



In the afternoon first half of the Battalion Sports was held, one of the main features being the many different fancy costumes in the best sustained character event. Sergt. Bessell won the 100 yards Championship for other Ranks, and Lieut. T. MAHONEY won the Officers 100 yards. Some very close racing took place. In the evening all Officers were invited to Battalion Headquarters to celebrate the second Anniversary of leaving HOBART. The Commanding Officer spoke of the good work done by the Battalion during the past twelve months, several songs were rendered by Officers.</p>	
	2-7		<p>The went to the wood in H.14 to meet Mr W.M. HUGHES, but owing to the boat from England being delayed he did not arrive. In the afternoon the second half of the Sports programme was gone on with. Some very fine races were witnessed. Cpl. Barnett won the 440 yards Championship, and Pte. Hannigan the mile. Numerous other events took place, both Championship and Novelty. In the evening the Commanding Officer spoke to all Officers on the A.I.F. Educational Scheme.</p>	
	3-7		<p>Training was carried out in the morning, in the afternoon an Officers Hack Race was run. There were ten starters over a course of about 6 furlongs. Lieut. L.W. BARBETT's "DOLLY" won by about six lengths from Major L.F. GIBLIN's "GUM BOOTS" with Lieut. R.H. SMITH's "DETONATOR" third, after a good race.</p>	
	4-7		<p>Training was carried out in the morning and Inter-Company Cricket Matches in the afternoon.</p>	
	5-7		<p>A Tactical Scheme was carried out by the Battalion. The enemy was reported to have broken through in the ALBERT Sector, and crossed the HALLUE River 3 miles North East of BEAUCOURT at 6 a.m. 5/7/18. The Battalion marched out and took up an Outpost Line in the ST GRATIEN - FRECHENCOURT Line. "A" & "B" Companies took up Outpost positions with "C" Company in support, and "B" Company in Reserve.</p>

QUERRIEU	6-7		The Brigade Sports Meeting took place, one of the chief features being the fancy dress display by the Battalion - Private Jones as a Cock and Privates Evans and Hanigan as an Elephant being exceptionally good. Private Hanigan won the mile. In the evening Battalion Concert was held.	
	7-7		Church parade was held. The members of No 7 Platoon, winners of the Divisional Platoon Competitions were photographed and had their medals presented by Brigadier-General McNICOLL. Orders were received to reconnoitre the HAMEL Sector.	
	8-7		The HAMEL Sector was reconnoitred by several Officers and N.C.O's. In the afternoon Swimming Sports were held. Private Johnson won the 100 yards Championship for O/Ranks and Lieutenant A.R. MILLS the Officers 100 yads. Some interesting Novelty events were held including a pillow fight; riding the barrel on a greasy pole, and fancy diving. This the first meeting of its kind in the Battalion was a great success. In the evening the BANDICOOTS gave a special Concert for the Battalion, but unfortunately the Battalion was ordered to stand to before the Concert was over. A Practice Alarm was held in the Corps Area, all troops took up Battle positions until 1.30 a.m. Sub-18x

