Copy of letter from C.O. Egyptian Section to O.C. Cairo Detachmente

Arrests for serious offences in Cairo.

with reference to the above, you will, for the future, adopt the following procedure. In all serious cases, such as theft, offences against property or persons, etc:, especially where any member of the civilian population is envolved, or if you consider that a F.G.C.M. will be necessary, or in cases where all the evidence that is available is in Cairo, the prisoners will be taken before the Commandant of the Expeditionary Force Base, either Australian or New Zealand, and they will be dealt with by the Base Commandant, who, if necessary, will take the summaries of evidence and the Courts Martial will be held in Cairo.

It will be necessary for you darefully to examine every case in the future, and I would bring to your notice that mamplaints have been made in the Division during the last few days that in many cases the evidence, as set

down, is found to be insufficient, conflicting, and in some instances quite useless.

It is absolutely imperative that all evidence should be conclusive and corroborative, else, if there is a flaw in the evidence of the police, the case falls to the ground and great discredit in is brought on use You will commence a series of lectures to the Kasr el Nil Detachment on, le The giving of evidence.

2. Framing of charges and so forth, and impress on all ranks the absolute necessity of corroboration in these matters. The A.A.&.Q.M.G., A.&.N.Z.Mtd Division, has authorised the procedure mentioned in the first part of the

foregoing, and you will assist the A.I.F.&.N.Z.Base to carry out the procedure.

If conduct sheets are required in Cairo a telegraphic request should be made to me, and the copy of Crime Sheet and results of all investigations and trials of all soldiers dealt with, should be sent to me for record and

passing to Unit concerned.

You will provide all escorts required to carry out these instructions, and will ensure that they are

correct and smart in appearance and manner.

Please acknowledge receipt of these instructions, which should be conveyed to all officers of the corps

in Cairo and District.

All cases dealt with by the Bases will go through your office.

Report on work done by Field Troop during the month

During my period of duty with the 7th A.L.H. Regiment at MA*ASAID a special course of cavalry drill was carried out, consisting of preparation for meeting hostile cavalry in shock action.

Only one event of importance occursed, namely the inspection of the 2nd L.H.Bgde by Lieut. General Sir P.

Chetwode. When passing my troop he noticed that my horses were in rather low condition and asked me the reason of it.

I informes him that the troop had been attached to the 1st L.H.Regt and had only just come into reserve. He than remarked "Your men and horses have been through it." On the 22nd February I handed over command of the Troop to

Signed P.J.Martin, Lieut, Anzac Provost Corps.

The 2nd L.H.Brigade left MA'ASAID at 0700 on the 22nd February and marched to SHEIK ZOWAIID, the Troop forming part of the 7th A.L.H.Regt. Arrived at Sheik Zowaiid at 1630 the same day and camped there until 0100 on 23rd.

At that hour the Brigade advanced towards KHAN YUNUS. The troop escorted the camels of the 2nd L.H.Field Ambulance as At that hour the Brigade advanced towards KHAN YUNUS. The troop was then broken up into sections to patrol the valley North of RAFA far as REFA, where they halted at 0530. The troop was then broken up into sections to patrol the valley North of RAFA to look for Turkish stragglers and prevent Bedouins from moving towards the Turkish lines, one section being sent to look for Turkish stragglers and prevent Bedouins from moving towards the Turkish lines, one section being sent on outpost to a commanding position between Rafa redoubt and the sea. This duty was continued till about 1200 when on outpost to a commanding position between Rafa redoubt and the sea. This duty was continued till about 1200 when word was received that the Brigade was returning from a reconnaissance in force on Khan Yunus. The troop then escorted the A.M.C. camels back to Sheikh Zowaiid. On arrival there at about 1630 a standing camp was formed on the beach and one section was immediately sent up the beach on Outpost duty.

During the rest of the month a system of reconnaissance patrols was carried out by which the troop formed part of a reconn patrol as far as the enemy's positions near Khan Yunus every other day, small parties of prisoners being

taken from time to time.

Lieut. R.A. ADAMS and proceeded to Cairo.

Report on work done by police of Anzac Mtd Division during month.

RALIAN PROVOST 1-2-17. to 7-2-17. The Division is still in the El Arish area. Discipline is good throughout the Division, except for a few cases of disobedience of Routine Orders prohibiting the galloping of harses in heavy sand, and riding along wire netting Infantry roads. Small parties of prisoners of war are being received daily.

on Feb. 1st orders were issued by the Chief of General Staff, G.H.Q., E.E.F., with reference to espiomage and leakage of information, of which the following is an extract which bears on the procedure to be adopted

in dealing with suspects in the Divisional Aarea:-

The action to be taken in the case of a suspect depends onmcircumstances. As a general principle "far more drastic action may be taken during an advance than during stationary warfare. The following may be taken "as a guide:-

s(a). During mobile operations any civilian in the fighting area on whom the least suspiction rests should "be arrested and handed over to the Intelligence Branch of the Staff, for transference to the nearest G.H.Q., Intelli-

"gence Officer.

"(b). The papers of any person dressed in uniform, of whatever rank, whose words or actions are suspic-"lous should be examined by any officer, N.C.O. or man on the spot. If this leaves any doubt the suspect should be she taken to the nearest British Officer who will be responsible; that he does not escape. If the Officer is not "satisfied he should send the suspect to the nearest A.P.M. or Intelligence Officer, or direct to the Headquarters of the nearest Brigade, Division or Corps, who will have enquiries made.

