YOUNG was wounded and evacuated. Lieut. R.H. BROWN was evacuated sick.</p> <p>The Battalion left BORRE about dusk marching by companies via ROUGE CROIX - FLETRÉ to relieve the 321st. FRENCH REGIMENT in the support system of the METEREN-BECQUE front. Relief was completed without incident. After relief an extension of trench was dug and completed and camouflaged by daylight. The Battalion is accommodated in trenches ready for action while a few details are living in farmhouses and barns. Map location of Battalion H.Q. X.2.C.2.3. - Sheet 27. "A" and "B" Companies are in forward positions from X.8.C.2.3. to X.8.B.9.5. "C" and "D" Companies are in supporting positions from X.7.B.7.8. to X.2.C.8.3. In daylight there are no fires so men subsist on dry rations. Our artillery fairly active today. Enemy artillery showed a slight increase shelling and firing farmhouses in the back areas. 1. The 1st. Australian Division is being transferred by rail to the 4th. Army.  
Entrainment of the Brigade group will commence on the 5th. inst., in accordance with programme to follow.
2. 9th. Battalion less Transport Section will move by Bus to CAESTRE Sub Area to-morrow, 4th. inst.  
Companies will be divided into parties of 25 and be ready to move from this camp to Embussin, point Canada Corner at 1.30 p.m. in the following order:-  
H.Q. "A", "B", "C", "D", Coy's.
3. Officers will be distributed on the lorries throughout the Column.
4. Battalion embussin, officer - Lieut. R.H. BROWN, M.C.
5. Transport of the Brigade will move by road to-morrow 4th. inst under the Brigade Transport Officer in the following order, passing starting, point, Cross Roads in LA OLYTE at N.7. Central at 10.a.m.  
11th. Battalion, 12th. Battalion, 3rd. M.G. Company,  
9th. Battalion, 10th. Battalion, Brigade Headquarters.
6. Dress: Full marching order.
7. Officers valises, mess gear, etc. will be dumped near road adjacent to this camp by 9.30 a.m. It is essential that these should be dumped at time stated as transport must move in Brigade Column
8. Cookers will be ready to move by 9.30 a.m.
9. The following distances will be maintained on the march:-  
(a) Between Companies, Unit Transports, and between Transport and its Units when Brigaded - 100 yards.  
(b) Between Bus - 500 yards.

1. The Battalion will entrain at CAESTRE on 6th April as set out hereunder (para 10.)
  2. Brigade Entraining Officer - Capt R. R. AGNEW, 3rd Battalion.  
Detraining Officer - Major C. RUMBLE, M.C., 10th Bn.
  3. Captain BIGGS in conjunction with Captain MCINTYRE will act as entraining Officers and will report to Brigade Entraining Officer 3 hours prior to entrainment of the Battalion.
  4. Trains are made up as follows:-  
 1 Officers Coach.  
 30 Covered trucks.  
 17 Flat trucks.  
 2 Brake vans.  
 Each covered truck will carry 40 men or 8 L.B. Horses or 6 H.D. horses.  
 Each covered truck will take on an average 4 axles.  
 No personnel or stores will be allowed in brake vans at each end of train nor on roofs of trucks. No covered trucks will be used for baggage.
  5. The Brigade Mining Coy. will act as loading party at the entraining station.  
 The C.O. 12th. Battalion will detail one Company to unload trains at the detraining station. This Company with cookers will proceed by the first train.
  6. Infantry transport will arrive at the entraining station 3 hours before time of departure of train.  
 Infantry personnel will arrive at the entraining station 1½ hours before departure of the train.  
 Company Commanders will reconnoitre the best route from their respective billets to entraining point and move off independently reporting to the Adjutant and Entraining Officer with parade state.
  7. Officers valises, signalling stores will be ready stacked in a dump at Company Headquarters at 5 p.m.
  8. Meals for today will be as usual.  
 All meat for tomorrow's consumption to be issued this afternoon and to be carried on the man. Cookers (excluding "B" Coy.) will be ready to move at 7.30 p.m. tonight 5/4/18. Two cooks per Company will move with cookers and prepare tea ready for troops on arrival at entraining point.



1. The Battalion will move today, 9th instant to FLESSELLES.
2. Battalion Starting Point. Cross Roads near ARGELVES CEMETERY, No. th of High Street.
3. Head of Battalion Column will pass Starting Point at 1.15 p.m. - Companies marching out in the following order: Headquarters, "C", "D", "A" and "B" Companies. Transport will move in rear of the Battalion.
4. Dress: full marching order, plus blanket. Steel helmets will be worn.
5. Distances on the march will be maintained as under:-  
Between Companies, Unit Transport and between Transport and its Unit - 100 yards.