The object of the practice was:- (a) To demonstrate the use of Tanks as a substitute for Artillery Barrage (b) To accustom Infantry to work with Tanks. (c) To practice signalling from Infantry to Tanks. "C" & "D" Companies carried out the attacks. HAMEL	1918 11-7		The Battalion moved from RIVERY and proceeded to AUBIGNY by the RIVERY - ^A DOURS Road and bivouaced on the banks of the SOMME until 9 p.m., and then moved into the line. No casualties occurred during the relief, although the enemy shelling was at times heavy.	
	12-7		Day quiet. Weather fine. In the evening enemy artillery was very active on rise East of HAMEL. Continuous enemy movement seen near ARQ ^U AIRE WOOD.	
	13-7		Day quiet and fine. At night a Company of 33rd Battalion relieved "C" Company, "B" & "C" Companies then relieved 37th Battalion. The Battalion now held the line from HUNS WALK P.16.c.10.70 to P.11.a.40.40 with four Companies in the line. Hostile artillery was again very active against the Hill East of HAMEL and on our front line.	
	14-7		During the day several of our planes bombed TAILLOUX and ACCROCHE WOODS. During daylight there was very little artillery fire, but during darkness it developed considerably on both sides. During night "A" Company was relieved by "C" Company 3rd Pioneer Battalion and "D" Company took over "C" Company's position portion of the front, "C" Company moved into close Support and "A" Company moved back as Reserve Company. The dispositions were now:- "B" Company Right Company in line from HUNS WALK to P.16.b.20.50. "D" Company Left " " " " P.16.b.20.50. to P.10.d.90.65. "C" Company Support Company in Banks in P.15.b. "A" Company Reserve Company in old German Front Line P.9.b. Two new posts were dug two hundred yards in advance of our line, one on HUNS WALK and the other about 100 yards to the left of it.	
	15-7		Day quiet. Weather fine. Enemy artillery activity was above normal, the front line and supports being shelled heavily with 7.7's.	
	16-7		Day fine very hot. Artillery activity on both sides. Our planes were very active, flying in large formations.	
	17-7		Day quiet. Enemy artillery was still very active against our front line and on the rise East of HAMEL. A Patrol under Lieut. 	18-7		Day quiet. The Battalion was relieved in the front line by the 37th Battalion and moved out into our old front line in P.8.b. & c., with "B" Company in PEAR TRENCH. The Battalion now becoming "D" Battalion.	
	19-7		The Battalion rested.	
	20-7		Weather fine. The Battalion supplied working parties for Brigade regiments Headquarters dugouts and work on the front line , support and communication trenches.	
	to 25-7		Several heavy showers during the day. The Battalion rested prior to going into the line.	
	25-7			
	27-7		12.30 a.m. relief of the 37th Battalion by the 40th Battalion was complete. The Battalion now becoming "B" Battalion in the line South East of HAMEL, with "A" & "C" Companies in the front line, "B" Company in Support and "D" Company in Reserve. Day quiet. Patrols operated on the Front at night, but no movement of the enemy was observed.	
	28-7		Day quiet. Weather fine. There was a marked falling off in enemy artillery fire. Our heavy batteries were active firing on enemy back areas.	
	29-7		At 12.30 and 1.30 a.m. Our 18 pounders put down a barrage in front of our sector as a diversion for the Minor Operation North of the SOMME. Enemy artillery did not retaliate for this barrage. Patrols operated on the whole front, but could not locate enemy.	
	30-7		A slight increase in enemy artillery activity, and his snipers were very active against movement in our lines. At 7.30 p.m. our Trench Mortars put over a shoot on known enemy Machine Gun positions. Patrols examined HUNS WALK to P.16.c.92.55. and found it unoccupied.

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HAMEL	1918 31-7		<p>Day quiet and fine. Owing to readjustment of Brigade Boundary, the 44th Battalion took over the Sector from our left flank to BENAMBRA Lane, and the 40th Battalion took over the two left posts of the 39th Battalion. The Battalion boundary now extended from the Junction of BARWON Trench and ACCROCHE Street to BENAMBRA Lane. "C" Company to hold the line from Southern Boundary to P.16.a.70.00 and "A" Company from this point to BENAMBRA Lane. "B" Company remained in the same position in Support and "D" Company moved into PEAR TRENCH as Reserve Company.</p>

ALARM PRACTICE.

1. It is intended at an early date, possibly tonight, to carry out by night the manning of Battle stations on the Army front for practice.
2. As this Battalion is part of the Reserve Division of the Corps, its action will be one of assembly on Battalion Alarm positions, ready in every detail to move (should the orders be given) to positions of readiness to meet threatened attack on the Corps Front or Flanks. Battalion Alarm position is at H.10.b.6.4.
3. The required personnel as detailed in Aust. Corps Circular Memo 21/213 of 22nd June will be ready in fighting order, with water, ammunition etc. Fighting limbers with S.A.A., tools etc. will have teams hooked in, but will not move unless ordered. Blankets will be rolled in bundles of 10 and stacked with packs and surplus stores in Company lines. "B" Echelon personnel will assemble at "C" Coys. H.Qrs., Officers in charge of Company "B" Echelons will report at that location to Major L.F. GIBLIN D.S.O., M.C. Signalling Officer will arrange for communications to flanks, forward & to rear, these will be tested. Every detail which would need attention in an actual attack must be thought out and put into practice on the night chosen.
4. States as under will be forwarded to B.H.Q. immediately after the alarm has been given:-

P.F.O

- (1) Troops on alarm position.
- (2) Administrative troops remaining behind.
- (3) "B" Echelon.

The following messages will be sent to Companies:-

"BATTLE STATIONS - PRACTICE - ACKNOWLEDGE"

when troops will act as above, and the message will be acknowledged

"POSITIONS - PRACTICE" will be sent by Companies to B.H.Q. when troops are in position of assembly.

