

# Repatriation & Demobilisation Department.

Progress Report by Branch 1.D. for week up to, and including, 21st March, 1919.

#### . 1.D.

A Conference was held on the 20th March, 1919 at which the following were represented:
1.D., Sub-Branches 1.D., 1.D.2., 1.D.3., & 5.D.

The financial questions regarding A.I.F. Forms 540 were discussed and a definite procedure adopted - all concerned being notified.

Various rulings were obtained and promulgated.

A large number of applications have been reviewed during the week, and several originally "not approved" have now been "approved", further evidence being produced warranting a re-consideration of the cases.

Checking and submitting applications for decision carried on.

Appendix "A" shews the total number of a pplications deal t with in Branch 1.D. to date, under the different headings.

#### 1.D.1. Early Repatriation.

220 new applications received during the week, an increase of 50 over last period.

Rolls of "approved" and "not approved" applications were issued - 84 and 89, respectively.

#### Dischærges.

630 new applications received during the week - an increase of 399, compared with last week.

Reminders have now been sent out regarding all applications that have been kept "pending" longer than 3 weeks.

"not approved" instead of "cancelled", as is at present being done by 4a Records. A cancelled application is totally different from one "not approved", and the present procedure has already led to mistakes being made.

#### Leave, Non-Military Employment etc.

During the period under review, 39 applications were received, 58 passed to 5.D. 248 "approved", 74 men called up and 23 passes issued.

## Returns - B213, Recordsetc.

Daily and weekly Returns promulgated. Records completed for the control of personnel on Non-Military employment.



### General.

Correspondence is increasing daily, much of it, however, is occasioned by men being placed in various jobs before the Forms 540 are completed.

Many queries are being received from personnel on non-military employment, such as :-

How they are to be trated dentally.
How to obtain a change of clothes, boots, etc.

### 1.D. 2. Educational.

Books were issued to 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th Divisions, Corps Headquarters, Rue, Havre, London and U.K. Depots. Most of the issues to London were for transports.

Books indented for during week - 16 Books in stock on 20th March - 16,327.

### Correspondence Courses.

13 I.C.S. Scholarships awarded during the period under review.

### Universities.

This week has been marked by a satisfactory increase in the number of students applying for courses. There has also been an increase in the number of personal enquiries. A great many have submitted their cases for advice, which, sometimes, has been difficult to give, even with the information now accumulated by this Branch.

The American Army Education Commission has made A.I.F. Law students its guests at the special vacation courses of lectures arranged for Americans by the Council of Local Education. Dr. R.C.Mills, author of "The Colonisation of Australia" has become Honorary adviser to A.I.F students attending the school. Professor John Adams of the London Day Training College is taking particular interest in the Australian teachers, with very helpful results. Professor Ashlet of Birmingham is interesting himself in the extension of courses of men who began as Overseas Scholars.

#### Technical.

With the increased number of men reporting from France on "Pool" interviewing from all Sub-Section Officers has been exceptionally heavy.

The number of applicants recommended has been well maintained, particularly so as several Sub-Section Officers have been unable to attend duties owing to sickness.

Major Webb left for the Northern Counties of England on 14th instant in order to visit the several Institutions, Firms, etc. where members of the A.I.F. have been placed. Opportunity will also be taken of calling upon Educational Institutions, Workshops, Firms and Factories with a view to procuring additional openings for applicants.

Lieut. William son proceeded to Leicester on the 18th instant in order to make further arrangements for the placing of Architectural and Civil Engineering students.

Lieut. Borthwick during the week visited Coventry and Birmingham, calling upon the following firms, with satisfactory results:-

Messrs. Daimler, Mandsley Birmingham University McGowan, Wild & Co. Ltd. T. Pass & CO. Ltd., Birmingham Technical College. Wildings Ltd.



## Agricultural.

Non-Military Employment - The number of applications received is now diminishing and the work of placing men is well in hand. Lieut. Mailler in Somerset and Lieut. Creed in Lincolnshire continue to meet with success in obtaining offers from farmers to take men for experience.

Other special offers which have been received during the week are from the Lister Sheep Shearing Machinery Co. for a further party of me 25 men; The East of Scotland Agricultural College, Edinburgh for a class of 20 to 30 men to take a course of general Agriculture, and through the Food Production Dept. it is expected that a large number of men will be able to gain experience in motor tractor driving.

Agricultural Tours - A party of 40 officers and O.R's were sent from Depots to visit stock sales and stud farms in the Midlands with excellent results. Arrangements were also made to send a party of 4 officers and 9 O.R's from A.T.D. Sutton Veny to withess a demonstration of assembling farm machinery at Massey Harris Warehouse, Bow, and to visit Covent Garden and Smithfield Markets.

### General.

The total authroised expenditure up to and including 15.3.19 amounts to £10,090,18.10.

Stocktaking in the Library has been completed.

2 Officers and 5 Other Ranks were added to the strength during the period and one strick off.

The demand for Lectures in U.K. Depots has increased and arrangements are being made to cope with this.

During the period under review the number of applications dealt with are as follows :-

# 4. 1.D.3. Non-Military Employment (Industrial).

#### Shipbuilding.

30 applications recommended. 36 men put on their jobs. Prospects of placing all applications satisfactorily.

#### General Engineering.

53 applications recommended. 57 sent out to work.



# Electrical, Aeroplanes, Motors.

Motors.

30 applications recommended. 31 men placed. Arrangements are being made for a course for a 100 men in Motor Engineering.

#### Aeroplanes.

8 applications recommended. 15 men placed.

Electrical.

20 applications recommended. 26 men placed.

#### Wools & Textiles.

Progress of students in this section is very satis-factory. Difficulty is being experienced in placing men for experience in the woollen mills.

The following is the total of men now out on wool and textile work :-

Wool & Textile Course-Technical Colleges and University :- 20 officers and 30 other ranks.

In Wool Warehouses and Mills :- 7 officers, 33 other ranks.

## Building Trades and Miscellaneous.

Building Trades. 39 applications recommended. 40 men placed.
Miscellaneous. 122 applications recommended. 114 men placed.

#### Industrial.

The industrial position is satisfactory, and, except in a few individual cases, we are experiencing no difficulties with the Trade Unions, who in many cases are most helpful in giving assistance in placing our men.

The industrial unrest in the railways and coal industries still hinders placing men in these trades, but there is a likelihood of an early settlement.

#### General.

During the week 401 Forms 540 were received, 302 applications recommended to 5.D., and 319 men were actually placed on their jobs; making a total of 1,004 men now out at work.

During the week 364 civilian suits and 402 sets of overalls were issued through Ordnance, Also 98 men were supplied with tools of trade.

Men are beginning to report back from Non-Military Employment, their terms of leave having expired. A large percentage of men are, however, applying for eltensions of leave for further periods of employment.

Arrangements are being made and the work of selecting suitable Area Officers for the supervision of men placed in N.M.E. is in progress.

# Repatriation and Demobilisation Department.

Progress Report by Branch 1.D. for week up to, and including 14th March 1919.

## 1. 1.D.

various rulings were obtained and promulagated. Checkings and submitting applications for decision carried on.

Appendix "A" shews the total number of applications dealt with by 1.D. to date.

Owing to the increased work in connection with Non-Military employment, the accommodation at 44 St. Georges Square, was found to be inadequate, and Sub-Sections 1.D.1.a. (Early Repatriation) and 1.D.1.b. (Discharges) were moved to 54, Victoria Street on the 14th instant and are now located on the 4th floor of that building.

# 2. 1.D.1. Early Repatriation.

During the period under review 169 new applications were received. Rolls of "Approved" and "not approved" applications were issued.

The number of applications for Early Repatriation shows a remarkable falling off and in consequence the staff of this Section has been decreased by 2 Officers and three other ranks.

#### Discharges.

231 new applications were received during the week.

Applications which have been kept pending for periods exceeding three weeks, are now being re-examined and reminders sent to Units concerned for the forwarding of the necessary documents.

The number of applications under this heading also shows a decrease.

Correspondence, however, is still voluminous and much of it is concerned with enquiries regarding applications which have been finalized for some time, and it would appear that "B" Records are somewhat slow in notifying approvals.

