

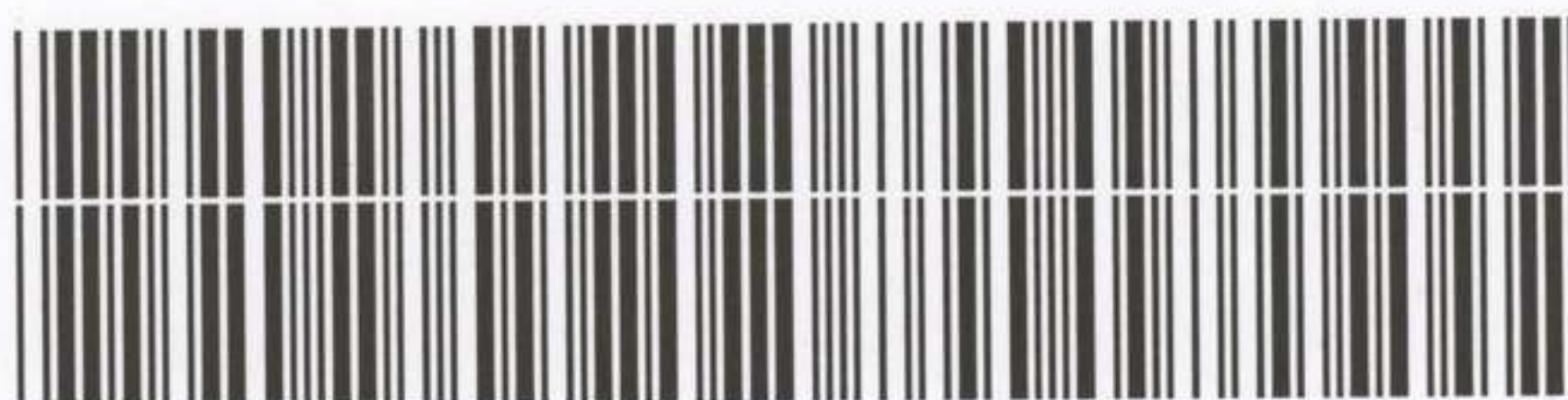

YPRES. Ref Map. Zonnebeke.	10 th to 21 st Oct.		<p>See APPENDIX II.</p> <p>Strength varied from 34 officers and 773 O.R. on the 10th to 32 officers and 608 O.R. on the 21st. <i>(L. Howard & L. Knott joined up as reinforcements.)</i> During this period the weather was extremely bad and both men and animals suffered severely. During the first 4 days 64 men were evacuated to hospital, suffering from trench feet, exhaustion and shell-shock. The A. Echelon were gradually sent back to Transport Lines and their places were taken by men of B. Echelon. Even Cooks, brakemen, bandmen and G.M.'s details were used. The difficulties of transport were very great and 12 animals were lost. In spite of this, rations, water & dry socks etc were taken up daily and after the first 2 days hot soup and stew and tea were taken up in improvised food-containers wrapped in blankets.</p> <p>Strength Officers. 608 (O.R.). Casualties in period were. 2 officers. Wounded. 15. O.R. killed 93 wounded.</p> <p>The battalion was relieved by the 50th Bde. 10th Bde. (Canadians) and moved back to H. 16. Central where they camped in tents for night of 21st/22nd. A. Echelon personnel arrived in a very exhausted condition.</p>

<p>The weather during the period 23/10/17 to 31/10/17 has been very changeable. Sharp frosts and cold rainy days were frequent. The Battalion was engaged in refitting and training which was interfered with by wet weather. A great number of colds, soften cases of influenza and chest trouble in the ranks. The C.O. was on Paris leave from 28/10/17 to 1/11/17 and the command was administered by Major J. Farrell.</p> <p style="text-align: right;">J. Farrell Major Adm. Command 42nd Bty.</p>				

Report of operations of 42nd. Battalion for Period
 Ended - October 2nd - 6th. 1917.

Ref. ZONNEBEKE Map 1 . 10,000

1. APPROACH MARCH .

Previous to Oct. 2nd. all Officers and Sergeants and a proportion of Signallers, Scouts and runners who took part in the attack reconnoitred ~~approach~~ ~~proach~~ routes and objective as far as possible .

