



Administrative Memo to accompany 6th A.I.Bde. Order 175 Ref. Map Sheet 62.D. 1/40,000

1. SUPPLIES (a) Supplies on 18th will not be delivered to present Q.M. Stores but Q.M's will send a representative to 16th A.A.S.C. lines 0.15.b.3.7. at 3 p.m. on 18th inst., where rations will be taken over and then delivered to new locations.

(b) Details rationed by Brigade H.Q. Will draw rations for 19th inst. early on that morning from Bde. H.Q. CHATEAU, VECQUEMONT.

(c) Rum will be drawn with rations on 18th inst.

(d) Supplies on 19th inst. for consumption on 20th will be drawn by Nucleus in the usual way. Units will arrange to ration their own Nucleus personnel from 21st inst.

- 2. BAGGAGE WAGONS. One baggage wagon is already with each unit. Capt. T.B. FARRELL, M.C. will arrange with Q.M's direct re the second wagon. If this is not required, it can be used to lift Bn. packs and surplus stores at LAMOTTE.
- 3. BILLETING PARTIES (a) The usual billeting parties will meet the Staff Captain at Area Commandants Office VECQUEMONT 12 noon on 18th inst. Officers in charge of parties to have unit strengths.

 (b) Each Transport section will send a mounted N.C.O. or man to meet Staff Captain as per para (b) to act as guide to their own section.
- 4. MOBILE ECHELON. Lieut. HISLOP on handing over will move (with full echelon) independently to VECQUEMONT. Each man will carry out of the line 120 rds. S.A.A.
 - 5. TRANSPORT. First line tran port will move independently but will not enter VECQUEMONT before 3 p m. Units will make their own arrangements re movement of Cooker.
 - 6. NUCLEUS. In accordance with the move of the Nucleus Bn. each Bn. will detail 2 limbers to report to Nucleus Camp at 1 p.m. on 19th instant to move baggage.

 All tents and trench shelters will be dumped on a lorry route under a guard Map location to be notified to Bde. H.Q. early so that arrangements can be made to have them moved.
 - 7. REFITTING. The work of refitting and re-equipping will be commenced immediately.
 - 8. ORDNANCE. Will remain at present location 0.11.central. Units will draw by 1st Line Transport.
 - 9. KITS. The present stores at ABBEVILLE will be moved and dumped at Bde. H.Q. VECQUEMONT at a time to be notified later.

 Units will arrange to return to D.A.D.O.S. any Ordnance Stores which they no longer desire to retain.


 Steps will be taken to forward all surplus kits to the A.I.F. Kit Store, London through the A.M.F.O.



Australian Corps.

I desire to express officially to all ranks of the Australian Corps my sincere appreciation of their splendid victory over the enemy on August 8th and the succeeding days.

The task that was allotted to them depended largely for its success on the element of surprise. The care that was taken prior to August 8th to camouflage the arrival of the Canadian Corps interfered to some extent with the Australian Corps dispositions. In spite of this and other difficulties, the assembly of the Corps, the distribution of the tanks, and the disposition of a large force of heavy and field artillery, were accomplished by night without attracting attention.

From zero onwards everything wont according to programme and without a hitch. It was no ordinary feat to win all the objectives allotted, to effect a penetration of 10 miles into the hostile position, and to reach the most distant objective half an hour before scheduled time.

The three points which I desire specially to eulogize are (1) the splendid gallantry and drive of the infantry, (2) the thoroughness and precision of the Staff work of the Corps, Divisions, and Brigades, and (3) the skill and rapidity with which the mobile artillery were brought forward in close support of the infantry for the attack of the more distant objectives.

I offer my heartiest congratulations and warm thanks to all ranks of the Australian Corps, though I feel that whatever words I may use all Australians realize that "Victory is her own reward". It was a splendid performance and as fine a feat of arms as any that even this war can produce.

H.Q., Fourth Army, 23rd August, 1918. Major-General, General Staff, Fourth Army.

"General Sir H.S. RAWLINSON, Commanding Fourth Army.

O.A.D.911.

" I request that Army Commanders will, without delay, bring to the notice of all subordinate leaders the changed conditions under which operations are now being carried on and the consequent necessity for all ranks to act with the utmost boldness and resolution in order to get full advantage from the

present favourable situation.

