APPENDIX I. TO THE WAR DIARY DECEMBER

At about 0830 on the 10th Dec 1918 I received information of the shooting of a N.Z. Soldier by the name No 65779 Tpr Lawry by a man suspected as being a Bedouin I immediately gathered up all available Police, and in company with Lieut Trennaman 3rd A.L.H. Regt, together with eight (8) of his Troop, we hurried away in the direction of the 1st N.Z. Machine Gun Lines, where the murder was committed. On arrival there I met Capt W.C. Cobb of the 1st N.Z.M.G. Squadron, and II/978 Cpl Carr C.H. of the 1st N. Z.M.G. Sqdrn., the latter being chief witness in the case. After hearing the circumstances of the case we proceeded in the direction where foot prints were showing. We followed up the foot prints right up to within 100 yards of the Village of Surafend. After this no traces of the foot prints were observed, in consequence of the culprit having crossed the road leading to the Village, but we proceeded onwards to the place, where we halted in order to place my Picquets, composed of men furnished by Lieut Trennaman, so that the place would be well surrounded, the carrying out of the search being entrusted to members of my Police. Prior to the search Major Montifiore A.P.M. P.L.of.C. was on the scene and I interviewed him and informed him of what had occurred I then got my Police to carry out their duties, but previous to my bringing them to the spot I had them all paraded and cautioned ~~thamxx~~ each and every one of my Police that no unjust carryings on against the caste and feelings of the People of the Village were to be enacted, their duty being purely to search the inhabitants and not violate or destroy, or to commit an act likely to bring about crime on themselves, the main object being to trace the culprit or any suspected person who was responsible for the murder of the Soldier.

At 0930 on the 10th Dec 1918. the Police commenced to search the Village and found no trace whatsoever of the culprit, or even any other individuals suspected of the crime. The only material clue, was that of a Native Cap (Similar to headgear worn by Bedouins) which was picked up by a mate of the deceased, and handed to me by Capt Cobb. This was found on the scene where the Soldier was shot and killed.

Later in the afternoon I sent Lieut Fyfe to obtain footprints impressions made of plaster of Paris, which he has done. The specimens taken are those of the man's left foot.

Subject :- The burning of the Village at Surafend,
and the Bedouin Camp South of Richon Le Zion

At about 2030 on the 10th Dec 1918., I received a telephonic message from Major Walker D.A.Q.M.G. to the effect that the Village of Surafend was ablaze. I immediately organised a group of my Police, comprising in all 13 men, together with a portion of the Town Picquet and Duty Troop with their respective Officers, and the whole of us, in company with Capt Stevenson G.S.O.3 of this Division, Lieut Fyfe A/D.A.P.M. and I proceeded to the Village of Surafend. On arrival there I found the Village in flames.

The N.Z. Mtd Troops were patrolling the outskirts. I then went across to the Bedouin Camp South of Richon and found that the place was also in flames. Quite a number of N.Z. and Imperial Troops as well as a few Australians, were in and around the Camp. I saw no Soldier committing an offence to warrant his arrest.

I entered with my Police and ordered all Troops out, which they did, but the lot assembled at the South end of the Camp. At this spot I addressed the men in a few words and advised them to their respective Units, and they immediately complied with the order.

I noticed several of the men were armed, some with revolvers, some with rifles, while others had sticks in their possession. After seeing that everything was clear I surveyed the Camp and discovered the whole place was in a total wreck. There were three (3) Bedouins (Males) killed and two (2) Bedouins (Males) wounded. I communicated the result of these to the N.Z. Field Ambulance, and two (2) Medical Officers were soon on the scene of action. I pointed out to them the dead and wounded. Then I left the Duty Troop Officer Lieut Tremaine 3rd A.L.H. Regt, and his men together with a couple of my Police to guard the Camp, and to give whatever assistance that was required of them.

After this I proceeded back to Surafend Village in company with Capt Stevenson, and my Police, and on ~~arrival~~ my return to this Village I saw no visible sign of any Soldiers in or about the place

CONTINUED.

As far as practicable I searched the Village throughout, and it was then still in flames. I found here the dead bodies of five (5) Bedouins (Males), and five Bedouin Males wounded. During the interval I sent a message to the 2nd A.L.H. Bgde Hdqrs requesting for the attendance of a Medical Officer at Surafend. It was not long before he arrived. I pointed out to him the dead and wounded and he took charge forthwith. I left a couple of my Police to render whatever help they might be called upon for. I also sent a message to the Duty Troop Officer to return with his men to D.H.Q. Camp, just leaving two (2) of my Police to look after the Camp.

