

They searched the ground in front of our position and examined the Bridges crossing the River LYS, over which it would be possible for enemy Patrols to pass · 2 Bridges were found to be passable and the others impassable. A vigorous works policy was adopted and Major W.J.R.Scott, D.S.O, Acting C.O ((Lieut)Col Ralston, D.S.O being in England on a months holiday), issued to all concerned an order showing method of making most use of man power available. Much wiring, consolidating and improving of trenches was carried out during the night Enemy artillery and Trench Mortars were quiet on our Sector the weather was mild, with a slight westerly breeze. 5 o·r's were evacuated to Hospitalfrom sickness 2/Lieut N.C.Toogood marched out to 5th Training Battalion in England and 4 o·r's. Lieut E.F.Lumb reported Killed in action is struck off Strength 9.10.17. Our Patrols went out during last night. Lieut Treacher of "C" Coy in charge of the second patrol whilst examining the Bridge North of FRELINGHIEN ROAD was challenged by a German sentry from the opposite bank of the River LYS the patrol at once took cover and remained perfectly still and the enemy opened fire with Machine Guns and Rifle Grenades on No mans land, one of the patrol, a very recently joined reinforcement, showed lack of experience in ill timed curiosity to see what was happening. He raised his head and an enemy Machine Gun bullet killed him dead. His body was left in a position of safety to be recovered later. The remainder of the patrol returned with out further loss or incident. The C.O left Battn H'Qrs at 1.30 a.m. and starting at the left front Coy, visited all working parties and frontnline posts proceeding through CARELESS AVENUE to ESTAMINET HOUSE post, POND HOUSE, post 3.c. 10 and returning to | |

| | | | During the night 56 o.r's (Reinforcements) arrived for the Battalion. These men were a very good class of men and appear far superbor to any recent drafts we have seen. Their physique was all that could be desired andthat they had marched from the Reinforcement Camp FLETRE through to the front line carrying full packs and two blankets spacks very well for their grit and stamina They were allotted to the two Support Coys "C" and "D" and orders were issued that they were no to be put on any work for 12 hours. As is usual with all drafts they had extensiny rations they had which included teh following days ration, however the Quartermaster was able to arrange rations for them. We had therefore considering the front the very high percentage of ki casualties as 3 killed 1 Officer and 2 o.r's wounded in addition 2 O.R s were evacuated sick. 7 o.r's reported back from hospital and were sent to their respective Companies. | | | |



During the tour of duty in the line, the duties will be as follows:-

Two patrols per night, each consisting of 1 Officer, 20 O.R's and Lewis 2. Gun.

These patrols will be found, I from each of the Support Coy's. It would be advisable for the Support Company Commanders to arrange a permanent 图。 Patrol, and Patrol Offficer, for each days duty.

The front line posts during the hours of darkness will each supply, apart 3. from 2 sentries on watch, the remaining personnel to do wiring on the Battalion front. It is desired that not less than 80 coils be put out each night on the front. The second in command of the front line Coy's will

supervise this work. 10 o.r. under a Sgt will be detailed from each of the Support Toy's to act as carrying parties to their respective Front line Companies.

- The Support Companies will supply carrying parties, not to, exceed 10 O.R's under a N.C.O to carry rations to their front line Companies. The remainder of the Companies in Support will be fromed into a permanent working party. It will be seen that this method of organisation will ensure the maximum amount of work being carried out during the night, with a minimum wastage of man power. Carrying and ration parties, having been cut down will therefore have to make at least 6 trips during the night.
- As far as possible the men, excepting sentries on duty, will be enabled to 5. sleep during the day.
- Company Commanders will make arrangements to give the men a hot drink at 6. about 10 p.m. each night, which will make a break for them during the night's work.
- Major Walker will be in charge of the Battalion Sector works, and will 7. have Lieut McMillan as Deputy works Officer on the right Sector, and Lieut Jenkins as Deputy works Officer on the left Sector.
- It is ordered by the G.O.C that all efforts shall be amde to place the Support Line, viz, LONG AVENUE and MONMOUTH TRENCH in a state of active defence, by erecting fire steps at intervals along these trenches. A scheme is being prepared by the Engineers and will be available almost at once.

RESUME OF WORK DURING TOUR IN LE TOUQUET 1.1.18 - 8.1.18.

All ranks co-operated and carried out a vigorous works programme, which included the defence of the Support line, the construction and strengthening of Front line, lateral communications and

new Posts, and shelter accommdation for the men.