# Leave, Non-Military Employment, etc.

542 Passes have been issued during the past week.

Many applications are received for extended leave pending finalisation of A.I.F.Form 540 and a great deal of time is wasted.

#### General.

2282 approved cases of men who have not yet reported are now on hand.

## 3. 1.D.2. Educational.

Owing to stock-taking no Books were issued to Units during the week, but 12,000 were issued to the Transport Officer.

Books indented for during the week - 135 Unit Libraries for Depots in U.K. were despatched. Books in stock on 7.3.19 - 15,690.

### Correspondence Courses.

5 students notified that scholarships were awarded and a further 9 requested from the I.C.S.

#### Universities.

A considerable number of personal enquiries re courses open to men who can do work of University standard were dealt with.

Summer courses are being arranged and proper arrangements for vacation study are proving to be possible.

The willingness to help shown by the British Universities is gratifying and so far is providing adequate means.

During period under review 25 applications on A.I.F.Form 540 were received and 27 passed to 5.D.

### Technical.

Closer working relationship has been reached with other Sections, particularly 1.D. 3., and this has considerably reduced duplication of work.

With the increased staff in this Section, work is greatly hampered by the lack of floor space.

Work in this section has greatly increased, both with regard to additional office work required and the necessity of keeping in close touch with the various firms, institutions, etc. where the comparatively large number of men are now placed.

A number of firms and institutions were visited during the week with a view to placing men.

Lectures at the Licenced Survey School commenced on the 10th instant, with about 40 students. 5 Instructors are now at the school.

453 applications received during the week, 183 passed to 5.D. and 21 rejected.

#### Agricultural.

A good response has been met with from City Wool Brokers in finding further openings for men for experience. It is anticipated that arrangements will be made to send a party of 50 to attend the sales commencing in April, to study marketing of wool and the grading of hides and skins. It is also hoped to pay regular visits to the Islington and Smithfield markets during the same period. It is proposed to replace parties every six weeks.

Interviews with farmers in Dorset, Somerset and Aberdeen have resulted in fresh offers to place men being received.

Arrangements have been completed for opening a special course in stock raising and general sgriculture at the North of Scotland Agricultural College, Aberdeen, early in April. 30 vacancies have been allotted to the A.I.F. and only applicants with special qualifications will be accepted.

The Royal Veterinary College, Edinburgh, has offered a three months special intensive course in the elements of Veterinary Science commencing in April, and a class is now being selected.

During the period under review 412 applications were received, 195 passed to 5.D. and 43 rejected.

### General.

The total authorised expenditure to date amounts to £9548.14.9d.

Stocktaking in the Library has been in progress during the week. The registers and ledgers are up to date.

2 other ranks were added to the staff during the week.

Various lectures were arranged at Weymouth and Codford.

4 of the recently appointed A.I.F. Lectures have been applied for from France to lecture in A.I.F. Depots in U.K.

During the period under review a total of 890 applications were received, 405 passed to 5.D. and 64 rejected.

37 A.I.F. Forms 545 were also passed to 5.D.

# 4. 1.D. 3. Non-Military Employment (Industrial).

## Shipbuilding.

Recommendations for 42 men sent forward to 5.D. 25 men actually placed.

#### General Engineering.

65 applications recommended and sent forward to 5.D. 45 men put out in on their jobs.

## Electrical - Aeroplanes - Motors.

Motors. 34 applications recommended. 24 men placed.

Aeroplanes. 18 applications to 5.D. 8 men placed.

The Underground (Me tropolitan District Railway)

definitely decided to accept any of our men, but we have again approached them asking for the use of their driving (Training) School. The Metropolitan Railway has agreed to accept a few men in their power station and are considering the employment of a few men in their automatic and electric signalling.

The British Electrical and Allied Mammfacturing Association have circularised their members with a result that several firms have offered to take our men.

### Wools & Textiles.

Special Wool and Textile course is commencing next month at the Leeds University. Sufficient applications are held by 1.D.2. to absorb the 40 vacancies.

It is expected 40 men can be placed in the mills in Scotland.



# Building Trades & Miscellaneous.

Building Trades. 17 applications sent to 5.D. 15 men sent out to work.

Miscellaneous. 73 recommendations to 5.D. 55 sent out to work.

### Industrial.

Unions coonnected with the Printing Trade were approached and will offer every assistance, but owing to unemployment cannot expect to do much. Would suggest men being placed in technical schools.

Glass Blowing Trades, will give assistance and place a number of men.

Shipbuilding Trades. All going smoothly except for a dispute among the carpenters and joiners at Vickers, Limited, which will hinder us placing a number of men of which we have had promises of employment.

### General.

During the week 283 applications were received. 262 recommendations were forwarded to 5.D. and 183 men were actually put on their jobs, making a total of 685 men now out at work.

168 men have been issued with civilian clothes and 346 issued with overalls. (Week ending 15.3.19) Also 34 sets of fitters' and turners' tools, 21 sets of carpenters' tools and 18 sets of tools for other trades issued.

The advantage of the Pool at Parkhouse is being felt in getting the men out more expeditiously to their work.

Progress Report by Branch 1.D. for week up to, and including, 7th March 1919.

### 1. 1.D.

Various rulings were obtained and promulgated. Checking and submitting applications for decision carried on.

A Conference was held on the 7th March 1919, at which the following were represented:-

1.D. and sub-branches 1.D.1., 1.D.2., 1.D.3.

5.D. - Pay Department.

Matters in connection with the checking and forwarding of the various applications were discussed and several points settled, which should result in increased efficiency in dealing with the applications.

Appendix "A" shews the total number of applications dealt with by 1.D. to date.

# 1.D.1. Early Repatriation.

289 new applications received - an increase over last period of 82.

203 applications were "approved" and 37 "not approved" during the week.

# Discharges, elsewhere than in Australia.

During the period under review 165 applications were received, 95 approved, 65 not approved, 122 passed to 5.D., 5 to D.M.S. 109 retained owing to irregularities.

# Leave, non-military employment, etc.

57 new applications were received and 35 approved during this period. 83 applications passed to 5.D. and 18 Passes issued.

It is anticipated thata large number of passes will be issued next week on account of telegrams sent a week ago.

A number of applications for have have been received from relatives of men serving in Egypt.

### Returns - B213, Records etc.

Daily returns completed and records made for control of men on non-military employment.

Owing to the increased number of approved A.I.F. Forms 540, the work of this Section has been re-arranged and extra clerical staff has been added from Early Repatriation Section, as the work in this latter section has considerably decreased.

#### General.

This Section (1.D.1.) has moved from Horseferry Road to 44, St. Georges Square and a certain re-distribution of duties has been carried out. A great deal of time elapses between the date of approval of A.I.F. Form 540 and the issue of the man's pass, owing to the fact that personnel are often granted leave after submitting their applications and no notification to this effect appears on the Form. Consequently, wires are sent to his Unit and in many cases after a delay of 14 days information is received to the effect that the man proceeded on leave to the U.K. on a gertain date. This entails finding out his address wil whilst on leave and further letters calling him up in order to issue his pass.

## 3. 1.D.2. Educational.

Books were issued to 2nd and 3rd Divisions, Egypt, Rue, Havre, Sutto/n Veny, Hurdcott and London.

20 Unit Libraries, averaging 84 books each, were issued to the five Divisions.

Unit Libraries for Command Depots in U.K. are packed and awaiting transport.

Books indented for during week - 12,230. 11,300 of these are I.C.S. pamphlets required for transport.

Owing to mough handling and pressure of heavy cargo stacked upon them, many packages of books were badly broken and a number of books lost.

Sets of drawing instruments have been issued on loan to 1st, 2nd and 4th Divisions. Similar sets are available for all Divisions and Command Depots and will be despatched as parties report.

#### Correspondence Courses.

93 scholarships granted to students.

#### Universities.

Arrangements have been completed for Mr. S.M. Burrows to act as representative in Oxford of the Australian Universities Committee.

Satisfactory reports were received as to the work now being done by men already placed at Oxford.

Accommodation at Oxford is now extremely limited.

