

- After this is established the Coy. of the 24th Bn. South of the 2. ANCRE will be withdrawn to BUIRE RESERVE.
- The 23rd Bn. will relieve the Coy. of the 24th Bn. North of the 3. ANCRE tonight. The platoons of the 28th Bn. in old front line posts will be relieved by the 21st Bn. and will withdraw to TREUX Line.
- 4. Other troops stand fast.
- The above reliefs will be completed by 4 a.m. 20th May. 5.

PROPOSALS FOR AN ATTACK TO ENCIRCLE VILLE-SUR-ANCRE

OBJECTIVES.

- 1. (a) Southern Attack. A line from K.7.a.6.0. to K.7.a.
 7.2. to K.7.b.2.7. thence to Road at K.1.d.2.4. along
 Road to CROSS ROADS K.1.b.1.4. thence to CRUCIFIX thence
 to ROAD JUNCTION J.6.b.5.5. This line will be covered
 to the East by advanced posts formed along a general
 line K.1.d.6.3., K.1.d.6.7., K.1.b.8.2., K.1.b.6.4.,
 K.1.b.6.6.
 - (b) Morthern Attack. Approximately a line from E.25.c. 9.9. to E.25.b.7.4., E.25.b.6.7.

THE ATTACK .

2. (a) Southern Attack -- 22nd Battalion.
2 Companies 21st Bn. will form a defensive flank
facing North between CROSS ROADS K.I.b.l.4. and ROAD
JUNCTION J.6.b.5.

(b) Northern Attack. 2 Companies 24th Battalion.

DATE OF ATTACK.

3. All preparations can be completed for the attack to take place on the night 16th/17th May.

ZEBO TIME. 4. 2 a.m. is proposed.

JUMPING OFF

5. For 22nd Sattalion -- A line to be taped from J.12.b.

For 2 Companies 21st Bn. -- 200 yards in rear of the left

ARTILLERY SUPPORT.

- 7. (a) Standing Barrage by one Brigade on our Right flank. Creeping Barrage by three Brigades covering EEnd En. attack.

 Standing Barrage by one Brigade on a line from E.20.a.

 2.0. South to the River.

 4.8 Hows. on selected targets to be notified later.
 - (b) Creeping Barrage to open on the line K.7.a.0.0. to K.1.a.0.7. at Zero, lift 100 yards at Zero plus 2 minutes thereafter lifting 100 yards every three minutes.

 Position of Protective Barrage 200 yards beyond the

line of posts given in para. I above.

Nate of fire during Creep - 3 rounds per gun per minute.

Hate of fire while halted on protective barrage line one round per gun per minute.

Cease fire - Zero plus 120 minutes.

(c) Smoke screens to be put down on high ground North of MORLANCOURT, on VILLE-SUR-ANCRE, and on approaches from DERNARCOURT to VILLE, at Zero plus one hour, and maintained for 2 hours.

HEAVY ARTILLERY SUPPORT

8. (a) Gas bombardment on VILLE and SURKEN ROADS in K.I. about 12 hours before Zero. Gas used should be of small persistency.

(b) Bombardment of VILLE, CRUCIFIX, and SURKEN ROADS from Zero minus S minutes until forced to lift off by the approach of the Infantry.

(HOTE. Similar bombardments should be carried out nightly from now onwards.)

(c) Haximum of counter-battery work from Zero onwards.

(d) Annihilating fire on possible assembly points for enemy counter-attack from Zero plus 30 minutes to plus one hour and at intervals thereafter.

MEDIUM YRENCH
9. One Mortar on M.8's in E.25.d. from Zero to plus one hour.
One Mortar from about D.30.b.7.5. co-operating with North attack by firing on targets N. & H.H. of VILLE.
Remaining mortars on CRUCIFIX and SURREN ROAD at maximum rates from Zero till forced to lift by the advance of the Infantry.

L.T.M.ACTION

10. Two 3" Stokes firing on CRUCIFIX and SUNKES ROAD in K.1.a. from present front line positions from Zero to plus 4 minutes.

Rate of fire.- 10 rds. per gun per minute.