On the afternoon, 2nd. Oct. the Battalion entrained at POPERINGHE and detrained at the ASYLUM - YPRES and bivouacked east of YPRES near the MENIN GATE during the night of 2/3rd and the day of 3rd. Oct.

The approach march - route "J" to the point of assembly was marked by tape, white posts and red lights at intervals.

The assembly position was south west of Hill 40 near ZONNEBEKE Railway Station - between the ZONNEBEKE Stream and a line running North West from the railway at a point about D 21 d. 2 1

At 10pm. night of the 2/3rd. Oct. the approach march was commenced from the bivouac area. East of Ypres. Several light showers fell and the going was very difficult owing to the broken slippery ground. The enemy fired occasional shells along the routes and frequently put up Very Lights from Hill 40 across the ZONNEBEKE.

The Assembly position was marked by horizontal tapes and the Company boundaries by tapes running at right angles.

The Assembly position was very broken and boggy, but by 3am on the morning of the 4th. all Companies reported ready for the attack. We had one Officer, 2/Lieut. A.E. Ballard, wounded and two men killed during the approach march.

Battalion Headquarters was established in a dugout at D 27 A 2 9 .

11. Formations and Objectives.

The Whole Brigade formed up 43rd. in front, 42nd, 44th. and 41st. in rear.

The front allotted was 550 yards from the Railway inclusive along a line running N.W.

The 2nd. Australian Division, 25th. and 26th. Battalions attacked on our right and the 10th. Brigade - A.I.F. - on our left.

The plan of attack was for the 43rd. Battalion to penetrate to 700 yards depth, and while the barrage halted 200 yards beyond this point for 12 minutes the 42nd. Battalion was to leap-frog through the 43rd. Battn. and penetrate a further 800 yards to the Red Line which ran across the Railway Line at D 22 b 25.65. southwards through the "T" in Thames and Northward to D 22 a 5 9.

The barrage was to halt 200 yards beyond this line for 47 minutes, to cover consolidation, and during this time the 44th. and 41st. Battalions were to Leap-frog through the 42nd. Battn. the 44th. Battn were to go to an intermediate objective and the 41st. Battn. to the final objective or BLUE LINE, which was 2,100 yards in the enemy ~~territory~~ territory.

The following formations were adopted.

The Battalion attacked on a three Company frontage, each Company taking 200 yards.

"C" Coy. on the right, "B" in the centre, "D" on the left.
 and "A" Coy. in reserve.

Each of the front Companies had 1 Platoon extended to follow the barrage 2 Platoons as Moppers-up and 1 Platoon in reserve.

The reserve Company moved in Artillery formation. (The formations are given in attached diagram)

The barrage was to fall on a line 150 yards east of our assembly line for three minutes, then advance 100 yards, lifts every six minutes.

Zero hour was fixed for 6am.

111. Commanders

The Battalion was commanded by Major J. Farrell.

The Company commanders were -
 "A" Coy. - Capt. G.A. Dunbar
 "B" Coy. - Capt. W.H.A. MacDonnell
 "C" Coy. - Capt. J. Leahy.
 "D" Coy. - Capt. A.E. Halstead.

155 In order to frustrate a possible enemy attack our Artillery at 5.15am put down an S.O.S. barrage which moved forward three hundred yards and remained down until zero hour.

In reply to this barrage the enemy put his barrage down along the ZONNEBEKE-BREMEN REDOUBT LINE. Our rear troops sustained a fair number of casualties during this stage, ~~which~~ ^{which} to avoid they moved forward up Hill 40 until the whole Brigade was crowded into a depth of a 100 yards.

At 6am. our barrage fell like a wall of flame on the appointed line and the whole Brigade rose as one man and moved forward.

An enemy machine gun kept firing for about five minutes from about D 21 a 6 4 and then stopped.

The 43rd. Battn. reached its objective without difficulty. The 42nd. advanced behind the 43rd. Two Officers, 2/Lieut. W.H.COMPER and 2/Lt. J.P. KELLY-HEALY were killed and one Officer, 2/Lieut H.V.CONRAD was wounded before Hill 40 was crossed.