Manchester University, although becoming crowded with British students and being handicapped by lack of staff, is willing to receive more A.I.F. students.

During the period under review 19 applications were received, 19 passed to 5.D. and 5 rejected.

#### Technical.

Some delay has occurred in the arrival from France of students for the Licensed Surveyor Course at Southampton, but it is expected that the majority of the students will have reported by the end of the week.

The Topographical Course for Qualified Surveyors commences on the 10th March, 1919. Major Wolff and Lieut. Peel, British Ordnance Survey Dept. Will be the instructors. -2

Under the auspices of the Federation of British Industries, so a selected number of A.I.F. members of various engineering and allied trades, visited two industrial centres of the country and viewed workshops, factories, steelworks and other industrial concerns. The tour, lasting from February 24th to 1st March, was highly instructive and appreciative letters have been sent to the Federation.

161 applications were received during the period now being reviewed, 280 passed to 5.D. and 38 rejected.

### Agriculture.

Satisfactory progress has been made in arranging for Motor Tractor experience and an offer has been received from Hereford for 12 men to be placed immediately.

Messrs. Massey, Harris Ltd., have offered to take 10 men for experience in assembling their agricultural machinery.

Good progress has also been made in arranging openings on farms and offers to take men have been received from 20 high class sheep, properties in Lincolnshire.

15 men have been sent to the Co-operative Wholesale Societies Farm at Wisbeck in Cambridgeshire for experience.

Openings were found for 20 men on good cattle properties in North Devon.

By arrangements with Headquarters, A.I.F. Depots in U.K., a party of 50 officers and other ranks, specially interested in stock, was sent to visit the Shorthorn Show and sale at Crewe and later the Clydesdale Show at Glasgow and Shire sale at Birmingham.

During the period under review 184 new applications were received, 251 passed to 5.D. and 59 rejected.

#### General.

Lieut. Hill proceeded to Egypt as Liaison Education Officer on the 27th February 1919.

Captain Pavy (Education Officer, London) and his staff were transferred to the strength of Administrative Headquarters, A.I.F. from 27.2.19.

5 other ranks were added to the strength and two other ranks struck off.

# 4. 1.D.3. Non-Military Employment (Industrial).

Six men actually placed.

Recommendations for 14 men sent forward to 5.D

As a result of personal canvass offers of employment for 274 men were received, for which only 77 suitable applications (540) are held.

Practically an unlimited number of skilled rivetters can be placed. No unskilled men can be placed as Unions object although we have many such applicants.

General Engineering. 27 men recommended and applications sent to 5.D. 14 men put out towork.

Electrical - Aeroplanes - Motors. Prospects satisfactory.

Motors. 21 applications to 5.D. 21 men placed.

Aeroplanes. 11 applications to 5.D. 8 men placed.

### Industrial.

Unions in Sunderland, Jarrow and Newcastle districts interviewed re placing men in shipyards, with satisfactory results; Union officials offer no objection and will afford every assistance and agree to our placing a limited number of men in the Trade which afford employment.

Few cases in which Unions have objected to our men entering trade have occurred and are being satisfactorily dealt with.

#### General.

During the week only 192 applications were received, showing falling off compared with 334 and 900 for previous two weeks.

195 applications were recommended and sent to 5.D.

Men are steadily arriving from France and being placed in employment. 136 being put out this week.

Up to the present 1547 applications have been recommended of which 502 have actually commenced work.

A few minor difficulties after placing the men have occurred. otherwise the scheme is working smoothly.

- 6. On this chit (Specimen B attached) 5.D.2 Chief Pay Office, Basement, Monck St.) will take necessary Finance action with Paybook, etc. and the man then proceeds to his Non-Military imployment.
- If the soldier finds that his application has already NOTE. left 1.D.2 or 1.D.3 when he first calls there, he is merely handed the "ur cent" chit, signed by one of the above Officers (per specimen A), and the man takes the same course exactly, until he catches up with his 540 and takes it on, as above.

# Repatriation & Demobilisation Department.

Progress Report by Branch 1 D. for week up to, and including 28th March, 1919.

1. 1 D.

At a Conference held on the 7th inst., the question of the appointment of Area Officers to supervise personnel on Non-Military Employment was discussed, and a scheme drawn up, which has now been approved by the Director-General, and applications for these appointments have been called for.

Various rulings were obtained and promulgated.

Checking and submitting applications for decision carried on.

Appendix "A" shews the total number of applications dealt with in Branch 1 D., to date, under different headings.

The number of re-considered cases to date are 75 for discharge elsewhere than in Australia and 8 for Early Repatriation, of which 73 and 8, respectively have now been approved.

2. 1 D 1.

Early Repatriations.

148 new applications received during the week, a decrease of 72 over last period.

Rolls of "approved" and "not approved" applications were issued - 133 and 87 respectively.

Discharges.

358 applications received during the week, of which 83 are new applications.

Leave. Non-Military Employment etc.

During the period under review, 52 new applications were received, 51 passes issued, 40 men called up. 204 approved cases on hand, waiting for men to report.

Returns - B213, Records etc.

Daily and weekly Returns promulgated.

3. 1 D 2.

Educational.

Books were issued to 5th Division, London, Rue Havre, U.K. Depots & Southall.

Books indented for during the week - 145.

During the period 19th January to 7th March, 1919, 564 packages of Books and Stationery were sent to Units in France.

Correspondence Courses.

4 Students were notified that Scholarships had been awarded to them, and 15 fresh Scholarships were requested from the I.C.S.

Universities.

Steadyapprogress was made in placing men at Universities and Colleges. The number of applications received still keeps up,

but with the final term of the British University session fast approaching, it will not be easy to find suitable courses

after the next few weeks.

Vacation courses have been arranged for most of the men now placed. The Easter vacation of the Scotch schools differs from that of those in London, so most of the students at the London Day Training College are taking this opportunity to inspect schools at Edinburgh and Glasgow. In many cases University students have submitted recommendations from their lecturers advising a course of reading to make up in part for the earlier weeks of the session which such students had missed. In general, reports received from Colleges are highly satisfactory as to the men we are sending them; and many men have expressed high appreciation of the personal interest they are receiving at their Colleges.

Applications for study in France are increasing. It is still possible that this educational opportunity may have

important influence upon Australian teaching.

The Chairman attended the Imperial Committee of Education as representative of this Service, on 26/3/19, and a meeting of the Committee of the Council of Legal Education and the American Education Commission on the same date. On 22/3/19 he had a long conference with Dr. Siegfried of the French Mission to Australia, regarding educational work, for A.I.F. men in France. Dr. Siegfried will now take up the representation of this Committee in France.

At the request of Lieut-Colonel Amery, Under-secretary of State for the Colonies, the Chairman telegraphed to Sydney University in regard to a proposed new Scholarship scheme for British soldiers inclusive of some ordinarily domiciled in the Dominions. The scheme is not yet complete, but will have the support of Australian Universities as it has the co-operation

of this Service.

## Technical.

In view of the large number of men now reporting here in connection with their applications, interviewing byall subsection officers has been very heavy.

The Licensed Surveyors course now being held at Southampton is well under way, practically all students selected

for same having reported.

The Topographical Courses for Qualified Surveyors with H. Qrs. in the same city has now been running for some weeks and results to date are very satisfactory.

Major Webb returned from his visit to the Industrial

centres of the NorthernCounties on the 25th inst.

Lieut. Williamson returned from Leicester on the 21st having interviewed Mr. Edwards, Water Engineer, who agreed to take another of our men. The Professor of Architecture at the Technical College was also interviewed, and promised, subject to finding a suitable instructor to start a special class for about 15 students in Building Construction.

#### Agricultural.

The work of finding further openings on farms etc., has been continued with successful results.

Lieut. Mailler returned from Dorset with definite promises for 15 men, and later visited an excellent property in Sussex and made arrangements for the placing of six men.

Lieut. Creed continues to make satisfactory progress in Lincolnshire and has forwarded a further 12 completed guarantee forms.