One of these guns will then be moved forward to the GRUCIFIX and the other to about K.1.a.5.3. to cover consolidation and deal with any M.8's firing from VILLE. Two guns to fire on targets in VILLE from the Railway Embankment in E.25.a.

Two guns co-operating with Northern attack, one of them playing on M.8's and M.8's situated at about E.20.centra from Zero.

ACTION.
Such barrages as can be arranged to cover the advance and to prevent enemy guns in and around VILLE coming into action.

Four Vickers Guns will go forward as soon as success signals are observed and of these two will be emplaced on each flank of the 22nd En., to cover the consolidation.

CONSOLIDATION 12. The objectives as laid down in para.1 are to be consolidated by the formation of mutually supporting posts. The construction, the following night, of a Communication Trench from about J.6.b.5.5. (the end of the communication trench now being constructed) to the CRUCIFIX It is suggested that this be constructed by the Pioneer Battalion.

For the Northern Attack, a line of posts along the objective.

MOPPING UP

VILLE-SUR
Sustained throughout the day of the attack will cease

at say 10 p.m.

Then the 24th Bn. will mop up from the N.E. up to the

Northern edge of VILLE; the 23rd Bn. from the West will

mop up as far as the Western edge of the village and

the 21st Bn. (with Tanks if available) from the South

will mop up the village and then form a line of posts

DISPOSITIONS

14. The dispositions will then be.22nd Bn. from Bde. Southern Boundary to K.1.b.5.5. with

trenches of the Right Bn.
24th Bn. will hand over their positions North of the
ANCRE to the 25rd Bn. and move into reserve.
The 23rd Bn. will have two Coys. in the line North of

Reserve at D.23.d.

FINAL DISPOSITIONS (contd.)

This Bn. will be responsible for holding the Bridges over the ANGRE.

It is intended that, on the night 18th/19th, the 21st
Bn. take over the line between the Bde. Southern
Boundary and E.25.d.7.5. and that the 23rd Bn. take over the rest of the line.

The 22nd Bn. East of MARETT WOOD will be in support to the 21st Bn.

The 24th Bn. North & West of BUIRE will be in support to the 23rd Bn.

SUCCESS SIGNALS 15. A succession of GREEN Very Lights.

DISPOSAL OF 16. Prisoners taken will be handed over to the garrisons of the present front line posts. They will then be taken back to the QUARRY in J.S.d. where they will be taken over under Brigade arrangements.

17. Half the attackers will carry tools in the proportion three showels to one pick.

PREPARATIONS.

18. Forsing up tapes will be laid with the co-operation of the 6th Field Coy. on the night of the attack.

Bridges for crossing the ANORE will be prepared, and patrols sent out to ascertain the width of the ANORE at the proposed crossing places.

Bire cutting (as necessary) will be carried out by the Field Artillery under arrangements to be made by the 22nd Bn. Commander through the Liaison Officer at his Hdqrs.

The present Headquarters of the Right Company of the Right Bn. will be enlarged to provide a Battle Hdqrs. for the 22nd Bn.

A Brigade Battle Hdqrs. will be constructed beside the present Right Bn. Hdqrs.

RELIEFS. 19. 21st Bn. will relieve 22nd Bn. on the night 14th/15th. 25rd Bn. will relieve 24th Bn. on the night 15th/16th.

COMMANDING OFFICER'S REPORT ON OPERATIONS
CARRIED OUT AGAINST VILLE-SUR-ANCRE ON
19th MAY 1918.

