#### APPENDIX."A".

#### THEFT OF ARMY ANIMALS.

During the whole of the period of the Division's stay in Tripoli, considerable trouble was caused by the illegal possession of Army animals by the natives. Several instances were brought to light wherein notable members of the village communities were in possession of horses or mules, the property of the British Government. In nearly all cases the animals had had the hoof numbers remo filed out, the British shoes removed and Turkish or natives horse sh shoes fitted to the animals. The brands had been tampered with, and in every way the animal was made to appear as unlike an Army beast as possible. At the same time horses and mules were taken from horse lines during the night, and owing to the animals being kept in stables during the daytime it was indeed very difficult to obtain traces that would lead to the recovery of them. Again there was a great number of captured animals with the regiments and other units, and these were stolen in almost a wholesale manner. With these the recognition was almost impossible if they were seen. After the sale of captured animals in the town, other animals were branded by the natives with the 'C reversed', similarly to the mules and other animals that had been sold by auction, and in this way, it is surmised that many animals that had been previously stolen were made to appear as if they had been legally purchased. It was decided that an organised raid be made on villages in order to, if possible, recover many animals that were believed to be concealed in sheds, and this was done, resulting in the recovery of six (6)

mules and one horse. One native was handed over to the Military Governor in this connection, but we were not informed what action was taken, altho' application was made several times, but to no avail.

APPENDIX "B".

#### MURDER OF NATIVE WOMAN.

On the morning of the 11th a native woman was found dead near the lines of the Divisional Train. The body was found in a garden of a small hut near the camp. The Civil Police being cognisant of this went to the Divisional Train and had a parade of the Egyptian personnel employed with the company there, (37th), They had a small child, daughter of the dead woman, and they wished to discover if the girl could recognise any of our natives as one who had been seen in company with her mother the previously. No result attended this parade as the girl was unable to identify any of our natives. I was informed of this afterwards, the Civil Police not notifying me prior to their asking for this parade. The following day a second similar parade was held and this time the child picked out a native driver as one who had been in the company of her mother a few days previously. A court of enquiry was held on 13th inst. and after hearing the evidence of all the witnesses they were of the opinion that the native driver picked by the child was no way connected with the death of the native woman. The civilian authorities were notified of the court and its finding, and they expressed themselves as satisfied in every way with the manner in which the matter had been dealt with.

At about 2030 on the 29th. inst. I wason duty in the public Womens Quarters when I heard shots being fired I at once went in the direction of the sound, where I saw Sergt. Kinsley M.M.P. who was giving chase to the above named soldier, I Followed him over the railway line, where he turned and fired at me three or four times with a revolver. I at once pulled out my revolver and fired; he dropped

to the ground. As I appreached him he again ran, eventually "he" was caught by the Mounted Patrol. I then conducted him to the XXX Military Police Barracks where it was found that he had been wounded in the right arm, an ambulance was phoned for and he was conducted to the 26th. Stationary Hospital where he was detained.