At Zero plus 41 minutes the 42nd. Battalion leap-frogged through the 43rd. and continued the attack. No resistance was met with and the fortified orchard at D 22 a 7 3 and the ALMA Gave no trouble.

The enemy kept firing Very Light signals as our troops advanced and his artillery kept shortening the range. He also heavily shelled THAMES WOOD. We sustained nearly all our casualties at this stage. The 10th. Brigade, on our left, lost direction and drew one left Company over to the left about 200 yards.

This Company Commander immediately threw in his reserve Platoon to fill up the front. The ground was very marshy on this flank which rendered the going difficult and slow and the left Company fell 250 yards behind the barrage. The Reserve Company Commander, (Capt G.A.Dunbar.) acted promptly and threw his men into the gap. All went well and the left Company regained their position.

Large numbers of the enemy occupied the dugouts East of THAMES WOOD along the RAILWAY LINE, but they did not fight and surrendered readily.

Our objective was reached on time, protective posts were at once pushed out and the work of consolidation began. The barrage halted 200 yards beyond the RED LINE for 47 minutes and during this period a large number of prisoners came in, altogether about 100 were captured by this Battalion all in this area.

The dugout at D 22 b 36 was an AID POST and the whole medical staff was captured. This dugout also contained a Machine Gun.

Nine enemy machine guns were captured altogether, 4 of which were new but did not appear to have been fired from. The enemy had evidently been consolidating on the high ground in front of our RED LINE as many half-finished positions were discovered.

The consolidation of the RED LINE was commenced on the following plan. Each Company put out two Lewis Gun Posts, 100 yards in front; these posts were manned by the Lewis Gun teams and two snipers.

Each Company also put down two Platoon posts on its front and each post being about 30 yards long. Three platoons of the reserve Coy. (One to each front line Coy.) helped in this work for two hours by connecting up the posts. The fourth Platoon of the Reserve Company dug in on a line 130 yards in rear of the RED LINE and after two hours the other platoons of the Company came back and also dug in on this line.

The ground was very wet and shell-torn, which rendered the work very difficult; but in two hours the men were under cover.

The work of the evacuation of the wounded, ^{was rendered very difficult} by the long heavy carry and the enemy barrage kept down for (4) four hours after Zero, was very difficult.

During the afternoon of the 4th. the enemy made repeated counter-attacks against the 41st. Battalion on our front, but ~~was~~ ^{was} easily repulsed.

During the afternoon and night of the 4th. the enemy also shelled our consolidated line, the RAILWAY LINE, Hill 40 and the ZONNEBEKE LINE.

During the afternoon of the 5th. he also counter-attacked but was beaten off.

At 9a^m, on the morning of the 6th. the Battalion was relieved after (60) sixty hours in the line.

Our casualties were 4 Officers killed and 7 wounded.