W.O. Wright visited the Salvation Army Farming Colony at Leigh-on-Sea, Essex and made preliminary arrangements for placing 30 men for experience in Orchard and Nursery work, Dairying and Stockraising. Mr. Wright returned to Scotland to work the County of Aberdeenshire, W.O. Yeomans visited the districts surrounding Tamworth and Northampton and returned with guarantees

of 10 places and holds out prospect of placing a large number of men in these Districts.

"Pool" - For the purpose of interviewing the men sent to Parkhouse on the Pool System it is proposed to send an Officer to Parkhouse at regular intervals. With this view two visits have been paid to Parkhouse and have resulted in the placing of a number of men whose cases required investigation and allaying a good deal of discontent consequent upon unavoidable delays.

Agricultural Tours. - A party of 20 officers and O.R.s from the Depots assembled on the 25th instant for a fortnight's

tour under the direction of Capt. Joynt, V.C.

A party of men awaiting the opening of a postponed course at Halifax Technical College, have been given the opportunity of studying markets for overseas produce in London.

In this connection visits have been paid to Smithfield Meat Market, Hides and Skins Warehouses and Wool Stores.

#### General.

The total authorised expenditure for period ending 22nd March, 1919, amounts to £10,211. 1. 5.

Arrangements have been made for Lectures to be given in U.K. Depots.

One Officer and three other ranks were added to the Staff during the week, & One other rank struck off.

The arrangements have been completed for a complete course for 100 men in Motor Engineering (including practical experience of haulage work in London). Suitable applications to fill these courses are held and the men asked for.

Work in this section is proceeding satisfactorily. For number of mon dealt with the factority of 1.Dr2.

Building Trades & Miscellaneous.

#### Building Trades :-

32 Applications recommended. 31 men actually placed.

#### Miscellaneous.

116 applications recommended. 124 men actually placed.

#### Industrial.

During the week visits were made to Glasgow and Edinburgh and the Unions connected with general engineering, coach making, ship-building and printing trades were interviewed. The only trades that are anyway satisfactory at present are coachmaking. The Unions agreed to give us whatever help they could, but in view of the large number of men out of work in the district, (47,000 in Glasgow alone), we cannot hope to do much in these localities.

All branches of Unions connected with shipbuilding in the Humber district will afford every facility for placing our men.

The industrial position has greatly improved, which will considerably lessen the difficulties in placing men in the various trades.

#### GENERAL.

During the week 300 applications were received. 396 applications recommended to 5.D. and 296 men were actually sent out on their jobs, making a total of 1,300 men now out at work.

Itmis interesting to review the figures up to date. Up to the end of February, 1352 applications had been recommended, of which only 366 had been sent out to employment. During this month alone the humber of recommended applications amount to 1155, making a total in all of 2507. 934 men have been placed on their jobs this month.

During the week, 426 civilian suits were issued for men going out on N.M.E., also 486 suits of overalls and 366 sets of tradesmen's tools were supplied.

Special efforts are being made by personal canvass to place applications for men for whom, up to the present we have been unable to find employment.

# SUPERVISION OF MEN IN NON-MILITARY EMPLOYMENT

1/3/19

The following report was submitted by this Branch in relation to supervision of men in Non-military employment:-

- 1. A.I.F. Education Service cannot maintain a large inspectorate owing to expense, lack of personnel, and time occupied.
- 2. Supervision should, however, be exercised in the following ways:-
  - (a) Occasional visits to centres as mentioned in paras 4, 5 and 6 below.
  - (b) Sending of instructions to men through employers or institutions wherever possible.
  - (c) Requiring periodical written reports from men.
  - (d) In the event of the appointment of Area Committees they should be supplied with lists of men employed in their area.
- I.D.2 and I.D.3 should co-operate by using the same methods of supervision as far as possible, the same visiting personnel, and should exchange lists of men non-militarily employed.

# 4. University Branch - I.D.2.b

- (a) Monthly reports from men required to be countersigned by Registrar, tutor or similar officer. Form as in appendix A.
- (b) Report in detail required at end of course with particulars of examination held or certificate obtained.
- (c) Co-operation with representatives of other educational services (e.g. American) by arranging for same representative to look after needs of students of both services.
- (d) In the cade of organisations such as a University a visit at least once a term of a representative of I.D.2.b. This representative to visit other men employed in district.

# 5. Technical Branch - I.D.2.c

- (a) Monthly reports from men countersigned by employer, Secretary of Institution or Firm &c and to be in form of Appendix B.
- (b) A full and detailed report, similarly countersigned at the end of each course.
- (c) Representative of I.D.2.c making arrangements for placing new men to visit all A.I.F. personnel in immediate vicinity as well as those being trained with same firm.

(d) District Superintendents of the O.U.T.C. to be asked to keep in touch with and assist members of the A.I.F. employed in these districts and for that purpose to be supplied with all available information. District Superintendents to be asked to report in special cases.

# 6. Agricultural Branch - I.D.2.d.

- (a) Fortnightly Reports countersigned by employer and in form of Appendix C.
- (b) Report in detail required at end of course of employment or experience.
- (c) Representative of I.D.2.c. on tour for making arrangements for placing new men to visit all . A.I.F. personnel in immediate vicinity.
- (d) Frequent visits to be arranged by O.C., A.T.D., at Sutton Veny, to men farmed out in neighbour-hood.
- 7. To guard against overlapping each of these branches I.D.2.b., c and d. is to keep the other two branches informed of proposed visits of inspection and personnel in particular district.
  - (a) Programme of visits will be circulated to other Branches 4 days before commencement.
  - (b) List of other Sections' personnel in District to be received 2 days before commencement.
  - 8. Employment Cards are to be kept in accordance with Office instructions issued separately. In addition to these monthly summaries of any special feature in reports sent in will be made. In particular these summaries will aim at putting on record any experience of value to trade or Industry in Australia.

## IMPERIAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE

# 6/3/19 Meeting held at Adastral House, Blackfriars

# Extension of British Grant to Officers & Men Domiciled in Oversea Dominions Serving in British Imperial Units

Lt. Colonel Amery having been introduced by Lord Gorell proceeded to explain the present position in regard to the extension of the British Grant in aid of Officers and men of like educational standard, domiciled oversea and serving in British Imperial Units or in Contingents paid by the British Exchequer, also the extension of the scheme to enable British Officers and men to study at oversea Universities.

The scheme as at present outlined would extend the grant to:-

- (1) Officers and men domiciled oversea serving in British Units or Contingents paid by the War Office to enable them to attend British Universities.
- (2) A limited number of officers and men of the Forces of the United Kingdom and domiciled there who desire to attend oversea Universities.

Proceeding he stated that Lt. Commander Hilton Young, M.P. was dealing with the matter on behalf of the Board of Education and that the scheme had to be considered by the Home Affairs Committee of the Cabinet of which Mr. Fisher was Chairman. Lord Milner had endorsed his recommendation on the Minute and there was every hope of the Scheme receiving approval. He explained that while the scheme provided for the training of oversea Officers and men at British Universities still there might be exceptional cases which would receive special consideration and if the Committee thought the circumstances warranted such a course he thought that an oversea Officer or man who had served in the British Forces or in a Contingent paid by the War Office might be permitted to study at an Oversea University other than in his own Dominion.

He suggested that immediately the scheme had received approval an Army Council Instruction should be issued setting forth in detail the scheme.

Several Oversea Representatives thought that an Official announcement should appear in the press immediately sanction was received. Therewas usually some delay in the promulgation of an Army Council Instruction.

Lieut. Colonel Amery stated that in order to expedite the preparation of the Army Council Instruction Lt. Commander Hilton Young, who had been delegated by Mr. Fisher to carry out the details connected with the working of the scheme would place at the disposal of the Committee any information required.

He further hoped that the Imperial Education Committee would undertake the work of investigation and decision on all applications.

Lord Gorell explained that the Committee at their last meeting had agreed to this.

Unanimously agreed that the Colonial Office and the Board of Education be asked to each nominate a representative on the Imperial Education Committee.

Capt. F. J. Sutton asked if it was understood that the South African Oversea Contingents were eligible for the Grant.

Lieut. Colonel Amery replied that if the scheme received the approval of the Home Affairs Committee members of the South African Contingent would be eligible for the grant; such grant to be available at British Universities. In special cases and where the circumstances warranted such a course the grants might possibly be made available at oversea Universities.

