REFORT 21st BATTALION OPERATION NEAR MARCHICAVE 8th AUGUST 1918. CHARLEST CHARLEST SERVICE THE

Ref.Map.Sheet 62D.S.E. 1/20,000.

For the purposes of this Operation the 21st Pattalion (less two Companies) come under the command of the G.O.C., 7th Brigade, the orders received being to follow the right flank of the rear wave of the 20th Battalion (who were on Right of 7th Frigade Sector), and move on North side of Railway; to be responsible for liaison with the 19th Canadian Battalion, and to protect the Right Flank of the 7th Brigade. The orders issued (copies of which were forwarded to 7th Prigade Bradquarters) were based on these instructions.

Under the supervision of Lieut.R.K. Bazley M.C., Jumping off Tapes were laid on the night of 7th/8th in rear of the right flank of the rear wave of the 26th Battalion. The formation adopted was two waves - one Coy to a wave in artillery formation of line of half-platoons in file. Each Company was between sixty and seventy strong and was organised into three Platoons; "D"Company, under Lieut. E. B. Mason M. C., forming the first wave, and "A"Company, under Lieut.J. Sullivan W.F., the second wave. For the purpose of closer co-operation and better supervision Battalion Headquarters formed an extra wave in rear of"A"Company and left the J.O.T. with the Companies. Zero Hour had been notified as 4.20 a.m. and by Zero minus seventy

minutes Companies were in position on the J.O.T.

At Zero minus forty five minutes the enemy put down a barrage which included the position covered by the J.C.T. The men were at once divided into small parties and placed in convenient pot-holes and sections of trench for protection. Ten minutes before Zero Companies were re-assembled on J.O.T., but four casualties were sustained before the move forward commenced.

At hero our barrage opened and, in a dense fog, the waves moved forward. The greatest difficulty was experienced in keeping touch owing to the impossibility of distinguishing anything more than five yards away. The enemy artillery still continued an erratic and gradually diminishing fire but great annoyance was caused by enemy machine guns firing from in front of the Canadians which enfiladed our line of advance.

Shortly after starting Em Hors encountered the liaison platoon of the 19th Canadian Battalion. They had lost their way and were put on the track again.

To better enable Companies to maintain direction and keep touch

they were closed to the right and moved along the railway.

On reaching the point 7.2.a.7.4.it was discovered that the majoraty of the enemy machine-gun fire, which was harassing us from the right flank, was coming from an enemy Strong Point in ISOB TRENCH, South of the Pailway Line at V.2.a.5.0. The fire of this Post was holding up the advance of the 19th Canadians. Lewis Guns were immediately brought into action and after a vigorous machine gun duel of some minutes duration the enemy guns were silenced and ten prisoners were captured when the post was taken. Receipt for these prisoners is attached. The advance was then continued

A 19th Canadian man and some 26th Bn men who had lost their way were met with and were attached to"A"Company. A number of other hostile machine guns were still firing from the South of the Railway Line but we were successful in silencing several with Lewis Gun fire, and progress was

maintained though it was slow.

In spite of strenuous efforts to keep touch half of "D" Company under two Officers became detached but reached their objective and consolidated. The remainder of "D"Company under Lieut. E. B. Mason M. C., finding the Canadians held up, crossed to the South of the Railway to ascertain the cause and discovered an enemy Stron, Point in an orchard at V.3.d.35.35. At this moment a message was received from an officer on the left of the 19th Canadians asking for assistance to clear up this strong point and a short halt was made to organise an attack on it. For this purpose a few

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Stragglers from 7th Bde were attached to our party who attacked from the North side while the Canadians attacked from the West. The fight developed into a vigorous bombing duel which lasted for about five minutes, but in the end the enemy were driven from the orchard. Two of the attached men from the 7th Bde were killed in this fight, three of the 21st Bn were wounded, and the Canadians suffered some casualties.

At this moment portion of "A"Company, under Lieut. J. Sullivan W.M., arrived on the scene and proceeded to mop up a dug-out in a cellar in the orchard. From this five prisoners were captured, who are included in the

seven for whom a receipt is attached.