Prier to the attack the Disposition of the Battalion was .-In the Line from Right to Left "D", "C", &"B"Companies with" A"Company in Support. It was decided that the Battalion's part of the attack would be undertaken by "A"&"B"Companies.Accordingly early on the night of the attack"C"&"D"Companies took ever "B" Company's frontage in the Line, "B" Company was withdrawn into Support, and "A" Company into Reserve, to facilitate reorganisation and the issuing of Ammunition, Bombs, etc. companies were in position well on time - the report to this effect being received at Bn Hqrs at 1.35 a.m., 19th inst. Situation throughout this part of the night had been quiet. The barrage opened punctually and, save for one machine gun firing from VILLE, no hostile fire interfered with the advance. The Left Company reported on Objective; digging in at 2.26 a.m. Machine Gun mentioned above was still firing. McCompany Commander arranged with an Officer of the 6th A.L.T.W.B. to silence it. This was done after 10 Rounds had been fired, and a message to that effect was received at Bn Hors at 2.42 2.m. The Right Company had by this time reached their objective and were digging in but were being troubled by our own artillery fire, especially on the right. This continued until 4.15 a.m. when all Artillery Fire ceased according to programme. Meanwhile, as reports had come in that little resistance had been met with, orders were received from Brigade at 3.45 a.m. to mop up the Village at 4.15 a.m. when all Artillery ent that Sector would be stopped. Orders were immediately issued verbally on the telephone to the Officer Commanding Left Company, with instructions to inform O.C., "A"Company, with whom he was in touch. Written orders were sent at the same time. Owing to the trouble the O.C., Right Company, was having with our Artillery, fire orders did not reach him to time, but a Platoon from this Company was sent in with the third wave of the Left Company, and helped in the mopping up. The Left Company formed up in extended order and got away to time at 4.30 pm. The advance was made by Section rushes in three waves as machine-gun and rifle fire was being directed against us from the Village. Our Lewis Guns and Rifles covered the advance well, and once the attack had been properly launched the maintak-ceased fire ceased. From there on no serious apposition was met with in the Village though there was an abundance of targets. The Company passed through but sent a Platoon back to see that the Mopping Up had been completely effected. They attempted to dig in about 200 Yards East of the Village , but the Company Commanderm, finding that he was under heavy fire from the high ground opposite, decided to temporarily withdraw. This was done by dribbling the men back in twos and threes under cover of Lewis Guns. The Left Company then formed up behind the Church and reorganised Platoons. The Platoon of the Right Company returned through the Village to the North West corner, where there was still some fighting going on. When this was dames cleared they withdrew to their defensive flank position. The Left Company then pushed their Lewis Guns one by one - one man at a time until they had five guns in position South East of the Village covering the approaches and the valley. The remainder of the Company, under cover of these, took up positions in banks near the BIG CATERPILLAR (Sunken Road), where they remained until dark. When darkness made it possible, a reconnaissance was made by the Intelligence

Officer and the O.C., Left Cempany and a line taped out for the Companies to dig in on, with Shovels and S.A.A. which had been sent forward at dusk. This was successfully carried out without incident. Cempanies reported - Dug in, flanks secure, and rations issued by 1.45 a.m.

Numerous prisenere were taken, though, owing to their being handed ever to different Units, as well as our Support Companies, a definite number cannot be given, though a party of fifty and another one of ten are known to have been handed ever to be taken back.

In all 11 Machine Guns were sent back by this Unit, but there were others captured in and near the village, together with 2 Trench Mortars, that could not be salved at the time.

COMMANDING OFFICER'S REMARKS ON OPERATIONS OF 19th MAY 1921 1918 AGAINST VILLE-SUR-ANCRE.

The arrangements for the operation were satisfactory though a few improvements

could be made.

Some trouble was caused through our own artillery firing short, and once more it was shown that, to get the quickest and closest liaison between Artillery and Infantry a system of Very Light Signals should be introduced, partitularly as regards to the lengthening of the barrage.

Also it is recommended that there should be one or more direct lines to each Artillery Group from the Infantry Headquarters, without using the Infantry

Switch Board or Lines.

On account of the light enemy barrage the telephone wires were intact almost continuously, and in addition visual from the Forward Company Headquarters was used. From the Battalien Observation Post the progress of work was recorded every fifteen minutes.

The Mills Grenade No.36 was used very effectively and the new Egg Bomb (No.34) is now preferred by the men to the Mills No.5., though the latter and the

smoke bomb are preferred for clearing cellars and dugouts.

Quite a number of enemy Machine Guns were captured in the Village but as no one was trained in their use a grand opportunity in supplementing our own fire could not be availed of . Even if the enemy M.G. could have been used for A.A. Fire it would have been a considerable . help.

Two enemy Machine Guns were handed over to the 6th A.M.G. Company later in the

morning but not in time to be used offensively.