The effect of the two very severe defeats and the continuous attacks to which the enemy has been subjected during the past month has been to wear out his troops and disorganise his plans. Our Second and Fifth Armies have taken their share in this effort to destroy the enemy and already have gained considerable ground from him in the LYS Sector of our front. Today the Tenth French Army crossed the AILLETTE and reports that a Bavarian Division fled in panic, carrying back with it another division which was advancing to its support. Tomorrow the attack of the Allied Armies on the whole front from SOISSONS to NEUVILLE-VITASSE (near ARRAS) is to be continued.

battles with limited objectives when the enemy was strong are no longer suited to his present condition. The enemy has not the means to deliver counter-attacks on an extended scale, nor has he the numbers to hold a continuous position against the very extended advance which is now being directed upon him.

resolute offensive is everywhere desirable. Risks which a menth ago would have been criminal to incur ought now to be incurred as a duty. It is no longer necessary to advance in regular lines and step by step. On the contrary, each division should be given a distant objective which must be reached independently of its neighbour and even if one's flank is thereby exposed for the time being.

Reinforcements must be directed on the pointswhere. our troops are gaining ground, not where they are checked. A vigorous offensive against the sectors where the enemy is weak will cause hostile strong points to fall, and, in due course, our whole Army will be able to continue its advance. This procedure will result in speedily breaking up the hostile forces and will cost us much less than if we attempted to deal with the present situation in a half hearted manner.

The situation is most favourable. Let each one of us act energetically and without hesitation push forward to our objective.

COPY of Aust.Corps Letter No.168/31, of 25th August, 1918.

"During the enemy retreat in the BAPAUME area in 1917, a great many devices were employed by him for setting off mines. One favouribe device was to have a wire treated with acid which gradually eat its way through the wire and this let off mines, as in the case at VELU Station, some weeks after this point had been passed.

Booby traps of various kinds were employed so that it was unsafe for men to attempt to collect anything in the nature of a souvenir lest it should prove to be a trap. Loose planks in the walls of dugouts were found, when pressed into position, to set off traps of various kinds. Innocent looking wires, when cut, also set off mines or fired shells or hand grenades.

All ranks are to be warned on no account to touch anything in the nature of a suspected wire, and to be very careful in entering dugouts. All dugouts should be examined by Engineers before occupation.

German Engineer and Pioneer prisoners may be retained in divisions to test anything that is likely to give rise to suspicion and to enter and examine dugouts before our men are allowed to enter them. German Engineer and Picneer prisoners should be examined as to their knowledge of the possibility of mines, &c.

- Ist. Transport Lines situated at LAMOTTE. Americans attached to Transport for instruction.

 From the 1st to 7th 2 Water Carts reported each morning at 10 a.m. to ese cookers at Quarry VILLERS BRETONNEUX.1 Eimber reported daily to Q.M. Store at 9 a.m.from 1st to 8th to proceed to A.S.C. Lines for rations. In addition Limbers reported daily for Canteen Supplies, Mail, & Ordnance Stores.3 Limbers went forward to Bn in line each night at 7 p.m. with rations and one limber remained at Cookers and went forward at 2 a.m. with hot food.2 Water Carts left lines at 7 p.m. with water for cookers.
- 2nd. Mess Cart reported to Bde at 8 a.m. returning at 8 p.m. Limbers for Mail, etc., as above.
- 3rd. Ration arrangements, etc as above. Americans attached returned to their Unit.
- 4th. Ration arrangements, etc., as above. 2 Pack horses reported to Bde Dump at 8 p.m.
- 5th. En preparing for forthcoming stunt. Ration arrangements as before. Maltese cart fully loaded with Medical Stores, Limbers went forward with Iron Rations, Extra Water Bottles, etc. Mess Cart went forward with Rum Issue.
- 6th. Rations transported forward at 11.30 p.m. 2 Mounted Orderlies went forward at 8.30 p.m.with wire cutters.

- 8th. Transport moved from LAMOTTE to 0.13.c.at 1.30 p.m. On arrival teams were sent forward to VILLERS BRETONNEUX to move cookers and water carts forward to Bn at V.32.c. Water Carts reported back from 7th A.I.Bde.
- 9th. Transport moved from 0.31.c.to P.22.c. Cookers, Water Carts, and Waltese Cart moved forward with Bn to GUILLAUCOURT.64h Pack Horses returned from 7th A.I.Bde.
- 10th. Transport moved from P.22.c.to W.8.c.at 9 a.m.On arrival G.S. Wagon returned to LAMOTTE BREBIERE to bring forward Orderly Room, Post Office, and Canteen.6 Pack Horses reported to Ede Dump.
- lith. Cookers, Water Carts, 2 L.G. Limbers & Maltese Cart moved forward with Bn to vicinity of HARBONNIERES. 2 O.R. were wounded at Transport Lines and 2 Horses. Cooker teams supplied hot food three times daily.