Our party then pushed on in line with the Canadians South of Railway for about 200 Yards, when the Officer in charge of the Canadian Left stated that he could not advance further until his Right Flank came up. As these numerous minor engagements had occupied a considerable time, during which the 25th Bn in front of us was pushing steadily ahead, a gap had occurred between the Canadian Left and the 7th Bde Right. A party was therefore pushed forward to pick up touch again to protect the Right flank of the 7th Bde. They established three Fosts along the Railway Line to the North of MARCELCAVE and at the same time "A"Company consolidated in the vicinity of the captured German Strong Point where Coy Hors were established. The portion of "M"Company which had previously consolidated in the vicinity of V.2.b.8.0. on their objective were then brought forward to strengthen our present position. The Canadians then pushed ahead.

The dugout captured at V.3.d.4.4.had apparently been a Regimental Headquarters and in it files of orders and documents of all kinds were discovered. Realising the possible value of the information they might contain, a mounted orderly of an Officer, who happened to be otherwise engaged for a few minutes, was pressed into service and galloped off with a bundle

of these papers to 7th Bde Hors.

Owing to the slowness of the advance and the great difficulty of maintaining touch with Companies, a Bu Hors was not established until nearly 6.30 a.m. when a position in a trench at P.32.d.9.1. was selected.

At this moment touch with Companies had been lost, but was soon restablished and maintained from then onwards. An inspection of the positions taken up by the Companies satisfied me that they were quite suitable for dealing with any possible counter-attack that might develop and I instructed Company Commanders to remain where they were and strengthen their posts. Shortly afterwards the 5th Division commenced passing through us and at about 11 a.m.I withdrew the Companies to a position in P.31.d.where they reverted once more to the command of G.O.G., 5th A.I. nde.

Communication was difficult to maintain, because, although a line was run to Forward En Hors the noise of the Artiblery Darrage made it impossible to hear on the 'phone before 8.30 a.m. After that hour commun-

ication as faitly good. Previously it was all by Runner.

Casualties during the engagement were as under.Killed - 1 O.R. Wounded-17 O.R. Wounded, remaining on duty - 2 Officers (Lts.
E.B. Mason N.C. & 2/Lt.F. W. Blencowe H. W.).

Prisoners taken numbered seventeen, for whom receipts were obtained from the escorts, and numerous others who were despatched to rear and for whom no receipts could be get.

Captured material includes 4 Medium Winenwerfers, 2 Heavy Machine Guns, 6 Light Machine Guns, 5 Mauser Anti-Tank Hifles, a small Wireless Set, and

numerous other miscellaneous articles.

Eplendid work was done on the J.O.T. and during the advance by Lieuts.R.K.Bazley M.C.& R.H.Farndon, and the performance of Lt.E.B.B.Hason M.C. was beyond all praise.Recommendations for decorations for these Officers are respectfully submitted for your approval.

LIAISON OFFICER'S REPORT ON THE OPERATIONS OF 8th AUGUST 1918 .-@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@@

All preliminary preparations having been completed, the J.O.T. laid, the attacking troops were in position by Zero minus two hours.

Whilst the men were lying out on the J.O.T., the enemy put down a heavy barrage at about 2.45 a.m. This barrage consisted of 5.9., 4.2., and high velocity shells and "whizz bangs, "and extended from the outpost to the support line. A number of casualties were caused by this counter preparation barrage, which continued, with but slight cessation, until Zero.

The 7th A.I. Bde on the Right, with the 5th A.I. Bde on the Left, and the 6th A.I.Bde in support formed the 2nd Aust.Divisional frontage for the assault. The Railway Line formed the flank on the Right, South of which the Canadian troops were operating, with their left flank in close touch with the 7th A.I.Bde. The 5th Aust. Divn. were in rear of the 2nd Aust. Divn., and, after the first objectives had been reached, passed through the 2nd Divn and carried on the attack. The 4th Aust. Divn. acted in a similar manner in conjunction with the 3rd Aust. Divn., who were on the left of the 2nd Aust. Divn. The 1st Aust. Divn were in Corps Reserve.

Two Companies of the 21st Bn, under Major A.R. MacNeil M.C., came under the orders of the 7th A.I.Brigade and formed a defensive flank along the Railway Line from V.2.b.central.to a line between V.3.&.V.4.running

North and South.

