

	15.6		On the 1st Orders were exceived to move to a new area, but as Division had commandeere all lorries, no move could be made. The Office Staff moved out early on the 2nd. and reported to D.H.Q., the rest of the	d ·
			Personnel being left to look after stores. No suitable site for a depot was seen, so the lorry returned and parked in Amiens, arrangements being made with Town Major for billets.	
			On the 3rd. further search was made for a depot near the Railhead, other Divisional Dumps being visited. As no Division was moving, arrangements were made with the Town Major	
		124	I arrived back and reported at Divisional Headquarters on the morning of the 3rd, having taken 48 hours to reach there. I then proceeded to find my Staff. I selected three	
			sites for depots on the way, each having good accomposition as store house and billets, with good houses for Offices. I then went on to Amiens and found my Staff in the factory arranged for with the Town Major. As the town was being shelled and bombed, and the factory was a large one	
10			and a big land mark, I gave orders to move to one of theplaces selected by me at Camon. Here the Depot was started. Office opened and D.H.Q. and Units notified.	
			The move from Northern to Southern Base having been approved, indents were passed forward. I made a visit to the last Depot and made arrangements for the stores and men to be	
			gradually brought here. I visited the Gun Park and arranged for the supply of Guns etc. The following day I visited the Divisional Nucleus Camp and Divisional Wing, and made	
			lists of their shortages and arranged for such supplies as I had on hand, to be sent, the outstanding items to be demanded by me. Stores were arriving in good quantities now, but only stores required urgently and	
			necessary for fighting were demanded. The bootmakers were brought down and their shop material was obtained from Blaringhem.	
			The shop was opened here. A second visit to the Divisional Wing, who had been forced to march long distances and changed camps on several occasions, revealed a bad state of affairs with regard to boots.	
			I arranged for four bootmakers to go there with necessary material. This was done, and now there are five men working and keeping the boot question good. Stores from salvage which are in good condition, such as rifles, bayonets and parts

			Lorries are thus kept going with stores for supplying these needs.				
			Lorries proceed to the Gun Park every three days for stores and this trip is a days journey, as are all the places lorries have to go to from here.				
			It has been possible to replace all Lewis Guns destroyed in the line practically immediately, a reserve having been allowed.				
			With Field Guns all destroyed or condemned have been replaced within 48 hours. The situation to day, 3oth., is that there are no guns outstanding of any sort.				
			Captured Trophies:. 3 Large Mininwerfers.				
			All were captured by the 15th. Aust. Brigade and are being prepared for sending to				
			Base to be claimed by the Division.