- 22nd. 2 Limbers to Area Commandant, 1 Divn for xxx Sig. Stores, 1 Canteen & Sanitary Stores.
 - 23rd. 1 Limber for Canteen & Mail.All Officers' Rides for reconnaissance.
 Ness Cart to VILLERS BRETONNEUX.
 - 24th. 1 Limber Wail & Canteen, 1 Salvage.
 - 25th. 1 G.S. Wagon & 8 Limbers moved Bn Packs, Blankets, Valises, & Surplus Stores to CORBIE at 4 p.m. On return transport packed. Ready to move at 8 p.m. en route for MERICOURT SUR SOMME, arriving there at 1 a.m. 26th inst.

26th. Bn moved from MERICOURT Area to CAPPY. Cookers, Water Carts, Maltese Cart, and 2 L.G. Limbers moved with Bn. 3 Limbers delivered rations to Unit before moving. 3 Horses drawn. 1 Limber to CORBIE with rations.

27th. TRANSPORT moved from MERICOURT Area to vicinity of FROISSY PILLAR. Cookers, Water Carts, Maltese Carts moved from CAPPY to G.28.a.

3 Limbers proceeded forward with rations.

28th. 2 Limbers went forward at 5 p.m. with rations arriving at cookers 6.30 p.m.Bn received work of relief and forward transport were moved back to G.33.a.&.b. 2 Limbers then reported to Bn Hqrs to bring back L.G.& Sig.Gear to Coy's new positions arriving there at 1 a.m.29th.

29th. Transport moved from vicinity of FROISSY PILLAR to the SOMMUE CANAL near ECLUSIER.Forward transport moved with Unit from G.37.a. &.b. to G.30.a. I Limber for Mail.

30th. Transport moved from vicinity of ECLUSIER to FRISE.Forward Transport moved from G.30.a.to G.13.a.&.b.

31st. Bn moving to I.14. with Forward Transport in attendance. Rations were conveyed forward by G.S. Wagon.

Owing to casualties the Transport has had a fairly heavy month's work, though the continued good weather has greatly facilitated work.

All local work was carried out by Wess Cart, Maltese Cart, & 1 Limber.

QUARTERMASTER'S REPORT FOR MONTH OF AUGUST 1918.-

This month was full of incident.

From 1st to 8th was a period of preparation for the Great Offensive.

For this operation the Battalion was attached to the 7th Brigade. The Unit was located in trenches in front of BRETONNEUX with Hqrs at "THE DOLL'S HOUSE". Cookers were established in QUARRY in rear of BRETONNEUX. Q.M. Store at LAMOTTE BREBIERE. Food was taken forward at 9 p.m. and 2 a.m. by limbers. On 6th assault rations were drawn and issued. Water Dumps were established near DOLL'S HOUSE and on the 8th the Bn moved to them attack in conjunction with other Units of the Division. On he evening of the 8th all objectives were taken and line ran in front of HARBONNIERES. Bn came back to old line system in front of BRETONNEUX, where cookers joined them, and with one or two exceptions, have been in rear of their respective Companies until the end of the month.

On evening of 8th Unit became mobile.Q.M.Store & Transport complete moved to AUBIGNY.On 9th Bn moved with the general advance through WARCELCAVE & GUILLAUCOURT. Lewis Gun Limbers and Cookers moved with the Battalion. Q.M.Store again moved to ACCROCHE WOOD.Rations were delivered and taken in Supply Wagons direct to Bn.Bn rendezvouzed for the night in rear of GUILLACOURT.On 10th Q.M.Store & Transport moved forward and joined the Unit near GUILLACOURT.

On 11th Bn was ordered to continue the advance towards the SOMME.Cookers and Lewis Gun Limbers moved with Unit to FRAMERVILLE.Rations were delivered at 5 p.m.from Store at GUILLACOURT to Bn with 1st Line Transport.At this stage the advance was held up at PROYART and for six days the Bn became practically stationary.

