
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



The process of weeding out had been continued and 8 unsittable men were struck off the strength General. An issue of police whistles has been made throughout the Cairo and Canal Zone Detachments on the 25th. to enable men to call for assista nce when necessary in the course of duty. The Detachment sare all well reported on by their Os.C.; the Desert Mtd Corps Detachment was split up during the last week of the month and posted at various places along the Jerico road between Telat ed Dumm and Ghoraniyeh Bridgehead. Its duties were to dimect and control traffic along the road, assist in the evacuation of Prisoners of War, and police the town of Jericho. The usual Appendices on the work of the other Detachment are attached to this volume. Very few cases of disciplinary action against members of the Corps occurred during the month, there was one F.G.C.M. and two cases were tried by the C.O. The record of Arrests and Charges for the month has been lost, but there does not appear to have been any unusual amount of crime in Cairo and there is no record of any disturbance. C. O. CIRCULAR MEMORANDUM NO 12. REFERENCE: - Alleged illtreatment of No 2033 Tpr MITCHELL, 9th L?H?R? by Australian ProvostbCorps.

It is known that exaggerated rumours have been circulated in regard to the above case. A board of enquiry was held consisting of:-

12th L.H. Regt., Major F.G. GRIFFITHS? A.A.M.C., Capt: F.G. CODE. 9th L.H. Regiment. Major A.E.D'ARCY

The Finding, together with the evidence of Dr John WARNOCK, Mental expert to the Army for the Cairo District and Captain M.M. RODGERS?R.A.M.C., and Trooper MITCHELL'S own statements are appended.

1st WIRNESS: Captain M.M.RODGERS, R.A.M.C. being duly swonn, states:-

"The report (procuded) made by me on the 7-3-18, is identical with Mitchell's condition on that date, with the exception that the two abrasions on the right cheek then mentioned, weee, upon further examination, found to be old scars. It would not be uncomman for a mental patient to show fear or apprehension when being approached or handled. The emotional disturbance caused by his getting into trouble may have caused the sudden breakdown. Had there been marks of violence I should have noticed them, for I made a thorough examination of Mitchell.

"Mitchell has steadily improved from his admission here, but he is still of unsound mind and I am not yet able to say what is the nature of his disease. I have never seen a patient such as Mitchell, whose mental breakdown has been traced to ill treatment. His condition, when admitted to "M" Special Hospital was some form of acate mania. I have known other cases in which the onset of acute mania was as sudden as in Mitchell's case, judging from reports."

2nd WITNESS: John WARNOCK M.D., Edinburgh, B.Sc. M.R.C.S., England, O.C. "M" Special Hospital, and Mental Expert to the Army for Cairo District, being sworn, states:-

"Assuming that the man Mitchell had a previous good character, and then suddenly made use of insubardinate z remarks when spoken to, and them immediately afterwards offered violent resistance, it appears to me that the mental attack was developing when he made the insolent reply. The arrest made it mare evident, and caused more rapid developement. His resistiveness when being placed in the cell and his resistiveness when admitted here, were so much in harmony one with the other to make one conclude that it was due to entirely the same cause- mental defection. The apparent suddenness of the attack would be nothing extraordinary. It is quite a comman occurrence for the symptoms of acute insanity to devlope in one hour or less. Later on we may be able to diagnose his case, but at present it is not possible. In my opinion it would be improbable - even impossible - that a man should develope insanity from any injury which he had received within two hours, or even a longer period. There is usually an incubation period of a day or so between the date of the injury and the obvious outbreak of insanity. His symptoms are not different to those observed in cases of insanity not due to injury. They are consistent with a non-traumic causation,"

ALIAN 9,2033 Trooper MITCHELL 9th L.H.Regt, makes the following statement:-

"I remember giving the insolent answer to the sentry. I remember afterwards falling in, and the Sergeant blamed someone else for the insolence, and I admitted the blame. I remember being ordered into the cells, I think I went to the cells myself. I can't remember the police taking hold of me to take me to the cells. I do not remember any more after I went into the cells. I had always been well treated by the Compound Staff and had a good job there as Mess Orderly. I do not remember being ill treated in any way. I always got on well with the Compound Staff and they gave me a good job. I cannot say what prompted me to make the insolent reply to the Compound Guard that morning. They had not provoked me in any way.

"I do not remember anything from the time I went into the Cell untill I found myself in this hospital,

I am well treated here but would rather go back to the Compound and complete my sentence."

FINDING.

The COURT having due consideration to the evidence as adduced, are of the opinion that no further evidence is needed, and are arrived at the following conclusions:-

(1). That the Compound Staff of the Field Punishment Compound, Moascar did not treat Trooper MATCHELL with

harshness or undue violence.