Capt. Sutton expressed his appreciation at the broad spirit of this decision.

After further discussion it was agreed that the various Dominions should prepare a brief survey giving concise information as to what facilities their respective oversea Universities could provide. Such information to be included in an Army Education Circular.

Major Thomson, Australia was of opinion that a large number of Officers and men domiciled overseas and who were eligible for the grant would elect to go to oversea Universities.

Lt. Burt, Canada, stated that quite a large number of Canadians were serving in the British Army and Air Force, and he hoped that something would be done to allay the present discontent existing among such men who felt that having enlisted in the British Army they werebeing penalised. He was glad to hear that the scheme would grant certain facilities to these men, hitherto denied to them. A general discussion followed.

Lt. Colonel Army Amery explained fully the various points raised.

#### Board of Agriculture Scheme

The question as to the present scheme of the Board of Agriculture in regard to scholarships being similarly extended was next discussed and whether if such a concession was granted the Board of Agriculture would deal with the applications.

Lt. Colonel Lascelles thought that it was only fair that such extension should be made, but as the training for Agriculture would take place in Universities and Colleges the scheme as explained by Lt. Colonel Amery should embrace this subject.

Lord Gorell stated that this would mean candidates making application direct to the Educational representatives without reference to the Board of Agriculture.

Lieut. Colonel Amery agreed and concurred in the opinion that application for agricultural training at Universities should come within the scheme.

Major Thomson, Australia enquired if it was premature to ask what was the limit in connection with the scheme as affecting oversea Universities.

Lieut. Colonel Amery in reply stated that 500 scholarships or alternatively an annual expenditure of £1,000,000 was proposed.

## Navy & Air Force

Lord Gorell pointed out that some members of the Air Force certainly of the Navy probably would be eligible for grants under this scheme and that this Committee only spoke for the Army.

Lt. Colonel Amery stated that it would be of great advantage to have only one deciding body.

Lord Gorell accordingly proposed that a representative from the Air Force and the Navy should sit on the Committee. Unanimously agreed. Decided accordingly to write to the Air Ministry and the Admiralty asking them to nominate a representative.

# Composition of Committee after Repatriation of Oversea Forces

Major Thomson, Australia, asked what was to be the composition of the Committee after the oversea forces had been repatriated as the present educational organisations of the Dominions would not be available.

It was suggested that educational representatives attached to the different High Commissioners should when the time came, form the Committee in conjunction with the representatives of the War Office, Admiralty, Air Ministry, Colonial Office, and Board of Education.

Lieut. Colonel Amery stated that he hoped to havea definite answer in connection with the scheme before the end of next week.

At this stage Lieut. Colonel Amery left the meeting having been thanked for his attendance.

Procedure in regard to consideration of applications under this Scheme

Unanimously agreed, that each Dominion should through its representative separately consider applications from candidates eligible under the foregoing.

That the Dominion representative should recommend or otherwise such applications to the Imperial Education Committee.

Lord Gorell proposed that a Sub-Committee consisting of Lieut. Colonel E.F.W. Lascelles (Vice Chairman), Board of Education Representative, Colonial Office Representative be appointed with power to act to deal with all such recommendations in accordance with the general principles decided on by the Committee. After discussion unanimously agreed.

## Canadians in the Air Force

Lieut. Burt asked that the Air Ministry should be approached with aview to the release of a large number of Canadians in the Air Force.

Lord Gorell stated that he had represented the matter to the Air Ministry and that he would again take it up with them.

## Workers Educational Association

The Secretary reported that 20 vacancies at the Oxford Summer School had been allocated to the Dominions.

Agreed that the 20 vacancies be accepted and that the Association be thanked for the offer.

#### UNIVERSITIES.

28/2/19 to 6/3/19

Lt. E.V. Clark visited Oxford and made final arrangements with Mr. S.M. Burrows to act as its representative in all matters requiring personal enquiry and negotiation with the University and Colleges. Mr. Clark also enquired into the work being done by men already placed at Oxford, and received very satisfactory reports. He found that accommodation at Oxford is now extremely limited.

The Chairman visited Manchester University and saw the Vice-Chancellor and a number of the Professors in the interests of the Committee's work. Manchester is also becoming crowded with British students, and has not yet received all its staff back, so that it is in difficulties with the teaching but is willing to receive more A.I.F. University students.

Fuller information from the Australian Universities with regard to their students on active service continues to reach the committee and is facilitating its work.

7/3/19 to 13/3/19

The week brought a considerable number of personal enquiries about courses open to men who can do work of University standard, and there have been some favourable indications of the success being attained by the men already placed. The Teachers at the London Day Training College, and the law students at the lectures of the Council of Legal Education, and the Sociological students at the London School of Economics (Univ.of London) seem particularly well occupied. Their requirements are sometimes difficult to meet. Summer courses are being arranged in various important centres, and proper arrangements for vacation study are proving to be possible. The willingness to help being shown by the British Universities is gratifying, and so far is providing adequate means.

14/3/19 to 20/3/19

This week was marked by a satisfactory increase in the number of students applying for courses. There was also an increase in the number of personal enquiries. A great many have submitted their cases for advise, which, sometimes, was difficult to give, even with the information now accumulated by this Branch.

The American Army Education Commission has made A.I.F.
Law students its guests at the special vacation courses of
lectures arranged for Americans by the Council of Local Education.
Dr. R.C.Mills, author of "The Colonisation of Australia" has
become Honorary adviser to A.I.F. students attending the school.
Professor John Adams of the London Day Training College is
taking particular interest in the Australian teachers, with
very helpful results. Professor Ashley of Birmingham is
interesting himself in the extension of courses of men who
began as Overseas Scholars.

21/3/19 to 27/3/19

and Colleges. The number of applications received still keeps up, but with the final term of the British University session fast approaching, it will not be easy to find suitable courses after the next few weeks.

Vaction courses have been arranged for most of the men now placed. The Easter vaction of the Scotch schools differs from that of those in London, so most of the students at the London Day Training College are taking this opportunity to inspect schools at Edinbugh and Glasgow. In many cases University students have submitted recommendations from their lecturers advising a course of reading to make up in part for the earlier weeks of the session which such students had missed. In general reports received from Colleges are highly satis-

factory as to the men we are sending them; and many men have expressed high appreciation of the personal interest they are receiving at their Colleges.

Applications for study in France are increasing. It is still possible that this educational opportunity may have

important influence upon Australian teaching.

The Chairman attended the Imperial Committee of Education as representative of this Service, on 26/3/19, and a meeting of the Committee of the Council of Legal Education and the American Education Commission on the same date: On . 22/3/19 he had a long conference with Dr. Siegfried of the French Mission to Australia, regarding educational work, for A.I.F. men in France: Dr. Siegfried will now take up the representation of this Committee in France.

of State for the Colonies, the Chairman telegraphed to Sydney University in regard to a proposed new Scholarship scheme for British soldiers inclusive of some ordinarily domiciled in the Dominions. The Scheme is not yet complete but will have the support of Australian Universities as it has the co-operation

of this service.



#### TECHNICAL

8/2/19

The number of Forms 540 received by this Section again shows reduced figures, the number of applicants recommended being in excess of applications received.

/3/19

The Licensed Surveyors course at Southampton was under way, though some delay occurred in the students reporting from France. The Topographical course for Qualified Surveyors will be under the arrangement and organisation of Lt. Ewing, 4th Aust. Pioneers, in charge of the course; Major Wolff and Lt. Peel of the British Ordnance Survey Dept., will be instructors for the course.

Under the auspices of the Federation of British Industries a number of selected members of the A.I.F. representing in civil life various engineering and allied trades made a visit to two industrial centres of the country, availing themselves of the hospitality and facilities offered for viewing workshops, factories, steelworks and other industrial concerns. The tour, starting on Feb. 24th and terminating on March 1st, was highly ibstructive and interesting, and appreciative letters of thanks have been forwarded to the Federation for their kindness and generosity in promoting and arranging the tour.