On account of the possibility of an enemy counter-attack the Company Commanders only fired at close and excellent targets with their L.M.G.s, as they wanted to have the maximum amount of ammunition on hand for any emergency.

A large number of good artillery targets were observed throughout the day, but though frequently reported, they were not availed of in the majority of cases. Prisoners were used in every case to carry down our wounded, but as usual the

supply of stretchersmaners ran out. It is recommended that just prior to an attack a substantial number of stretchers be taken as far forward as possible on the proposed line of evacuation. This would ensure that the early wounded could be evacuated with the aid of

prisoners much more quickly.

This latter means of evacuation generally means that the front area is drained of stretchers as there is not the return trip of the prisoner bearers to take

the stretchers back to the line.


The Officer in charge of the Trench Mertar Battery, by keeping with the Company Commander during the advance was able to deal effectively and quickly with the few enemy M.G.s that were still active after the barrage had passed them. The mopping up of the village was done effectively. Only in one or two cases did the occupants of cellars hesitate, and then the introduction of a Mills Grenade or a Smoke Bomb always effected the required result.

Had it been decided beforehand to mop up the village an hour earlier it is considered a larger number of enemy would have been taken prisoners or killed as it is reported that a large number got away before the barrage was put

down in rear of the village.

INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY.

21st Battalion A.I.F. ---- 2 a.m.19.5.18.to 4 p.m.19.5.18.

OUR OPERATIONS. At 2 a.m. in conjunction with 22nd Battalion on right and 24th Battalion on left our troops launched an attack on enemy positions of VILLE & Southwards. The attack was entirely successful and objectives gained without much opposition by the enemy. Numerous prisoners of 184th Reg. passed through our hands; several M.G.s and 2 Winenwerfer were captured. Our artillery barrage opened to time and effectively covered our advance, neutralising hostile MiG. and artillery activity, but unfortunately when consolidating on final objective, our artillery (18 pdrs chiefly) fell short; necessitating our line being withdrawn 150 Yards. The Right Company consolidated a line of posts as follows -K.1.b.4.5., K.1.b.3.5., K.1.b.2.5., K.1.b.1.5., K.1.b.0.5., K.1.a.8.6., K.1.a.7.6., K.1.a.5.5. Left Company had consolidated a line from CRWCIFIX to K.l.a.O.8. At 4.30 a.m. mopping up parties proceeded to mop up VILLE, from which sniping. & M.G. fire still came. The left Company organised as a line of skirmishers and advanced towards the willage S.W. edge of the village. After a sharp fight the Hun surrendered freely while others bolted. This Company proceeded right through the village (leaving it to be mopped up by the 23rd Bn Party) and attempted to dig in along row of trees at E.26.c.05.30.but owing to heavy M.G. Fire from Ridge to the East this was not possible. Right Company attempted to link up with this Company but it was not possible to dos so during daylight, so the Left Coy withdrew to the Village and reorganised and then established L.G. Outposts well out on the East and South East outskirts, by L.G. Teams crawling out to shell holes. The ramainder of the Company occupied the BIG CATERPILLAR. These dispositions were maintained during daylight but at dusk a line of posts was consolidated from K.1.a.8.6.to E.26.e.0.5 E.26.c.05.30.to E.25.d.90.45., and occupied by 2 Companies having two Platoons in reserve. On our barrage opening Hun fired usual whites, greens, and double reds, and M.G.s opened but soon ceased. His artillery fire was exceptionally feeble until late in the day, when our positions were heavily shelled by all calibres. VILLE & BIG CATERPILLAR in K.1.a. being chief targets. Our casualties were slight compared with results gained Many dead Huns lie on the battlefield whilst our killed amount to only eight. Throughout the day our activity was confined to improving and consolidating our positions. EMENY OPERATIONS .-ARTILLERY. Very poor support to his Infantry during the attack, practically inactive till about a.m. when VILLE & CATERPILLARS, TRUCK & MARRETT WOOD were shelled periodically. M.GUNS. Fired for a few minutes, but soon ceased. From a reconnaissance of the captured positions it was found that all enemy M.G. positions had been correctly located. This reflects great credit on scouts and observers. FLARES. Greens and then Reds were fired by him on our barrage opening apparently his call for artillery support.