(2). Medical examination on several occasions on the 5-3-18, and since, proved that MITCHELL did not, and does not show any signs maximizes on his body or head, that he has been treated with violence.

(3). (a). That the reports of Tprs AXELSEN AND GANZER were based on false conclusions.

(b). That they inferred - and wrongly - that certain things were occurring, without being in a position to see.

(c). That according to their own evidence, what they actually saw and heard is insufficient to support the charge they made.

(4). That Tropper MITCHELL'S insanity is of natural origin and not the result of any injury received on 4-3-1918.

(5). The evidence is unanimous in showing that, owing to MITCHELL'S particularly good behaviour, whilst serving the early part of his sentence, he was treated with unusual leniency.

On arrival at Khurbet Karade the prisoners were sent straight on to await our arrival at Shunet Nimrin. D.H.Q. and N.Z.M.R. Brigade moved from Khurbet Karade at 1500 and marched to Shunet Nimrin,(127 P.23.a.) where a halt was made for the night. Escort with three prisoners did not rejoin. Brigade police employed in policing bad portions of the track, guiding Units into bivouac Areas and regulating watering traffic on arrival of Brigades at Shunet Nimrin. | |

Strict attention has been paid to the orders governing pollution of water, damage to crops, trading with natives and interference with inhabitants of the town. Brigade police have been emplyed in their own areas on thusual police duties which have been satisfactorily carried out. Duties of Bridge Post at Ghoraniyeh.

*1. There will be 4 men on duty by day and night, one man on the bank at each end of each bridge, hours to be arranged

PALIAN by N.C.O. in charge. Men must be armed and properly dressed.

2. All traffic proceeding East over the Jordan will cross by the barrell bridge, and that proceeding West by the Pontoon bridge, unless one bridge is under/repair, when all traffic will be directed over the sound bridge. Eastward moving traffic will have preference, except in the cases of ambulances bearing wounded and despatch riders. 3. Not more than two animals will be allowed to cross abreast, and there must be at least one man to each pair of animals.

4. No civilians are to cross Eastwards, unless provided with a pass signed by an Intelligence Officer or a Staff Officer.

5. All armed or suspicious looking civilians crossing Westwards will be handed over to the N.C.O. i/c Post who will have them interrogated by the I.O. stationed at the bridge. If the officer is absent they will be detained until his arrival.

6. The N.C.O. i/c Post will be held responsible that these orders are carried out.

Subsequently Para 5. of the above was cancelled and the following substituted:-

All natives, whether men, women or children, armed or unarmed, crossing the bridge Westawards at any hour of the day or night are to be detained at the bridge until the following evening, when the Intelligence Agent on duty will collect them and escort them to Jericho. This hative will leave the bridge between the hours of 1600 and 1700 daily.

Report on the Detachment at Ayun Kara.

A number of men from the 52nd Division were in the town of Ayun Kara without passes, and were creating April 1st. a disturbance. It was impossible to arrest themall, so they were collected and escorted out of the town in batches. About 20 arrests were made during the afternoon.

Still a large number of men of the 52nd Division in town without passes. The same procedure as yesterday was adopted, and about 14 arrests were made in the evening.

3 arrests made of soldiers creating a disturbance in the town.

Special patrols placed on the town on the occasion of Baron Rothschild's visit. All quiet. Later two suspects were arrested and brought to the office where one of them drew a revolver with the evident intention of using it. On this being taken from him he drew a knife and attempted to stab one of the police. Both suspects were handcuffed and chained up.

Native referred to above forwarded to Military Governor at Ramleh under polo ce escort, charged with attempted murder and carrying concealed arms. Large sums of money also found on these men were forwarded

Wire received from A.P.M. Ramleh that Moustafa Mahomed, the native charged with attempted murder,

has escaped. Police instructed to keep a shrp look out for him.

2/Lieut Cowen and \$9 police, accompanied by a Yeomanry Detachment of 3 officers and 34 O.Rs., raided & village of Beit Dejan (071.L.24.c.). Three camel loads of Government Property were collected and brought to Ayun Kara. Nine natives were arrested and vrought in to be questioned as to arms and ammunition in the village.

Three more natives arrested at Beir Dejan, as one of the menarrested there on the 14th gave their names as being in possession of arms and ammunition. Still holding all natives arrested as hostages, as no rifles or ammunition have so far been brought in from the village.

Questioned all natives arrested at Beit Dejan, but could get no information of value. Released 3 with instructions to exeport back tomorrow with arms and ammunition. Released another native at 1730 with

similar instructions.

Raided Arab village on the outskirts of Ayun Kara and obtained a small quantity of Government Prop-

erty.