An exceptionally heavy ground mist prevented any object from

being visible for a distance of more than ten yards.

At 4 a.m. (Zero minus 20 minutes) the 21st Bn Hqrs under command of Major A.E. Reed D.S.O. moved forward in the rear of the 5th wave (21st Bn) who were following in rear of the 26th Bn, 7th A.I. Bde.

At 4.20 a.m. (Zero) our guns opened with a volume of fire which has seldom, if ever, been equalled by our Artillery. Owing to the flatness of the country and the low trajectory of the 18 Pdrs, firing at 1500 Yards, the shells were exceptionally low. From this time until about 6.20 a.m.no part of the attack was visible from any other part, owing to the thickness of the mist.

At Zero plus 30 minutes prisoners commenced to come in . They appeared to be of a very poor stamp, and the majority were terrified by our barrage, of which everybody speaks in the highest terms of admiration.

At Zero plus 1 Hour the 26th Bn Hgrs moved forward, and, on crossing the old German Line, traces of the effectiveness of our artillery were everywhere visible. Through the mist forms were moving - stretcher bearers at work, walking wounded, linesmen, prisoners, - but all were half-hidden by the enveloping fog which threatened for a period to make the attack only a partial success.

Forward through CARD COPSE and on to MARCELCAVE we passed, where

the 5th Aust. Divn. were moving up in lines of sections in file.

Between CARD COPSE and MARCELCAVE were his first Field Guns -77 mm. sunk level with the ground in gun-pits, well-roofed over.

Pushing on to LA BASTILLE MILL the 26th Bn established their Hars. The mist now commenced to disappear rapidly and a clearer conception of the situation could be gained. The 5th & 7th Bdes had reached their objectives and the 5th Divn were through them in splendid alignment. extending, and carrying on the attack . Behind them came the Cavalry . It was a wonderful sight. The last Companies of the 5th Divn were just pushing through, whilst the whole district between MARCELCAVE and VILLERS BRETONNEUX was alive with movement. Every road was crowded with cavalry, whilst Supply Tanks rumbled forward over rough country, and alont the main road streams of motor transport were moving. One realised what the organisation of an Army must be to perfectly adjust the many details of this gigantic movement,

On turning to the Right and looking South East across MARCELCAVE the canadians could be seen carrying on with the attack - line after line moving forward in splendid order. A wood in front of them suddenly spurted fire from many hidden machine guns, which swept their ranks. The men parted and moved forward in small sections, working to the flanks of the guns, and finally rushing them. The Canadians in the face of heavy opposition fought

throughout with splendid courage and vigour.

And now to the North the Australians were out of sight. A few Tanks could be seen spitting fire in the distance, others could be seen coming up from the rear, whilst cavalry were moving at the gallop across the open country Then came the Artillery - gunlimber after gunlimber - in a never-ending stream. Aeroplanes were circling overhead in swarms, whilst through the air at intervals could be heard the scream of a German long range shells fired at random.

Near the 1st Objective were the German Field Guns . Our counterbattery fire had played exceptional havoc amongst them. Here lay a 5.9 with the wheel blown off, there a 4.2 with a shell hole right under the trail. Everywhere the debris of war lay scattered around. Dead and wounded man and horses, guns, shells, rifles, equipments, and all the other accessories of battle were strewn amongst the heaps of bricks and masonry that had once

been houses. A Canadian Officer in the highest terms of admiration for the work done by this Unit, which was of great service to his Battalion at a critical juncture. To all troops in the attack nothing but the highest praise can be given. The manner in which they performed their difficult task of keeping direction and touch, and pushing forward in the face of all obstacles - surmounting each in turn - during those first few hours when the heavy mist rendered their task so hard, speaks for itself.

Within a few hours of the commencementof the advance, looking back along the MARCELCAVE - VILLERS BRETONNEUX Road, streams of transport of all descriptions could be seen following up in the rear of a victor-

ious and advancing army.

This was the first occasion on which all the Australian Divisions have been engaged together on the same day in the same battle. It was one of the biggest operations they have ever been called upon to perform, and the success which attended their efforts from the start only tends to add lustre to the already high record of the A.I.F.