AERIAL. Hun was over at times but our planes were most active.

MOVEMENT. A great deal on ridge in K.2.b.& E.27.c.Fired on by Heavies

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





During the aperations at VILLE-SUR-ANCRE on the 19th May, this Officer was

in command of "B" Company.

Early in the morning, having reached his final objective, and hearing that two of his Platoon Commanders were casualties, he went to his Company Flank

and personally supervised the digging in.

Later, having received orders to mop up VILLE he reorganised his Company and advanced into the village. His men were admirably aranged, so that each section was able to cover the advance of the others. Having passed through the village a Platoon was sent back to mop up VILLE thoroughly. Captain MacNeil personally supervised all the positions taken by his men. He was always at hand when most needed directing and encouraging his men under heavy fire. Owing to heavy machine gun and sniping fire his advance platoons were unable to dig in, so he skilfully withdrew his men to the rear of the village where he supervised reorganisation, and then sent out Lewis Gun Posts in front to defend the Village.

Again in the evening, he took the remainder of his Company to a more suitable place, and advanced his Lewis Gun Posts. Here his men finally dug in. As on many previous occasions Captain MacNeil's coolness, courage, and good judgement under most trying and difficult circumstances was superb. His tactical dispositions were such that the best possible effect was always obtainable with the least amount of effort, and with few casualties. His untiring devotion to duty, bravery, and soldierly spirit acted as an unfailing incentive to his men, by whom he is greatly admired,

Lieutenant Robert Kenneth BAZLEY M.C.

On the morning of the 19th inst., during the attack on VILLE-SUR-ANCRE, this Officer was stationed at the Forward Report Centre.

On receipt of orders for the mopping up of the village, he at once went forward and assisted the two Companies in their organisation for that purpose.

Again throughout the day at frequent intervals he went forward, and, on return, rendered an accurate account of the attack and the situation in general to his Commanding Officer.

On his own initiative, he sent a platoon from supports up to act as supports to the Companies engaged in the mopping up of the village.

to the Companies engaged in the mopping up of the village.
Later in the evening Lieut.Bazley satisfactorily arranged the dispositions

of these Companies, and himself laid out a tape for the Companies to dig in on.

Throughout the operation his assistance was invaluable and his marked judgement and tactical skill in his selection of positions were largely responsible for bring ing the operation to such a successful issue.

Lieutenant Harry Neville GARTON.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty.

Whilst digging in between VILLE-SUR-ANCRE and the CRUCIFIX, during the operations of the 19th May, two of the Platoon Commanders of his Company became casualties., leaving in his Company only this Officer beside his Company Commander. He at once took command of the other Platoons and proceeded to mop up the near corner of the village, thus effectively silencing the machine guns which were giving trouble at this point.

Later, at only five minutes notice, he formed up two Platoons as a second wave to assist in mopping up the village. He displayed remarkable coolness

and initiative during this operation.

After clearing the village, his skilful selection of a position for his Platoon and the manner in which he linked up with the left flank battalion were both worthy of the highest praise.

During the day, under heavy fire, he personally assisted in carrying back wounded to a place of safety.

Later he reorganised two platoons and led them to their positions in the Sunken Road on the Right of the Village under heavy shell fire.
Lieutenant Garton's energetic handling of his men under difficult and

trying circumstances cannot be too highly commended, whilst his extreme coolness and personal bravery proved an excellent example to his men.

Lieutenant Stanley James BENNIE.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty.

During the attack on VILLE-SUR-ANCRE on the 19th May 1918 this Officer commanded No.4. Platoon which reached the furthest point of the objective and there dug in. Owing however to this position coming under heavy artillery fire he decided to withdraw to a flank. This he did very skilfully, thereby saving many lives without sacrificing any of the advantages gained by the capture of the objectives.

Throughout he maintained touch with the Units on his flanks.

Later, when his Company Commander who had been wounded earlier in the action was unable to carry on any longer, Lieutenant Bennie took command of the Company.

