

FRENCH PATRIOTIC MEETING.


- 1. The inhabitants of PICQUIGNY are placing flowers on the graves in the British Cemetery, tomorrow, 1st. November, and have expressed a wish that the Australian troops billetted in the town attend the Ceremony. The 13th. and 16th Battalions will attend.
- 2. Battalions will be at their starting points at 2 p.m. ready to move off.

STARTING POINT - 16th. BATTALLION OFFICERS' MESS - facing CROUY.

The 16th Batta-lion will block up close to allow the French people to take their place immediately behind them.

Companies will be formed up in SQUARE by 1.45 p.m.

3. Battalions will be formed up at Cemetery as indicated below :-



4. When the Ceremony is over at the British Cemetery, the 16th. Batta-lion will march back direct to the starting point and remain there until joined by the 13th. Battalion.

5. Massed Bands will play FRENCH and BRITISH National Anthems in the SQUARE, after which the troop s will move off under direction of the Battalion Commanders.

ADMINISTRATIVE INSTRUCTIONS No. 94.

- 1. In order to "round up" the large number of absentees from units of the Australian Corps, the five Divisions are taking simultaneous action on SATURDAY, 2nd November in the Aust. Corps Area.
- 2. A muster parade of all units in the Division will take place at 9 am on the 2nd November at which every available Officer, N.C.O. and Man will attend. Every Officer and Other Rank paraded will remain on Duty until 1 pm.
- 3. No leave will be granted for this day except the regular formal loave to England or in France.
- 4. All traffic will be stopped and examined to make sure that, absentees are not making good their escape by this means.
- 5. All Soldiers who are not in possession of proper duty orders by signed by C.O. and bearing orderly room stamp are to be detained in Battalion Guard Rooms.
- 6. Soldiers in British Uniform must prove their identity before being allowed to proceed.
- 7. Examining Posts consisting of 1 N.C.O. and 4 men will be placed at the entrances of Villages to ensure that no unauthorised persons are allowed to enter or leave.
- 8. Officers and N.C.Os. who are responsible for arrests will take all the necessary particulars of the accused person with a view to submitting evidence of arrest at ensuing trials.
- 9. Nominal Rolls and Charge Sheets giving full particulars of all persons arrested will be submitted to D.A.P.M. 4th Aust. Div. on the morning following the "round-up".
- 10. Military Police and Traffic Control Personnol with this Division are wrking on similar lines but are operating outside the Corps

11. The following dotails for work of the 4th A.I. Bde. will apply generally when not otherwise stated.

- 4th Aust. Inf. Bdo.
 12. The points of assembly should be outside the Village in Which a Battalion has its H eadquarters.
 - 13. Only mon who are actually required to guard Military Property during the absence of the remainder of a Battalion should be allowed to remain in Billets and the men thus detailed should be in possession of necessary authority signed by the Commanding Officer bearing the Orderly Room Stamp.
 - 14. When the C.Cs. Units have satisfied themselves that there are no unauthorised persons within the ranks, they will dotail the following picquets for Special Duty in the Villages named.
 - 15. HANGEST, 14th Battalion. 2 Officers, 30 Other Ranks to search carefully through the Village and ensure that no absentees are hiding within it. Special attention is to be given to Esteminets and Brothels which it is thought Absentees may frequent. The Britalion, less the Picquet, will scour the Woods in the vicinity of HANGEST.
 - 16. 15th Battal-ion, will take similar action with rehard to the Village of CROUY, as that laid down for HANGEST with the addition that a Picquet of 2 Officers and 20 Other Ranks be sent to SouES with a view to clearing out that Village.
 - 17. 4th Field Ambulance will act in a similar mannor with St. PIERRE-

18. 13th Battalion and 16th Battalion will co-operate in searching PICQUIGNY. 2 Officers and 30 Other Ranks from each of the 13th and 16th Battalions will be required as a special picquet to scour this town effectively.

In addition to above ? Officers and 30 Other Hanks of 16th Bn. will be detailed to visit BREILLY to search that Villege. The balance of the two Battalians being utilised to search the woods between St.PIERRE and PICQUIGNY, and the latter town and CAVILLON, special attention being given to the placing of examining posts at the entrances to the Villages on similar lines to that laid down for HANGEST.

19. 4th Div. Signal School, 4th Aust. Div. Salvage will co-operate in the searching of FOURDRINOY.

20. CAVILLON will be examined by the personnel of the Divisional Headquarters.

20a. The C.R.E. will clear up SAISSEVAL and SAISSEMONT.

21. 4th Aust. M.G. Battalion. Will be held responsible for the searching of LE MESGE, RIENCOURT, OISSY and DREUTL-LES-MOLLIENS in addition to the Woods in the vicinity of these Villages.