The works policy taken over from the 17th Battalion, and drawn up by Brigade Staff, laid down wiring as prior to communications. Forward and isolated posts were wired around so that enemy could not bomb from the fringe of the wire onto the works. In addition the existing wire in front of the forward posts was strengthened, gaps filled, and a continuous belt of strong wire built along the entire front. In all 745 coils were put out making 420 yards of new double double-apron, and 1160 yards of double apron to strengthen existing wire. Both sides of FRELINGHIEN ROAD were wired and what was a weak point made much more secure.

In the Support Line Bouble double-apron was constructed in front of MONMOUTH SUPPORT and LONG AVENUE. The amount of wire comprised 400 coils to construct 960 yards of defensive wire. The grand total of wire put out by the Battalion was 1145 coils used over seven working days The Battalion contributed to the completion of NEW SUPPORT TRENCH running from SUFFOLK AVENUE TO UNA SUPPORT by building 300 yards of parapet from ground level to 6'. 6". The earth was thrown up from a borrow out in front.

- As the Sector comprised a labyrinth of old German Trenches, which had partly and in some places whollyfilled, the new system, comprised the reconstruction of main old enemy works. In this work the Battalion cleaned and renovated 300 yards of old trench, revetted 38 vards, and excavated 70 yards of trench 5' deep and 3' wide. Owing to the wide front and the distance of the outposts from the dumps, carrying materials forward occupied much time. Large parties were detailed each night to follow the winding saps and transport rations and materials to the widely scattered posts.

As per contract arranged direct with Tommy cooker Coy, England, the following re-fills arrived safely during the month:8 cases each containing 100 refills Total:- \$000 Refills

Case numbers were :- 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, 55, 56.

During the month the Battalion had 3 tours in the line each of 8 days and one of 6 days. On each occasion the 2 front line Coys were issued with 1 Tommy Cooker refill per man per day.

For the month nothing special to report. Gonerally specking the ration supplies were very satisfactory except at the beginning of the month when a shortage of fresh bread occurred, the issue to the troops working out at

to one loaf (21bs) to 7 lbs for about 4 days. It is, however, particularly 48 noticed that the issue of biscuits now coming to hand have been more palatable and soft. Comforts for the men.

For the month of January an amount of approximately 529 Francs 80 cts was drawn from Regimental Funds and expended on extra Condensed milk, Potatoes, Candles, and etc for the benefit of the men. Wet Canteen

For month of January approximately 20 large barrels of best quality French beer was consumed by the troops of the 5th A.I.Brigade. The beer was sold at 1 Franc per Mess tin D.S. Total profits for the month amounted to 688 francs 55 cts (£25.4.11) and this amount was paid to the 20th Battalion Trust A/c through 2nd Divisional Field Cashier on 22.1.18.

The Australian Comforts Fund issued to the troops during the month the

following comforts:-

1 Case cigarettes. 1 Curry powder 2 cases milk 1 Rugby football 3 Pkts playing cards.

The three first mentioned were very acceptable and were issued to the troo while in the line.

Cooking.

Cooking was done in thefront line enabling the men to have hot meals each da negularly. Fresh meat was used right through the period in the trenches. RUM. Rum was issued regularly.

Delivery of rations. Rations were delivered to Support line by first line Trans ort and were taken to the front line by Light Railways and carrying parties.

Gum-Boots. During the month a total number of 895 pairs Rubber gum-boots were eceived and on charge to the Battalion for use in the trenches. On balancing up t the end of the month receipts were produced for a total number of 899 pairs ubber gum-boots, thus showing a credit of 4 pairs of Rubber gum-boots to the pod. The boots were found to be invaluable in the line on accuont of the forward rea being covered in water.

LOTHING. The demand on clothing during the month was fairly heavy owing to the men handling and coming in contact with Barb wire.

120 Tunics, 90 Breeches, 48 Prs Puttees, 17 Hts, 33 Prs Braces were exchanged during the month. Sandbags were issued as puttees by the men while in the trenches. A large wwwber amount of mending was done by the Regimental Tailors, particularly to Great Coats and Jackets S.D.

pors, ANKLE. During the month the three Regimental Bootmakers were kept asy on repair work; the rain and muddy condition of the trenches and roads scount for the condition of the boots. Approximately 450 prs were zzzzzzzzzz epaired and 150 Prs new boots issued.

OX. Approximately 5,000 pairs of sox were exchanged during the month. While in the forward area, 2 men per Coy were detailed off to collect wetbsox daily and exchange them for dry and clean sox supplied from Battn Q.M. Store.

MOVE TO REST ALSO FOR RE-FITTING AND TRAINING. On 31.1.18 the Battalion moved from the forward area to the LUMBRES area in ear. After having a hot mid-day meal the men had a short march to the en-Paining station. At the detraining Station, LUMBRES, Hot Tea and Cocoa was upplied to the men by the Y.M.C.A. and on arrival in the billeting area BAYINGHEM), 2 cooks per Coy, with camp kettles, fuel, tea and milk etc, who had een sent ahead with the blanket lorries early in the morning, had a hot drink epared for the incoming men.