"In territory which has been occupied by the enemy particular care must be taken to guard against the working of the enemy's espionage system. During a retreat he may leave agents either in uniform or dressed as "Bedouins concealed in native towns or in Arab encampments to observe the movements of our troops, and to communicate

with the enemy by special Bedouin agents told off for the purpose beforehand.

"Carrier pigeons are very possibly employed by the enemy, and may be left in all native villages

or Arab encampments to communicate information over long distances.

"If a man has the misfortune to be taken prisoner, he is not to give any information beyond his sown name and rank. The enemy cannot and will not compell him to say more, though he may threaten to do so, on the "contrary he will respect a man whose courage and patriotism do not fail even though wounded or a prisoner. Erisoners "should be on their guard against any officers dressed as British officers who are employed by the enemy to extract "information.

"Papers of every sort must be burnt before troops move from a billet or bivouac. All chalk or "other marks indicating the units occupying the billets must be removed before departure.

"It is of the greatest importance that every man in the ranks should be impressed with the necessity; "of doing every thing in his powerto combat the enemy's system of espionage, and above all to do nothing to assist "him by carelessness in writing, talking or custody of documents. If circumstances prevent him from giving an evasive "answer to a question such as "Where he has come from, arwhere he is going" he should understand that it is a national "duty to make a false statement, however much he may dislike doing so.

"It is essential that the whole of the information contained herein be communicated to all ranks. "NOTE. Any man coming into our linesor captured, who claims to be on special service for us should

The following is an extract from tepert by A.P.M., A.&.N.Z. Mtd Division for week ending 14-2-17.

"Prisoners of War. During the week 32 prisoners of war have been evacuated through Desert Column.

Railway Crossings and Pipe Line. The police have had some difficulty in enforcing the order? as in many instances Brigades have been located some considerable distance from recognised crossings, as in the case of the 2nd

L.H.Brigade, which is situated about a mile from a crossing. They have however made two crossings over the Pipe Line with sandbags, which are very satisfactory. Application has been made for the formation of a level crossing over the railway line in the vicinity of that Brigade, but at present this has not been done.

The order referred to is a Divisional Routine Order forbidding the crossing of Railway or Pipe lines

by troops or vehicles at any place other than an authorised level crossing.

"General. The various Brigades were visited by me during the week and the police are all carrying out

their duty satisfactorily.

"The Camel Transport units are daily visited and it was found in some places that the lines were dirty a ill kept, but after interviewing the Officer Commanding, the necessary improvement is to be seen.

"Leave to Port Said.

BOUNCES. I visited Port Said during the week and noticed a number of soldiers there on

leave from the Division.

"The placing of the public women's quarters out of bounds appears to me to be; the cause of an amount of crime. Soldiers from the Division, if given short leave, are only able to go to Port Said, and on arrival there fing the women's quarters out of bounds. I would recommend that a certain number of the women's establishments be supervised and placed in bounds, and that soldiers be permitted to make use of the places with in certain hours, as is the case in Cairo, and I would suggest that the hours be from 1600 to 2130 daily, the same as in Cairo."

20-2-17. The 4th Light Horse Brigade has now been formed, and is at Ferry Post on the Suez Canal. In order to start the police of that Brigade on a firm footing three experienced N.C.Os., 1 Sergt and 2 Corporals, are transferred from the Anzac Mtd Divisional H.Q. Application has been made for an increase in the Establishment of the Corps of 1 Sergeant and 9 men to provide a full Detachment for that Brigade. On this being approved, the Detachment will be absorbed into the Corps as has been mone with the other Divisional Police.

The following is an extract from the report of the A.P.M. for week ending 21-2-17.

"I would like to point out that some units are not supporting the action of the police with regard to contravention of D.R.O. against "Galloping in sand.", and when cases are being brought up they are frequently dismissed

whereas a simple admonishment would support the action of the police.

During the week several A.Fs.B.252 have been received from the A.P.M., Port Said for the offence of Out of Bounds, and I would again like to refer you to that portion of my last week's report, recommending that a certain number of licensed houses be placed In Bounds at Port Said.*

On the 22nd the Division moved from El Arish to Sheikh Zowaiid. Police performed the usual duties during the march, namely regulating traffic and watering parades, and a Detachment of the D.H.Q. mise police acted as escort to the D.H.Q. camel sonvoy. On arrival at Sheikh Zowaiid on the night of the 22nd it was found that, owing to the shortage of fire-wood, strict precautions would be necessary to prevent men from looting woodwork, doors etc from the village. The police patrolled the village till a late hour that night and all the next day. On the evening of the 23rd a guard was supplied by the Imperial Infantry for duty on the village which has been placed OUt of Bounds to all ranks, and police patrols will only visit it occasionally.

The principle trouble experienced in this area has been safe-guarding the palm groves from damage by troops as there is a great shortage of wood both for burning and making bivouacs. Police have been

strict in enforcing regulations in this respect and the difficulty is being overcome.

Large convoys of Bedouin refugees and suspects have been taken over by the police and escorted to Desert Column Headquarters at El Burj. A considerable number of prisoners of war have also been dealt with.

In his report for week ending 27-2-17 the A.P.M. again comments on the number of charge sheets for the offence of Out of Bounds recieved from Port Said and renews his suggestion re licensed houses. These suggestions were subsequently adopted.