The number of forms 540 received during the week shows a considerable increase over the previous week's figures, and is in excess of the number of applicants recommended by the Section for the period undew review.

3/3/19

Under the new arrangement whereby forms are first passed through Records for verification before distribution a valuable amount of time is saved, and the liklihood of a form finding its way to the wrong section materially reduced.

The degree of efficiency reached by this section in the prompt dealing with all applications received has been maintained, and the closer working relationship reached with other sections, particularly 1.D.3 has considerably reduced, practically eliminated, any duplication of work.

With the comparatively large number of men now placed, the pressure of work in this section has greatly increased, both as regards the additional office work required and the necessity of keeping in close touch with the various firms, institutions etc. where men are placed.

Licensed Survey Schools: Lectures commenced on Monday 10th with about 40 students in all. All 5 Instructors are now at the School.

Lt. Thorpe visited Messrs Samuel White & Co., Ltd., Shipbuilders amd Engineers, at their works on the Isle of Wight on the 8th, with a view to placing applicants for experience in Marine Engineering and Shipbuilding. A number of other firms and Institutions were also visited.

A steady flow of incoming forms continued during the week, the total reached being a considerable increase over last weeks figure. With the increased number of men reporting from France on "Pool" interviewing from all Sub- Section Officers was exceptionally heavy.

Major Webb left for the Northern Counties of England on 14th inst., in order to visit the several Institutions, firms etc. where members of the A.I.F. have been played, and to call upon Educational Institutions Workshops, Firms and Factories with a view to procuring additional openings for applicants.

Lt. Williamson proceeded to Leicester on the 18th insta, in order to make further arrangements for the placing of Architectural and Civil Engineering students.

It is proposed that the first party should be replaced every six weeks by a fresh class and so on.

a good deal of discontent consequent upon unavoidable delays



Thirty students under Instructor Harrison visited farm belonging to Lord Bath and inspected shorthorns and Jerseys. Ploughing in operation - seed bed for potatoes. Two Instructors visited Horse Sales at Salisbury on 18/3/19.

A lantern lecture was given by Capt. Barton on 18/3/19 in Y.M.C.A. No. 4 Camp, 1st T.B. subject "The Dairying Industry in Australia". There was a large attendance.

L8/3/19 to 35/3/19 General lectures embracing all aspects of Australian Agriculture were delivered regularly to personnel drawn from No. 1 Command Depot and No. 1 Training Brigade. Owing to Boat Rolls and projected early closing down of No. 1 Command Depot, there was a general falling off in attendance this week. It is hoped that this phase of activity at the A.T.D. is drawing to a close, for regular students are beginning to arrive. On the last Weekly Summary there were only 25 students. This week the total enrolled students of A.T.D. was 41, made up as follows:- Officers 6, N.C.O's 12, Men 23. As these however desire a wide range of subjects, regular courses in set subjects have not yet been commenced, for the regular students are only a few in number (with the casuals from the Depot.

During the week a party of four Officers and eight other ranks proceeded to London to visit the Massey Harris Works, Covent Garden, and Smithfield Markets. Sgt. Hern, Wool Instructor, visited Bradford Technical College, Mills etc, to get in touch with Australian students there and to co-ordinate the work in the two, so that our work may be a more fitting preparation for future students.

Instructor Hughes attended the Bee-Keepers' Conference in

London and gained much information that will be of service in his instructional work here and in Australia. Instructors challis and Kerr visited Kent to arrange future visits for classes of students to visit orchards etc. in that County. Much useful information was obtained.

A very valuable addition to the supply of lantern slides was made during the week, so that there is now a first-rate set of slides on practically all branches of Agriculture - practical and scientific. Two films of Ayrshire Cattle are on loan to the A.T.D. and arrangements are in progress for their screening.

Subjects on which lectures were given while waiting for students inckuded: Bee Farming, Veterinary Science, Viticulture, Water on the Farm, Wool Classing, Fruit Growing, Sheep Herding, Irrigation, Hints to Settlers, Shoeing, Agriculture, Agricultural Co-operation, Wheat Growing, Market Gardening, Dairying, Ailments of stock, Funigation of Fruit Trees, Horses, Mixed Farming, Fungus Diseases, Stock, Padtures and Fodder Crops. # EDUCATION WORK IN FRANCE

# 3.19. SUMMARY FOR WEEK ENDING 15/2/19

#### ENROLMENTS

The attached table shows an increased enrolment in two Divisional Groups, and in six other units. The total decrease in enrolments is 350, well accounted for by activities of Demobilization, Influenza and the movement of Units.

#### TEXT BOOKS

Four Unit Libraries per Division are being sent from London to meet the needs of Brigade and Divisional Classes. A shortage in text books in Australia is advised; men due for Demobilization have been acquainted of this, and are obtaining necessary books through the Education Service.

#### CORPS CENTRAL SCHOOL - RUE

The Education Service has arranged for the recognition of the Matriculation Examination to be held at Rue about the middle of April, as a qualification for entrance to Australian Universities. Approximately 440 students are in attendance.

#### CORPS TECHNICAL SCHOOL - JEUMONT

The excellent organisation and enthusiasm of the Staff and Instructors continue to ensure a very high standard of work. A Unit Library of Technical books is in operation; classes in architectural drawing will be in operation this week.

#### AUST. BAKERIES - ROUEN

Owing to the energy and personal interest of Major Prior, the course of instruction reveals an excellent standard of work. The number of students is 107.

#### SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

Visits to Local Industries. Agricultural Schools for a six week's intensive study, an Arts & Crafts Exhibition in 3rd Division; Unit Newspapers in 2nd Division, First-Aid Classes in 1st Division, the extension of the plan of lecturettes followed by discussion - are a few of the features of special activity. A further co-operation of E.O's and C.O's will arouse the interest necessary to ensure the success of many similar activities, such as Debating Societies, Mock Parliaments, and - with the splendid facilities of the Reference Library - Study-Groups and Study-Circles on Historic, Economic and Social Subjects.

#### UNIVERSITIES de TRAVAIL. (2ND DIVISION)

The attendance has increased to 250; new classes have commenced during the week, and the quality of the work remains at a high level of efficiency.

#### BRIGADE & DIVISIONAL CLASSES

The establishment of Brigade classes in 2nd Division has led to an increase in enrolment: Group Schools in 3rd Division record satisfactory results. In preparation for the amalgamation of Units, the establishment of Brigade Classes is ensuring a continuity of instruction.

# SUMMARY FOR WEEK-ENDING 22/2/19

The attached table gives an analysis of the total enrolments in classes in A.I.F. Units France for the week ending 22/2/19. The decrease shown is directly due to the process of Demobilisation.

## /3/19 BOOKS & STATIONERY

Large supplies of these requirements have come to hand during the week both from London and G.H.Q., including a quantity which has been delayed in transport since early in December last.

Four Unit Libraries are in course of transport to each Division: in addition, supplies of Camps Library Books have been delivered to Divisions, thus forming the nucleus of Unit Libraries of novels and magazines which are being extended, in many cases, by the addition of books purchased from special funds.

## STUDY CIRCLES, LECTURES, LECTURETTES ETC.

A large extension of these valuable systems of education has taken place. In one Unit of 1st Augt. Division fourteen lectures were delivered by members of the Unit during the week. As an effective means of bringing the majority of members of the A.I.F. in France to face, and duly consider, the important problems facing Australia as a nation at the present time, these systems of study cannot well be surpassed.

#### EDUCATIONAL VISITS

During the week 200 Officers and other ranks visited Waterloo and 170 Officers and other ranks were conducted round Brussels under the auspices of the Education Service A.I.F. In addition large parties under Divisional arrangements were conducted through Factories and other centres of industrial and educational interest in the Sambre Valley.

These tours are keenly appreciated and are a definite source of useful instruction.

#### GENERAL

Although a decrease is shown in the enrolments, the average attendance tends to gradually increase, with the result that it may be confidently assumed that the instruction afforded is as effective, if not more so than at any previous period.