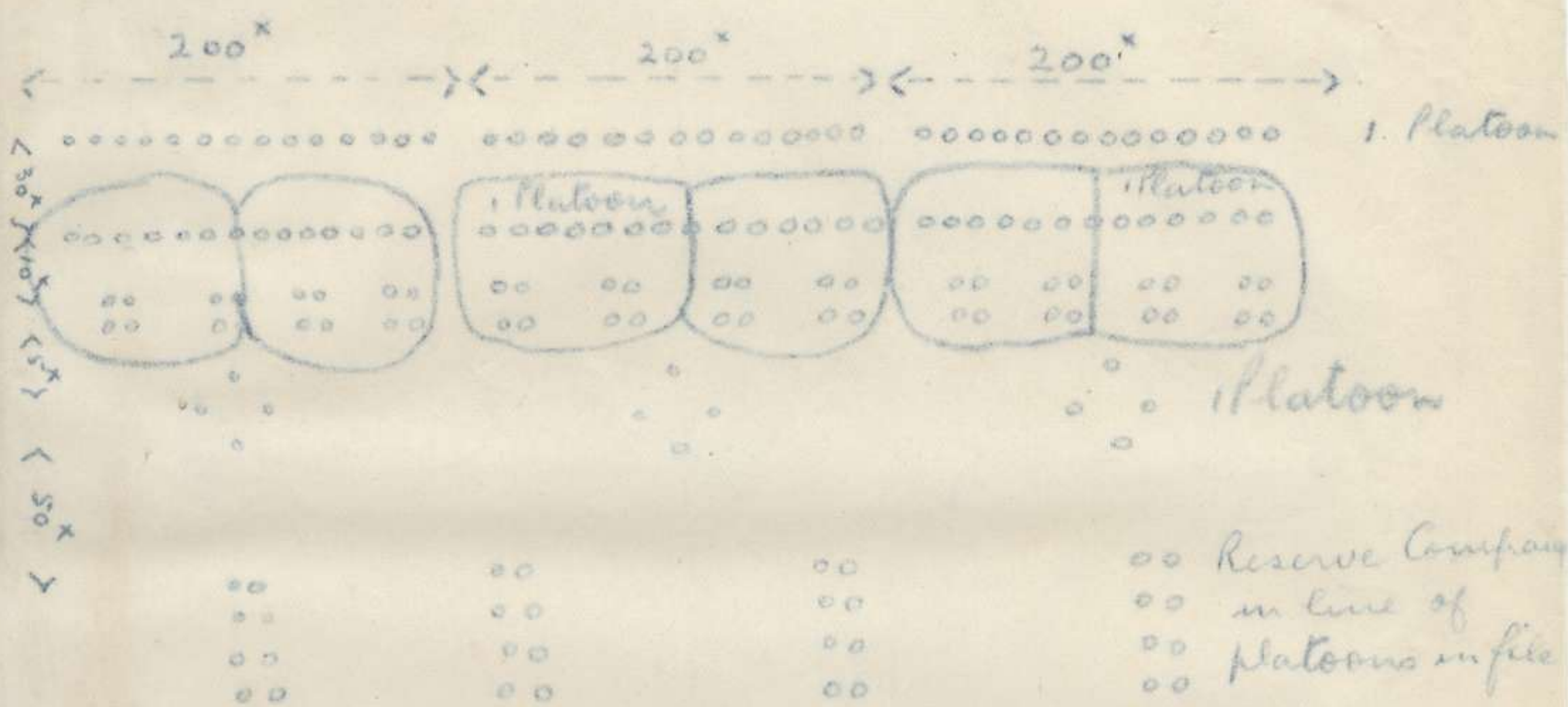

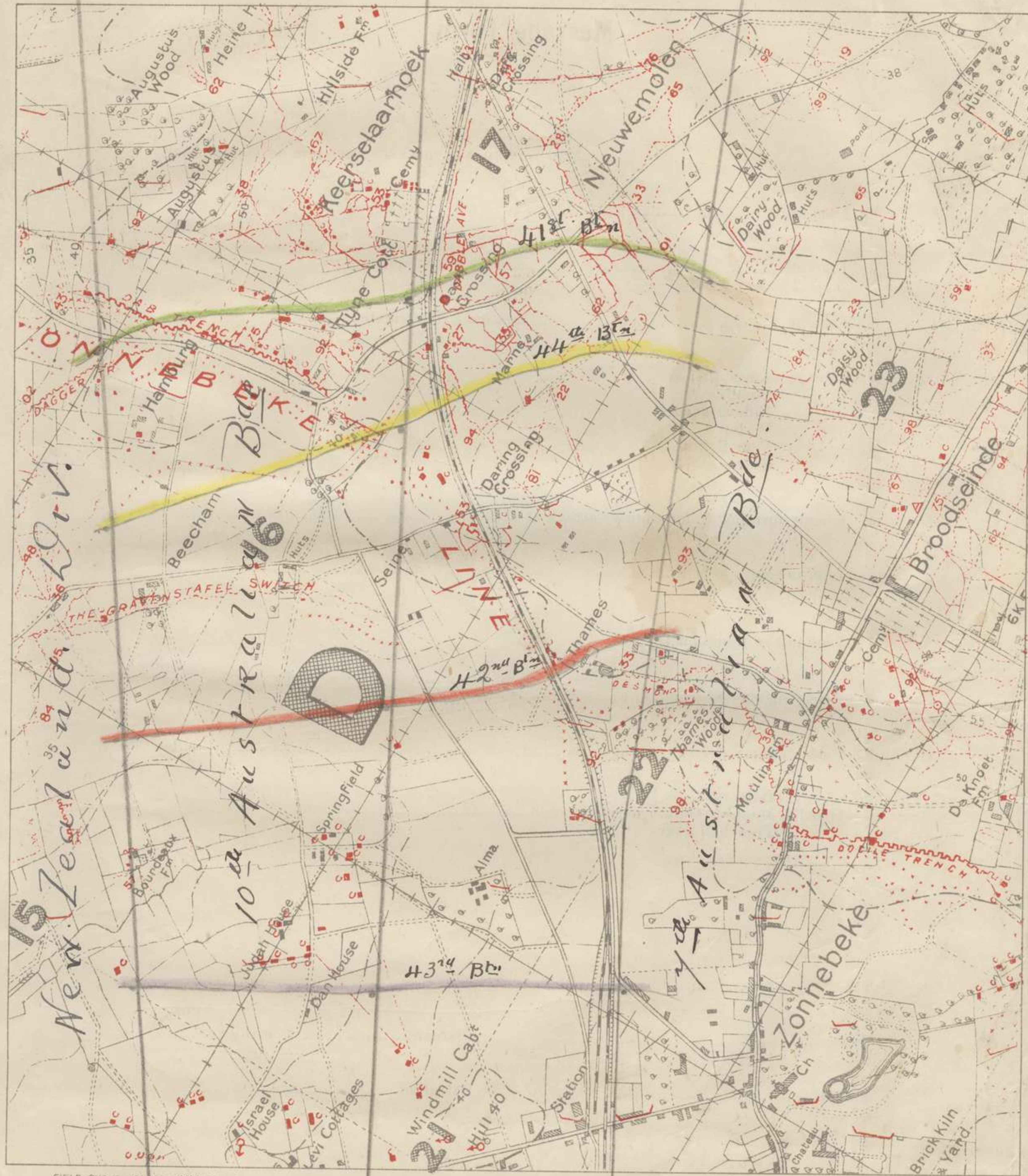

Operations of 42nd d. Battn. - Period Ended 10th./21st. Oct. 17.

Map ZONNEBEKE 1:20,000

I On the 9th. Oct. the 11th. Inf. Brigade received orders to move from hutments near BRANDHOEK and bivouac East of YPRES near FREZENBERG RIDGE, preparatory to taking over the new line from the 66th. Div., which was to attack the PASSCHENDAELE RIDGE on the morning of the 9th. On the morning of the 10th. the 42nd. Battn. was disposed as follows:

"A" Echelon (16 Officers - 400 O.R.) were camped in tents about C 29 C

"B" Echelon (Transport and Q.M's Personnel) were camped in

"C" Echelon (As per S.S. 135) tents EAST of YPRES near the CEMETRY about I.9.a.2.5.

2 Officers and 50 men were detached with 11th. Engrs. Coy.

II The attack of the 66th. Division, on the 11th., was only partially successfully on account of abnormal weather conditions and the condition of the men and the ground. On the night of the 10th./11th Oct. the 11th. Inf. Brigade -A.I.F. was ordered to relieve the troops of the 199th. Brigade - 66th. Div. on the new front about 650 yards, extending from the RAVEBEKE about D 10 b 5.2 through AUGUSTUS WOOD to the ROULERS RAILWAY.

III DISPOSITIONS. The 42nd. Battn and 44th. Battn. held the front line with 3 Companies in front and one in support. The 41st. and 43rd. Battns. were reserves about 400 yards in rear.

The 42nd. Battn. took over from the 2/6th. Manchesters who had suffered severely and occupied the left front from the RAVEBEKE to AUGUSTUS WOOD.

The relief was carried out in daylight and the enemy planes observed the movement. His artillery put down a barrage which inflicted a good number of casualties to our troops and somewhat disorganised the relief. (Capt. A.C. Moyes - M.C. - was severely wounded.)