As far as my observation went I could not trace any signs of cruelty, or an act of brutality done to women or Children at either of the places burned down, but I noticed many of them huddled up together in places.

Lieut Fyfe A/D.A.P.M., and four (4) others of my Police were sent away early this morning to make further enquiries, with the result that on arriving at the Bedouin Camp, found the place was picquetted by the N.Z. Bgde. Lieut Fyfe made a search through the Camp and found the bodies of four (4) Male Bedouins. He then proceeded to the Village of Surafend, and found that place was also picquetted by Lieut Trelow (3rd A.L.H. Regt.) Officer in charge, in company with the latter Officer Lieut Fyfe searched the Village and discovered dead bodies of ten (10) Male Bedouins, and about seven (7) Male Bedouins wounded. Lieut Fyfe immediately communicated with the 2nd A.L.H. Bgde, and N.Z.M.R. Bgde Field Ambulances. Major Montifiore A.P.M. P.L. of C., and Capt Mc Kay. Deputy Military Governor of Ramleh then arrived. Lieut Fyfe pointed out the wounded to the Military Governor and returned to D.H.Q. with Major Montifiore, leaving the Police there to assist, awaiting further instructions.

In company with Major Montifiore I visited both the camp and the Village The Muktah these informed me that no children or women were interfered with.

The Picquet were still doing duty as per instructions.

SWIMMING.

188. No parties will go swimming, except under an Officer, who will see that necessary precautions are taken to prevent any accidents.

LIGHTS OUT.

189. All lights must be out by 2215.

HORSES.

195. A number of loose horses are continually straying about the lines and on crops. This must be asex. Attention is again drawn to G.R.O. 4514. reference clipping No horses are to be clipped.

ROADS.

196. In order to prevent the whole area becoming cut up and dusty, and to preserve parade and sports grounds all ranks are instructed to do everything towards keeping to the marked roads.

Units will detail Traffic Police in their own area to assist in this.

CROPS.

197. Troops are again warned against riding or walking over cropped areas. Where roads are necessary, authority can be obtained from this office to put them in.

FOOTBALL MATCHES
AND SPORTS
MEETINGS.

194. When these are held in the Divisional Area, Troops are instructed not to go mounted, owing to the Traffic and congestion. The Units from which teams concerned are drawn will detail patrols to see that this order is carried out, and that authorised roads are adhered to.

All sports grounds should be marked by a sign showing to which Units they belong.

The Field Squadron will supply signs on application.

TIMBER.

192. No Waggon are to be sent to RAFA for timber except under a responsible N.C.O.

APPENDIXV. TO WAR DIARY JAN 1919.

The following Routine Orders are republished
for information and necessary action.

THREATS BY CIVILIAN INHABITANTS.

G.R.O. No 4349 is cancelled and the following
substituted.

1. No Civilian or Egyptian, Arab, or other Nationality, other than those serving with the Egyptian Expeditionary Force in an authorised employment, will be permitted to enter any Barracks, Camp or other Military premises.
2. Round all such premises a cordon will be drawn within which no unauthorised person will be allowed, and the General Officer Commanding Formation, or Officer Commanding Unit (In case of isolated Units) is responsible that this cordon is effectively maintained.
3. In the vicinity, but outside such cordon, market places will be established by the General Officer Commanding Formation, or Officer Commanding Unit, as the case may be, at which fruit, eggs, etc may be sold, only by persons who are in possession of a pass signed by the Military Governor of the area and counter signed by a Staff Officer of the Formation, or the Adjutant of the Unit concerned.

ROADS D.R.O. 168.

Units will take steps to have all roads in their areas marked by mounds of earth on both sides. Traffic is to be confined to roads so marked, or where signs are erected.

Short cutting over clean, or ploughed ground will be severely dealt with.

BOUNDS. D.R.O. 169. ALL Villages are Out Of Bounds, except to Men on duty, or leave, provided with a pass stating clearly reasons for such.

GALLOPING OF HORSES ETC. D.R.O. 171.

All unnecessary galloping of horses, and other Animals must cease forthwith.

WATERING PARADES D.R.O. 173.

All parties must be organised under an Officer, Straggling must not be permitted.

DRESS. D.R.O. 174.

Every opportunity should be given all ranks to smarten up. Hair is still being worn too long, and Men are going about unshaven.

Daily inspections must be held to ensure general neatness. No one is to leave the Divisional area unless correctly dressed.