# SUMMARY FOR WEEK-ENDING 1/3/19

1/3/19

The attached table gives an analysis of the total enrolments in classes in A.I.F. Units in France. Compared with the previous week a decrease in enrolments of 1057 is shown. This is chiefly caused by the progress of demobilisation. In addition the enrolments in the 3rd Aust. Division have been seriously affected by the transfer of the 3rd Pioneer Bn. to Havre for duty, and in the 4th Aust. Division the movement to the new area has accentuated the normal decrease.

It is to be noted that the departure of drafts does not necessarily proportionately reduce the number and variety of duties and fatigues, but rather tends to increase the percentage of men in a unit so engaged. In view of this fact, it is interesting to note that for the week ending 25th January, approximately 19.5 % of the total ration strength of the Divisions were under instruction, and the average attendance was 60 % of the enrolments.

For the week ending 1st March, with approximately 33 % less men available, 21 % of the total strength of the Divisions were under instruction, and the average attendance was 80 % of the enrolments.

#### BOOKS & STATIONERY

Ample supplies are now available and deliveries are satisfactory. There are now four Unit Libraries, each containing 120 books of wide interest and great utility, available in each Division.

#### LECTURES

In order to assist men not attending classes, efforts have been made to greatly extend the system of lectures and study groups. In the 2nd Aust. Division a comprehensive scheme embracing lectures on:-

"Land Prospects in Australia"

"Demobilization"
"Man and Woman"

"Development of Modern Europe"

"Psychological Aspects of the Causes of the War"

is in operation.

In the 3rd A.I. Brigade a series of 10 lectures on Agricultural subjects has been drawn up to be delivered to the whole Brigade. In the 3rd Aust. Division this scheme has been in operation for some time in connection with Agricultural Studies, and general lectures are a feature of the educational activity in all Divisions.

#### VISITS

Large parties continue to visit Brussels and Waterloo, and the conducted visits to Factories and other Commercial centres continue to excite great interest.

#### GENERAL

Divisional Conferences of Education Officers (or where this is impossible Brigade or Group Conferences) are being encouraged as an effective means of successfully overpowering the growing difficulties of the work. The arrival, belated though it unavoidably was, of the Divl. Edn. Officers' box cars will greatly assist in the ordinary administrative work.

In classes in A.I.F. Units in France for the week ending 8/3/19, in spite of the departure of drafts for repatriation, an increase of 78 compared with the previous week. Substantial increases are evident in the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Aust. Division, while the 4th and 5th Aust. Divisions show an decrease, due to the fact that these Divisions were on the move to new areas.

Taking the five divisions as a basis, the actual number of students enrolled in classes is 22 % of the total ration strength, and the average attendance is 81 % of the enrolments.

#### BOOKS & STATIONERY

The position in regard to these supplies still remain satisfactory. The sale of Text Books from the various Branch Libraries still continues, thus indicating that the desire for self improvement is not tending to decrease, but rather to increase.

#### LECTURES

The organisation of lectures on useful and interesting topics is meeting with marked success. It is noted that the use of a set of well chosen lantern slides greatly enhances the interest in a good lecture. The lecture on "The New European Republic" - the "Czechoslovaks" by the Rev. Hampton-Boyd of Canada was most favourably received.

#### VISITS

In addition to the weekly parties to Belgian Cities, arrangements have been made, through the co-operation of the Canadian Y.M.C.A. for 20 members of the A.I.F. to accompany their conducted tours to Ostend and Zeebrugge.

#### NON-MILITARY EMPLOYMENT

Personnel from A.I.F. Units in France is now being steadily withdrawn for Non-Military Employment in England. The departure of such men unfortunately, in many cases, seriously affects classes in operation, but in general, it has been found possible to overcome any temporary dislocation of work.

#### A.I.F. AGRICULTURAL DEPOT SUTTON VENY

A first allotment of 200 vacancies for this course was made to A.I.F. Units in France during the week. This allotment was easily filled, and the successful candidates are being despatched with drafts through Havre.

Further allotments are expected from time to time as the shipping congestion in England decreases.



# WEEKLY SUMMARY

/3/19 to 5/3/19 The attached table gives an analysis of enrolments in classes in A.I.F. Units in France for the week ending 15/3/19. Compared with the previous week a decrease of 1,722 is shown. This is due to the process of demobilisation and attendant circumstances - movement to new areas - withdrawal of personnel for Non-Military Employment etc.

At the present stage of demobilisation, a rapid decrease is inevitable. As each quota is accompanied by an Educational Staff of sufficient strength to meet the requirements of instruction within the Quota, it is expected that the work commenced in France will be resumed in the Camps in England and on board transports en route to Australia.

The Corps Central School Rue - Corps Technical School,

Jeumont and the various Divisional and Brigade Schools continue
to function effectively.

Courses of lectures both by visiting lecturers and volunteers from the Units continue to maintain their interest and utility, while organised educational visits are fully availed of by all ranks. Brussels, Antwerp, Louvain, Bruges, Ostend and Zeebrugge are visited, under the direction of selected guides by large numbers from the Corps each week.

In view of the adverse conditions at present prevailing, the general state of Education throughout A.I.F. Units in France is satisfactory.

#### EDUCATION WORK IN U.K. DEPOTS

### REPORT ON WORK FOR FORTNIGHT ENDING 1/3/1919

1/3/19

Education Officers - Lt. H. J. Moore, and 2/Lts A. C. Ross and J. P. Tuke, returned to duty from the Imperial Overseas Teachers' Conference, on 22nd February.

Lieut. H. J. Filshie (M.C) - Due for early Repatriation, as an Undergraduate, sailed as Education Officer on the Troopship "Anchises" on 28th ultimo. His place, at R.B.A.A., Heytesbury, is being filled by Lt. R. B. Coleman, a student of the Agricultural Training Depot, pending the opening of the latter.

Instructors - A further list of Promotions for Instructors appeared in List 110. G.O.Cs A.I.F. Depot Orders of 22nd February.

Personnel in Depots - The congested state of Depots continued duringthe period. On 16th February there were 1273 Officers and 28000 other ranks in Depots. On 1st March there were 1120 Officers and 28000 other ranks. Only two Troopships left during this time.

Classes - The increase of enrolments continues, mounting from 1163 on 15th February to 1442 on 1st March. The largest individual total is enrolled in the four Sub-Depots of the No. 2 Command Weymouth - total 431. The delay in sailings has operated favourably in allowing a certain continuity of personnel, and of Instruction. The Electrical Engineering School at Weymouth, for instance, was sufficiently advanced to instal the electrical fittings in one of the Y.M.C.As.

Lectures - Largely increased. Sixteen were delivered by visiting Lecturers, and Lt. Bushell's Lectures on "The Problem of the Pacific" and "Into your hands Australians" were specially well received. By inside Lecturers (Officers and other ranks) at least twelve were given, Apart from the Agricultural Training Depot (see below) and numerous Parades dealing with Demobilisation questions. Attendances varied from 20 to 800. Total attendances at Lectures in No. 1 Command Depot for the week ending 1st March were 2240. This aspect of Depot work deserves a special emphasis, because it affects a far larger personnel than the classes, although the EXERGEN results are not able to be tabulated.

Study Circles & Debates - These are on the increase and have a value above the mere statement of their occurrence. Some of the subjects treated were: - "Should New Guinea belong to Australia" "Industrial Conditions", "Decentralisation of Ports & Industry" "Total Prohibition".

Library - Sales still increasing. A total of 483 books, representing a value of £61 were sold in the first week of the period, and 477 books, value £48--12--0 in the second week. Highest individual Depot totals were No. 4 Command Depot, Hurdcott, and No. 1 Command Depot, Sutton Veny, with just under £20 each, in one week.

Agricultural Training Depot - Personnel for this school was still unable to assemble during the period. Instructors were, however, kept very busy with Lectures in No. 1 Command Depot (31 in one week) and surrounding Depots (11 in the O.T.B. in one week). Three visits were organised to neighbouring farms, with an attendance of over 30 each time. On the 24th February, 100 men were called for, from Depots, to attend the Agricultural Centre, but their actual assembly falls outside this period.



