandant.

(11) Officers servants will remain behind and see that Officers kits are handed over to the Battalion Dump, after which they will report to C.Q.M.S. to assist in collecting packs and blanketss. On completion of this work they will move forward and report to their respective Officers.

(12) Rough sketch shewing assembling posts and route to be

taken is attached hereto.







Wittkopp on his own initiative immediately swung his platoon round and directed Lewis gun and rifle fire on the enemy to meet the danger and by doing so caused heavy losses to the enemy which resulted in the Germans' retreat in disorder allowing the Company to move forward. He then collected and reorganised all men in the vicinity including men of other Units and advanced through the village taking about 20 prisoners, and causing heavy losses to the enemy. Lieut. Wittkopp finally took up a position in our original outpost line bringing heavy machine gun and rifle fire on the retreating enemy. He carried out his work with great coolmess and showed great initiative during the action. I trust this Officer's services shall not go unrewarded. (Not previously recommended or rewarded.) | 605 |

Chataway during the attack by the enemy handled his platoon with great coolness and quick decisions.  His platoon moved through Lagnicourt doing a great deal of mopping up and assisted in driving the enemy out of the village. After pass-   |     |

WILSON At LAGNICOURT, FRANCE on 15th April 1927, Sjt. Wilson rendered valuable assistance to his company commander as a leader of men during an enemy attack. He pushed forward with a party of men and established consolidated, and held a post in close proximity to enemy outposts. He was under heavy enemy fire and although several times his post was in danger of being cut off from th remainder of his company, by his keen initiative and courage held his grounduntil relieved. (Previously recommended and rewerded.

Pte. ALEXANDER KARELIN At LACNICOURT, FRANCEOn 15th 9th Battalion 2168 April 1917, Pte. Karelin during A.I.F. the attack by the enemy succeeded in leading a party across 150 yards of open roadway swept by Machine Gun and Rifle fire and took up a position where he brought fire to bear on a part of the enemy who were attempting to outflank the company. Although loosing two of his men he hung on to the position and finally succeeded in keeping back the advance of the enemy on that flank which would seriously have hampered our operations and caused numerous casualties. His coolness and courage cannot be too highly commended. (Not previously recommended or rewarded). 2388 At LACNICOURT, FRANCE on 15th 9th Battalion Pto. GEORGE NORMAN A.I.F. April 1917, Pte NORMAN during the attack by the enemy showed gallant conduct and distinguished himself on many occasions by carrying messages between Com pany Headquarters and Platoons throughout the action under heavy rifle and machine gun fire. In the heat of the action he sought out and found detached parties of the company who had become mixed up with other units and later succeeded in Kinding guiding ration parties to these men. His work throughout is des erving of the highest praise. ( Not p eviously recommended or rewarded).

He was in charge of a party of men that took part in the movement resulting in the outflanking of enemy detachments. Later he pushed forward and secured a number of prisoners eventually reaching our frontaling original front line. His tireless energy and magnificent courage are deserving of the highest praise. ( Not previously recommended or rewarded) At LANICOURT, FRANCE on 15th April 1917, L/Cpl. Fletcher, during an attack by the enemy wascof invaluable assistance to his platoon commander. His coolness and devotion to duty were most marked. During the counter attack he pushed forward with a party of men finally reaching our orig - inal front line. Although detached he promptly consolidated his position and established communication with parties in rear .He hold this position under heavy artillery machine gum fire until relieved. Throughout the whole operation he was an excellent example to all. Byshis energy and tact he was largely instrumental in capturing 26 about 50 of the enemy. 9th Battalion 664 BENTLEY At LANICOURT, FRANCE on 15th Sergeant JOHN T April 1917, Sjt. Bentley J.T. A.I.F. showed great skill and coolness in handling his platoon and when wounded continued to direct the fire of his men . until the enemy were checked and driven back. During the tour in the outposts this Serjt. showed exceptional ability and x and courage when out on reconneit -ring patrols. His work through -out was deserving of the greatest credit and praise and his devotion to duty and tireless energy cannot be too highly commended. (Previously recommended) 9th Battalion L/Cpl. JOSEPH VARCIN 2223 At LANECOURT, FRANCE on 15th A.I.F. April 1917, L/Cpl. VARCIN who was in charge of a Lewis Gun Team shewed himself to be a XEEMERXEXEEEEXTENEX leader of exceptional quality and courage. He brought his gun into play under heavy Machine gum and rifle fire causing heavy losses to the enemy. He pushed his gun £ forward into prominent pos itions in full view of the e enemy to obtain a better field of fire and give covering fire to our troops. He was the first man to reach our original outpost lines where he again played havoc with the retiring enemy. His coolness and itiative calls Torkthe for the highest praise.