On receipt of message from B.H.Q. "NORMAL DISPOSITIONS" Companies will resume normal dispositions, reporting completion of this by wire to B.H.Q. using the message "NORMAL PRACTICE".

On the alarm being given 1 Officer & 1 runner per Company will report to Battalion Headquarters for instructions.

Water cart teams will be hooked in but will not move.

Lewis Gun Limbers will proceed immediately to respective Companies and will move with them.

Care must be exercised that no orders are given which might be taken to indicate that an actual hostile attack is anticipated.

A report on the carrying out of the practice will be sent by Coy. Commanders and O.C. "B" Echelon to reach B.H.Q. by 10 a.m. on morning following practice.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR TACTICAL EXERCISE (PRACTICE ATTACK)

INTENTION: 1. The Battalion less two Companies will carry out an attack scheme in conjunction with 2nd Tank Battalion at E.20.b. (Sheet 62 E.)

OBJECT OF PRACTICE: 2. (a) To demonstrate use of Tanks as substitute for Artillery barrage.
(b) To accustom Infantry to working with Tanks.
(c) To practice signalling from Infantry to Tanks.

GENERAL SCHEME: 3. (a) (i) "C" & "D" Companies will attack the trenches from a South Westerly direction, the right flank resting on VAUX WOOD.
(ii) Formation. Each Company will be in waves of two lines each.
(iii) Frontages. Will be pointed out on the ground.
(v) Objectives. ditto
(b) The attack will be held up by enemy wire and Machine Guns for so long that the barrage, which will be represented by flags, will get right away from them and will not be caught up.
(c) Tanks on being signalled by the Infantry will move ahead cleaning up strong points, acting in place of Artillery barrage.
(d) Infantry will indicate positions of machine gun nests to tanks by firing smoke grehades. Tanks will then engage these points and will signal by flag when Infantry may continue the advance.

ZERO.

4. Zero hour will be 3.20 p.m.

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DISTANCE. 6. Infantry will not approach nearer than 15 yards from Tanks.

DERELICT TANKS. 7. Tanks flying a red & yellow flag will be out of action.

SIGNALS. 8. Interpretation of the various signals used in the scheme will be ascertained and made known before commencement of operation to all concerned.

GENERAL. 9. All troops not taking part in the actual attack practice will be assembled at a point of vantage. The Senior Officer present will explain the details of the scheme and draw attention to any point of interest which arises while the scheme is in operation.





for month of July 1918

At the start of the month the Battⁿ
was in rest around QUERRIEU.
Companies were broncos + H &
KAP were situated in the town.

The RPT was in a house there was
ample room for work + facilities
for dealing with cases were good.
The usual sick parades were
held but these were not heavy.

The number vaccinated to
hospital for small - influenza
+ PVO¹⁹¹⁸ mainly ascending from
the creek. The cases of men
went out away. A Rest Hut
was constructed + generally 3 or 4
cases kept under observation.
Several cases of scabies were

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satisfactory results. Sports

trees on the bank of the Lorraine
canal. The unit rested for the
day and in the evening moved
with the line with the H & K
Sector. While waiting to move
for ward sick parade was

And several ³ men sent to hospital.
 The Battalion got into position without
 casualties.
 The RAB was situated in a bank
 which also accommodated
 Battalion Headquarters. The RAB
 was only roughly constructed
 by digging out clay. The engineers
 effected considerable improvements.
 There were two small dugouts
 off the RAB which served for
 the sleeping places of the NCOs
 & their men. Casualties were not
 heavy for the period in but one
 night about 12 wounded passed
 through. A ration party on their
 occasion suffered from shell
 fire. During this period
 4 were killed & 3 subsequently
 died of wounds.

During this time diarrhoeal
 trouble started in the Battalion
 & has been responsible for a
 good deal of sickness since.
 On the night of the 18th the Battⁿ
 moved into support. The RAB
 was situated in a trench road
 but no RAB proper was then
 constructed. During our stay
 a good sized room was built
 into the bank. This was well
 sandbaffed & made fairly secure.
 Diarrhoea was the main cause
 of men becoming sick and
 several were evacuated to
 hospital. Subsequent examination
 showed Bacillary Dysentery in some
 of these cases.
 On night 26-27th Battⁿ again
 moved into the line & the
 RAB was likewise situated