He sited new trenches and supervised the digging and manning of them in a

Thoroughly satisfactory manner. On the evening of the twentieth, in company with two other Officersm, he carried out a reconnaissance of a new forward position and displayed much initiative in the manner in which he led the Company forward and manned the position during the night.

At all times cool and resourceful his manner of handling the Company during an anxious period was instrumental in preventing many casualties, and is

deserving of the highest possible praise.

706a Private Robert Clifford DOWNING.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on the 19th May during the attack at VILLE-SUR-ANCRE.

This soldier, though alone, followed some of the enemy into a cellar, and, by means of his great personal daring, succeeded in driving them, at the point of the bayonet, to another entrance, where they were met by his Platoon Sergeant. This Sergeant was thus able to send 1 Officer and 30 Other Ranks to the rear as Prisoners.

Pte Downing then used his Lewis Cun very successfully on the enemy between the Sunken Road, known as the CATERPILLAR, and VILLE-SUR-ANCRE, thus accounting for

many enemy casualties. His bravery and soldierly devotion to duty, to the utter disregard of self,

was exceptional.

702a Private Ralph Lucas BROWN, For Conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. During the operations on the 19th inst., this soldier displayed great initiative. He played a prominent part in the mopping up of VILLE-SUR-ANCRE. Pte Brown is a Lewis Gunner, and carried many magazines for his gun, which he was able to use with great success throughout the attack. Whilst his gun was located in the open, he, under heavy machine gun fire, crawled back to the Sunken Road, known as the CATERPILLAR, which at the time was being heavily shelled by the enemy, and brought back magazines and ammunition from a dump which, a few minutes later, was blown up by enemy fire. me On return, with the help of another man, he kept back the enemy with his gun, making great carnage in the process. His example was magnificent.

718a Private John Malcolm STEWART. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty, during the attack on VILLE -SUR - ANCRE on the 19th May 1918. This soldier, who is a Lewis Gunner, was a member of the mopping up party which went through the village. Whilst consolidation was in progress, he, with the aid of another Private, advanced his gun into the open, and held on to his position in spite of heavy sniping and machine-gun fire. His work in covering his comrades was excellent, and, without doubt, the execution he performed with his gun was the means of saving many casualties. His devotion to duty, at great personal risk, and soldierly courage were of the highest order.

2857 Lance Sergeant Thomas James ALLEN. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during the attack on VILLE-SUR -ANCRE on the 19th inst. This N.C.O. is the Company Lewis Gun Sergeant, and, in the execution of his duties, he displayed exceptional gallantry and zeal for his work, providing a wonderful example for his men. He supervised, located, and assisted in making sure the positions of three gun teams, between the Sunken Road, known as the CATERPILLAR, and the Village. All this was done under heavy enemy fire of all descriptions. His courage at all times spurred his men on to greater efforts, whilst his sound judgement in the placing of his teams was largely responsible for the harvest of Huns they were able to reap, and for the slight casualties sustained by his teams.

6865 Company Sergeant Major Charles OLIVER. (W.O. Class II.). For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on the 19th May during the attack on VILLE-SUR-ANCRE. This Warrant Officer was very quick to grasp the tactical opportunities offered, and, on the first platoone entering VILLE, he led them through the Village and out on the Eastern side, where he started and supervised consolidation. He rallied this Platoon which was under very severe fire from enemy machine guns and never remained idle for a moment, but worked till on the point of

exhaustion. As all the Officers, except two, belonging to his Company were casualties, his assistance during this critical period was invaluable, and his untiring efforts and valuable personal example contributed greatly to the success

of the undertaking.

535 Corporal Stephen TOGNOLINI.M.M.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during the attack on VILLE-SUR-ANCE on the 19th May 1918.

This N.C.O. was everywhere where the enemy happened to be.He did excellent work in mopping up cellars and recesses, where he accounted for numbers of the enemy.

Later he encountered a number of the enemy at a post on the Left of the Village. With a few bombs he cleared this post which had been giving his comrades much trouble. His party killed many of the enemy.

