



Troops very stale owing to coming out of the line after a 16 days tour, reaching billets very late, at night and having to turn out for working parties. March 5 and 6 Kilos to work before 8 a.m. following morning. Weather very wet and roads and tracks heavy. Effective strength 47 Off. 878. O.R. <sup>s</sup> . Ratee strength 37 Off. 704. O.R. <sup>s</sup> .	
IRISH HOUSE.	2-1-18.		Br. Hd. Qrs at KEMMEL and B + C Coys at LINDENHOEK Camp moved up to join remainder of Br. at IRISH HOUSE. Accommodation for half the troops good, remainder very poor. Raining very heavily. C.O., Adjutant and I.O. reconnoitred Support Brs. Battle position, in case of attack and routes to same. 

War Diary, January 1918

Quarter Master's Report from 1st. to 29th. January.

Supplies. The quality and general condition of the rations has been up to the standard except in the case of bread.

31 JAN 1918

Bread. Advice was received early in the month that the issue would be cut-down to 43%, this only lasted 3 days when it increased again to 66% and has remained so since. It often is delivered in a very broken condition which renders it very difficult to cut up and creates a shortage. This matter has been repeatedly reported to the S.S.O. Damage to bread occurs in transit.

Meat (Fresh). The average percentage for the month has been 55%, the balance has been made up in M & V and Bully Beef. On one occasion during the month 8 cases Pork and Beans was issued: 384 rations, the balance in fresh meat, it can hardly be said this is a meat issue.

Vegetables. There has been a very light issue during the past 4 weeks. The issue is chiefly composed of potatoes and onions and also the vegetables food contained in the M & V ration, the average issue has been 75%. I am assured by the S.S.O. that this shortage will be made up in carrots shortly.

Jam and Margarine. The issue has been up to the standard.

Groceries. Quite up to the scale laid down.

Tobacco and Cigarettes. Full issue is received every week.

Fuel. Occasionally a shortage occurs but this is usually made up.

Burning Oil. Of late there appears to be a difficulty in obtaining our requirements.

Ordnance Stores. The general equipment of the Battalion prior to entering the line in December was up to the establishment. Indents are now being submitted to complete shortages.

Transport Equipment. Is good, there are some articles demanded for and are not yet to hand. During the month all vehicles excepting Cookers have been painted over twice and also improvised dust wheel caps have been fitted in accordance with G.R.O. (M & V tins are cut and fitted for this purpose)

Cookers and Water Carts. Are in good condition with exception to VGV Coy, being second hand when issued in December, it has burned through, this will be sent to I.O.M. for inspection.

Service Dress Clothing. Tunics are all of Australian pattern and supplies seem plentiful.

Australian Pattern Trousers and Puttees are not available, it is necessary, therefore, to accept English pattern.

Hats. English pattern hats are of a very poor quality, which is a green felt, the colour fades to a purple shade in many cases. A small percentage of Australian manufactured hats are coming to hand. The following shows the issue made to the Battalion during the period:-

Underclothing. Is exchanged from Divisional Baths. No difficulty has been experienced in obtaining our requirements. I have always found same in a clean wearable condition.

Boots. Australian manufactured boots are mostly drawn, although all the same pattern the quality varies somewhat, some makes last longer and keep the water out better. A record is being kept of the brand and dates which all new boots are issued, so that the life of the first sole can be arrived at. A clump sole is now being fitted to all boots before leaving Ordnance.

I have to report there are many instances where boots are returned from Corps in a burnt condition rendering them useless for repairs.

The following shows the number of boots issued during the month:-
