

(a). The Circular Memorandum of Court Martial S.S. 412. Part IV (b) provides as follows;

"Except on the lines of communications, when any man is sentenced by a Court-Martial to, penal servitude or imprisonment he will not be committed to prison but will be kept under arrest until the directions of the Superior Military Authorities under the Army (Suspension of Sentences) Act 1915 are received.

(b). On production of a written request signed by the C.O. of any man so sentenced the A.P.M. will receive such man and keep him under arrest. Such request should be to the following effect;

To give effect the biscuit portion of the iron ration now on the man must be gradually consumed corres -ponding daily under-drawals being made on A. F. B. 55.


In order to be in a position to complete the iron ration biscuits should be indented for and maintained in unopened cases stored under Regimental arrangements.

Courts of Enquiry will be held on all men who havenbeen reported as missing up to date, and in future, as soon as a man is reported missing.

Animals in 1278. Draught. DRO.131-744. BRO.179-2099.

The following order is republished and must be read to all concerned on three successive parades:-

"No vehicle or gun is to be driven at a faster pace than a walk unless the military exigencies of the moment demand it.

Police have orders to report any case of meglect of this prder to Divisional Headquarters through the A.P.M. and offenders will be tried by Field General Court Martial.

Injuries to 1279. Veterinary Officers will submit evidence through the A. D. V. S. to Divisional Headquarters in the case of any animal found to be suffering from an injury caused otherwise than by the action of the enemy; together with the name, No. and Corps of the individual responsible for the charge of the animal.

Bisciplinary action will then be taken, and, if the evidence

warrants trial, the case will be tried by F. G. C. M.

The "Passed by Cansor" stamp is to be used only by the Officer Commanding the unit to which it has been missued; or by am officer to whom he has deputed the duty of stamping communications. The stamp is not allowed to leave the personal custody of am officer. When not im use, it should be kept under lock and key or on the person of the Officer responsible for it. Consor stamps are not transferable.



- The 36th, Battalion, 9th. Brigade, will relieve the 40th. RELIEF. Battalion, 10th. Brigade, in HOUPLINES Sector, relief commencing on 17th. instant, as per relief table attached.
- The Specialiats of the 36th. Battalion will relieve an SPECIALISTS 2. equivalent number of the 40th. Battalion on the 17th. instant, as per 3rd. Australian Divisional Trench Orders, para 4.
- Fifty per cent of the 36th. Bn. (two platoons from each DETAILS OF 3. Company, and the Coy. Commander) will move into the line of the RELIEF. 18th. instant, and the remaining 50% (two platoons from each Coy. and the 2nd. in Command of Company) will move into the line on the 19th, instant. 