This N.C.O.s capabilities as a leader have again proved themselves. His coolness, courage, and daring have built up for him amongst his accountered.

coolness, courage, and daring have built up for him, amongst his comrades, a reputation which it would be hard to excel. In action his many soldierly qualities act as an incentive to his comrades to perform acts of daring.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on the morning of 19th May during the operations at VILLE-SUR-ANCRE.

This Non-Commissioned Officer went forward with the attacking troops and laid a telephone wire to a position taken up by the assault Company.

During the enemy retaliation the wire was broken on several occasions.

L/Cpl Finnis succeeded in repairing these lines, and supervised communications throughout the attack.

This N.C.O. was later wounded but remained on duty until ordered to the Aid Post, where he was evacuated.

His determination and endurance were of the highest order.

1789 Private John James CRAIGIE.

For Conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty.

During the operations against VILLE-SUR-ANCRE on the morning of 19th May, this man attended to the telephone switchboard for eight hours continuously, dealing rapidly and effectively with messages and reports.

Later during the enemy retaliation, when telephone wires became cut, Pte Craigie displayed exceptional bravery in attending to the lines in the village of TREUX under heavy fire of all descriptions.

He re-established communications and continued all that day in maintaining communications, although he had been severely shaken by exploding shells. Continuous communications were maintained owing to the resource and courage of this man. All the Signal Section speak in the highest terms of the work he performed.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on the morning of 19th May at VILLE-SUR-ANCRE. Whilst acting in the capacity of Company Sergeant Major this N.C.O. cheered his men and visited all the Company Posts during consolidation, sending back valuable and accurate reports of the work in progress to his Company Commander. His assistance and example were invaluable and largely tended to the success of his Company.

During recent tours of duty in the line, covering the last two months, Sgt Irwin has performed service of a consistently good character.

He is an original member of this Unit, and has always displayed a most commendable devotion to duty.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during the operations at VILLE-SUR-ANCRE on the 19th May.

This Private displayed great coolness, bravery, and eagerness in the execution of his duty. He was always at hand as a volunteer whenever work was to be done He appeared to be indefatiguable under all conditions no matter what the task or heavy the shell fire. His assistance, both during the attack and during consolidation, was of the utmost value, and his Company Commander speaks in glowing terms of his general work.

286 Sergeant John Sydney SEMPLE.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on the 19th May during the operations at VILLE-SUR-ANCRE.

This N.C.O. is an original member of the Battalion, and has, on many previous accasions displayed great bravery and untiring energy in the performance of his duty.

His men, encouraged by his example, fought with such a spirited offensiveness that the enemy suffered heavy casualties, and, their morale being broken, surrendered freely.

Wany prisoners and machine guns were captured.

His conduct at all times was superb and workhy of the highest possible praise

2252 Private Vernon Jack ROCKLIFF.

4227 Private Richard SCOTT.

For conspicuous gallantr and devotion to duty on the 19th May 1918.

During the operations against VILLE-SUR-ANCRE these men acted as Stretcher Bearers. They worked unceasingly during the whole of the action, with total disregard for their own personal danger.

They attended to and carried in many wounded from the most advanced positions under heavy shell, machine-gun, and rifle fire.

In their anxiety to alleviate the sufferings of their less fortunate comrades they many times risked their own lives;

These men worked for hours, with never ceasing effort, and undoubtedly did much towards the successful evacuation of the wounded.

536 Private William John WEST.

4825 Private Henry Richardson STAFFORD.

6857 Private John Shawe McGRATH.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on the 19th May 1918.
These men acted as Stretcher Bearers during the attack on VILLE-SUR-ANCRE.
They did yeoman service in carrying in wounded under all kinds of enemy fire. In spite of all difficulties and dangers they continued cheerfully with their work, and, by their own brightness and disregard of danger, succeeded in cheering up the casualties who came within their scope of action. Their fearlessness and kean desire to aid helped in a most capable manner the successful evacuation of the wounded.
Their example of self-sacrifice xxx and devotion to duty were superb.

425 Tempany Sergeant Percy MORTIMER M.W.

For conspicuous gallantry and devo ion to duty.