A camel load of Military goods was brought in from Beit Dejan, consisting chiefly of sacks, also

two old revolvers, Remainder of hostages released.

Raided all Yeminite houses in Ayun Kara and obtained two sacks full of Military clothing etc:.

It is reported that Bedouins are digging up bodies on the old battlefield in this Area. Police

instructed to keep a strick look out.

Capt Watts arrived from Advanced D.H.Q. and took over the Area from 2/Lt Cowen who left for Advanced

D.H.Q. to take over duties as XXXXXXXX A/A=P=M= Anzac Mtd Division.

There was a good deal of i,llicit selling of liquor during the early part of the menth, which was the cause of the trouble with the men of the 52nd Division. Although no arrests have been made in this connection, such a strict watch has been kept by the police that the offenders have been unable to carry on their than trade.

Many cases of Cruelty to animals akve occurred, which have been suitably dealt with by the Auth-

orities.

Market places have been established near the camps where natives can sell goods to troops. This has practically overcome the grouble cauded by matives entering camp zareas. It is, however to be regretted that troops do not avail themselves more of these market places, and thus deprive the natives of any

incentive to enter camps.

Instructions/ re dealing with the inha bitants of Occupied Villages during Operations.

Then advancing through villages in the progress of am Operations, then A.P.M. of the Formation concerned will take immediate steps in conjunction with the Advanced Intelligence Officer, to warn the Headmannthat all the inhabitants of the village must concentrate in the village within 24 hours, and must not leave its preceinsts again until permission to do so is given: and that any person seen outside the village in defiance of this order is liable to be shot.

When it is found necessry to evacuate from a village either certain undesirables, or the whole population of the village, the A.P.M. of the Formation, will, withouthe help of the Advanced Intellgence Officer and the Headman, select responsible villagers to remain in the village as Ghffire to guard the property of those evacuated.

Top avoid subsequent claims, an inventory of the property left in the guardianship of such Ghaffirs should, if possible, be drawn up and signed by the Headman of the village and by the Ghaffir, and a copy should be retained by the A.P.M. The AP.M. will provide such Ghaffirs with a Green Armlet with the letter "G" marked thereon in Red.

APRIL 1918.

Report on Australian Mtd Division.

The first five days of April 1918 were taken up in moving from Deir el Belah to Jaffa. The A/A.P.M. with 6 of the D.H.Q. police travelled ahead of the Division the whole way and took over the bivouac area each night, guided troops into place and controlled traffic and watering.

The Division remained in the Kaffa Area until the morning of the 20th. The police performed the usual duties in all villages and orchards in the neighbourhood of camps. 2 police were sent to Jaffa to do duty under the A.P.M. there.

Everythingnappears to have been quiet and orderly in the Area.

On the 20th the Division left the Jaffa Area and marched to Jericho, arriving there on the 26th. No halt was made at Jerusalem; the Division mmarched through from Enab to Telat ed Rumm on the 23rd and remained there till the 26th. The usual advanced party of police was sent ahead to take over the new bivouac areas. At Telat ed Dumm ally the police were employed on the watering area as the supply was very limited and therewas apt to be considerable conbecation in the traffic.

From the 26th to the 29th babbe police did duty on the Jericho Supply Dump and the Wadi Kelt, regulating

traffic at the former and enforcing orders governing the water supply at the latter.

At 2100 on the 29th the Division mandager moved across the Jordan on Operations and advanced in the direction of Es Salt. Police posts were established along the route for direction of traffic and collection of stragglers.

On the 30th 3 prisoners were received and evacuated. D.H.Q. was at that time about 3 miles W. of Es Salt.

APRIL 1918.

Report on give PALESTINE LINES OF COMMUNICATION DETACHMENT.

Patrols were found throughout the month on dumps and railway lines and villages in the area. Reports were received that a great deal of looting from trains was being carried on by the hatives. To cope withithis the Detachment at Mejdel was moved to Esdud and ordered to keep a sharp lookout for cases of this nature and to try and locate some of the stores and fodder already stolen. The police located a quantity of grain in a Bedouin Camp between Esdud and gukerieh. A raid was organised but, on arrival, the camp was found to be desemted.

Two Bedouind wwere arrested in the village T Simsim for being in possession of Government petrol. They

were dealt with by the Military Bovernor.

On the 30th the Detachment left No 3 Area and moved to Jerusalem, to do prolice duty in the town. A halt was made at Junction Station on the night of the 30th, and Jerusalem was reached on 1-5-18.

The health of the Detachment has been consistently good throughout the month, and the O.C. reports that

all ranks have worked well and carried out their duties satisfactorily.

The condition of the horses is also excellent. There is nothing further to report.