After all the hardships of three years of war, to take part in such a successful operation, to see the cavalry streaming through, and to know that we actually had the enemy on the run, were fitting compensation

foe the many discomforts we have been called upon to endure.

Lieutenant Robert On the 8th August 1918 during the operations Kenneth BAZLEY E.C. against MARCELCAVE the enemy put down an artillery barrage on the Jumping-Off Tape.

(Awarded M.C. A.I.F. When the time came to assemble on the J.O.T. this List 264.27.11.17. Officer skilfully led his men by a covered route Awarded Bar to M.C. to a point near the J.O.T. and then overland through

A.C.H.O.169.No.31. the barrage to the Tape. 18.6.18.).

He then walked continually up and down the tape, talking to and encouraging the men, though enemy machine-gun fire was very severe in addition to the artillery.

His example of coolness and disregard of danger was of inestimable value in keeping the men in position until the advance commenced, after which he showed an extraordinarily good knowledge of direction and successfully guided the wave through the fog.

As a result of his splendid example of coolnesc and his skilful guidence, not a man went astray during the entire advance to the objective.

Ligutenant Reginald "On the 8th August 1918 during the operations against MARCELCAVE the enemy put down a barrage on the J.O.T.

While moving a party of troops into position, the trench was found blocked by a party from another Battalion, who were without an Officer, and had come back from the J.O.T. for shelter. They had very little idea of where they were or where the J.O.T. was, and, as the time for the commencement of the barrage was getting close, it was imperative that they should move forward.

Regardless of the enemy barrage and severe machine gun fire, this Officer jumped on to the parapet, organised the party and led them forward through

the barrage to their own tape. He then returned, took charge of a party from his own Battalion, and led them also under similar conditions to their positions on the J.O.T. Machine-gun fire was very hot at this time, but heedless of it and the barrage, he walked up and down the tape several times and personally saw that every man was in position. After the advance commenced he showed the same splendid disregard of personal danger, going continually between the various parties (who were in artillery formation) assisting them to keep direction, in the dense fog,

and to maintain touch with each other. The effect of his absolutely fearless behaviour and his constant care for his men at the risk of his own life made a most powerful impression on all ranks and was a splendid stimulant under trying conditions."

"On the 8th August 1918 during the operations against HARCELCAVE this Officer was in command of a Company. The advance from the J.O.T. commenced under enemy artillery fire and through a dense fog. Lieut. Mason showed great skill in the handling of his men under these conditions . At one stage in the advance it was found that a Strong Point in an orchard was holding up the advance of other troops on our right. They appealed to him for assistance and, after hurriedly organising a party, he skilfully organised an attack from two sides. He personally led one party and a flerce bombing engagement ensued lasting for five minutes. Two of his party were killed and three wounded, and the other party also sustained casualties. Eventually the enemy were driven out and a dugout in the orchard was mopped up and five prisoners taken. Shortly afterwards Lt. Mason sat down for a moment alone to look at his map. A party of six Germans rushed at him and threw a bomb which wounded him in his face and arm. Calling to a few men who were near by, he led a rusk against the party who fled precipitately, leaving two prisoners in our hands. Lieut. Mason then led a party into the Village and secured the flank of the troops on our right sufficiently to enable them to continue their advance. His dash and fine leadership, were of inestimable value in a difficult situation."

Active, particularly on area in X.10., where several hundred rounds of 77 mm. and 10.5 cm. fell between 2.45 a.m. and 4 a.m. Some specing gas shells fell in X.15.b. at 4.30 a.m. VAUVILLERS, FRAME VILLE and RAINECOURT were heavily shelled at intervals. BAYONVILLERS, HARBONNIERES and WARFUSEE -LAMOTTE received some attention from heavy calibre guns. VILLERS BRETONNEUX received a few rounds from an H.V. gun.
- 5. ENEMY ATTITUDE. A gameal stiffening in his defence is apparent, and more artillery has come into action. No further counter attacks are reported on the Corps front.



SITUATION AUGUST 11TH AND NIGHT 11TH/12TH INSTANT. As the result of our operations north of the SOMME, ETINEHEM was captured, and ground gained towards BRAY, which village we command from the high ground Immediately west of it. The enemy, strengthened by the arrival of the 26th Res. Div. made a counter-attack west of BRAY which was repulsed. The enemy attempted no further action last night.