During this time all trophies of war were collected and despatched to Ordnance. Much salvage was disposed of in A.S.C. Wagons returning to Railhead. A sufficient number of wells, with water fit for drinking, were located and water carts were always with Cookers or Bns.

on 16th 2 Coys -"A"&"D"-were attached to 23rd & 22nd Bns respectively for a minor operation in front of FRAMERVILLE.Cookers were attached to these Bns for the operation and the men were fed with the customary regularity.

On 18th, the minor operation having been successfully completed, the Bde was relieved at night.Q.M.Store & Transport moved by Road to DAOURS.Bn embussed at HARBONNIERES and debussed near DAOURS.For this contingency two cookers were left at Forward Hqrs and fed men with hot stew and tea before embussing, the other two proceeded with the Transport and had hot drinks ready for the troops on arrival at destination about 2 a.m. Coy Clerks and 2 C.Q.M.S.s formed the Advance Party and did good work distributing blankets, packs, and valises to their respective Coy Tents.To do this one baggage wagon was sent to LAMOTTE Pack Store, the other being used to transport Bn Stores.

On 19th and following days the Unit was busy reorganising.All baggage was reduced to a minimum.Officers' Kits were reduced and surplus gear sent to

reduced to a minimum.Officers' Kits were reduced and surplus gear sent to A.I.F.Kit Store, England. War trophies and Salvage were disposed of: the former to War Museums Collecting Depot, CORBIE, the latter in the usual manner. All surplus stores, Bn Gear, etc., and all material not required in the forward area were returned to D.A.D.O.S. on Divisional Authority.

The list of these stores comprised. 200 Bomb Buckets, 5 Bar & Stroud Range Finders, 32 Grenade Dischargers, 32 Grenade Dischargers No. 23., 64 Wire Cutters S.A., 64 Sights Luminous, 215 Bottles, Water (Battle Stores) 200 Blankets. The blankets being surplus from strength of one per man.

After this reorganisation the Bn became truly mobile. During this period shortages were taken in clothing and necessaries, and Bn Stores checked. Indents were furnished to complete establishment.

On 22nd Foden Lorry was available for Unit and all blankets were put through. On 24th Divisional Travelling Armourer's Workshop inspected, repaired, and replaced all damaged rifles and Lewis Guns.

On 25th Bn received orders to move by bus at one hour's notice.

Packs, Blankets, and Walises were collected and sent to Pack Store at CORBIE.

Bn embussed at 7 p.m.for PROYART Area. Transport & Q.M. Store moved complete at 7.30 p.m. This move was carried out in the dark and under most inclement conditions. Transport took up a position East of MERICOURT arriving at desetination about 1 a.m.

Bn was located in trenches between MERICOURT & PROYART for the night. A hot meal was served to the troops before going to sleep. Kram

From period 26th to 31st Bn has moved daily with the general advance.
Moving at the rate of 10 Kilometres a day, Cookers, Water Carts, and Lewis Gun
Limbers moved continually with the Unit.
Transport Lines, Q.M. Store, and Rear Bn Hqrs followed closely in the rear.
On night of 26th Q.M. Store was located near MERICOURT; on night of 27th
in rear of CAPPY; on 28th in front of ECLUSIER, and on 30/31st in front
of FRISE.

In each case rations were delivered to Q.M.Store and taken on to the Unit & during the day.

During the month the Transport, Storegetc., have moved eight times and have advanced altogether approximately 40 Kilometres.

COMMANDING OFFICER'S REPORT FOR MONTH OF AUGUST 1918.-

The period under review has been one that all ranks will remember, both for the strenuous times they have been through, and for the success which has attended our arms.

Early in the month the Unit was holding the line in the VILLERS BRETONNEUX Sector. Here we took part in the initial operations which culminated in the general retreat of the German Army on this front.

From them on victory has attended all our efforts right through the month, and with but few casualties to ourselves. Though times have been hard for the men, they accept it all in good part, and have been much inspired by the advance.

Rations and supplies have been of practically the same standard

as in he past.

A collapsible camp cooker has been in use in the Batalion during the latter part of the month, and, owing to the facilities it affords, the men's rations have been greatly varied; such dishes as Jam Tarts, Meat Pies, Pastry, Etc., have been supplied to the troops regularly. In this manner the greatest possible results have been obtained from the use of the biscuit ration.