LANKETS AND SURPLUS GEAR. For the move, 2 motor lorries were supplied to carry I blanket per man and all surplus blankets, also all extra Equipment and stores uch as Box Respirators, Scouts Clothing MANKETE Bandsmens packs, and several bags of Jackets S.D. Breeches and sox etc.

REGIMENTAL TRANSPORT 4 Travelling kitchens, 1 Water cart, Mess cart, 4 Riding Horses and G.S. Wagon were loaded with rations for consumption for 1stFeb, entrained at Bailleul on night31stJany and detrained at Wizernes, arriving in new billeting rea at 2.50 a.m on morning of 1st inst. RATIONS. Rations had to be immediately unloaded and split up and distribated ready for consumption from breakfast time starting from 8.30 a.m on that lay. REGIMENTAL TRANSPORT. The balance of the Transport with 2 baggage G.S Wagons and 1 Horse Fodder G.S. Wagon attached left per road on morning of 30th Jany. and arrived safely on afternoon of 1st Feby, after billeting one night at Strazeele and one night at Renescure. POTATOES. Potatoes were procurable in abundance (price 30 francs per 100 Kilos) In the new area and 200 kilos werevprocured from Reg Funds as extra rations for the men. . FAT RETURNS. During the month, 10 lbs per day was consumed by the men, and 319 lbs were returned to A.A.S.C. HOT MEALS & HOT TEA. Hot meals chiefly consisted of stews. Roasts and Rissoles were occasionally served when in reserves.

On 3rd January 1918, Transport Section moved into new Camp at ROMARIN, in the PONT de NIEPPE area. Owing to the accommedation being very good, and odder ration received being satisfactory, the horses whowed a marked imrovement in condition.

Roads to ration dumps in the forward area - a distance of about 4 Kilometres - were in a very good condition. Enemy shelling on roads Nil.All releifs carried out without any inconvenience from the enemy shelling or M.G. fire. Numerous loads of salvage transported on return trips nightly. Work for Brigade and the Battalion necessitated a fair amount of

Transport, neverthe less, both horses and vehicles are in splendid condition

Indents for camp equipment were exceptionally light for the month,

owing to suitability of accommodation for Transport lines. The Transport Section was inspected by the Divisional Commander and Brigade Brigadier and Staff, and found to be in a satisfactory condition.

On 30th January, the Transport moved out of area with Brigade Transport Group to STRAZEELE, a distance of about 9 miles. The accommodation fair, weather and roads good. On 31st January Transport trekked to RENESCURE, a listance of about 9 miles. The weather was fine and the roads good, fine

The last 6 days spent by the Battalion in the line was certainly most trying to all ranks d had it not been for the closest supervision by Officers, that mens sox re changed daily and hot food provided, I am quite sure there would have been good deal of sickness. With the exception of one period for a few days when the bread issue was bad, the rations issued for the month have been good. The discipline and work of the Battalion has improved during the month and the nen are now in good spirits, good morale, and very satisfied. I have dealt itly with the doings of the Battalion in the Diary.

A Counter attack by us over the open past SEVEN TREES and SMYTH AVENUE will be most difficult and likely to end in failure owing to the maze of trenches and remains of heavy wire entanglements. The means of success, therefore, will be by bombing up the trenches. The first objective will be the Support LINE. When the Battalion is assembled in C.8.a. orders will be issued to advance to the deployment position, and form up there organised for offensive bombing in accordance with the principles laid down by Brigade Training Memo No. 25, which has been issued to all Companies. At a Zero hour to be notified by Brigade Headquarters, they will move forward to the attack. "B" Coy. will bomb down SEVEN TREES AVENUE and SMYTH AVENUE to LONG AVENUE, up LONG AVENUE to junction with MONMOUTH AVENUE, establishing a block at the junction of LONG and BARKENHAM AVENUES. Should "B" Coy. be in the SUBSIDIARY LINE, "A" Coy. will have this task. "D" Coy. will bomb along NICHOLSON AVENUE, HARNIAN AVENUE and MONMOUTH AVENUE to the junction with LONG AVENUE. Should "D" Coy. be in the SUBSIDIARY LINE, "C" Coy. will have this task.

Officers and N.C.O's. will reconnoitre their different tasks. When the SUPPORT LINE has been recaptured, the senior Officer on the spot will reorganise the troops with the view of pushing forward and re-establishing the old front line position. The remaining Company will be in reserves and will detail one Platoon to either of the Companies to whom the tasks have been allotted, and

have one Platoon in the SUBSIDIARY LINE. The reserve Company less one Platoon will be at Deployment Position and will hold themselves in readiness to act as Carrying Parties or as otherwise ordered.