North of DERNANCOURT, our patrols have been active, and encounters with the enemy took place. No enemy were seen in MEAULTE. South of the SOMME, RAINECOURT was captured, and the situation at LIHONS cleared up. In the latter area, fighting was very heavy, the 5th Bav. Division

being strengthened by the newly arrived 38th Division.

At HALLU, strong counter-attacks were made, probably by the 119th Div. our troops being forced to evacuate the village.

PRISONERS. The number of prisoners captured by the Fourth Army since the 8th instant, who have passed through Cages or C.C.S. now amounts to 19,953, of which 490 are officers.

ENEMY REAR ORGANISATIONS.

Bridges and Railways. Photographs of 11th show both the road and railway bridges at PERONNE still intact. Rolling stock for 5 trains is shown in PERONNE station at 8 a.m. on 11th. Rolling stock for about a dozen trains is shown in PERONNE and PERONNE Sud stations at 8 a.m. on 9th and 7 trains at 6 p.m. on 10th August. (I.S. No.237).

INFORMATION REGARDING THE 34TH INF. BATTERY.

It is now established that the personnel are drawn from artillery, men. The strength of the battery is 133 or 134 all ranks, including 5 officers. There are 4 horse-drawn Austrian 75 mm. guns (pattern Gotha Gebirges Kanone 15) which have an extreme range of 6,500 yards with a fourth charge, but normally fire between 700 and 1,500 yards with 3 charges. Only H.E. and shrapnel are fired, no armour piercing ammunition, though tanks are engaged. The chief tactical use of these guns is to destroy machine guns in the enemy's front line, and to engage tanks. Open sights are used. The battery is only put into the line in offensive or defensive operations; during ordinary trench warfare it is withdrawn to the back areas for training. Previous to coming into line the battery underwent 14 days' training in the LILLE area. It entrained at LILLE last Thursday and arrived at PERONNE the same night, arriving in the line at 3 p,m. Friday afternoon. whole battery came down, but the whereabouts of the other guns is unknown. The men were all trained in the school at ROISIN between 25th May and (I.S. No. 237).

A captured document, issued by the XI Corps and dated 31:7:18, makes mention of accidents having occurred with anti-tank mines (Tankminen) when carrying out practices with them.





- Under cover of creeping Artillery Barrages, the Bde. will establish. 1. posts on the general lines shown on attached sketch at 4.15 a.m. on the 18th inst. At the same time the 4th A.I.Bde. on our right is carrying out a bombing operation to capture MADAM WOOD.
- The method of the advance will take the form of a series of bombing 2. and mopping up teams, who will penetrate the enemy defences at the points A, B, C, D, E, and F, and then link up to right and left along the line shown to form a continuous chain of posts.
- The Inter-Bn. boundaries for the operation are shown on attached 5. sketch.
- At Xero an intense barrage will be placed down on sections of the 4. enemy defences corresponding to the points of entry. At Zero plus 2 minutes it will lift at the rate of 50 yards every minute until it reaches the protective line where it will remain for 5 minutes, when it gradually ceases. The 4.5 Hows. are bombarding selected points from Zero to plus 15 minutes.
- Jumping-off Tapas, if necessary will be laid under arrangements 5. to be made direct between Bus, and 7th Field Coy, A.F.
- The Ede. M.G. Group are providing barrages at selected points and 6. in addition 2 guns are allotted to each Battalion C.O. to move forward behind the storming parties and take up positions for assisting consolidation.
- The 6th A.L. T.M.Sty. are available to assist in barrage work and 7. may move forward as C.O's desire to take up S.O.S. positions.
- WHITE Three Very Lights will be fired in quick succession by storming 8. parties on reaching objectives.
- One Coy, each of the 21st Bn. will be allotted to the 22nd and 23rd 9. Bns. They will come under the Command of the Line Bns. at 6 p.m. on day prior to operations They are available for use as Nucleus Garrisons, Counter-attack Coys. or for Ration and Ammunition carrying. Arrangements for their accommodation etc. will be made direct with C.O. 21st Bn.
- An Officer from Bds. Hdgrs. will synchronize watches with Line Bns. 10. before 8 p.m. on night prior to operation.