IV. There was no attempt at consolidation previous to our relief and our troops had to occupy shell holes and carry on the work of consolidation as well as conditions permitted.

The weather conditions were extremely bad; the ground was in a bad state and every trench soon filled with water and had to be abandoned for a fresh position.

During the first 12 hours of our occupation of this position, enemy snipers were very active and inflicted several casualties including Lieut. H.E. Josephs, (severely wounded.), but after our snipers got to work the enemy activity disappeared.

Our men suffered severely owing to abnormal weather conditions during the first 48 hours.

Very good patrol work was done by our men on the left front and one patrol under 2/Lieut. J.E. Wood penetrated 1000 yards towards PASSCHENDAELE without getting touch with the enemy.

V. Battalion Headquarters was established at BOETHOEK at D 8 c 2 9.

The New Zealand Division held the line on our left and the 12th. Brigade on our right (beyond ROULERS Railway Station.)

Attack of the 9th. and 10th. Brigades on the morning of the 13th.

VI.

On the night of the 12/13th. Oct. the 9th. and 10th. Brigades assembled on the front, from the RAVEBEKE to the ROULERS RAILWAY, the 40th. Battn. of the 10th. Brigade relieving the 42nd. Battalion.

The 11th. Brigade moved back about 1000 yards and became Divisional Reserve, the 42nd. Battn. occupying shell holes positions in D 15 c 13, Headquarters remained as above.

At this stage 30% of our men had to be evacuated mostly with feet

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trouble and the effects of mustard gas. The damage was done by men sitting or lying on ground on which shells had burst. The parts of the body in contact with the ground became blistered and painful. Reinforcements from "B" and "C" Echelons were sent up to replace ~~casualties~~ casualties.

The attack of the 9th. and 10th. Brigades was unsuccessful. The 9th. Brigade reached their objective (Blue Line) the 10th. Brigade was held up just West of PAASCHENDAELE ~~RIDGE~~, while the NEW ZEALANDER'S attack, on our left, was held up altogether on account of uncut wire and enemy machine guns.

The result was that the 9th. and 10th. Brigade troops retired to a position just in front of where they started and their casualties were exceedingly heavy.

VII. On the night 13th./14th Oct. the 9th. and 10th. Brigade troops were withdrawn and the 11th. Inf. Brigade once more held the line. The 42nd. Battalion was left support Battalion, behind the 41st. Batt., and occupying positions in the vicinity of ABRAHAM HEIGHTS. Here the troops had to hold on for 48 hours. No offensive action could be taken owing to the exhausted condition of the men and the weather conditions. The 9th. Brigade troops were in reserve in our former positions.

VIII. On the night of the 16th/17th. Oct. our Brigade was relieved by the 9th. Brigade, the 42nd. Batt. being relieved by 36th. Batt. A.I F. and we again became Brigade in reserve, occupying a position about D 14 D. At this period the Battalion strength was 11 Officers 180 O.R. in the line. The Battalion Headquarters shifted to LEVI COTTAGE. Here the Battalion remained until the night of 21st./22nd. Oct. when they were relieved by the 50th. Btn. CANADIANS and the men moved out to a camp WEST of YPRES at H.16 Central, a march of about 7 miles.

IX. The difficulties of transport were very great and all material and rations had to be carried on pack mules. To add to the difficulties of tracks and bad weather the enemy frequently shelled our lines of approach. In spite of these obstacles, hot tea, soup, and stew was sent up to the men daily as well as the ordinary rations, fuel and water. The work of the transport in this operation reflects great credit on the personnel of the Battalion 1st. Line Transport Section, which lost 6 men wounded and 12 animals killed. The men at all times showed the utmost grit and courage and upheld the reputation of the Battalion under the worst possible conditions.

X. Never since the Battalion has landed in France has it been called upon to face such abnormal conditions. Never have the men had to face such hardships or to show such endurance and never have the Officers and men risen so well to the occasion and upheld so well the honour of the Battalion and the best traditions of the AUSTRALIAN Forces.