Mjr. HAILES, D.S.O. went on English leave on the 31st. Dec. 1917. Capt. Cameron of 7th. Aust. Fld. Amb. is temporarily acting as R.M.O. New Years Day found the battn. in the line having taken over the line on the evening of the 31st. The battn. sector lies approximately between ARMENTIERES on the southern border and PLOEGSTEERT on the The 20th. Battn. are the right battn. of the northern. right brigade of the division, so that our R.A.P. is on the extreme right of the division. The R.A.P. is very roomy and situated above the ground. Its official name is SURREY FARM, though there is not much resemblance to a farm. There is accomm dation for nine patients in addition to a room for the M.O. and another room in which 4 details can During the time spent in the spot i.e. be housed. 'During the following days up to the 8th. Jan. everything was fairly quiet, no shelling occurring around the R.A.P. The casualties for the battalion were 3 men killed and 4 wounded, being caused by a 'Minnie' large size. The cases were brought from the front trenches, which varied from 2 to 1 mile ahead of the R.A.P., by a heavy carry along saps and then along a decanville line to a hand truck. Men suffering from minor maladies were kept for a few days at the R.A.P. and could be treated quite well there. Medical stores and comforts reached the R.A.P. without delay from the A.D.S. which was administered by the 5th. Aust. Fld. On the evening of the 8th. Jan. the battalion was relieved by the 17th. Battalion and moved back to ROSSIENOL CAMP about 1 kilo from NIEPPE. A large Nissen But Camp provided plenty of accommodation. The usual sick parade and sanitary supervision were carried on. Foot washing parades were held regularly. A moderate number of men suffering from Diarrhoea, also a fair percentage of boils amongst the men on sick parade. On the evening of the 16th. Jan. the battn. moved into the line again. Mjr. HAILES returned from leave on the 15th. Jan. and Capt. Cameron rejoined his unit. Owing to the recent heavy rain, the R.A.P., which the A.M.C. had inhabited on their last excursion into the line, was found to be flooded out by the overflow of the LYS RIVER. The 17th. Battn. had vacated it and had taken refuse in the remains of a farm near by but were in rather uncomfortable circumstances. The A.M.C. spent thenight there whilst the Pioneer Sgt. and his merry men drained up the water and pumped out the R.A.P. Next day by mid-day it was habitable again. The battm remained in the line until the 22nd. Jan., when they were again relieved by the 17th. Battn. During this time the front was very quiet and there were only two minor casualties? (both wounded), very liltle sickness and no Trench Feet sufficiently serious or advanced to necessitate evacuation to the Ambulance. A few cases of commencing Trench Feet occurred and were sent back to the Transport lines. The RIVER LYS gradually diminished in size and the saps became more passable. The battalion returned again to ROSSIGNOL CAMP and remained there until the 28th. Jan., when they moved to BULFORD CAMP near NEUVE EGLISE. On the 24th. Jan. Mjr. HAILES? D. S. O. relinguished his position as R.M.O. after 14 months continuous service towards the end of which he was awarded the D.S.O. He is transferred to No. 1 A.G.H. and I take his place as R. M. O. 2 A. M. CDetails were returned to the 5th. Aust. Fld. Amb. on the 24th. Jan. Their names were Cpl. SIMPSON and Pte. YEARDLEY and both were original men of the battalion. On the 26th. Jan. a sum of eighty two francs was received from the Red cross Society for distribution between the A.M.C.Details. A receipt for the sum and a note of thanks from the details was returned to the Australian Branch of B. R. C. S. BOULOGNE.

Continuation sheet No. 2 for month of January 1918.

Two stretcher bearers have been taken into the A.M.C. for training and instruction to replace the men returned to the Ambulance. Cpl. JONES D. the stretcher bearer CBL. replaces Cpl. SUMPSON and is in charge of the A.M.C. Details. On the 21st. Jan: a scables inspection was held. At 10.20a.m. on the 28th. Jan. the battalion moved to BULFURD CAMP. Latrine accommodation is sufficient and buckets are used. a large incinerator disposes of refuse and burns well. The men appear in good in good health and spirits after leaving the trenches and are looking forward to a good month's spell in the back areas. One company, though which has just come back from the subsidiary line is suffering a little from diarrhoea. On the 31st. Jan. the battalion left BULFORD CAMP and marched a couple of kilos to the entraining point at KENNEBEK where our train collected and conveyed us to LUMBRES, which we reached about 7 p.m.
