



- 9. BLANKETS. will be rolled in bundles of 20 ONLY, properly labelled and dumped, together with Officers' valises at Q.M. Store at 6 a.m. 14.12.18.

  Duty Company to detail loading party of One N.C.O. and six men to report to Q.M. at 6 a.m. 14.12.18. Company mess boxes will be carried on Cookers.
- 10. BILLETING PARTY. will report at SIVRY Church at 10 a.m. on 14th inst. Capt. L.W.H.CLEIAND, M.C. will report to Brigade Headquarters at 1 p.m. 13.12.18 to proceed by motor ambulance to SIVRY reporting at Church, SIVRY at 4 p.m. to-day. After completing billeting at SIVRY he will report immediately tonBrigade Headquarters in connection with the billeting in next area. Billeting party to be in possession of 48 hours rations.
- 11. COOKS One Cook from each Company will march with the brakesman of each-Cooker. Remainder of Cooks will march in rear of last Cooker under charge of Sgt. Cook. Cooks must be uniformly dressed (fighting order).
- 12. MACKS . Transport Officer will arrange for the delivery of hacks Adjutant, R.M. U. and four Company Commanders.





On the table there were cakes, chocolates, lollies, cigars, cigarettes etc. in galore while beer was issued as asked for. There was more than p plenty of everything that one desired.

The Officers and Committee acted as efficient carvers

and waiters. The whole was a decided success, thanks to the splendid work of Lt. McRAE and Committee, who not only arranged the catering but arranged the hire of crockery and the decorating of the Hall and tables. Music was provided by the Battalian wana.

That there was plenty for all was evident from what remained, for after even the leigian children, who had assembled near by, had been provided with some of the good things, there still remained for later meals, a goose, the whole sheep and about four gallons of vegetables.







2. To effect an improvement each Division will detail a number of Officers and N.C.O's for duty as draft conducting parties. Whenever a draft of 25 men or under is despatched to the Base a draft conducting N.C.O, will be sent in charge Any draft over 25 men will be in charge of a draft conducting Officer with an N.C.O. to every 20 men. These draft conducting officers and N.C.O's will report back to their units when the draft is handed over at the Australian Base Depot, and they will then be held responsible for any indiscipline that has occurred. 3. In addition to the above a picked guard of 10% will be told off from each draft sometime before they leave the Division. This guard will be employed keeping discipline throughout the journey. Later, he again showed the most conspicuous initiative in the capture of hostile posts and machine guns, and rendered invaluable support to his company digging in.