For portion of the month the Unit has been billeted and bivouaced near the SOMME RIVER and the use of this for bathing and swimming has been greatly appreciated. This form of exercise has been of great benefit to the troops. Owing to the exigencies of the campaign the supply of clean clothing has not been up to the usual standard but the difficulty of supply is understood by all. The Battalion Blankets were put term through the Foden Lorry and the men's tunics and trousers treated whilst the Unit was having a short spell. At the same time clean clothing was issued, so that every opportunity was availed of to free the men from vermin.

Several promotions to Non-Commissioned Rank have been made

during the month, and some Temporary Ranks confirmed.

Canteen supplies have been regular and exceptionally good, though for the last week the difficulty of transport has greatly hindered the regular procuring of goods. Cigarettes, Tinned Preserves, Etc., have been bought for the troops from Regimental Funds. These have helped to supplement the daily issue and have formed an agreeable addition to the meals in the forward area.

Several absentees have been disposed of summarily whilst a number have been dealt with by Court Martial. Several of these offenders

have been committed to prison.

A number of Decorations have been awarded to Officers and Other Ranks for gallantry In The Field. The Battalion List of Honours is now one of which any Unit might be proud, and which certainly is a matter of great satisfaction both to myself and all ranks under my command.

Considering the number of operations the Bn has been called upon to take part in during the month and the general strenuousness of the campaign, the total casualties and evacuations have been very light, though the numerical strength of this Unit has been fairly low for some time past.

The recent advance has confirmed the belief that all ranks previously held that the German is now well beaten and it is only a matter of time before the end arrives. This belief gives them heart to carry on with the many arduous tasks imposed upon them, though, one and all, eagerly look forward to a period of rest to enable them to thoroughly recuperate after the months of forward area work they have passed through.

2 1 st AUSTRALIAN INFANTRY BATTALION.

REPORT ON OPERATIONS FROM 26th to 28th AUGUST 1918. - Ref.Map.62C.N.W.

The Battalion took over the line approximately G.21.central, G.21.d.central., G.21.d.8.O., G.27.central to G.33.central from loth A.I.Brigade Battalion. The orders were to keep always in touch with the enemy and to push forward by peaceful penetration whenever possible.

As soon as relief was complete this work was proceeded with, and in consequence on the night 27th/28th our line had been pushed forward without casualties a distance of about 1,500 Yards.

At dawn on the 28th our patrols again commenced pushing forward and by 10 a.m. our line ran. G.36.central., G.30.d.central., G.24.d.8.0., H.19.a.5.0., G.24.b.95. 75. with a defensive flank in front of FRISE to G.24.b.5.2.

Strong opposition as being met with from the village of FRISE & Trench System in H.13.and MEREAUCOURT WOOD. It was decided to take these villages and the trench system and for this operation a Company of the 23rd Bn was placed at the disposal of C.O., 21st Bn.

It was decided to send the Coy of 23rd Bn to mop up FRISE whilst"D"Coy, 21st Bn, plus 1 Platoon of "A"Coy, worked down the 3 Trenches Northward in H.13. Zero was fixed at 3.25 p.m. - 15 minutes prior to which the Field Artillery were to open extra fire on the Village and MEREAUCOURT WOOD, lifting at Zero to the rear of the latter and back area roads and approaches. 1 Gun of 6th A.L.T.M.B.

Little opposition was met with in FRISE but strong opposition was met with by the other party who however worked down the trenches so quickly and bombed with such good effect that this was soon overcome leaving the points in our hand. 50 Prisoners were taken together with about 15 M.G.s., & 3 Light M.W.s. A 77mm Anti-Tank Gun situated about 300 Yards East of the objective on the Canal Bank opened fire but was immediately engaged with Lewis Guns and the crew were

Owing to the enemy still being able to fire on its position it was not possible to get out to the gun which fell to the 18th Bn who later passed through us.

Our casualties were. 2 Officers and 3 Other Ranks Wounded.

In addition to the above mentioned prisoners several of the enemy were killed.

At 7 p.m. the line ran. - From G.36.b.3.5. North along HELENE & SOPHIE Trench past LITTLE WARREN Northwards to the SOMME RIVER.

At 9.30 p.m. the 18th & 23rd Bns had passed through and the Battalion withdrew to G.33.a.