22. 12th A.I.Bdo. will be held responsible for FLUY sub-area which includes the Villages of FLOXICOURT, BRIQUEMESNIL, SEUX, PISSY, FLUY, REVELLES.

In addition to these Villages the 12th Bde. will sond Officers Picquets to MOLLIENS VIDAME, BOUGAINVILLE, FRESNOY and QUEVAUVILLERS.

23. The 13th ACI. Bdo. Will work in a similar manner the BOVELLES sub-area which includes the Villages of SAVEUSE, FERRIERES, BOVELLES, GUIGNEMICOURT and CLAIRY, and will also send Picquots to clear PONT-de-METZ, SALOUEL and SALEUX and CREUSE.

24. The 4th Aust. Picheor Bn. Will search AILLY-SUR-SOMME DREUIL, and MONFIERES, special actention being paid to the former as it is that centre that numbers of Absentees are known to fruquent.

25. Areas to be exploited are shown on attached map.

26. Woods in all Areas will be searched.

COMMANDING OFFICER'S MONTHLY REPORT.

STRENGTH. - This is still fairly low - the few Details that have rejoined have only counteracted against the departure of men of 1914 - 1915 class for AUSTRALIA on Furlough. The majority of these classes are Non-Commissioned Officers.

DISCIPLINE.AND MORALE of the Battalion is good in all respects - especially during the series of Marches from FRESNOY-LE-GRAND to SAINS-DU-NORD.

HEALTH. - The health of the Battalion is fairly good. The epidemic of influenza has been nearly entirely eradicated. There have been a number of cases of bad feet caused through marching in new boots, but steps were immediately taken to attend to them and they are now quite O.K. I regret the loss of one of my Officers (Lieut: C.C. GARRETT D.C.M.) at 3rd. A.G.H., ABBEVILLE, from influenza.

TRANSPORT. - At present exceptionally good. The animals are looking very well, but would do considerably better if they were clipped. Our vehicles are all in good repair and condition.

REGIMENTAL MEDICAL OFFICER'S MONTHLY REPORT.

SICK WASTAGE. - Prevailing Diseases: Total evacuations. - . Influenza .. 29.

REST BILLET. - Eight cases of minor illness were successfully treated in the RestxBillet during the Month.

BATHS, ETC. - Whilst at PICQUIGNY the troops had regular baths and clean changes of underclothes. Since arriving at SAINS-DU-NORD baths have been available also. Baths were also available at FRESNOY-LE-GRAND.

V.D. Prophylaxis. Prophylactic treatment against Veneral disease was available for anyone desiring same whilst at PICQUIGNY, and also since arrival at SAINS. Of the cases of V.D. evacuated from the Unit during the month fully 70% contracted the infection whilst on leave in the U.K. or at the Base, FRANCE.

ROUTE MARCHES. - During the month a considerable amount of Route Marching was done by the Battalion. In spite of the fact that many men were supplied with new boots a certain amount of trouble was experienced with the feet chiefly because there was not sufficient time available for the proper fitting of the boots. Hot foot baths with Pot: Permanganate solution and foot powder were available after every day's march.

DISINFECTION. - Whilst at PICQUIGNY all blankets were thoroughly disinfected by the FODEN method.

GENERAL HEALTH. - An epidemic of influenza occurred during the month and 29 cases were evacuated auximuxkum month sick. However it was held in check by daily gargling of the men's throats and isolation of patients. The epidemic practically disappeared towards the end of the month.

DENTAL. - Adequate dental attention was secured for the Unit whilst at PICQUIGNY.

At a Meeting of the wives of the Agents General held at Australia House, convened and presided over by Mrs. W. M. Hughes, wife of the Prime Minister of Australia, it was decided to forward two Flags to each of the Australian Battalions.

It gives me the greatest pleasure to present two to each of the Western Australian Battalions, viz. the 10th Light Horse, the 16th, 44th, 28th, 51st, and 11th.

We are now forwarding two to mark the location of your Unit and its Headquarters.

Captain Bean suggested that after one has been flown at your Headquarters for a week or two, it should be sent to the Mayor of Perth, with the suggestion that the women there should make, and send other similar Flags to supplement or replace these Flags when they are worn out. The womenfolk at home will be glad and proud of the opportunity of helping the menfolk by sharing in a little work such as this.

We are very proud of your great record, and never more so than now, after the glorious manner in which you have enabled Australia this year to shoulder so great and worthy a share in the cause of the Allies.

The Flag that you retain I hope will bring you continued good luck as long as it flies with you, and, when the War is over, may perhaps represent the 16th in the great Memorial Museum which is to be raised as a monument to the A.I.F. in our Homeland of Australia.