This Platoon Sergeant during the attack on VILLE-SUR-SOMME on the 19th inst., handled his Platoon, after his Officer had become a casualty, with great determination and tact. His men were dispersed by an exploding shell, but he rallied them very quickly and led them to assist with the mopping up.of the Village. By his timely action he was instrumental in capturing sixty prisoners (two of whom were Officers), also several machine guns and one light Trench Mortar.

His contempt for danger and proved ability were of great value under trying circumstances.

All his men speak in glowing terms of his actions.

2116 Private Albert Henry BLACKWORE.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on 19th May 1918.
This man was of the greatest assistance to his Platoon Commander in getting the first wave through VILLE-SUR-ANCRE as exepditiously as possible, and in maintaining direction.

He took charge of a Section when the N.C.O. was killed and led his men forward to an advanced position where they were able to inflict many casualties on the enemy.

His prompt action and ready grasp of the situation mark him as a thorough soldier, and by his work he inspired and helped all around him.

291 Private John TAYLOR.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty.

On the 19th May this man acted as a Company Runner during the operations against VILLE-SUR-ANCRE . His O.C. speaks in glowing terms of his conduct. His services and unostentatious devotion to duty, combined with coolness to an exceptional degree, were invaluable. Whenever required he was there ready. Not on one finle occasion did he fail to accomplish the task set him. On one occasions, having received a despatch from his Flatoon Commander, he carried it to the Company Commander through an almost impassable barrage.of machine gun fire. The despatch contained valuable information, thus rendering his work of double importance.

His disregard of danger and superb conduct at all times under the most difficult conditions werethe best possible example and incentive to the men

with whom he came in contact.

5873 Lance Corporal Arthur Faulkner LYNAS.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during the attack on VILLE-SUR-ANCRE on the 19th May.

This N.C.O. was detailed to carry boxes of bombs to the forward positions .He was carrying a full load of bombs, when suddenly he came across two German snipers. Immediately he rushed them without waiting to get his rifle ready, and,

after a sharp tussle, took both prisoners without the aid of any weapon. His soldierly action and great personal bravery in this action undoubtedly saved the lives of many of his comrades, whilst his example is much talked of amongst his comrades.

5876 Lance Corporal Reginald Marr MURRAY.

5413 Lance Corporal Gustaf William Oscar STAAF.

6401 Lance Corporal Samuel Charles WEST.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty.

These three Machine Gun N.C.O.s, during the attack on VILLE-SUR-ANCRE on 19th May worked in conjunction for a period during the operations.

L/Cpl Murray kept the enemy quiet with his L.G. during consolidation at the CRUCIFIX and later was one of a team which covered the gaps between the

Sunken Road and the Village.

L/Cpl West caught the enemy patrols entering the Village on the East side during the afternoon and effectively stopped their further advance. L/Cpl Staaf covered the withdrawal of our troops from the East side of the Village. These three men caused great slaughter amongst the enemy and by their timely action were instrumental in saving many casualties to our troops. Their bravery and coolness, combined with great initiative, were superb.

20a XXXXXXXX Sergeant John Alva Sturgess LYON.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on the morning of the 19th May. During the attack on VILLE-SUR-ANCRE, whilst acting in the capacity of Platoon Commander (his Officer having become a casualty) this N.C.O.led his men forward with great gallantry to the objective. His display of leadership inspired all with confidence.

Having supervised consolidation, he took out a patrol with the purpose of getting in touch with the enemy. This patrol encountered a number of the enemy who opened up with machine gun fire, resulting in himself and two others becoming casualties. He however remained at his post, encouraging his men, who accounted for a number of the Huns. By his determination and the aggressive character of his actions, he was able to successfully lead his men to all their objectives; they being inspired by his gallant and fearless example. After two and a half hours, although himself wounded, he managed to bring in another man, more severely wounded, over a distance of xxxe hundred yards under

heavy machine gun and sniping fire. He then reported to Company Headquarters and rendered valuable information both as to our own movements and dispositions, and also those of the enemy. He gave definite reports as to the establishment of four enemy posts. On the way out he was again severely shaken by an exploding shell. His conduct at all times has been of the highest standard, and all his comrades in the Company speak in very high terms of his conduct in this action By them he is regarded as being of an ability and courage far above the

average.