Troopships - Excellent work has been done in organising activities for the voyage. In anticipation of an authorised service on board 2/Lt. Kelso, Early Repatriate from France, was appointed Education Officer for the "Orca" sailed 19/2/19, and Lt. Filshie M.C., for the "Anchises", sailed 28/2/19. Classes for the "Anchises" were prepared in three Depots; for the "Orca" at No. 2 T.B., and for the "Darbyshire and "Euripides" at No. 1 C.D.

Publicity - This work continues to be one of the main activities of Education Officers, and takes up a good deal of time, but it probably impresses the individual more than anything else, that the Education Service has something to give him.

Imperial Overseas Teachers' Conference - This was largely attended from Depots, and was of great educational value to the members. Appreciative reports from some of the latter have already been forwarded.

Non-Military Employment - A large number of applications were received during the period for the visit of inspection to Stud Farms and Sales near Birmingham and Crewe, for the A.I.F. Courses in Telegraphy, Telephony and Radio-Telegraphy, several for the Surveying Course provided by the Service, and a large number for the months course of Instruction on the Shearing Machine and Petrol Engine, provided by the Wolseley Sheep Shearing Machine Company.

New Work - (a) Telegraph Classes have been started at Monte-Video and Littlemoor Camps, Weymouth, with equipment obtained on loan from the G.P.O. by the Technical Branch of the London Office. A similar class already existed at Westham Camp, Weymouth, and Heytes-bury.

- (b) A.D.H. Extension Parkhouse The work started here in the early part of the month has progressed well. 85 students are now enrolled, and a weeks books sales amounted to just under £6.
- (c) The difficult question of supplying Motor Instruction to the large number of applicants has been partly met by sending 20 men from other Depots to the well equipped Motor School at Weymouth, for a month's course. It is intended, periodically, to send 30 men to this School.

Insufficiency of staff and the brevity of this period of the School naturally curtailed the efficiency of the work done at Tidworth. The most useful and instructive part of the course was that furnished through the kindness and courtesy of the League of Empire, London. On the 7/2/19 the School transferred to London. ## EDUCATION ON TRANSPORTS

The following instructions were adopted for education work on Transports (General Instructions No. 15, para, 59):-

In future each Embarkation Quota will include Service Personnel, on the following scale:-

1 Education Officer.

10 N.C.O. Instructors (which may include 1 Warrant Officer).

1 Sergeant or Corporal Clerk.

1 Private.

Such Educational personnel will be selected by Divisional Group Commanders on recommendation of Divisional Education Officers who will keep a Precedence Roll in accordance with instructions issued separately through Education Service.

Names of Education personnel, together with identification of the particular quota, will be notified as soon as selected for that quota, to Assistant Director of Education, Australian Corps for transmission to Director of Education, A.I.F.

Immediately after arrival at Depot in United Kingdom, the Education Officer will report to Assistant Director of Education, Headquarters, A.I.F. Depots in United Kingdom, Tidworth.

The Assistant Director of Education, Tidworth, has authority to nominate Officers or detail instructors to complete Education Service establishment on any transport, to the following scale:-

1 Education Officer
1 Warrant Officer ) (per 600
3 Sergeants ) Instructors (on (Board ) Office and Library.
1 Sergeant )

In the event of any vacancy in Establishment, the Officer Commanding Troops will detail an Education Officer or N.C.O. Instructors up to above scale for the period of the voyage.

The Officer Commanding Troops will, so far as the exigencies of the voyage permit, allow not less than four hours per day, between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. to be devoted to Education, and will make suitable provision and grant facilities for the holding of classes and the giving of lectures.



# SECOND VISIT TO BRD. AUSTRALIAN DIVISION (25-2-19)

1/3/19

Demobilisation activities have had a disturbing effect on the educational work of this Division.

Almost the whole of the Pioneer Battalion is now employed at Havre in the erection of huts for the demobilisation camps, and this has brought to an end the very excellent technical classes which were in operation under Pioneer instructors and supervisors.

The first embarkation quota has left the Division, and its departure reduces the 10th Brigade to about 600 men. Those who are expecting to go in the next quota cannot avoid a natural feeling of unrest which interferes with the regular and progressive work of the classes. In spite of these difficulties, however, there is a great deal of very excellent work still being done.

At the Divisional Train I saw the students of the 3rd Course in Agriculture working on the same lines and with the same syllabus as that on which I reported last month. At the Divisional Train there is also a Cookery School of about 18 students. The men are studying all grades of the Art, commencing with rough cooking over an open fire, and dealing with the Soyer Stove, camp oven, and the ordinary stove of a household. They also receive instruction in the cooking of pastry, and in other cookery work useful in civil life.

Another Agricultural School composed of students of the 11th Bde. is being held under the supervision of Lieut. Hamblin of the 9th Bde. This course is one of three weeks, and provision is made in the syllabus for instruction and lectures on wheat growing, sheep farming, poultry keeping etc. Many of the students in this School and also in the School at the Divisional Train, are applicants for admission to the Sutton Veny Training Farm.

A very good course in commercial subjects, including bookkeeping and accountancy, shorthand, typewriting etc. is being held in the 11th Brigade under the direction of Lieut. Maddeford, 44th Bn. andLieut. Purchas 43rd Bn. The work of the students in this School is of a very high standard.

A good supply of telephone and telegraph apparatus has been obtained from Abbeville, and Lieut. Trudgian of the 41st Battalion has gathered together a fine class of postal and railway employees, who have already reached a high standard of work.

A School in general subjects attended by 70 students of 11th Bde. H.Q. personnel is making very good progress, and is very fortunate in having the services of a Sergeant Instructor who is an M.A. Sydney. This school also provides for elementary instruction under other qualified teachers.

At the 41st Battalion medical examinations in connection with demobilisation prevented me from seeing a number of the classes at work - one small class in motor mechanics being the only one in operation.

The 40th Battalion has obtained from 3rd Army a good, second-hand petrol engine, which the class has taken down and put together, and which is giving the best possible facilities for studying the internal combustion engine.

In response to a telegram from Corps H.Q. I visited Dieppe on the 23rd inst., and found five Ford Vans for the Divisional Education Officers at No. 43 Aux. Petrol Coy. The drivers who were being sent from Corps Headquarters had not arrived, but I left written instructions for one of the cars to be sent to H.Q. of the 3rd Div. at Blangy, and for the others to proceed to their destinations in the Charleroi area. The arrival of this car will assist Captain Symons very greatly in the supervision of the classes in the Division, and will enable him to render much more help than he has been able to hitherto.

### NON-WILITARY EMPLOYMENT

up to date this Division has forwarded 1,131 applications for non-military employment, and has received approval for 130.

### VISIT TO H.A. BRIGADE

On the 28th February 1919 I visited the 36th Heavy Artillery Brigade at Tourgoing, and met the Commanding Officer Major H. C. Bundock, and the Education Officer, 2nd Lt. J. J. Forster.

Nothing very satisfactory can be said regarding the educational work with this Unit. The Education Officer was appointed very recently, and has not had time to organise the work of his unit. Owing to the inability to obtain Text Books, suitable rooms, furniture, blackboards etc., it was stated that the men lost interest in the proposals. In addition to this fact the technical stores have now been handed over, and orders are expected for a move to the 2nd Div. area.

I think the most fruitful field for activityn with this unit is in the direction of technical education, and I have made various proposals of this nature to the Commanding Officer and the Education Officer.

According to the last report the following classes are in operation:-

#### VISIT TO AUSTRALIAN RAILWAY UNITS

In order to find some of the smaller extra Corps Units I called on the Australian Paymaster, Boulogne, to obtain the latest locations. On arrival, however, at some of the places given, it was found that certain railway units had moved to other localities.

i was able to see No. 3 Light Railway Operating Company at Lomme, under Capt. L. C. Leslie, and the Broad Gauge Operating Company at Courtrai under Lieut. H. E. Cockram - the C.O., Major W. James, being on leave.

Most of these railway units are at work, and the personnel are unable to spend any time on educational work outside their own occupations. At Courtrai arrangements exist for firemen in the work of engine-driving, and students are able to pass the necessary examinations and to undertake more advanced branches of their work.

Demobilisation is proceeding satisfactorily. One small quota has already left these units, and organisation is complete for the continuation of the normal procedure.
